**Late Foreign News.**

**AMERICA.**  
 Mrs. Garfield has announced the engagement of her daughter Mollie to J. Stanley Brown.  
 There were landed 2,262 emigrants in Castle Garden Sunday, most of whom are bound west.

There was a disastrous railroad accident on the night of the 14th inst. on the main line of the Southern Pacific between Colton and Indio, near a small station called White Water. It resulted in the death of two men and the destruction by fire of thirteen freight cars loaded with through freight from New Orleans or Deming for Los Angeles and San Francisco.

New York, March 14.—The afternoon papers estimate the business loss, the contingent loss and the actual pecuniary outlay which the storm will occasion in New York city at not less than seven million dollars, and the loss to the States involved at \$20,000,000.

Washington, March 14th.—The Ways and Means Committee to-day began the formal consideration of the Mills Tariff and Revenue bill. The entire document was read to the committee by the clerk.

Washington, March 15.—Because the statistical information expected from the Treasury had not arrived, the Ways and Means Committee to-day did not resume consideration of the tariff section of Mills' bill, but took up instead the internal revenue portion and made some progress toward conclusion.

McKinley offered an amendment at the proper place to repeal entirely the tobacco tax, but this was voted down.

New York, March 15.—Hourly reports are coming in from surrounding towns of fatalities resulting from the storm. The names of twenty persons have come in who perished and several who are missing. Grave apprehensions are felt for the pilot-boats, twelve of which are still at sea.

New York, March 14.—It is estimated that the loss to New York business men, the railroads, shopkeepers and wage-earners by the storm is fully \$10,000,000.

Chicago, March 15.—A special from Boston via London says: The storm raged incessantly for over two days all over New England. Every railroad out of the city was blocked completely, and the only telegraphic communication is by the Commercial Cable Company's lines to Rockport, Maine, and thence by cable to London. Never before was there such complete prostration of business, and the damage to property must amount to an enormous sum. The morning and afternoon papers of Tuesday were devoid of all telegraphic information, and no trains arrived in the city.

New York, March 15.—The blizzard has largely increased the local prices of necessities. The market stalls are nearly empty and all sorts of meats have advanced from 2 to 6 cents a pound.  
 During Monday night at the Delaware Breakwater twenty-eight barks and schooners were driven ashore or forced above high-water mark on shore. Every effort was made to prevent this wholesale loss, but the elements proved more powerful than man. The total loss to shipping is estimated at between four hundred thousand and five hundred thousand dollars. Only two bodies have been recovered.

Washington, March 19.—The Supreme Court this morning delivered an opinion in the Bell Telephone case. In considering the question of the alleged anticipation of Bell's invention by the telephone of Reis in Germany, the Court holds that Reis discovered a means of transmitting musical tones and nothing more. Bell's patent being for the process or art of transmitting speech, would have been just as valid, even if he had used the apparatus of Reis in developing it. The Court held that the apparatus of Reis was not successful in transmitting speech and that his invention was not in any respect an anticipation of the discovery of Bell. All the points thus far considered, in the Court's opinion, in the telephone cases have been decided in favor of Bell, including the points set up in the claims of Reis, Vanderweide and McDonough.  
 Portland, March 22.—A serious

accident occurred to-day on the Portland and Willamette Valley narrow-gauge railroad, near the town of Oswego, about eight miles above this city. While a mixed train was coming down to Portland several cars jumped the track when rounding a sharp curve. There were twelve passengers on board, and a number of cattle cars fell a distance of about sixteen feet and were badly mangled. The cars that left the track were at the rear end of the train. No one was killed but all the passengers were more or less injured.

Washington, March 22.—The President sent a message to the Senate to-day in reply to the resolution introduced by Senator Frye on the 16th inst., requesting the President to transmit to the Senate copies of the minutes and daily protocols of the meetings of the commissioners who negotiated the fisheries treaty with Great Britain. He inclosed a copy of the letter received from the Secretary of State, which says in substance that the President's message of March 5th and the documents transmitted with it placed the Senate in full possession of the documentary history of the conference. Every point is covered by those papers except the question of damages sustained by American fishermen, which being met by a counter claim for damages to British vessels in Behring sea, was left for future settlement.

**CANADA.**  
 New York, March 20.—Professor Goldwin Smith is here on his way to Washington. He said, in an interview this afternoon: "There are many Canadians, including myself, who would like to see the fishery question settled by a broad measure which would improve the commercial relations between Canada and the United States. The discussion of a commercial union is going on in the Canadian Parliament, but the resolution in favor of unrestricted reciprocity, brought forward by Sir Richard Cartwright, will probably be voted down by a Government majority."


