

THE BEAR AND THE MULE.

DETAILS OF A CONFLICT WHICH WAS FOUGHT TO A FINISH.

The Bear Sniffed at the Heels of a Docile Old Mule—Whereupon the Mule Did Battle with the Weapons Which Nature Had Provided—A Tussle.

Ike Garvey and Eph Dunham, brawny woodchoppers of the upper Lehigh timber region, took a team of mules the other day and began to draw railroad ties from the woods out to the main road. Along in the afternoon they let the mules stable in the wood road which they went ahead to cut down a lot of saplings. Presently they saw a black bear tramping through the snow in the rear of the sleigh. When the bear reached the sleigh he turned to the right, walked past it, and snuffed at the heels of the old mule. The mule, who appeared to be sleeping when the bear waddled up, stuck up his ears at once, raised his right hind foot like a flash, and gave the bear a terrific kick in the neck. The bear tumbled over in the snow, partially stunned by the blow, the sharp corks of the mule's shoe having cut and bruised the flesh directly behind his right ear.

Dunham and Garvey laughed heartily at the mule's performance, and tried to yank himself away from his mate. Every motion indicated that he wanted to be let loose on the bear.

"Say we unharms him and let him fight the bear if he wants to," remarked Garvey.

"All right," said Dunham, "we'll do it." Dunham then jumped to the mule's head and unstrapped the lines. In an other second the harness strap and the belly-band were unhooked, and the mule slipped from under the harness with nothing on except the headstall and collar. Then the mule turned straight around and made for the bear with all his might. He lunged forward with so much force and speed that he went right over the bear's back before he stopped. The bear did not attempt to get away, but stood upon his haunches and was ready to fight as soon as the mule turned upon him.

ADVANCING ALL ALONG THE LINE. The mule struck at the bear savagely with both forward feet, but the bear dodged and thus escaped the blow. Then the bear rushed at the mule, uttering a grunt of anger as he did so, and tried to strike him in the breast. The mule, however, showed more anger and grit than the bear did, and as the latter came toward him, he struck the bear on the shoulder with one of his sharp corks, and the bear, growling with pain from the blow, backed away. The mule quickly followed up the advantage he had gained, and the bear tumbled backward over a log, making the snow fly. The mule leaped over the log and struck the bear on the back with both fore feet before he had time to get up, but he paid dearly for it, for the bear twisted his head around and got the mule's right foreleg between his jaws and bit it badly!

Dunham and Garvey, who had the utmost confidence in the mule's ability to conquer the bear, kept at a safe distance and watched the fight closely. While the bear was trying to crush the bone in the mule's leg the mule bit the bear's ear and made the blood run. A moment later the mule succeeded in yanking his leg from the bear's jaws, prancing around in the snow after he had done so, and appeared to be madder than ever. Then the two infuriated animals came together again.

As the mule raised his front feet to strike, the bear sprang under his body, knocked his hind legs from under him, and tried to bleed him over on his side. The mule scrambled to his feet in a second, rushed up to the bear, and gave him such a tremendous thump on the nose that it made the bear stagger and roar. He was not ready to retire from the conflict, though, and as he made another effort to strike the mule the blood spurted from his nostrils. He stuck his nose into the snow and growled loudly, and the mule stood off a few feet and eyed him steadily. Presently the bear raised his head and plunged at his antagonist again. The mule wheeled suddenly as the bear approached him, and, turning his tail toward the bear, kicked him in the jaw with one of his hind feet and headed him over on his back. Before he could get on his feet again the mule had begun to stamp on him with his sharp corks. The bear struggled desperately to get away from the terrible blows, but his lone-eyed antagonist dealt him, but his efforts were useless. The bear was getting weaker, and, when Dunham and Garvey ran to the spot and clubbed the mule off, was unable to rise and was moaning piteously. Garvey at once hit the bear on the top of the head with the back of his ax, and put an end to his sufferings.—Scranton Correspondence.

Two natives got into a little dispute on the corner of Fort and Queen streets, last evening, and after a few hot words, adjourned to the vacant lot back of the Enterprise Planing Mill to settle the dispute in their manly style. At the end of ten minutes' slugging they both presented a very discouraging appearance.

Yesterday morning a dray loaded with merchandise was seen going along Merchant street with one of the nuts almost off the left front wheel. Somebody on the sidewalk tried to show the defect to the native driver by calling to him, but he doubtless thought it was an attempt at haka and drove along without stopping. It has not yet transpired as to whether an accident happened or not.

Reckless Driving.

