G. A. R. The Annual Camp Fire of the G. O. W. DeLong Post, No. 45—A Pleasant Social Reunion.

Williams, Surgeon J. S. McGrew, Comrades G. W. Merrill, N. B. Emerson, W. C. Merritt, S. McKeague, R. M. Overend, W. C. Wilder, F. Sherman, L. Adler, J. H. Lovejoy, John Ross, Thomas Short, W. McCandless and W. R. Lawrence.

The proceedings were opened with a blessing pronounced by the Rev. W. B. Oleson. The beans and coffee were next on the programme, added to which were sundry delicacies with which the veterans were probably unfamiliar in the field.

Mr. J. F. Field, of the All-Star Company now in town, gave a masterly exhibition of his skill on the accordion, and was several times encored.

The next toast was "The United States of America," honored with the customary enthusiasm, and responded to by Comrade G. W. Merrill, U. S. Minister Resident. After referring to the principles for which the veterans had fought and established, and upon which the great American Republic had taken its place among the family of nations, he pointed out how frequently those same principles were seen cropping up in other countries.

"The Army and Navy of the United States" was responded to by Comrade G. J. Burnap, Chief Engineer of the U. S. S. Vandalia.

Mr. Frank M. Clarke, of the All-Star Company, created much merriment by some comic recitations, for which he was repeatedly recalled.

The toast of "Our Commander-in-Chief, General Fairfax," was next honored, and was followed by three lusty cheers.

Comrade Dr. J. S. McGrew responded. He said he knew him pretty well, and could say he was a man who always did his duty, and was doing it now. In the course of an interview the other day with a newspaper man the subject of this toast said that the condition of the Grand Army was improving.

The next on the list was "The Governor of Oahu, our Old-time Friend," followed by "Our Guests." The latter toast was eloquently responded to by Mr. W. M. Leman in a lengthy speech. He expressed the pleasure and surprise he felt on landing here a few weeks ago at finding a Post of the Grand Army.

Pleasant as it always was to meet a countryman in a foreign land, never was pleasure greater than when on coming here he had grasped the hands of veterans who, bidding farewell to the blandishments of social life, severing the ties that were dear to them, had gone forth to fight for freedom.

"Hawaii, Our Adopted Country," was responded to by Rev. W. B. Oleson in a thoughtful speech, in which he traced the gradual evolution of history whereby one nation derived its existence from another.

Dr. Emerson also responded to this toast. Vice-Commander Ashford spoke to that of "The Ladies," giving a succinct resume of the majority of remarkable women recorded in history from the days of ancient Rome down to the present time.

The remainder of the evening was spent in social intercourse, and the gathering broke up at a late hour.

A SKETCH OF HONOLULU.

