IN EXTRA SESSION.

The Second Legislature for the Consideration of Appropriation Bills.

THE HOUSE—SEVENTH DAY.
(AFTERNOON SESSION)

A pleasantry—with a lining of common sense, however—characterized the meeting of the House yesterday afternoon. When it was resolved to go into committee of the whole, Wright, the chairman, declared a recess for ten minutes, as he invariably does when called to the chair. It seems, however, that Wright has not always been prompt in terminating these recesses and resuming business. The fact had not escaped the notice of Speaker Beckley. So, yesterday afternoon, when the ten minutes had passed and there was no move on the part of the committee's chairman, the Speaker rapped for order.

"The Committee of the Whole having failed to sit," he said, "the chair recalls its order and is ready for regular business."

There was a tickling about the risibles of several members, who saw the point; a minor petition was presented, and then a motion to go into committee brought Wright promptly forward.

All the items in the list for Maui roads, etc. passed. Oahu appropriations were taken up and the following items passed:

Roads and bridges, Koolaupoko, \$1,125; relocating road to Kailua, \$2,000; repairs to roads damaged by storms; \$2,500; repairs to bridges \$500; road machine, \$400; road roller, \$500.

Koolauloa—Roads and bridges, \$2,325.

Wailua—Roads and bridges, \$200; steam road roller, \$3,000.

Ewa road and Waiauae—Puuloa road, \$2,500; Makua trail, \$500; steam roller, \$3,000.

Honolulu—Roads and bridges, fourth district, including Nuuanu street, \$66,000; roads and bridges, fifth district, \$50,000.

On the island of Kauai all the items passed as in the bill, as follows:

Kauai—Waimea—Roads and bridges, \$1,250; new bridge over Waimea river, \$20,000; bridge at Holoalea, \$1,000.

Lihue—regrading of roads into Huleia valley, \$8,000; roads and bridges, \$3,875; regrading road into Nuuanu valley, \$500; bridge at Huleia gulch, \$2,500; steam roller, \$3,000; regrading Lihue road, \$5,000.

Koloa—Roads and bridges, \$1,500 road in Kalaea valley, \$500.

Hanalei—Roads and bridges, \$1,500.

Kawaihau—Roads and bridges, \$3,225.

Niihau—Roads and bridges, \$125.

All the items in the department of education passed.

In the department of public lands the general item of \$3,875 passed, but the item for "incidentals" in the agricultural bureau, \$2,500, was thought not to be sufficiently specific and was deferred. Agricultural fairs was raised from \$1,250 to \$2,500, and the lump item of \$12,500 for running expenses of the survey department was deferred, the expenditures not being clearly and sufficiently specified.

Clouds began to gather when the Board of Health was reached, and the item of \$3,750 for general expenses was put over. In the item of \$1,500 for disinfectants and vaccine, the word "vaccine" was stricken out. After a good deal of bantering and "rubbish," the item of \$60,000 for segregation and support of lepers passed. New items inserted were: For treatment of lepers, \$10,000; entertainments at the settlement, \$350; freight on packages

MISCARRIAGE OF SPOILS.

A great noise is being made by the evening appetizer of the morning toner because the House of Representatives has refused—or rather, the clerk has—to permit the use of its paid vouchers in its columns as a means of exposing how public funds were spent during the sixty day session. We see no reason now for making all this noise, as it can resort to the same means of publishing the list of warrants drawn upon the Treasury, by permission of the Registrar of Public Accounts, and during the absence of the Treasurer on Maui.

At the time the "expose" was made, the request of the Star had already been refused, and properly too, and the House had placed its fiat upon such action in declining to adopt the Greenwell resolution introduced a few hours before the close of the last day's session (Tuesday evening, April 28 last). And when the Registrar permitted such departure to be made from the advice of the Treasurer, he did something unknown of heretofore, knowing also that the House had already given its refusal. We are further informed that the Registrar, in company with the Star man, went to the Clerk of the House and were both told that he could not permit such use to be made of the vouchers without the permission of the House, and after that the Registrar used his discretion, by being prevailed upon, in the absence of his chief, unless he must have had his permission in advance before leaving for Maui, or probably by a wireless message, we don't care how, but the harm has been done.