Last night, at half past eight o'clock another exhibition of reckless driving was given by two hackmen on Nuuanu street, at the first bridge. Seven persons, among whom were two women and a child, were nearing the bridge, three going one way and four the other, when the two hacks were first seen by a Press reporter, racing toward town along the street. Both hackmen were trying to obtain the lead and drove furiously over the bridge almost entirely filling the narrow roadway at that point. A lady and gentleman were forced into the ditch at one end of the bridge, in order to avoid the danger, and the remaining persons in the way were driven back to the sidewalk in front of the Chinese stores. The Press reporter tried to see the numbers of the hacks, but failed; one of them, however, was driven by a white man and the other by a native.

Continuation of Mortgagees' Sales. At twelve o'clock noon to-day, Messrs. E. P. Adams & Co., will continue the land sale commenced yesterday. New Stores. The Chinese merchants who, for several years past, have been doing business in a row of dilapidated buildings near the first bridge, have lately been seized with the fever of improvement. The consequence is that the old buildings have been torn down one at a time and immediately rebuilt with new lumber, until there is now an entirely new appearance to a neighborhood, which was formerly an eyesore.

An Elegant Book. Mention was made some time ago of the arrival of sample copies of an elegant book on the "Indigenous Flowers of the Hawaiian Islands," written by Mrs. Francis Sinclair, Jr., and published by a London firm in large quarto form, with over forty fine plates in colors of various Hawaiian flowers. The work has been extensively sold by subscription and an invoice of the books has just been received per the steamer Zealandia by Mr. T. G. Thurm at his Fort street store, where subscribers can now obtain copies. This is certainly one of the most valuable books in the botanical line ever published about Hawaii and should receive a liberal patronage from the residents of these Islands.

Fine Work. Messrs. Castle & Cooke of King street, have just had made, at Mr. Thurm's Bindery, a fine cash book, which is deserving of attention from the fact that as a specimen of home manufacture it rivals any of the fine work in the blank-book making line that has ever been imported from abroad. This sample of "home industry of a competitive kind" may be seen for a few days at the bindery, before it is delivered, so that those who have been in the habit of sending abroad for such work can see what manner of home manufacture they are giving the "go by." The book is about 14 by 20 inches in size and is finely bound in embossed red leather of the best quality. It contains 600 pages and the ruling, which was done by a native workman, rivals, and some say, surpasses similar work done at the Coast.

It is impossible for one who is not a musical critic to do justice to this "Infant Phenomenon's" execution, but it is entirely possible for everyone hearing her playing to be delighted, although without the ability to analyze the delicious sensations produced. The rippling and rapid tones which the instrument sends forth seem like the carolings of a joyous bird. Miss Pauline then played 'Souvenir du Bosphore' Violenctemps, with a touch impressively sweet. On her encore the tones from her bow were sweet, soft and affecting. The violin seemed to voice human emotions of tenderness, rapture and grief, in alternation. Miss Lulu Joran next rendered 'L'Invitation a la Valse, Weber, at the piano. This piece is of the dreamy reverie style, enlivened at times with flashes of vigor, then softened by a series of rippling cadences to relapses into the dreamy style once more. Miss Joran is not only thoroughly conversant with the instrument but she has the most correct conception of the music itself. Now came the gem of the evening. A selection from Gounod with the voice of Miss Spring, the violin of Miss Pauline and the pianos of Miss Elise and Lulu. It was so sweetly rendered that the audience fairly forgot the usual applause allotted to the young ladies. But it did not forget to recall them. A duo on two pianos by the Misses Pauline and Elise Joran closed the first part. The second part consisted of selections from the "Barber of Seville" in which Signors Lencioni and Campobello and Miss Spring in costumes, sang with unusual taste and effect.

Advance in Sugars.

NEW YORK, April 23.—The strike of workmen in the Williamsburg refineries has boomed the price of sugar. Granulated sugar was quoted at 6 3/4 Saturday last; yesterday it reached 7 1/2 c. It is said prices are sure to advance still higher. The stock of refined sugar on hand amounts to practically nothing. Business has been slow and dealers have been buying sugar in quantities just sufficient to supply the demand. Now that the country demand has increased, the strike has caused prices to advance out of proportion and cost of the natural course of trade. Raw sugar was quoted at 5 1/2-16c on April 14th; yesterday it was 5 3/8c. This shows a slight advance in the cost of raw material, which is not accounted for by the present strike, but which will account for something of the advanced price of refined sugar. The strike, however, has tended to very much strengthen the advance.

Confine this in a bag or cloth and place in a kettle of boiling water, and let it continue to boil 1 1/2 to 2 hours, until cooked. When done (while warm) stir with a stout spoon, adding a little water until the whole is well mixed. Let this stand from 5 to 6 hours. Then add water in small quantities, mixing thoroughly and kneading until the desired consistency is obtained. Owing to its great purity it will take from 5 to 4 days to become acid or sour. 202-3M
