The Outside World.

London, Feb 10—The Dover corporation, after a heated debate to day accepted Andrew Carnegie's offer of \$50,000 to found a public library in Dover.

Honolulu, Feb 10—At a meeting of Catholics to-day it was decided to demand the removal of Professor Brigham, director of the Bishop Museum and Polynesian Collection. It is charged that Brigham, while showing visitors through the museum had taken occasion to asperse the character of Father Damien.

Springfield, Ill., Feb 10—The State Senate to-day by a vote of 43 to 1 adopted a joint resolution in favor of electing United States Senators by direct vote of the people.

New York, Feb 10—The journal has the following from London: Passengers on the Atlantic transport steamship Minneapolis, which reached London to-day, enjoyed the distinction of being the first trans-Atlantic travelers to keep in touch with the world throughout the voyage. They were the first contributors to and readers of the Intercontinental Wireless Daily, printed on the Minneapolis, which for five days kept in touch with the Cape Cod station. After that her wireless plant began to respond to the message from Cornwall.

Madrid, Feb 10—The strike situation in Barcelona and Cadiz is regarded as most grave. The impartial demands that martial law be proclaimed in Barcelona.

Dallas, Tex., Feb 10—Mrs Roosevelt, wife of the President of the United States, was talked about most discourteously by society ladies assembled in the Elk's Club rooms in Dallas to-day because of what they regarded as evidence of "stinginess, closeness and cheapness." It was all because of the quality of a gift Mrs Roosevelt had sent in the interest of the Dallas free kindergarten for which a festival has been arranged, called the "Columbia reception."

Salt Lake, Feb 11—More than eight inches of snow fell in Salt Lake to-day and the storm is still raging. This is the heaviest snowfall here in fourteen years. Street car traffic was demoralized. The storm extends throughout Southern Idaho, Western Wyoming and Northern Utah, and trains on all roads are more or less delayed. The snow is drifting badly in some places.

Dresden, Feb 11—The Crown Prince of Saxony was to-day granted a divorce from the former Crown Princess Louise after several doctors had furnish expert testimony in the case.

Salem, Or., Feb 11—There was no change in the Senatorial ballot to-day, which was as follows: Fulton, 88; Greer, 15; Wood, 15; George, 15; Williams, 2; Malarky, 1; absent, 9

BOLTERS VS BECKLEY.

The whip lash of the Republican party managers utterly failed in smothering any of the Hawaiians to fall into line with the haole minority, who would like to run things their own way and to suit themselves. If it should ever happen that the Hawaiians should join forces in the House, they will show a solid front that will turn the tables upon the few who would either "rule or ruin."

Party managers and leaders of the majority rulers have been using the Kallhi thoroughfares during the past two nights. These "fecklers" are well known, for they do not go out that way only for a special purpose. Because prominent members of the Hawaiian minority party are domiciled out that way, is one suggested reason for their for their evening walk. Hawaiians have no cause to be swayed in the cause of Republican harmony. "Go to" and "get thee behind me, Satan," saith the Lord to the tempter, and these tempters may yet be rolled.

When the seven bolters voted against the choice decided upon, by the majority in caucus assembled, they have no further claims upon the thirteen to stay by and with them. And the same may be said with the Hawaiian party, if there was any private and previous understanding before the election of Speaker Beckley, the later actions of the seven has relieved them from carrying out any prior arrangement; whatever that may be, we know not, but, there's a surmise that there was and must have been.

We understand that the bolters have seen the error made by them, and that

they are strenuously striving to retrieve their lost prestige with the Hawaiian Republicans. But, so far, they have not succeeded, although some compromise has been attempted and differences have seemingly been patched up. Majority rule should prevail and it shall too, there's no getting round or out of it, gentlemen.

Those Republican bolters have expressed sorrow, so 'tis reported, for the wrong they themselves have done to their party, but it is understood that their expression of grief is deemed insincere. If they are willing to do penance, in order to gain purgatory, then their sincerity may be proved real and their grief earnest. But we very much doubt their zealotness. They cannot be too much trusted and they bear watching.

