To the list of crimes that have occurred dur-
ing this year, we are compelled to add an un-
fortunate occurrence at Pitt's Island. We learn
the particulars from Capt. Ziegler, of the
schooner *Pifai* which arrived from a schooner on
Tuesday last, and from a letter from Kanoo, the
Hawaiian missionary residing there, written to
the editor of the *Kaoua*. The above schooner
is owned by the house of Ed. Hofschlager &
Co., of this city, and is engaged in the coconut
oil trade. She left this port early in June, and
arrived at Pitt's Island on the 24th, with sup-
plies for the Hawaiian Mission. On the morn-
ing of the 25th, the mate was dispatched with a
boat containing the supplies, which were taken
by three native sailors to the house of the mis-
sionary. Soon after they had entered Kanoo's
house, the King's voice was heard asking "Where
is the mate? Where is the mate?" The re-
minder of the story we will relate by transcrib-
ing in English the written statement made by
Kanoo. He says that while he was reading his
letters brought by the *Pifai*, he dispatched his
wife for some water for the three Hawaiian ser-
vants belonging to the schooner, when he heard
the King's voice as above stated. The tone was
one of excitement, and on going to see the cause,
he observed the King with a six-shooter, aiming
at the Hawaiian sailors. At that instant the
pistol was discharged, the ball going over the
missionary's shoulder and striking one of the
sailors in the back of the head, coming out in
front. He fell at once, without uttering a word,
having been killed instantaneously. The King,
however, fired another shot at the man, although
the first had done the work of death. The mis-
sionary was thereupon much alarmed and ex-
cited, and his account of what subsequently oc-
curred becomes somewhat confused. It appears
however, that two of the men were killed by
Kanoo, the King of the Island, and a third,
who was endeavoring to escape to the boat, was
pursued and killed by a half-brother of the
King, named Teihemua. Kanoo, who is a very
intelligent Hawaiian, saw all three of these mur-
ders, and declares that no provocation whatever
had been given by the sailors, or by any one con-
nected with the vessel. He says that the King,
after having given the missionaries permission to
live on the island, after a school, and teach the
people, had, after the lapse of three months, be-
come dissatisfied, drinking heavily, and discon-
tinued attending the meetings of visiting the
missionaries. No violence was offered to the
latter, but they were advised by the King's
brother, to leave the island, as the "all" was
in a state of frenzy from drink. At the same
time, he told the missionaries that he would re-
turn to their homes and protect their property.
Getting on board a small vessel belonging to the
island, they were next day transferred to the
Pifai, and landed on Ebon.

The master of the *Pifai* was desirous of in-
flicting summary chastisement on the murderers,
but was persuaded to desist and report the whole
affair to the Hawaiian authorities, leaving them
to take such action in the matter as they may
deem proper. It remains to be seen whether this
Government, which so promptly fitted out a pri-
vateer to recapture a frail woman from the gay
galleon that it was supposed had abducted her,
will have the energy in this case to teach the
barbarous natives of the King's Will group that
the Hawaiian Government has the power and the
will to protect its own subjects engaged in the
peaceful avocations of commerce, or as
Christian teachers among the archipelagoes of
this ocean. The opportunity should not be lost
to enlighten the Pitt's Islanders as to the real
status of the Hawaiian Islands. This Kingdom
ought ere this to have made itself thoroughly
known to the various tribes of this ocean as its
pioneer and exemplar in the march of civiliza-
tion. Pitt's Island, or Butaritari in the Gil-
bert Archipelago, is in lat. 2° 22' N. and 172° 5'
48' East.