"The documents of the session are supposed to be turned over to the Secretary of the Territory when the session ends," so says the Star. And

properly, too, but, he is nothing more than the custodian of the legislative archives. We very much doubt whether he has the right to open up any of the records and give out for publication certain matters wanted by sensational and hungry news gatherers, as in the case of these vouchers, without due permission being first obtained from either the Senate or the House.

In former Legislatures, detailed statements of how public funds had been spent during sessions were never published, and in the present instance, why is the desire, unless it be to show how the mighty have fallen? It was claimed that Home Rulers fared well in the Republican controlled House of Representatives: they receiving nearly all the work, and Republicans hardly any at all. Did Republicans expect that when work was to be done, the House or its officers should have gone out in the alleys, by ways and on skirts looking for Republicans to do the work when there were others near by and on hand who could do the work just as well. But not so with the Home Rulers, those who made much out of the Republican House and who were willing to work; they were always on hand and on time, and of course the work was given them and was done, too, in time. Who is to blame for this miscarriage of spoils?

Ever since the beginning of regular session, it is known that it has been the desire of both the morning Toner and its evening Appetizer to have a chance of publishing the vouchers, but not getting it directly, it sought other methods. But why the House alone? They had better get consent from the Senate first, to publish its vouchers, and when that is gotten, then try the House whether it will give like consent or not. Why show partiality to only one arm of the Legislature, why not both arms? What is good for one should be as well for the other, or as in the well-known adage—"what is sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander."

Now, while all this noise has been made over the Hcuns expenditures, but not a word has gone forth as to the Senate. The Senate saw fit and proper to give its officers more money after finding out that it had a balance of over \$1,000 to its credit, out of its \$25,000 expense appropriation for the regular session. When it did so, not a word was raised by our immaculate morning and evening contemporaries. The Senate had no more right to apportion that balance out to its employees, when it should be considered that the fund was not theirs to give away as they pleased, but was the public's. We very much doubt whether they would do the same thing to their own personal funds. And further, why give stationery to two Senators only, and not to all. This is partiality with a vengeance, and they had no right to deal so with public funds and public property.

And Representative Wright lost his easy job of playing chairman of the House Committee of the Whole this morning. He ordered one of those five-minute recesses too often, and instead of five, it exceeded over that time and the Speaker had to take charge again and ordered Representative Long to hold down the chair. This caused another member to send word to us that "Wright got the sack." Too too!

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Somehow or other Dole is always making a blunder. The latest is his appointment of an Englishman to extend to President Roosevelt, that Hawaii's latch string is still out.

Judging from the number of "protests" the Advertiser is receiving against smoking in the Orpheum, one might assume that its office typewriters will soon stand in need of repair.

Why did Governor Dole appoint W G Irwin as the one to represent Hawaii should President Roosevelt extend his visit to California? Is it because he is a foreigner, a subject of King Edward VII?

Representatives were in a generous mood last afternoon, they virtually assenting to whatever was asked. Representative Gandall got all he asked for the Island of Kauai, and others, too, for their respective districts.

If attention had been paid by our fathers to the whine of that element of woman-kind, which had sealed and labelled itself "A. O. K." and then proceeded to Carry-Nation everyone else's likes and ideas, man would long ago have had to climb a tree to do his smoking and seven eighths of the other things he does.

Wailuku, after having had a bill passed and approved for the establishment of a volunteer fire department, also providing for its equipment and housing, now seeks an appropriation for a chemical engine, followed by a like request for Waimae, Kauai. A hog is known when he grunts, as in these instances, and in the instances of steam rollers and rock crushers.

The House yesterday afternoon ran up against an item of \$2,500, in the agricultural bureau's budget, for "incidentals," and cautiously and rightly deferred it for investigation. As we pointed up yesterday there is no justification of these blind or speculative appropriations. Let every such item be investigated. For what is this \$2,500 in the pigmy bureau to be used? It cannot be for pens, pencils, ink, etc., for \$10 would supply that demand for two years. Let the facts come out in this case, as well as in the other (and larger) ones.

"Keliinoli" means "the begging" or "the asking chief." The name of the Representative of that name from the Island of Maui was probably derived from such a source and this may account for his asking propensity in the House for Wailuku, for a volunteer fire department, chemical engine, and the curbing and paving of Government lots, etc. He evidently believes in the Scriptural adage: "Ask and it shall be given thee," for nothing can be got without asking. Right ye are, keep on asking, even if it should exceed your proportion of taxation, as all will come out in the wash at the end.

