GREAT NORTHERN HOPES.

Spokane (Wash.), May 9.—Contractor Coykendall said to-day that the Great Northern would positively be completed into Spokane by June 1st. President Hill has notified the business men of Spokane that he will be ready to handle freight here by June 15th. The road is now built to within forty miles of Spokane, and is coming this way at the rate of two and one-half miles a day. The bridge over the Pand d'Orelle at Albany falls was completed several days ago, and construction trains are now passing over it.

About half of the 170 miles between here and the Columbia river has been graded, and the other half will be completed about the 10th of August. Mr. Coykendall, who has been superintendent of the work here, will leave the day after tomorrow for the Columbia river to take charge of the work on the Cascade division. J. W. Colt succeeds him here. C. Shields of the St. Paul, Chicago and Kansas City Railroad, has been made superintendent of the Pacific extension of the Great Northern road, and will arrive in Spokane in a few days to assume the duties of his office.

TO TEST COAST COAL.

Washington, May 9.—Coal merchants in the West, having succeeded in inducing Secretary Tracy to order the use of American coal for vessels of the American navy whenever practicable, are now quarrelling among themselves for contracts. So many letters have recently been received at the Navy Department from persons interested in coal mines on the coast, each claiming that his particular coal is the best, that the department, in order to establish a good standard of Pacific coast coal, has authorized the appointment of a board of naval officers to make a thorough test of the steaming qualities of the different bituminous coals on the Pacific coast. Hereafter, also, no special kind of bituminous coals will be used by the Navy Department for making trial trips of cruisers.

SUNDAY CLOSING IN SAN JOSE.

San Jose, May 9.—The Common Council to-night passed an ordinance requiring that all saloons should be closed at 10 o'clock Saturday night and not to be opened until 5 o'clock Monday morning. At least one-third of the doors of the saloon must be of clear glass and nothing must obstruct in any way the full and free view of persons passing along the streets or sidewalks.

There shall be no drinking in back rooms or any place in the saloon other than the bar. The penalty of violating the ordinance is a fine not exceeding \$100 or imprisonment of not more than thirty days. One of the Councilmen voted affirmatively in order to call for a reconsideration, which will be had next Monday night.

LIQUOR IN ALASKA.

Senator Dolph to-day presented to the Senate a letter from the Attorney-General showing the great difficulties in the way of enforcing the law prohibiting the sale of liquor in Alaska. He says grand juries refuse to indict liquor sellers who sell to white men, but will indict those who sell to Indians. It is very easy to violate the law, even as to the Indians, and it is constantly done. More money is needed for deputy United States Marshals, as the force is at present entirely inadequate and should be increased.

DEATH IN A CYCLONE CAVE.

William Wilkins, colored, his wife and five children entered a cyclone cave at Anthony, Kansas, on the evening of May 9th, fearing a cyclone. Heavy rains washed away the foundations and at 1 o'clock in the night the roof fell in, burying the family. Wilkins managed to crawl out from under the mass of mud and brought neighbors to the rescue. The five children were taken out dead. Wilkins and his wife were badly hurt.

Another cure is reported from Vienna. Dr. Heinrich Weiss claims to have discovered an unfailing remedy for certain forms of headache. The treatment consists in the application of pressure with the hand for a few minutes on the great inferior artery, between the sternum and the navel, which causes an alteration in the distribution of the blood. Dr. Weiss states that he applied this treatment to twenty-three female patients suffering from violent headaches, with immediate relief in each case. In most of the attack did not recur, but in a few it returned in a milder form, ultimately disappearing on the treatment being repeated. Dr. Weiss states that he made the discovery quite accidentally.—[Celestial Empire.

At night there will be a danger signal placed on the forward derrick of Dredger about 30 feet above sea level, which can be seen by all vessels approaching the harbor. Editorially the Advertiser presumes the innocence of the defendants for treason, while in its news columns it denounces a meeting, claimed by its holders to be a Labor Union one, because the reporter recognized among them "the faces of many members of the International Liberal League, of which Hon. Robert W. Wilcox is the President." That is preserving the utilities of journalism with a vengeance.

William Astor Chanler, a young American, is heading a military expedition to explore those parts of "darkest Africa" which Stanley has left still in the dark. He is making more fuss about his expedition, and having others assist in making it, than either Livingstone or Stanley at the outset of their careers. Nevertheless he seems to have a large supply of pluck, and his track into the Ethiopian night will be watched eagerly to the vanishing point, and his emergence therefrom awaited with equal interest.

