As They See Us.

HONOLULU (T. H.), April 9.—Treasurer Lausing has just made a report to Governor Dole, which indicates that the Territory is running very short of funds and will soon be without cash for current expenses. The cash balance is now down to \$160,000 and running expenses are about \$100,000 a month. There will be no income until the Legislature provides some and today it was found necessary to suspend some road work.

Transport Quarantined.

Smallpox infests the United States army transport *Lawton*, which arrived here on Tuesday from Manila, via Nagasaki and Honolulu, and she must spend about fourteen days at the Quarantine Station.

The *Lawton* comes home with the Thirty ninth Infantry. She put three cases of smallpox ashore at Honolulu. The disease again became apparent after she left that port.

At the Mint.

On March 16, there will be a meeting of the directors of the Mint, to discuss the question of coinage, and the size of the equivalent to be poured out for a quarter. The stockholders are requested to meet later on in the new beer garden, back of the Mint, and there express their views on dividends and reserve funds. The President hopes that there will be a full attendance.

### LEGISLATION.

On Wednesday, April 3, Governor Ollah sent to the New York Senate at Albany a bill of 1000 pages, being a revised charter for the city of New York, with the request that it be considered at once. The Senate passed the bill within one hour on the day of its receipt. The next day, Thursday, the bill passed the Assembly within four hours, and on the next day, Friday, the bill was on its way to New York City bearing the Governors signature.

This action may be dwelt upon by our legislators with profit and by Gov. Dole with equal profit if the facts reach his comprehension, we mean by this if he has capacity of mind to perceive and understand.

### THE GOVERNOR IS MISTAKEN.

We doubt that Mr. S. B. Dole is following or responding, to the best interests of the Territory by declining to the first Legislature an extension of time in which to settle and dispose of vital measures for the welfare of this little commonwealth, forcibly annexed to the Great Republic of the United States.

THE INDEPENDENT doesn't want to break open old political sores and as the Governor knows, there is no ill-feeling towards him as a citizen of the Territory and an old resident of Hawaii.

Would it not be good policy on his part to try to smooth the hostile feelings which necessarily arose in the days gone by, when Mr. Dole one day was a sworn servant of the Queen and the next day a cursed rebel?

We have tried to say "pau" to the ill-feeling which naturally arose among the Hawaiians, during those disastrous days. But when we find the organ of Thurston daily abusing a young Hawaiian, whose skin is as white as that of the owner of the Dole-Thurston organ, and heaping abuses on the boys who have Hawaiian blood in their veins, we believe the moment has come, when, in mass meeting assembled, the voters of this country should meet and publicly announce through a resolution that the people of Hawaii have no faith in the present Governor and desire his immediate retirement.

The contemptible attitude of the Governor has been of such a character that few Americans would tolerate. He is there of course, but when we did get annexed we thought that the Sand Bag Dole regime was no longer wanted.

### COME ON GIRLS.

There is no question now as to our boys going into politics. We tried to keep them out but Attorney General Dole has rendered a decision which gives the dear girls a chance to vote in this Territory. We hope the dames can also run for the Legislature, and be elected, because the lobbyists are dead tired of working with politicians of the male sex.

How nice it will be to call at the caucus room and whisper, with a kiss, to Miss Senatoress Blank: "Will you give me your vote on the bill relating to the tax on female dogs," and instead of "setting" the masculine drinks up be answered with a sweet voice saying: "You bet your life, how much." Oh! we want Mr. Dole and his opinions. This is his opinion you can take the rest out of him:

"Territory of Hawaii, Office of the Attorney General, Honolulu, H. I., April 25, 1901.

"To His Excellency Sanford B. Dole, Governor of the Territory of Hawaii.

"Sir:—I have the honor, at your request, to submit the following opinion relative to that portion of Section 55 of the Organic Act which provides, that: 'The legislature, at its first regular session after the census enumeration shall be ascertained, and from time to time thereafter, shall re-apportion the membership in the senate and house of representatives among the senatorial and representative districts on the basis of the population in each of said districts who are citizens of the Territory.' In some precincts the women and children are almost entirely Hawaiian born, while their husbands and fathers are mainly Asiatic, ineligible to citizenship. These conditions seriously affect the relative strength of political parties in this Territory, and in a manner that Congress probably did not contemplate; but when a provision of the Organic Act is as plain as the English language can make it and is not in conflict with the constitution of the United States, it cannot be avoided by construction, whatever its consequences may be.

"This provision declares that re-apportionment shall be on the basis of the population in each of said districts, who are citizens of the Territory."

"Section 4 of the Organic Act declares: 'That all persons who were citizens of the Republic of Hawaii on August twelfth, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, are hereby declared to be citizens of the United States and citizens of the Territory of Hawaii. And all citizens of the United States resident in the Hawaiian Islands who were resident there on or since August twelfth, eighteenth hundred and ninety-eight, and all the citizens of the United States who shall hereafter reside in the Territory of Hawaii for one year shall be citizens of the Territory of Hawaii.'