Parties belonging to the brig *Pifai* say that
Captain Randall is a white man, married to a
native woman in a Tahitian man, who he has
as his family of children. From his conduct
during the recent troubles there, both the cap-
tain of the *Pifai* and the bark *Cocoon*, were led
to the belief that he was in some measure
cognizant of the hostile intentions of the native
King. At the time of the murders he was on
board his vessel within signaling distance of the
Pifai, and although the *Cocoon* immediately
came up, when the flag of the *Pifai* was
placed at half-mast, as a signal of distress,
Randall paid no attention to it. In fact he did
not join the other vessels until the next morning
at ten o'clock. There were also a number of
circumstances in his conduct afterwards which
excited the suspicion of Captain Ziegler, and to
these, more than to the demonstrations on the
island, are ascribed the early departure of the
Pifai. In the course of investigation by the
Government, it would be well to discover if there
was any collusion between the Captain Ran-
dall and the savages who committed the mur-
ders. If so, he is equally guilty with them, and
should be punished.

THE DAILY HERALD.—We regret to chronicle the
suspension of this sprightly little sheet, which had
become quite a favorite if not a necessity in Hon-
olulu. But so long as only 250 to 300 copies
could be daily disposed of, its support was impos-
sible, at least while two other papers are published
here, one of which is not supported by the public
half so liberally as was the *Herald*, and the other
published in the metropolitan city of the Pacific
Islands, makes us, egotistical though it be, ascribe
the failure of our experiment not so much to our
incapacity to conduct the *Herald*, but to the peculiar
localities of the field we had selected.
The fact is patent—we have fully proved it—a
daily paper cannot at present exist in Honolulu. We
regret to be compelled to come to this conclu-
sion, but it is inevitable. In attempting to establish the
Herald, we have been somewhat like Rogers' Pa-
triotism, angling for impossibilities in the pool of
despondency. In reviewing our course since the
first issue of the *Herald*, we see nothing to regret.
We have conducted the paper on the strictest prin-
ciples of rectitude. This course we have seen and
we candidly considered the best for the interests of
the community. And as we dip our pen to draw
both our vocabulary and our paper from the ocean,
we can only say that we had hoped to be the
means of doing some service to our adopted home;
and if we have done any—by any suggestion or
thought of ours—towards the betterment of the
enterprise here, we are proud to have been
of the City of the Islands—we shall feel that
our labor and our losses have not been altogether

NOTES OF THE WEEK.
A Meeting of Germans was held last Sun-
day, at the store of Messrs. Melchers & Co., to take
measures to enlarge the sphere of the German
Beneficial Society. This society, which is one of
the oldest of the kind on the islands, is now com-
posed mainly of Germans residing in Honolulu.
An invitation will be extended to those living on
other islands of this group to become members and
share the benefits extended to them when in need.
There are between two and three hundred Germans
living in this Kingdom, generally of the better
class, and well-to-do. Like the Yankees, wherever
there is room to settle and prosper, they are sure
to do so. An exchange very truthfully remarks
of them that there is around the earth a globe of
German influence and German culture. Into what
ever country or clime the Germans go, they carry
with them the habits, pastimes and traditions of
Fatherland, to which they cling with unyielding
tenacity. Everywhere they are welcomed, and
everywhere they impress much of their national
character upon the people with whom they take up
their abode. In America they largely influence
political as well as social life. Generally industri-
ous, law-abiding and intelligent, they are valuable
accessions to any land.

AN INCOMPREHENSIBLE TRIFLE.—One of the natives be-
longing to the chain-gang, named Kalama, after hav-
ing served out a term of five years imprisonment,
was released last spring, and during one week's
freedom committed offenses enough to give him
eight years more of hard labor, which term he is
now serving out. A day or two ago, while em-
ployed on the Esplanade in Wright's blacksmith
shop, taking advantage of the absence of the black-
smith, and while the overseer's back was turned,
he took a walk up town, with a short iron bar in
his hand, and entered the dwelling of a gentleman
on Emma street. He had not been in the house
long enough to commit any depredations when the
owner entered the front door and the burglar
bolted out of the back window and returned to the
Esplanade, leaving his iron bar behind him. He
stands a good chance of having a few years added
to his term.