It is recalled that Mr. C. W. Ashford was Attorney-General when the judicial opinion was rendered under which all notaries public who were candidates for election to the Legislature resigned their commissions. General surprise is heard expressed, therefore, that Mr. Ashford's present doubt on the matter should not have found utterance before almost the eve of the Legislature's opening. It is hard to say it, but the critical suggestions of a correspondent of this paper on the matter have been remarked upon as being apt by a number of thoughtful readers. The general verdict seems to be that the proffered submission of the question to the Court at this juncture was the most remarkable action in the whole political career of the gentleman concerned.

The Advertiser comes out this morning with a comical effort to appear the champion of a fair trial for the persons accused of treason. Nobody had been heard counseling or countenancing anything but a fair trial. But the Advertiser prejudged the case to the outer limit of propriety, by saying all it dared in the face of the community to discredit the Government for making the arrests. Surely the cause of law and order is entitled to a fair trial as well as persons who were bold enough to talk treason in public. As the authorities evidently do not rely on these public utterances of one or two of the accused, the matter of their innocence or guilt is hardly competent for newspaper discussion. Yet the Advertiser tacitly argued their innocence by doing what it little could to weaken the position of the Government in public estimation.

MEDICAL APPOINTMENTS.

Dr. Richard Oliver, for nearly two years the efficient Superintendent of the Insane Asylum, has been appointed Physician to the Leper Settlement, Molokai, in place of Dr. S. B. Swift, resigned. Dr. Swift is going to the Coast. Dr. Oliver being popular among Hawaiians may be expected to have availing influence with the unfortunates now placed under his care.

Dr. A. P. Huggs has been appointed Government Physician for Hanalei, Kauai.

Dr. Nicholas Russell has been appointed Government Physician of Waianae, Oahu.

The appointment of a successor to Dr. Oliver in the Asylum is vested in the Minister of the Interior and not in the Board of Health.

THE MARY E. FOSTER.

The schooner Mary E. Foster, Capt. Robert Andrews, brought from Laysan Island a fine collection of the island canaries, a turtle weighing 300 lbs. and 36 tons of guano, the last named for the Pacific Phosphate & Fertilizer Co. The schooner was nine days going down, arriving on Sunday morning, May 8. Found all on the island safe and sound and landed provisions. On May 10th, heavy N. W. seas were experienced, which caused the Foster to sever moorings and go to sea. On the trip back experienced light westerly calms. Three laborers were left at the island, while Captain Berry, a Portuguese and a Chinaman were passengers for Honolulu. The Mary E. Foster will leave again for Laysan Island the first of next week.

A CHINESE DESERTION.

A Case Which Interested the Chinese Community.

A report was given in the BULLETIN some time ago about a peculiar Chinese desertion case which was entered in the Police Court. The case came up Wednesday morning and evidence was taken in full. The parties are Hui Hung (k) and Ah Sing (w). Hui Hung brought the following charge, "Desertion of his bed and board without cause, refusing, and still refusing to return." He also claims that they were married according to the Chinese custom of sitting before the bones of their grandparents in Canton, China. This the woman, Ah Sing, says is not true and that they were never married. Hui Hung also claims that they have been living peaceably together for five years and seeing that there was a cooling in his wife's affections he asked her to go to California, hoping the change of climate would have some effect on her. She refused and left him. Hence the arrest.

Police Justice Foster sentenced Ah Sing, under Sec. 3, Chap. 36 of the Laws of 1890, to imprisonment at hard labor for 12 hours and to pay costs of Court. J. M. Davidson for defendant noted an appeal to the Intermediate Court. P. Neumann for the prosecution. Both parties are engaged in the Chinese Theatrical Co. as actor and actress. Ah Sing is a pretty little woman, 31 years of age.

A PRINCE TO LEAD.

George May Command England's Navy—Emperor William's Luxurious Private Train.

