

- (a) Assistance. (See under welfare)
- (b) Schools. During the typhoons five (5) schools were completely demolished and five (5) lost their roofs and are unfit for occupancy at the present time. The remaining four (4) are in operation. Reconstruction will be undertaken solely by the natives when every family has repaired its home. It is Yap custom to refrain from constructing community buildings when any individuals within the community are without shelter. Schools will be constructed from native materials and by native labor, as heretofore. The early construction of these schools is being encouraged by CAU, but no physical assistance is contemplated.
- (c) Churches. Church services are being held in the basement of the Yaptown School which itself is mission property. Upon completion of a new school by contractors from Guam it is contemplated to return the mission building to the church.
- (d) Community Buildings. Almost without exception the Yap club houses and guest houses in each district have been either destroyed or severely damaged by the typhoons. As described in paragraph (b) above, reconstruction cannot be undertaken until private homes have been replaced. When such reconstruction is undertaken it will be accomplished by native labor as community projects and without the aid of the CAU.