The ovation offered Speaker Beckley when he yesterday declared that he would not resign was the spontaneous outburst of appreciative people, which clearly showed where the sentiment of the people is centered. Be it said on his behalf, he declined the nomination for election to the chair, and his election to it was forced upon him unsought for. He was a "dark horse" who carried the fort by storm and he should stay in position, ruling peaceably if he can, forcibly if he must. Enough ability has been already shown by him to be dubbed by his opponents "the Caesar of the House" or "the Thomas B. Reed of Hawaii."

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Any attempt to oust Speaker Beckley from the chair, to which he has been rightfully and lawfully elected, should by both friends and enemies be frustrated politically. Such a course as unseating him would immediately destroy the organization of the House and practically precipitate a state next to anarchy, and should be deemed revolutionary.

The Independent is full of admiration and is proud of those true Hawaiian Republicans who stood steadfast to principle. They are really the true and sturdy ones in the Republican party and no fair-minded man, be he of whatever political party, sect or faction, could help in admiring their steadfastness, thereby showing to the white bolters that they are not traitors to their party and to their principles. Stay pat, boys, and don't waver an atom, and show to those who played false and treacherous that Hawaiians are true and earnest, and that they are perfectly capable of holding their own against their more enlightened confederates.

Around the World.

On Thursday next, the public of Honolulu will have an opportunity of witnessing the most fascinating entertainment of the age. The occasion will be the special engagement of Dr. Alexander J. THE LEGISLATURE.

Second Day of Second Session. HOUSE.

The House, on reassembling yesterday afternoon, immediately proceeded with the completion of its organization, which was completed as reported in yesterday's issue.

A motion to adjourn was ruled out of order. Twice it was moved and twice the motion was disregarded. After the election of Janitor, Mr. Harris moved to defer the completion of the organization, at the same time moving for adjournment. The Chair then declared that the organization should be completed and election was proceeded with.

Mr. Kupihea moved to appoint a committee of three to inform the Governor of the organization of the House. Lost.

Another motion by Mr. Harris to adjourn was carried, the House adjourning until 10 this morning.

Assembled at 10 o'clock, nearly every member answering. After prayers the Speaker addressed the House and said that, in the cause of harmony, he desired, on adjournment, every member would meet him to arrange the standing committees. The minutes of the previous day were then read and approved.

Mr. Kumalae moved that a committee of three be appointed to wait upon the Governor and inform him that the House was organized and ready to proceed to business. The Chair appointed Messrs. Chillingworth, Harris and Kou as such committee.

The Clerk read a communication from the clerk of the Senate, informing the House of its organization and readiness to transact public business, also giving a list of its duly elected officers. Another communication was also read from the Senate, enclosing the resolution introduced and passed yesterday, relative to the erection of this Territory into Statehood.

Mr. Kumalae moved to adopt the Senate resolution, but Mr. Hala moved to defer consideration till tomorrow, and that it be made the special order of the day. Carried.

Mr. Chillingworth reported that the Governor had been interviewed and that he had informed the committee that he would immediately send his message. Secretary Hawes soon after arrived with the document.

Mr. Kumalae, by advice from the Chair, moved a suspension of the rules, so that the message be read. Carried.

The Clerk proceeded with the reading of the message, which is practically the Appropriation Bill.

At 11:45 o'clock, another message from the Governor was announced and delivered.

Mr. Kaniho moved to defer the reading of the message and to take a recess to 2 o'clock.

At 11:55, the reading of the message was completed. Mr. Kumalae moved to suspend the interpretation and that it be translated and printed and the members furnished copies, so that they may be able to work intelligently. Carried.

Mr. Kaniho renewed his former motion to take a recess.

Mr. Kumalae amended it to 3 o'clock in order that sufficient time be given for the consideration of standing committees.