What has become of the Board of Health's medical dispensary? This institution was established for the benefit of the poor, and was supposed to have a fixed home where the poor might find it and avail themselves of its advantages. For more than three years the dispensary has been largely on moving drays, and has stopped nowhere long enough

for the sick poor to relocate it. In fact, owing to freak superintendency the dispensary never comes to light any more except at the periods when it has a hand out for its appropriation from the Legislature. For all practical purposes the dispensary has become a dead letter. It should either be chained down somewhere and properly managed, or abolished altogether.

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

Col C P Pauka has resigned from the Republican central committee.

M S Gribbaum arrived by the Alameda this morning from California.

Judge De Bolt will tomorrow hear only arguments on demurrers and motions.

First Officer J Hibus is in charge of the Lshua at present, Captain Naopala being ill.

A drill of the second battalion of the National Guard has been ordered for next Tuesday evening.

Col Thomas Fitch has decided to remain in Honolulu and will open offices in the Young building.

The Peking was sighted shortly after 5 o'clock this morning nearly a day late from San Francisco.

This is the evening of the dance, given by the Catholic Ladies Aid Society, in Progress hall for charity.

Prof A Koebela, the bugologist, returned by the Alameda today from his tour of Mexico and visit in California.

The Jane L Stanford left yesterday and the Blakely will get away today for San Francisco, both loaded with sugar.

Judge Robinson has excused his jury until Monday morning, it being expected that by that time the grand jury will report.

O P Cameron, of the Honolulu Undertaking Parlors, who is suffering of blood-poisoning, is on the high road to recovery.

Commissioner Douthitt will Monday morning hear the case of the Japanese woman charged with violating the Edmunds Law.

Miss Harriet C Austin has resigned from the office of electoral registrar and will leave in the Alameda for a visit to the mainland.

Owing to delay in repairs to the refrigerator and water tanks of the Sumner, that vessel will not get away before late tomorrow for Manila.

Secretary Carter yesterday began issuing certificates to claimants to the Chinese fund, and will continue to do so until all the depositors have been paid off.

The Elks minstrel next Tuesday night will be a continuous performance, there being no recesses. The box plan is now open at the store of Wall, Nichols Company.

The Siberia arrived early this morning from Yokohama on her way to San Francisco. She brought 1400 tons of freight for Honolulu and a long list of through passengers.

It is said that there will be no appeal in the Fearles-Nevadan salvage case, and that the owners of the latter will in a few days pay Sprackels & Co. the \$6,000 awarded by the court.

Mlle Dolores had a good sized audience at the Hawaiian Opera house last evening. The singing of the star and program generally were fully up to the high mark of excellence promised.

An election will be held in the headquarters of Company A, N G H, next Thursday evening for the election of officers. The only ticket in the field is as follows: First Lieutenant E L Beradt, to be captain; Second Lieutenant O J Whitehead, to be first lieutenant; Sergeant-Major Chas Crozier, to be second lieutenant.

Upon the assurance of Manager Ballentyne that there would be no reduction in wages, a threatened strike of conductors and motormen of the Rapid Transit Company this morning was averted. It is the company's purpose to employ some of the Portuguese who formerly drove tram cars, and this had led to fears of a reduction in wages.

IN EXTRA SESSION.

The Second Legislature for the Consideration of Appropriation Bills.

THE SENATE—EIGHTH DAY.

Met pursuant to adjournment, and the regular routine was disposed of as usual.

House Expense Bill was taken up on second reading and referred to Ways and Means.

Nothing else being ready on hand, adjournment was taken.

THE HOUSE—EIGHTH DAY.

After the regular routine had been disposed of as usual, a communication from Secretary Carter, in reply to Resolution 10, asking for a supply of copies of the Constitution of the United States of America, in which he says "that I have no copies of the Constitution of the United States of America for distribution. If the Legislature should so desire, I should be very glad to include the Constitution of the United States and the Organic Act in the pamphlet which is to contain the County Act. If the members of the House desire copies of the Constitution of the United States, surely the appropriation for expenses of the House can cover the cost of a few copies of The World Almanac and Encyclopedia."