Unpaved Streets and Some Modern Improvements.—Honolulu has a well sheltered harbor, with a depth of about twenty-five feet of water over the coral reef at its entrance. The city stands upon a low plain, crescent shaped, with its opening toward the sea, about three miles long and one mile wide. On the landward side this plain is inclosed by mountains of considerable elevation, several of which are extinct volcanoes. Noticeable among these are Diamond Head and The Punchbowl, prominent headlands as you approach the city by water. Honolulu has a population of 25,000, of which 10,000 are natives and 10,000 Chinese, Japanese and South Sea Islanders, and 5,000 Americans and Europeans, the latter English, Germans and Portuguese mainly. The city is irregularly laid out. Its streets are unpaved, and there are few sidewalks; hence it is very dusty in dry and very muddy in rainy weather. It is abundantly supplied with good water, but is wholly unprovided with any system of drainage or sewerage. The telephone has been introduced, and is in very general use. The residences are widely scattered, are mostly frame of one story, with broad verandas about them, and surrounded by ample grounds tastily ornamented and embowered within a rich profusion of tropical trees, shrubbery and flowering plants. Aside from the royal palace, there are no public buildings having any claims to special notice. There is a small museum containing a poor collection of ancient weapons and other native articles, a small public library, and the Young Men's Christian association has a lecture hall and reading room. There are daily and weekly newspapers published in both the English and Hawaiian languages. The descendants of the early missionaries now resident here, together with the better class of Americans who have since arrived, constitute a highly cultivated, refined and agreeable society, ready to give cordial reception and generous hospitality to all visitors manifestly worthy of their attention. There is another class, quite as numerous, who neglect no opportunity to sneer at and denounce the missionaries, and who constitute the patrons of saloons, gaming places and low dives, of which Honolulu is by no means destitute. Hilo on Hawaii is the second town in size and importance. It is beautifully situated upon Byron bay, and contains a population of between 3,000 and 4,000. The other towns are inconsiderable villages. King Kalakaua is 50 years of age, is dissolute and a hard drinker, and is fast treading the footsteps of his predecessor, Lumalo, who died from the effects of dissipation at the age of 39. He had no children. The heir apparent is his sister, well advanced in life, after whom there is a girl 12 years of age, upon whose death the royal family becomes extinct. What is to be the future of these islands? Nine-tenths of all the most intelligent citizens are republican at heart, and would rejoice to see the Hawaiian Islands annexed to the United States. From their position off our west coast and on the great highway of commerce between our Pacific States and Australia, China and Japan—as an important coaling and naval station for our vessels in the Pacific, it is of the first importance that they shall not be permitted to pass under the control of any European government. Both England and France are keenly watchful, are desirous and, no doubt, hopeful, of their acquisition whenever a change occurs.—Honolulu Cor. Cincinnati Commercial Gazette.

It Is Worry That Kills.
I once heard Henry Ward Beecher say that he had the greatest difficulty at the beginning of his career to acquire the habit of working easily, and he might have been in his grave a quarter of a century ago had he not overcome his tendency to worry—the natural concomitant of a highly nervous organization. "I am convinced," said he, "that no youth can expect to achieve great success unless he learns that lesson. It is worry, not work, that kills men. When I was a young man I worried over the mistakes I made so much that I saw it was injuring my health and I resolved to stop my lying awake nights to fret about my blunders. I conquered the weakness, and since that struggle I have attempted to do my best, whatever the emergency in which I was placed, and then dismiss the matter from my mind, whether the result was satisfactory or otherwise. The only good of studying the past is to avoid the repetition of blunders." Mr. Beecher probably felt that a wise man may make a mistake, but only a fool makes the same mistake twice.—Chicago Journal.

To Stop Nose Bleeding.
A simple plan of stopping bleeding of the nose has lately been advised. Grasp firmly the nose with the finger and thumb for ten or fifteen minutes; by thus completely stopping the movement of air through the nose (which displaces freshly formed clots), you will favor the clotting of the blood and will frequently stop hemorrhage.—Medical Journal.

Athletes Are Born, Not Made.
"Of course you find a great difference in the natural aptitude of different persons for such things?"

But some persons seem to have a quicker connection than others between the brain and certain muscles, and these excel in what requires immediate obedience of the muscles to the will. There is a physical tact just as there is a mental tact, and an apparently difficult and dangerous feat is accomplished by using just the right stress at just the right moment. There is, of course, a certain knack in using the apparatus. This is taught in a small part of the time in which it can be acquired by practice without the lessons. A good many of the gymnasts' feats which are apparently done so easily are the result of long continued practice. As some one has said, an uneducated eye can no more appreciate the difficulties of certain gymnastic exercises by seeing them done with so much ease than an inexperienced ear can estimate those of a piece of music by hearing it played."—New York Mail and Express Interview.

Celluloid for Water Proofing.
The water proofing material recently discovered by M. Tanin turns out to be simply dissolved celluloid. The mixture is prepared with pyroxline, which is prepared by disaggregating some cellulose with paper or with rags in a mixture of sulphuric acid and azotic acid. This pulpy mass is put in camphorated alcohol, to which is afterward added a mixture of alcohol and ether. The compound is applied on hard objects with a brush, but stuffs are dipped into a bath of the mixture.—Frank Leslie's.