New York, May 9.—The Tribune will publish tomorrow a London cable letter from Edmund Yates, in which he says: There are widespread and persistent rumors that Prince George will shortly be made Admiral of the fleet and given the title of Commander-in-Chief of the navy. It is high time that the service had a royal chief, but a purely ornamental figurehead would be of little value. At the Royal Academy dinner a year or two ago the Duke of Cambridge returned thanks, as he always does, for the army, but, although the Duke of Edinburgh, a full Admiral, was present, Lord George Hamilton, a civilian, responded to the toast of the navy. Surely this ought not to be natural and proper. The head of the Queen's sea service ought to be the Duke of Edinburgh, whose thorough knowledge of that service is unsurpassed and whose popularity among the officers is as great as it is deserved.

The German Emperor is at last in possession of the imperial train-de-luxe, which it has taken three years to complete. It has cost about £90,000, and consists of twelve carriages communicating by corridors. The drawing-room and library are hung with Gobelin tapestry from the Charlottenburg palace, and the dining-room is paneled in old oak. Two compartments are reserved for the nursery. A bath is attached to each sleeping-room, and the reception-room is decorated with marble statuary. One car consists of a kitchen fitted with every modern appliance. News comes from Newmarket that the Duke of Rutland's Cambridge-shire estate has been sold to Harry McCalmont, and that the price exceeds \$350,000. Chevelay Park is a fine old place, but there is not now much of a house and a new one will doubtless be built.

OAKLAND POOLROOMS DOOMED.

The following is from Oakland items in the San Francisco Chronicle: At the meeting of the City Council last night the ordinance prohibiting the selling of pools in the city came up for final passage. Mr. Nelson moved that the ordinance be finally passed. Mr. Bronsahan then made an amendment that the provision in the ordinance closing the poolrooms in ninety days be stricken out and that the ordinance take effect on October 1, 1892. The amendment was carried, Messrs. Johnson, Parson and Nelson voting no. Mr. Garthorne then moved that the provision preventing the selling of pools on race tracks in the city be stricken out. The amendment was carried. These amendments made it necessary to pass the ordinance to print again. The vote last night shows that the poolrooms are doomed. They will have to go on October 1st. The ordinance will come up for final passage at the next meeting of the council.

DIFEAT OF THE WHISKEY TRUST.

Judge Dundy of the United States District Court, Omaha, Nebraska, entered judgment May 9th in the celebrated Nebraska City Distillery case. In 1887, the Nebraska City Distillery went into the whiskey trust and after running for two years shut down. It had been leased to the trust for twenty-five years, and, after being shut down, was sold to G. L. Woolsey under the condition that he should not use it for distilling purposes. Woolsey began the manufacture of whiskey and high wines. The trust immediately began suits, alleging violation of the terms of sale. The defense was that the terms of the lease were intended to perpetuate a monopoly, and, therefore, contrary to public policy. Five suits in all were maintained, and in each instance the trust was defeated. Judgment was entered on May 9 and all the proceedings were dismissed.

STRANGE RACE OF CAVE-DWELLERS

At the Royal Geographical Society's meeting in Madrid a curious paper has been read by Dr. Bile, a medical man who has recently explored a wild district in the province of Caceres, still inhabited by a strange people who speak a curious patois and live in caves and inaccessible retreats. These singular remnants of some prehistoric race have a hairy skin, and have hitherto displayed an inveterate repugnance to mix with their Spanish and Portuguese neighbors. Lately roads have been pushed into the district inhabited by these "Jurdes," and according to Dr. Bile they are beginning to learn the Castilian language and to appear at fairs and markets in the province in order to purchase a few modern commodities and agricultural implements.—*Pall Mall Gazette*.

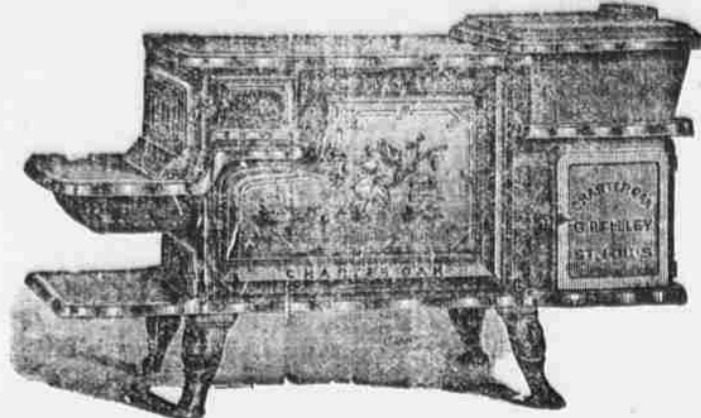