A communication was also read from E R Stackable, Collector of Customs, relative to the taking care of the Light House of this Territory without any assistance from the Territorial Government, and in reply thereto, he gives as his opinion that the communication from the Clerk of the House should have been addressed to The Honorable, The Secretary of the Treasury, President of the Light House Board, Washington, D C. And in this connection, he deems it proper to invite attention to Sections 4653 to 4680 inclusive, U S Revised State and particularly to Sections 4660, 4661 and 4662.

The Merchants Association sent, by its Secretary, P R Helm, a copy of a resolution passed at its meeting of the 6th instant, as follows:

"Resolved, that it is the sense of this Association, that the present Legislature be asked to appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars, to reimburse the business organizations of Honolulu for the monies expended, and to compensate Mr J G Pratt for the successful prosecution of the Fire Claims Bills at Washington." Tabled for consideration with the Appropriation Bill.

Aylett presented a petition from homesteaders at Hauula, Koolauloa, praying, for the second time and as supplementary to their first petition, that \$3,000 be inserted in either the Appropriation or Loan Bill for the construction of the road and bridges to the said Hauula Homestead Lots. The whole amount required is \$20,000. To Public Lands.

Harris, from special committee on the petition of E van Sinden for reimbursement of \$1210, for the purchase price of Lot 10 in Nuuanu Valley, who was refused to hold the lot on account of his not being an American citizen, recommends the insertion of the amount in the Appropriation Bill. For consideration with the bill.

Harris offered a resolution that \$20,000 be inserted in the Appropriation Bill for the purpose of advertising the resources and advantages of the Territory. Referred to a special committee, composed of Keliinoi, Paole and Harris.

Kealswa also presented one for \$750 each for teacher's cottages at Kamsili, Puua, at Keaukaha and Puuou-uka, Hilo, and at Papaalos, N Hilo. To Health and Education.

Aylett also offered another that \$300 be set apart in either the Appropriation or Loan Bill for a separate building for the turnkey and telephone keeper of the Hauula jail. With the Appropriation Bill.

Frank Davey petitioned that he has had compiled, and is now having printed, a handbook, entitled "Glimpses of Hawaii, and Hints to

Travellers and Tourists," which will be copiously illustrated, and including a map of Honolulu, etc, 25,000 copies will be distributed, and 100,000 copies will be delivered to the Secretary of the Territory partly in Honolulu, and partly in St Louis, for not more than \$3,000. And the petitioner prays that such an item be inserted in the Appropriation Bill. Referred to the same special committee with the Harr's resolution.

Then the House went into Committee of the Whole on Bill 3, six months current account, with Wright as chairman. H, as usual, ordered a five-minute recess and took more, when the Speaker took charge of the House again and called Long to the chair. Long asked to be excused, but the Speaker would not take any excuses, and he therefore took the chair. Wright came in later, but found his place taken.

Much discussion was held on the item for the Associated Charities for running expenses, \$625 Kaniho moved to strike it out but failed. Keliinoi moved to increase to \$1250, but that also failed, and finally the item passed as in the bill.

Incidentals and traveling expenses, Auditing Department, \$1,500, was next called up. Greenwell moved to reduce it to \$1,000. A discussion was aroused on this item, the end of it all being a motion by Pulaa to rise, report progress and ask leave to sit again, which motion prevailed and the report adopted.

And on motion, adjournment was taken, so as to permit the members to visit Kapiolani Park this afternoon, all to meet at the House before going out.

sent to Kalaupapa, \$500. For the
support of non-leprous children of
lepers, \$5,000 was inserted in the
bill. All the other settlement items
were deferred.

Under the hospital's, etc, the item
of \$5,000 for emergency quarantine
purposes was shelved. The item of
\$2,000 for expenses of a garbage
crematory was struck out, and an item
of \$1,800 for the same purpose was
inserted in the public works appropria-
tions. The hospitals got all
they asked for, and the appropria-
tion for Kapiolani Maternity home
was raised from \$2,400 to \$3,000.

The item of \$2,500 for Territorial
dispensaries was raised to \$3,000 and
passed.

Five thousand dollars was voted
for a telephone system between
Kalaupapa and the two centers of
Halawa, a large part of the paid
for the settlement coming from there.
