MUDDY STREETS.

Mr. Aholo is new to the duties of his office, and being crowded with the multiplicity of details appertaining to it he is no doubt excusable in degree for not taking active measures for prosecuting street and road repairs as suggested by the ADVERTISER a short time ago.

There is a shortage in the supply of illuminating fluid for lighting the city, or else there is great economy in its use. Last night the city and suburbs were in a state of comparative darkness.

Messrs. Wenner & Co., Fort street, have manufactured a very handsome silver medal to commemorate the jubilee anniversary of His Majesty's birthday. It consists of the monogram "K. I." surmounted by a crown, in the center of which is a small photograph of His Majesty. Around the monogram, on a narrow band, is an inscription giving the date and year of His Majesty's birth. It is a clever piece of work, and the demand for the medal is likely to be large.

Engine Company No. 1.

The regular monthly meeting of this company was held Wednesday evening with a good attendance of members. An application for membership was rejected and another was deferred to the present. The following committee was appointed to make arrangements for the public torchlight procession: Foreman Robert More, Assistant Foreman W. Wright and delegate T. R. Lucas. It was decided to change the monthly drill from Saturday to the Friday evening nearest full moon. A letter was read from Mrs. M. C. Beckley, Secretary of the First Division of the Liliuokalani Educational Society, thanking the company for the offer of its hall for holding meetings. The picture of Mr. John Nott, ex-Chief Engineer, presented by himself, was received with thanks, and hung up in a prominent place. Mr. J. A. Mehrtens presented Foreman Robert More with a very handsome silver badge. Mr. More expressed his surprise and thanks.

The Fire Department.

The monthly meeting of the Board of Representatives of the Honolulu Fire Department was held at No. 2 Engine Room last evening. Mr. Chas. B. Wilson, Chief Engineer, presided, and the attendance numbered 18.

The Secretary, Mr. Henry Smith, read a communication from Captain T. E. Krouse of the Fire Police, complaining of a statement reported by the "Herald" to have been made the previous evening by Mr. Toussaint at the meeting of Engine Company No. 1, to the effect that the "Bulletin" had published a letter, charging the Fire Police with "dereliction of duty at fires." Mr. W. Williams was also reported to have said that the Fire Police "would most likely be found at the rear of fires among the plunderers." Accepted.

Another communication from No. 1 Company was read, in which the name of Mr. J. M. Kaneakau was mentioned as delegate. Accepted, and the gentleman invited to take his seat.

A letter signed by Hon. J. A. Cummings, and approved by His Excellency Mr. Gibson, in which it was stated that the Jubilee Committee promised to pay the Department \$400 towards the expenses of taking part in His Majesty's birthday festivities on the 16th instant, the money to be paid out of the sum appropriated by the Legislature for that purpose, was received. Accepted.

The Chief Engineer reported the receipt of a letter from the Interisland Steam Navigation Company expressing appreciation of the services of the Department and enclosing a check for \$500.

He had taken it upon himself to draft a reply, which had been published in the papers. As he believed it was the first time the Department's services had been acknowledged in this way, he was having some copies engrossed to be distributed among the different companies. (Applause.)

The Secretary read a claim from Mr. M. N. Kennedy for injuries received at the fire on board the W. G. Hall. It was stated that his ribs were broken and his eye injured. The amount was ordered to be paid out of the sick fund.

The Chief Engineer, as Chairman of the Relief Committee, reported verbally that there was a balance still on hand unclaimed amounting to \$50. It was decided that the report of this committee be held over for one month, so that it might be presented in writing, it being understood that no further claims would now be considered.

A somewhat lengthy discussion took place relative to the report in the "Herald" already alluded to. Many and diverse views were expressed and the debate accordingly waxed somewhat warm. Some blamed the reporter, who they considered should have had more discretion than to publish such statements; others blamed the speakers, and held that they should have been more guarded, and that if these things were true, it was right they should be published; if not true, a contradiction should be caused to appear in the same paper. Some considered the writer of the letter in the "Bulletin," which had first given rise to the unpleasantness, while others treated the whole thing as a joke, though it had appeared in print in all seriousness, and had thus created a wrong impression. As the outcome of these views, various motions and amendments were tabled and allowed to lapse. Some considered that it did not concern the Fire Department as a whole, but only the Fire Police, who should be left to deal with it; while, on the other hand, it was pointed out that it was unfair for a deserving body of men who received nothing for their service, to be accused unjustly, and that they ought therefore to be protected. A suggestion of the Chief Engineer that the delegate be instructed to lay the matter before No. 1 Company and direct the two members who had signed the letter in the "Bulletin" to contradict the statement at once or substantiate it, was ultimately embodied in a motion and agreed to.

Mr. H. Smith stated that a majority of No. 2 Company were desirous of having the date on which the Fire Department should take part in the birthday festivities altered from the 16th to the 15th instant.

The Chief Engineer stated that the department had tendered its services on the occasion, leaving it to the Jubilee Committee to choose the date. They had chosen the 16th and made arrangements for that date, and it could not be altered.

The Chief Engineer reported that he had placed the \$500 received from the Interisland Steam Navigation Company on deposit with Messrs. Bishop & Co., bankers. He thought of dividing the money in this way: \$100 to each of the three engine companies, \$50 each for the Pacific Hose, the Hook and Ladder and the Chinese Fire Companies, and \$50 for incidentals on the night of the fire.