Winnipeg, March 22.—The Saskatchewan "Herald" again gives a note of warning in the issue of this week of the impending half-breed troubles in the Northwest. It says the Indians are becoming much more communicative and talk freely of the coming revolt, but while doing so, say that whatever trouble comes will not be of their own causing. They say the half-breeds tell them they must rise and they are afraid they will have to do as they are bidden. Some others say they will only take up arms in the event of an uprising in the south, an event which they are pretty sure will occur, when they feel bound to go to their assistance. It is not claimed by the Indians that the half-breeds are seeking to secure any further "rights" but are lankering after revenge for their former defeat.

Ottawa, March 15.—It is rumored that the Government has come to an agreement with Premier Greenway of Manitoba and the Canadian Pacific Railway, by which the latter disposes of its monopoly clause for \$12,000,000, a portion of which is to be paid by the Province and the rest by the Dominion Government.

Victoria, March 16.—The schooner Sapphire, Captain Petit, cleared for Behring Sea this morning. She will go into the sea with a crew of sixty Indians from the west coast of Vancouver Island. Captain Petit had command of the schooner Grace, seized last year, and with difficulty kept his Indians from firing on the officers of the American cutter at the time of the seizure. During the past winter, through the loss at the time of the seizure, the Indians have been reduced to starvation and they state that if any attempt is made to molest them this year they will fire on the crews of cutters. As all are armed with Winchester rifles it can be surmised in case of collision that bloodshed will result. The suffering of the Indians during the winter has been severe, and as they are in a comparatively uncivilized state trouble is to be feared if the same policy pursued last year is followed by the American authorities. There has been considerable additions to the sealing fleet this year, and nearly all will clear for Behring Sea as soon as they return from the coast catch. Sealers are exasperated over the losses and the delay in settling the dispute, and there will be armed resistance made in more cases than the Sapphire in the event of any piratical attack such as last year.

**VENEZUELA.**  
 New York, March 18.—A gentleman who arrived on the steamer Burnley from Trinidad yesterday, and who requested that his name be not published, said, concerning Venezuelan affairs, that there does not appear to be immediate trouble with England. 

A trading vessel has brought

the children will probably return on  
the Morning Star. The Star left

Miss Julia Pratt, sister of Pres.

died suddenly at Columbus, Ohio,  
Feb. 29th. She has been living  
with her brother's family in the  
Ohio Deaf Mute Asylum, ever  
since their departure from the  
Islands.

Friends of Gen. Armstrong will  
be sorry to hear of the calamity  
that has befallen his Normal School  
at Hampton, Va., in the loss of the  
whole herd of cattle belonging to  
the school. The whole number,  
101, including 38 milk cows, had  
to be killed, because of infection  
with pleuro pneumonia. No animals  
can be placed in the stables for four  
months. The government pays a  
nominal sum for the cattle killed,  
but the loss to the institution is a  
serious one. The contagion was in-  
troduced by cattle, brought from a  
distance, apparently in good health.  
The milk alone was valued at \$350  
per month.

AUSTRALIAN MAILS.

The Oceanic Steamship Company  
has been awarded the contract for  
carrying the English mails from San  
Francisco to the Colonies for one  
year from November next, the com-  
pensation being the same as that  
paid for the past two years. The  
company promises to reduce the  
time, but it has not yet been deter-  
mined whether the steamers will  
touch at San Diego to receive and  
land the through mails. The new  
contract abolishes all thought of a  
competing line from Port Moody to  
Honolulu, Auckland and Sydney.  
Canada's ineffectual effort to secure  
a reciprocity treaty with the Hawai-  
ian Government was a great damper  
to the enterprise, and without the  
aid of New Zealand nothing could  
be done. The Oceanic Company will  
therefore have a monopoly of the  
carrying trade for a year and a half  
at least.—[S. F. Bulletin.]

THE BOOM IS OVER.

A letter from Mr. Yates, former-  
ly of this city, dated San Diego,  
Mar. 17, says:—

Admiral Jackson, admiral of the  
"King's navy," is a book agent in  
San Diego.

Met Mr. J. T. Dare, ex Hawaiian  
Minister, is in good health and do-  
ing well.

Mr. Davey, lately foreman for  
Lucas's mill, is in business with a  
man named Cavanagh, and is doing  
fairly.

Bill Crooks is here at his old  
calling, slinging gin over the bar.

W. S. Bartlett, formerly of the  
Hawaiian Hotel, was here, but has  
gone north again.

Joe Wiseman may often be seen  
on the streets, seated behind a flash  
horse.

A number of other ex-Honolulu  
people have been seen in San Diego.

Major Hills was here but did not  
see him.

