THE POINT OF THE JOKE. There is one thing apparent to the most obtuse, namely, that the great Opposition-Independent party is composed exclusively of men who aspire to Ministerial place.

There are two ways of creating a necessity for a new administration during the recess. One is by forcibly displacing the present Ministers; the other is by intimidating the King.

There is no Ministerial crisis impending, however, and these panting politicians may as well "hold their breath to cool their kail," as a homely but expressive Scotch proverb hath it.

THE CANADIAN FISHERY QUESTION. Owing to popular clamor and Congressional action President Arthur made no attempt to renew the treaty of Washington so far as the fisheries question was concerned.

Both sides were thus gratified by President Arthur's proclamation; but as time wore on it was discovered that very serious complications might arise, inasmuch as the termination of the reciprocal articles of the treaty would take place in the midst of the fishing season.

President Cleveland, in consequence of this agreement, issued a proclamation on the 26th of June last, continuing the reciprocal fishing clauses of the treaty of Washington of May, 1871, to the 1st of January next.

POLITICAL EVOLUTION IN ENGLAND. Those who are old enough to remember the agitation in the United Kingdom over the proposal to admit Jews to Parliament, will be able to appreciate the great change in public sentiment which rendered possible the elevation of Sir Nathaniel Rothschild to the peerage without opposition or protest.

In the elevation of the head of the great London banking house of Rothschild to the peerage of the United Kingdom, a compliment has been paid, not merely to the man himself, but to his coreligionists.

This creation marks a distinct stage in political evolution in England. For over a quarter of a century Jews have sat and voted in the House of Commons; and now that a Jew can sit and vote beside the spiritual peers far greater changes may take place.

ISLAND NOTES. A Budget of Interesting News.

HILO, July 17th. Since our last, Hilo has been favored with fine weather, and such weather as no one can find any fault with, except a few grumblers that no kind of weather seems to suit.

Thieving appears to be on the increase in Hilo, as Messrs. Richardson & Coon report the loss of some six thousand shingles from their lumber yard during the month of June.

The schooner Emma Claudina, Captain Matson, arrived at Hilo on Friday, July 10th, fifteen days from San Francisco. She brings as passengers Miss E. A. Armes (who we understand returns to Hilo to resume her position as a teacher in the Hilo boarding school), Miss Cleveland, Miss Knowles and Mrs. Morrow and two children.

The Emma Claudina also brought a full cargo of assorted merchandise, and the following live stock: 16 mules for Honokaa (W. H. Rikard), 1 cow for J. W. Colville, 55 hogs for C. Y. Alona, about 20 hogs on private account, and last, but not least, a fine dark bay stallion, imported by Captain Matson, and now for sale.

The Japanese steamship Yamashiro Maru made an appearance off Hilo early on Tuesday morning, and arrived in harbor at about 6:30 o'clock a. m. Soon after she had dropped anchor, there landed His Excellency W. M. Gibson and His Excellency P. Neumann, accompanied by the Japanese officials, Captain Jackson, of the Government Surveying Corps, and Capt. Mahlmann, of the steamer.

On Wednesday morning at 7 o'clock the Yamashiro Maru, with the party she brought from Honolulu and about 300 of the citizens of Hilo (among which were a large number of ladies) on board, left the port of Hilo and took her departure for Laupahoehoe, stopping at Hakalau to land one of the Japanese officials. She arrived at Laupahoehoe about 9 a. m., and after landing the Japanese Commissioner, shaped her course for a quick return to Hilo, where she again dropped anchor at 11 o'clock, having been absent from her anchorage only four hours, and making the run from Laupahoehoe to Hilo in one hour and forty-five minutes.

At 3 p. m. their Excellencies W. M. Gibson and P. Neumann met quite a large delegation of the natives and some of the foreign residents of Hilo at the Court House, and addressed them on the situation and future of Hawaii. His Excellency the Attorney General's address was delivered in English and translated as he went along into native by the Hon. F. S. Lyman. Both addresses seemed to be well received.

Dr. Jas. Brodie arrived in Hilo last week, for the purpose of looking into the condition of the horses and mules of Hawaii. He started on his tour of inspection on the 10th instant, accompanied on that and the following day by some of our citizens. He has gone overland to Hamakua, and as far as we in Hilo know at present, he only found two diseased animals in Hilo district, and they were both at Pepeekeo.

This week we miss the pleasant and smiling faces of the native lads and lassies that have been wont to greet us from the makai veranda of the old Corner Store on the arrival and departure of the steamer; their absence being caused by the removal of the seats that have been a fixture there since the time the building was converted into a store.

KOHALA, July 17th. Kohala has suffered from a three days' drouth, and the planters are feeling bad over it. Mr. F. Austin has been in town looking up hames for his new cultivators. It seems that he has struck the right thing, and if it works as promised, it is certainly a valuable implement.

The English Church will have an entertainment at Kaeopili Hou the coming week, and it is hoped and expected that a large audience may see and hear the talent brought forward at that time.

We saw some instantaneous photographs last week that were taken by our local artist, Mr. Iyer, and these were good. So hereafter it will be utter foolishness for those who wish to perpetuate their good looks to hie away for Honolulu.

We hear that Mr. Young is in town preparatory to putting in a maceration plant at Kohala Mill. It is also rumored that Union and Hawi Mills will soon follow suit.

Manager Ewert of Star Mill has finished his planting, having put in between two and three hundred acres, thereby leading the district.