FOLLOWING COPY.—Among printers there is an
old saying—"Copy, even if it goes out of the
window." Nevertheless, the compositor is ex-
pected to use common sense in following copy.
A funny instance of neglecting to use this valuable
quality occurred in the *Kaoua* last week. The
writer of an article, wishing to have the heading
put in large letters, wrote on the margin the words
"big title," and then, to make sure, added the
English abbreviation "caps." Oddly enough, the
compositor set up those words, the blunder was
not observed, and the article was printed com-
mencing "Hua mi—Caps," and went on with the
subject, leaving the native reader's mind quite
muddled as to what the writer was driving at.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—Yesterday morning, a na-
tive woman, while cooking breakfast, was poking
the fire together with what she thought was simply
an iron bar, picked up near Foster's shipyard.
Leaving the supposed harmless poker some ten in-
ches from the fire, it suddenly exploded with a loud noise,
and showers down his golden rays. The signs
were in both arms. It turns out to have been a
bomb-lance—whether one of those famous white-
hairs imported here some years ago by Capt. Ro-
bert Brown, deputy saith not—but the woman
certainly had a narrow escape. She proceeded to
Dr. McKibbin's office, where her wounds were
dressed, and she will with care, get over the ac-
cident with only some scars.

SIXTY.—Such was the remark of a lawyer the
other day in the Police Court, when an old native
who had just concluded his evidence in a civil
suit, and was told he might go, walked up to the
Deputy Sheriff, and without saying a word, extend-
ed his open palm. The officer comprehended that
the old man wanted his quarter, which the law
allows to witnesses, and handed it over. Looking
down at a moment, and turning it over, he
saw that it was good money, he gave a grunt of
satisfaction, and left. That old gentleman looks after
the quarters and lets the dollars look after them-
selves.

A DRY TIME.—The present fall—and in fact the
whole year past—has been remarkable for the scar-
city of rain on this island. Vegetation is suffering
for the want of water, and the streams are mostly
dry. We generally have one or two rain
storms, but not in December. The signs
have on several occasions indicated that we were
about to have an old-fashioned blow from the south,
but it is said that "all signs fail in a dry time."
On each of the other islands of this group there has
been the usual amount of rain during the year,
which renders the drought on Oahu all the more
remarkable. The nights during the past week
have been unusually cool with heavy dew. The
thermometer has fallen several times to 62, and
this morning it looks as if a fresh south wind might
set in.

A COLORED ACTION.—An English paper states that
Mr. Morgan Smith, a colored man from the
United States, has made his debut in Honolulu,
and it is said that in the character of "Othello," he
gave from first to last the most elaborate and finished
readings, and was called before the curtain by an
audience and long continued applause. Native
Hawaiians possess a fondness for theatrical
performances, which, if cultivated, would show
them to be unsurpassed as delineators of character.
Their language and mode of expressing ideas are
full of gestures, and probably more so than any
European tongue.

THE *Canoe* sailed on Saturday last at 4 P.
M., and was spoken by the whaler *Teihoua* on
Sunday in the Molokai channel, about forty miles
from this port. She had a south-west breeze, which
will doubtless freshen as she goes to the eastward,
and perhaps take her over to San Francisco within
fifteen days, or by the 21st of this month. In that
case, we may expect letters by the *Colorado*, an-
nouncing her arrival. The bark *Sarita* sailed on
Monday, and is probably not over two hundred miles
westward of the *Canoe*. She passed up the same
channel.

THE MAILS are still out, and anxiously
looked for. Our latest dates by mail are: San
Francisco, Nov. 13, New York, October 26, and
London, October 6. The bark *Berkley*, clipper
Golden Fleece and bark *Southern* are all due, but
are doubtless having the long passages under sail
this season of the year. With the first strong wind,
we ought to have one of these vessels and the New
York mail of November 1.

SEA BATHERS, BEWARE!—One morning this
week while we were taking a stroll along the Esplanade,
we observed the fin of a huge shark circling about
a ship lying at anchor close to the shore. He was
announced by a sailor standing by, to be of the
man-of-war species. He was seen at several places
along the shore in the harbor lately. Sailors should
keep a lookout for sea sharks as well as for land
sharks.

British navy.
The War Department and General Grant have

three months.