Mr. Chillingworth drew the Speaker's attention to his remarks at the opening of the session relative to meeting for consideration of "Standing Committees." Mr. Kaniho accepted the amendment, and recess was taken to 3 o'clock.

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

The "Mirror" appears tomorrow.

Don't forget Maritana at the Opera House tomorrow night.

Heavy rains still continue but happily not continuous.

William McKinley lodge K of P will meet tomorrow evening.

Brilliant lightning was noticeably last evening in the direction of Molokai.

"Westerly winds and cool weather with a few rain squalls" is "old probs," forecast for today.

The big freighter Texan of the American-Hawaiian line is due here today from Seattle.

Tourist stalker Weedon returned by the steamer China. The tourists are still "coming."

Lack of quorum presented a meeting of the Builders Exchange organization, last evening.

The annual meeting of the Hospital Flower Mission will be held at the rooms of the Y M C A, this afternoon.

Harry Jerome for many years purser on the steamer China has been transferred to the new steamer Siberia.

A M Thomson has resigned the purser-ship of the steamer Korea and has been assigned for duty to the steamer China.

The "hell girls" had a hot time this morning in the telephone office alarm from 24 at 8:5 being caused thereby. Service uninterrupted.

Alexander J McIvor Tyndal, reputed to be a wonder in the science of mind-reading, is expected to arrive here by the steamer Sierra on the 26 instant.

The steamer Enterprise had a very rough passage to San Francisco, making an eleven day voyage. Her cargo of sugar is reported to be partly damaged.

The bark R P Rithet sailed from San Francisco, for this port, on the 12th inst, with a cargo of general merchandise valued at \$19,184.

Late San Francisco papers note that Judge Whiting is registered at the Occidental as is also D E Noble the buyer for Messrs Brewer & Co, of this city.

News has been received that the Hawaiian steamer "American" had arrived at Coronel, Chile, and would arrive in San Francisco about March 7th.

The steamer China carried 1,100 tons of flour for Hong Kong and a large shipment of ammunition, in a specially constructed magazine, for forwarding to Manila.

With all the amount of labor and money expended in street cleaning the lightest rain shower makes the streets almost impassable, unless by the addition of more m—black sand, which also costs money.

Notwithstanding the showery and threatening weather the open-air concert by the Band at the Moana hotel, was well attended last evening and proved to be a most enjoyable occasion to those who attended. The premises were given up to the visitors and Col Tom James made all feel at home.

District Court: Wilcox, J.

The session this morning before Judge Wilcox was a short one, not by reason of the importance in the character of the cases but, by reason of the "laws delay," as evidenced by the attorneys representing the different charged persons, all desiring continuances so as to prove an "unknown something." Following was the calendar with the results:

Five Chinese, charged with obstructing justice, the officer Hauma case, had their case continued as also W J Akana; embezzlement and, Sol Keela assault. Sam Chey, riding a bicycle without a light was reprimanded and discharged; and two inebriates paid inebriates paid "33" fine.

Maternity Home Report.

To the President, the Princess, the Trustees, and the members of the Society:

Greetings: As we have assembled here today in meeting to hear all matters undertaken by us during the year past, I, your servant, respectfully submit to you the following report. At our last annual meeting, we were gladdened by the presence and countenances of our President and his respected Princess, and on that day his Princess was elected to the presidency of this association. In passing we do not forget to offer our good wishes to Prince Kalani-annole, the Detegate-elect of the People, and to his Princess, and wish that upon them may fall only benefits and blessings in the future.