Japanese for Spreckelsville. Mr. G. C. Williams, the popular and efficient manager of the Spreckelsville plantation, Maui, returned to town yesterday, he having business to transact with the Japanese Commissioner and Consul General Irwin regarding the Japanese immigrants intended for the plantation.

Two hundred and seventy-five picked men go to Spreckelsville, leaving this port to-morrow (Tuesday) for that destination, it being decided that the immigrants should be permitted to take a run over the city to-day as a relaxation after their long confinement on the reef.

The Japanese Commissioner, Mr. Inouye, having expressed a strong opinion that the bodily welfare of the immigrants required the employment of physicians familiar to their language and habits, it has been arranged that Dr. Yoshido, who came by the Yamashiro Maru as ship's physician, should be located at Spreckelsville, that being the center of the plantations on which Japanese laborers are employed on Maui, or at all events, where the largest body of them will be located.

Should the experience with this large body of Japanese laborers prove satisfactory at Spreckelsville, arrangements will be made to employ at least 800 men. And the manager is most anxious, as already explained by the ADVERTISER, to have the wives of laborers with them.

Rejoicing at Spreckelsville—A False Alarm. A correspondent on Maui writes: Last Wednesday night there was a grand display of fireworks at Spreckelsville, in token of rejoicing at the failure of De Young's prosecution against Adolph B. Spreckels, at San Francisco. The overseers and men on the plantation convenient to Mr. Williams' residence, assembled there, and the echoes were awakened on silent Maui by discharges of giant powder at intervals. Each report was followed by a flight of rockets and the burning of blue and red lights.

OUT OF QUARANTINE. The Japanese Immigrants at the Depot.

On Saturday last the Japanese immigrants, who have been for the past three weeks in quarantine on the reef, were removed to the spacious grounds of the Immigration depot. Of the whole number of 957, all but four were transferred to the depot. These four are still sick in the hospital attached to the quarantine station, but not with any form of contagious disease. Before the immigrants were removed, Dr. Trousseau certified to their being free from disease.

Yesterday, when a visit was made to the depot, the Japanese were found engaged in their different occupations, enjoying their new quarters and making themselves completely at home. They are a finer looking body of men than the first lot, and that is saying a good deal, for the first arrivals were by no means inferior men in appearance. In the present shipment there are more large men than we have seen before among the Japanese, and they are a remarkably cleanly looking company. Those who have charge of them in the depot speak of their being very intelligent and anxious to learn the names of everything they see. Mr. Atwater, the Secretary of the Immigration Bureau, is busied in getting them ready for transportation to different plantations. None will leave to-day, probably, the proper papers not yet being made out. During this week, however, they will be assigned among those who have made application for them, and the depot will soon be empty again.

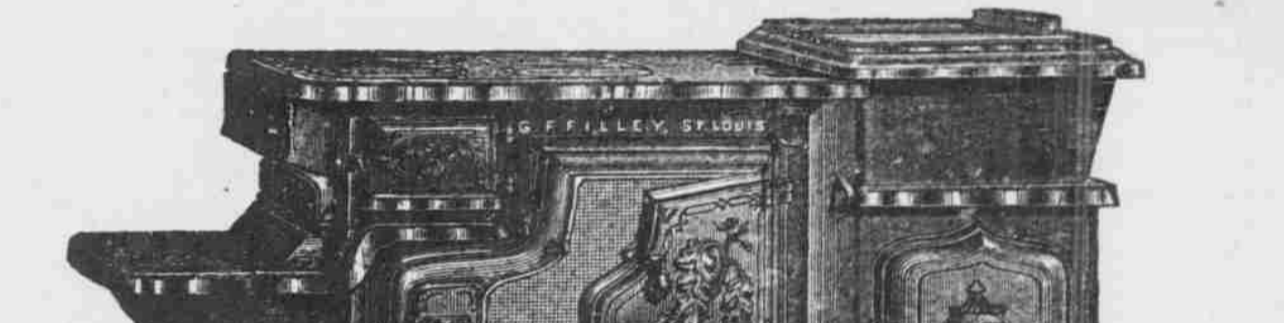

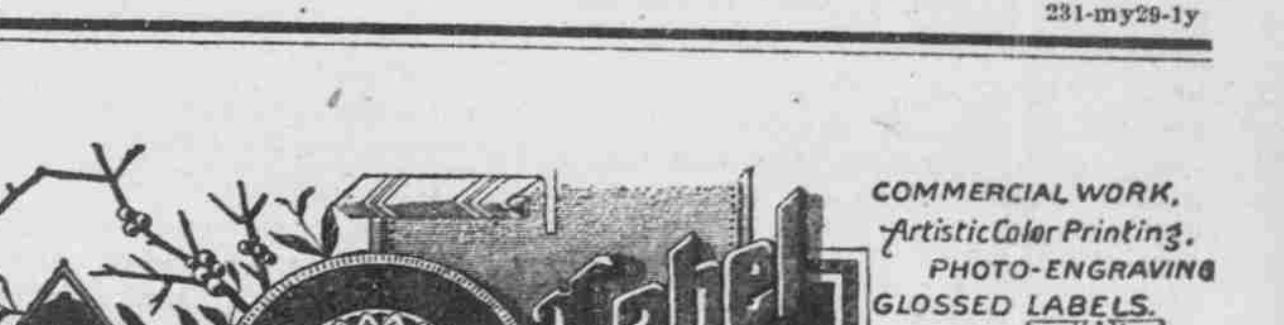
