DEMAND FOR BED GRASS.

Among the indigenous grasses of this country is one which the natives name *pili*. Its natural element is moist, marshy soil, where it grows very rapidly and ordinarily reaches a height of four or five feet. When young and tender it is not bad fodder for animals, particularly for milk cows. Formerly it was much used by Hawaiians for the walls and roofs of their huts. It is now, however, not much in demand for that purpose, civilization having superseded it by imported lumber. Its chief use at the present time is for making mattresses; and it is by no means a bad material for that object—probably the best the country produces. When properly dried it becomes tough and springy, and retains those properties for a long time. For these reasons intelligent upholsterers use it in preference to rice straw or any imported straw. Of late *pili* has been more in demand than at any previous time, not merely because its good qualities are becoming better known, but principally because of an increased demand for beds. And why this increased demand for beds? Because plantation owners and managers are becoming more concerned for the comfort and happiness of their laborers, and along with better dwellings they are furnishing better sleeping accommodation. Shortly after the arrival of the last lot of Portuguese immigrants, some hundreds of *pili* mattresses, single and double, were made here and sent to various plantations, for the use of the new comers. The majority of our sugar planters appreciate the fact that a little extra money expended on the lodgings of their employees is money wisely and profitably invested, because of its being promotive of contentment. But if any are forgetful of their people's comfort, or negligent of Government regulations and requirements, the periodical visits of the Inspector, the Hon. A. S. Cleghorn, operates as a wholesome reminder. It is part of this gentleman's duty to inspect laborers' quarters, and to insist that they conform to the requirements of law. We believe he is neither backward nor timid in the performance of his duty, which may largely account for the increased demand for *pili* grass.

A BREWERY FOR HONOLULU.

We notice that a petition is being circulated to obtain a license for the establishment of a brewery in this town. Some years ago, we have heard, a brewery was started but failed from various causes such as impurity of water, &c. Now, however, those troubles are obviated as artesian water can be used. It is urged that the establishment of a brewery here ought to be supported as the liquor brewed would be of the best quality, and Hawaiians would more readily drink it than whiskey or other spirits and thus would be less liable to injure their health from drinking bad liquor. We understand that the countenance and approval of several of our wealthiest and highest citizens and others have been given to the project.

POLICE COURT—DECEMBER 6. CRIMINAL DOCKET.

Two cases of fast-riding—fined each \$5, and \$1.20 costs.

CIVIL CASES.

Haiku Plantation vs. Adolph Nyman—case of deserting contract service. A Norwegian belonging to Haiku Plantation, admitted having deserted, ordered to return to employer and pay costs \$3.

Hang Lung Kee & Co. vs. F. Marcos and B. Oadt. In giving his judgment the Judge stated that he did not propose to say anything as to the responsibility of the officers in the matter of the legality of Search Warrants, or to hold them responsible for his official acts. If the Warrant was not legal that would be shown in a suit to be brought by plaintiffs against the Marshal and himself.

He could not find from the evidence that the officers used any undue force, but thought they executed the warrant in a very officer-like manner.

He did not think an officer had any right to hold a Search Warrant for any length of time before serving it, but probably the officers thought they had a right to serve the Warrant when they did. He thought they could not be upheld in the course they had taken.

Damages allowed to plaintiffs for forty dollars.

14 other Civil Cases heard, and all disposed of by half-past 11 o'clock.

Express drivers' badges issued to date, 136; natives, 63; foreigners, 40; Chinese, 33.

Number of arrests for the month of November, 255; remanded from October, 6. Natives, 165; South Sea Islanders, 11; Chinese, 41; all other foreigners, 38. Number convicted, 233; number acquitted, 25; remanded to December, 3.

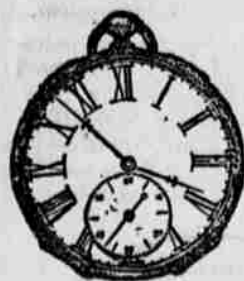

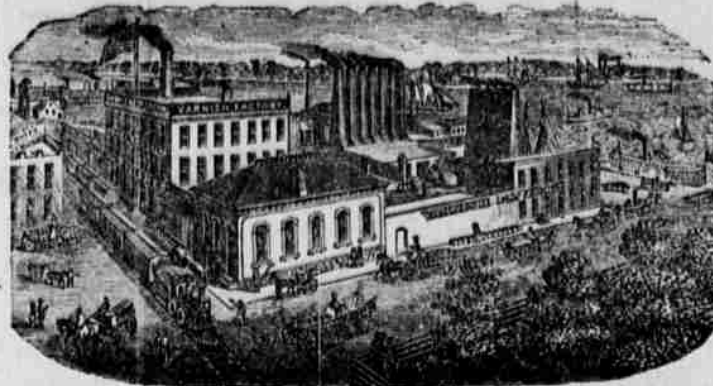