We have met with certain difficulties, but they were not of sufficient moment to retard the progress of the Home that all of us have been fostering these many past years. The first of these unlooked for happenings was the resignation of Mrs Wilson, our much respected Matron; the vacancy thereby caused was filled by Miss Duot. This new Matron took charge on May 1, 1902, and has had charge of 56 confinements. One of our new acquisitions, Mrs Dowsett, through whose indefatigable endeavors, we obtained a constitution by which the property of the Kapiolani Maternity Home is now controlled and governed. Her other works of charity has endeared herself to all of us. The constitution of the Kapiolani Maternity Home, of the Hooulu and Hooulu Lahui Society, now an incorporated body, was unanimously adopted May 28, 1902. The total amount invested by the Trustees during the year past is \$4,000, viz.: one \$1,000 bond drawing interest at 6 per cent, and three \$1,000 bonds drawing interest at 7 per cent per annum. Thanks are due to the Trustees for making these judicious investments. Dr Hodgins has been the attending physician of the Home, and during his tenure of office, has aided the Home by crediting a me of the events that have come within his own private practice, by transfer to the Home. The income of the institution has been thus augmented, the total collected by Miss Duot the Matron, being \$1,216 50. During 1901, the greatest total collected by Mrs Wilson was \$1,183 55. This Society has incurred no expenses. Mrs Dowsett herself paying the expense incurred in printing the Charter and Bye Laws, both in the English and Hawaiian language, as well as the translation thereof. A donation of \$300 was received from Princess Kawanakoa for the Home. There have been 72 confinements during the year. The Treasurer's report gives the returns from monthly dues, as well as the receipts and expenditures of the Home.

Pacific squadron was hoisted on the flagship New York shortly before noon yesterday and before the time ball dropped to the base of the ferry depot flagstaff, the New York, the Boston, the Marblehead and the Ranger, in the order named, were steaming out toward the Golden Gate on their way to Amalpa. The speed of the squadron will be regulated by the pace of the Ranger, which is the slowest vessel in the squadron.

Auckland, N.Z., Feb 10—Neither the Friendly Islands nor the adjoining islands experienced any effect from the tidal waves which caused heavy loss of life in the Society Islands January 31st.

Panama, Feb 11—An official cablegram has just been received from Guatemala saying that Guatemala has not declared war, but that Salvador, Honduras and Nicaragua menace the Guatemala Government, which is ready to defend its honor.

Salt Lake, Feb 11—Senator-elect Reed Smoot of Utah will, it is announced, go to Washington next week. His credentials as Senator to succeed Senator Rawlins will then be presented.

Astoria, Feb 11—News has been received here from Washington that United States Senator Mitchell of Oregon is very ill and fear is expressed that he cannot recover. Should he die, Governor Chamberlain, a Democrat, would have the appointment of his successor. It is reported from Salem that the Legislature, instead of adjourning sine die at the end of the session, will name a date for meeting, that it may select a successor to Senator Mitchell, should his illness prove fatal. The Legislature is overwhelmingly Republican.

New York, Feb 11—While presiding over services in connection with the semi centennial celebration of St. Paul Methodist Church in Newark, N. J., Governor Franklin Murphy predicted in his address that unless in the near future greater harmony be restored between labor and capital the country will be plunged into a civil war more disastrous than any previously recorded in history.

Cleveland, Feb 11—Pugilist Tom Sharkey was not able to withstand Wrestler Dan McLeod's attempt to throw him three times within an hour tonight, McLeod winning in fifty-six minutes. The first bout was the longest of the three, McLeod taking half an hour to throw the sailor. After a rest of fifteen minutes the men went to the mat again and McLeod had Sharkey down in thirteen minutes. The third fall was seventeen minutes.

Rock Island, Feb 13—Shop A, the principal storeroom of the Rock Island arsenal, was destroyed by fire last night, together with its contents, which included cavalry and infantry equipments of every description and a million rounds of Krag Jorgensen smokeless ammunition. The contents were worth \$1,500,000. The building was a massive structure, three stories in height and was erected twenty years ago at a cost of \$400,000.

The flames in the great institution endangered property worth many times the amount lost. The fire was under control by 1 o'clock this morning, at which hour Major Blunt, the commandant, estimated the loss at \$1,900,000. There were no casualties as far as known.

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