A Valuable Mexican Product.
Pita Fibra, a Mexican product, is found largely in Honduras. It grows in canes from five to twelve feet high and from two to three inches in diameter. Efforts are being made by the Mexican government to encourage its cultivation. The Indians use it for the manufacture of boots and shoes, nets, fishing lines, halters and cans. Mats of great beauty, some of them valued as high as \$30 each, are made from it. It also makes a good imitation silk.—New York Tribune.

Are Not Cloud Cleavers.
W. W. Story, the sculptor, says that statues should be placed near the ground. That seems to be good sense, and since Story recommends it, there is little doubt but it is also good art. The old style of placing statues on the top of columns and pinnacles, where they would be out of sight and lose their natural proportions, had the effect to hide art. Human beings are land animals, and it is unnatural to thrust their statues into the sky.—Kansas City Star.

A New Apparatus.
The megascoposcope is a new apparatus lately brought to the notice of the Academic des Sciences. It is armed with an incandescent light, and is used to explore the stomach, bladder and other cavities of the body. By its means an objective lens may be carried into the cavity and a magnified image of its interior be obtained for the physician's inspection.—Hall's Journal of Health.

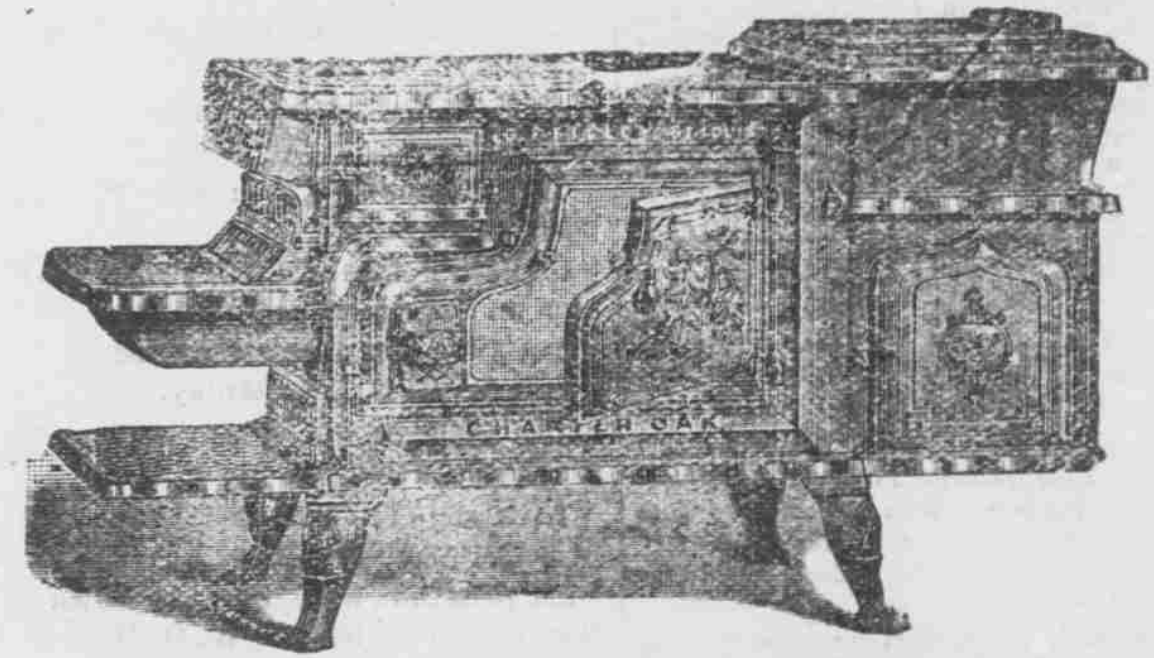