The boom is over, and real  
estate is declining. Provisions are  
high and the cost of living is twice  
as great as in Honolulu.

A four-roomed cottage costs from  
\$35 to \$40 a month, and a furnished  
room from \$20 to \$30.

The town is overrun, the me-  
chanics being too numerous to mention,  
and the number of people out of em-  
ployment is enormous. Many who  
have a few dollars left are departing  
with all possible haste, mostly the  
northward. Would advise no one  
to come here to seek employment.

The butter, cheese and maple-  
sugar producers of Vermont have  
organized a State Board of Trade.

A system of distributing com-  
pressed air for motive-power pur-  
poses has been lately inaugurated  
in Paris.

In the adulteration of lard in the  
United States there were used last  
year 50,000,000 pounds of cotton-  
seed oil.

Insurance rates at Montreal, Can-  
ada, will be raised 20 per cent on  
all except dwelling-house and three-  
year risks.

The miners of Wood River, Idaho,  
were successful in their fight against  
a reduction of from \$3 50 to \$3 per  
day.

Most of the barber shops of St.  
Louis are run by colored barbers.  
There are very few white barbers in  
the South.

Late Foreign News.

EUROPEAN.

Moscow, March 14.—Seventeen  
thousand copies of a circular pur-  
porting to have been issued by the  
Governor of Saratoff have been dis-  
tributed throughout that Province,  
stating that during a tour of inspec-  
tion in 1887 the Governor observed  
everywhere destitution and ruin  
among the people, and suggesting  
the necessity of an early investiga-  
tion and measures for relief, and  
requesting the people to express an  
opinion as to whether the destitu-  
tion was caused by economic condi-  
tions or whether the social life of the  
people is the root of the evil.

The Moscow "Gazette" says it  
suspects the letter is a forgery, but  
if genuine it asks whether this is the  
beginning of universal suffrage in  
Russia and the summoning of the  
old State-General.

Berlin, March 14.—Advanced  
Conservative newspapers expressed  
disappointment at Frederick's pro-  
clamation, which they call Emperor  
Frederick's effusions, considering  
his views antiquated and not corre-  
sponding with the great questions of  
the day. Conservative papers re-  
serve their opinion except to reject  
the idea that his reference to reli-  
gious toleration is directed against  
any anti-Semitic campaign. The  
Liberals greatly approve his utter-  
ances, while scientific and art cir-  
cles greet them as heralding a new  
era.

Newspapers of all the European  
Capitals praise the utterances of  
Frederick, but there is much dis-  
cussion as to whether or not the  
character of his proclamation is due  
to assistance from Bismarck. The  
only note of disapproval heard as  
yet emanates from the anti-Semitic  
party, both in Germany and Austria.

London, March 13.—James G.  
Blaine in a private letter written from  
Florence to a London friend, states he  
will visit London in May and reach  
New York about the end of June.  
His return to America, he says, has  
no political significance whatever,  
and he will, under no circumstances,  
personally participate in the coming  
Presidential canvass.

Pesth, March 22.—The situation  
in the flooded districts in Hungary  
is appalling. The dykes at Bekes  
are filling and the town is doomed.  
Fifty or more houses have already  
collapsed. Floating ice has de-  
stroyed the houses in Danaplin.

Sofia, March 22.—The council of  
Ministers has decided not to reply  
to the Porte's dispatch declaring  
Prince Ferdinand's position illegal.  
Munitions are being forwarded to  
the troops on the frontier.

Vienna, March 22.—The King of  
Roumania conferred to-day with  
the Emperor and the leading mili-  
tary officials. It is supposed the  
object was to discuss the probable  
invasion of Bulgaria by the Rus-  
sians.

London, March 22.—All countries  
represented at the recent Sugar  
Bounties Conference, with the ex-  
ception of France have sent replies  
to the British Government favorable  
to the abolition of sugar bounties.

ASIA.  
Shanghai, March 20.—The earth-  
quake shocks in Yunnan continued  
three weeks, destroying several  
towns and causing much damage to  
shipping. At Kien-Shiu 4,000 per-  
sons were killed.

London, March 22.—The inhabi-  
tants of Padasa have revolted against  
the British-Borneo Company, and  
have murdered four policemen and  
burned the town of Baku. They  
also attempted to destroy Mamba-  
Kuk, but were prevented by the  
interference on the British man-of-war  
Rambler.

London, March 22.—Advices  
from Rangoon say the town of My-  
ing Yan, an important military post  
in upper Burma, has been destroyed  
by fire. Fifteen thousand persons  
are left without homes, and an  
immense quantity of grain, hides  
and other property was destroyed.