Mr. Monsarrat considered this unfair, and contended that if the money was divided at all it should be divided equally. He, however, was opposed to division, and suggested that a contingent fund be established with it to provide refreshments for the firemen at fires and other such purposes.

Mr. Smith pointed to section 15 of the Constitution, which provided that all donations should be placed to the sick fund.

The Chief Engineer said the money was not merely for services in putting out the fire, but also for extra services in pumping out the ship in which Companies No. 1 and No. 4 took part, he having sent No. 2 away in case of another emergency.

After a good deal of discussion, the matter was postponed for one month.

A motion to ask the reporters not to publish anything detrimental to the Fire

Department failed to find a second and therefore lapsed.

The meeting then adjourned.

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

To-day, November 5th, is Guy Fawkes' day.

Yuen Kee & Co. have removed to Hotel street.

The Honolulu Rifles will hold their regular drill this evening.

The Royal Hawaiian band will play at the Queen's Hospital this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

A boy named Kia, 15 years of age, was locked up yesterday on a charge of drunkenness.

A large assortment of goods will be offered to-day at 10 o'clock by Mr. J. Lyons, at his regular cash sale.

There was a very heavy fall of rain at Waianae, on this island, yesterday, the first in many months.

The steamer W. G. Hall sails on her usual route at 10 o'clock this morning. The mail closes at 9:30.

The Post Office dispatched by the bark Calbarian, for San Francisco, 439 letters and 593 packages of papers.

The load of black sand complained of yesterday as occupying the sidewalk on Merchant street has been removed.

The steam-schooner Surprise, recently purchased by the Pacific Navigation Company, has been placed under the Hawaiian flag.

Last evening Mr. Manuel Reis gave a luncheon and ball at his residence, in honor of the first anniversary of his child's birthday.

Torbert won the one hour gas-souper race at the rink, covering close on 9 miles; Camara second with 8 miles and 9 laps.

The examining board of the Honolulu Rifles will be at the armory this evening at 7 o'clock to examine candidates for Corporals.

The Hon. J. L. Kaulikou, Marshal, is prosecuting in the Police Court during the absence of Deputy Marshal Dayton on Hawaii.

A meeting of the Waimea Sugar Mill Company will be held at 10 o'clock this morning at Messrs. E. Hoffschlaeger & Co.'s office.

It commenced raining very heavily yesterday morning, and continued throughout most of the day. The streets are in a very muddy condition.

The King's Own will have a drill this evening at the Armory, under command of Quartermaster General Nowlein and Captain C. H. Clark.

There will be the usual service at St. Andrew's Cathedral this evening at 7 o'clock conducted by the Bishop of Honolulu, who will deliver a brief address.

Yesterday afternoon, while a policeman was marching six prisoners over to the jail, one of them, a Chinaman, escaped. He has not yet been recaptured.

W. C. Sproull has just opened up in his new store on Fort street a very fine assortment of goods, which he has imported specially for the coming holiday season.

Mr. J. L. Hutton, the gifted musician and composer, recently died in England. His charming songs will live as elegant and truthful samples of the pure old English school.

The bark Alden Bessie, from Portland, Oregon, with Chinese passengers, for Hongkong, is anchored inside, she will probably take a number of passengers from this port.

Mr. W. S. Luce, the well-known wine and spirit merchant, received a fifteen-gallon keg of Philadelphia lager beer by the Alameda. It was sampled yesterday and pronounced A. 1.

In spite of the unpleasant weather yesterday, Her Royal Highness the Princess Liliuokalani held her regular monthly reception, which was well attended. The Royal Hawaiian Band was in attendance.

Messrs. Lovejoy & Co. have recently enlarged and renovated their store, and also added largely to their stock of wines, spirits and ales. They call particular attention to the "Royal Club" brand of gin.

Instead of playing a match game at pin pool last evening, Messrs. Loui Morris and J. F. B. McCleery gave an exhibition for the gate receipts. The attendance was small, and the game was interesting to those who fully understood it.

Mr. J. H. Soper is now showing an invoice of standard works and novels recently arrived from England at his store, Merchant street. They are fine works and selling rapidly. There is also fac-similes of the Magna Charta and warrants of execution of Mary Queen of Scots and Charles I.

The New Hydrant.

A preliminary test of the new sample fire hydrant alluded to a few days since was applied yesterday morning at the head of Emma street. A hose 100 feet long was attached to one of the small nozzles, and without the employment of steam power, a horizontal stream 160 feet long was thrown. Two 50 feet lengths of hose were then attached to both the small nozzles, and perpendicular streams about 120 feet high were obtained. After this, the small nozzles were shut off and the large engine nozzle turned on, the result being a heavy stream which ploughed up the ground. The operations are considered eminently satisfactory and it is anticipated that the further test with steam, which will probably take place to-morrow, will be equally so.

No Races.

The programme for the jubilee festivities included horse races, to take place at Kapiolani Park, November 27th. They have been declared off. It appears that the Hawaiian Jockey Club did not feel in a position to offer the purses to be competed for, and the Festivities Committee could not arrange to have a draft made payable before December 1st. The Jockey Club then tendered the use of the track, but the committee has declined the offer, consequently there will be no races.

Celestials Returning.

The American bark Alden Bessie, mentioned in the shipping column of this issue, has on board some 250 Chinese in transit from Portland for Hongkong. She will also take 25 Chinese from this port.