"Sections 60 and 62 of the Organic Act declare: 'That in order to be qualified to vote for representatives a person shall, first, be a male citizen of the United States; second, have resided in the Territory not less than one year preceding and in the representative district in which he offers to register not less than three months immediately preceding the time at which he offers to register; third, have attained the age of twenty-one years; fourth, prior to each regular election, during the time prescribed by law for registration, have caused his name to be entered on the register of voters for representatives for his district; fifth, be able to speak, read and write the English or Hawaiian language.' 'That in order to be qualified to vote for senators and for voting in all other elections in the Territory of Hawaii a person must possess all the qualifications and be subject to all the conditions required by this Act of voters for representatives.'"

Upon the overwhelming weight of authority, as well as from the Organic Act itself, it seems to me plain that the word "citizen" cannot be limited to those who have the right of suffrage, but also includes women and children, who, by birth or naturalization, are subject to the laws of the United States and of the Territory of Hawaii and entitled to the protection of the laws of the United States and of the Territory of Hawaii.

**LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS**

**TOPICS OF THE DAY.**

To Let—A furnished room at No. 9 Garden Lane. Mrs. McConnell.

The band will play at Makee Island this evening.

Dr. Carmichael has succeeded Dr. Kiyouan as quarantine officer at San Francisco.

Jim Lloyd, vice-captain and coach of the Healan Boat Club, has been sick for the past few days.

Healan minstrel rehearsals have been changed from Monday and Thursday to Tuesday and Friday evenings.

The Oahu College of Music will give a concert tonight at 8 o'clock, in Pauahi Assembly Hall. Friends and lovers of music are cordially invited.

The Hawaiian bonds will be paid off on May 1 by Treasury Agents MacLennan and W. W. Ludlow, who arrived on the China. The funds are deposited in the First National Bank.

Reports brought by the steamer Haulei, which arrived yesterday from Kauai, confirmed the news of a smallpox case at Lihue plantation. R. D. Mead and J. M. Coulson, who were at the plantation, made a hurried departure, fearing they would be quarantined.

At 4 o'clock this afternoon the steamship Zealandia, Captain Dowdell, sails for San Francisco, from the Oceanic wharf, taking mail and passengers. She will also take a quantity of sugar to the Coast. From San Francisco she will proceed to Los Angeles to bring more Porto Rican emigrants to the Islands.

A stevedore, Kline by name, was slightly hurt by the falling of a coal bucket on the Navy wharf yesterday afternoon, while at work on the unloading of the Big Benauze. He was removed in a hack to his home, after the surgeon of the Iroquois had made sure that no bones were broken, and that the man was not seriously injured.

Wilder's steamer Claudine, Captain Parker, arrived from Hawaii ports yesterday morning at 3 o'clock. Today she starts on the new ten days' schedule, rendered necessary by the departure of the Helene for the Coast to be repaired. At 5 o'clock this afternoon she sails for Lahaina, Kahului, Nahiku, Hana, Hamoa and Kipahulu. She is now taking on freight at Wilder's wharf.

Another business block is to be erected at once on Hotel street, adjoining the "Elite." Contracts have been let to Messrs. Hoffman and Reiley for a modern two-story brick building, containing seven stores on Hotel and Union streets, and offices, and probably lodge rooms up stairs. The building is to be completed by September 1st, is to cost about \$10,000. The building will be known as the "Oregon Block." The owners are A. V. Gear, J. Lando, V. Hoffman, J. F. Reiley and L. A. Rostin.

**More Lawyers.**

F. W. Buckley, one of the Representatives in the present Legislature, yesterday applied for examination for admission to practice law in the District Courts of the Territory. He was admitted and took his oath. He is 25 years of age.

Wm. White, aged 49 years, and a native of Hawaii, yesterday applied for an examination and to be admitted to practice law in the District Courts. He is a Senator in the present Legislature. He was admitted and took his oath.

Samuel K. Pua, a printer, also made application, was admitted and took his oath.

**Ex-Senator Wright's Funeral.**

The funeral of the late Senator John N. Wright took place yesterday afternoon, the interment being in Nuuanu Cemetery. The services were first held at the residence, whence the remains were conveyed to the Masonic Temple where the ritual of the body was pronounced under the direction of Brother Fred. Whitney. The members of George W. DeLong post were in attendance.

Night sessions in the Legislature are not a success. The honorable gentlemen, and they are honorable because they say so, should not be doing their pushing of public matters, in the federal buildings. The band ought to be in attendance at every night session.

It is always a pleasure to see a "white" Hawaiian stand up for the people of this country as did the Honorable Julian Monsarrat yesterday in the House of Representatives. Mr. Thurston may take a pointer from the words of Mr. Monsarrat in his fight against George Richardson's son going as Cadet to West Point. It was a bill relating to vagrancy which was before the House and Mr. Monsarrat said (as reported in Mr. Thurston's paper): "Any Hawaiian that says that any Hawaiian is a vagrant says what is untrue. Neither are there any Hawaiian prostitutes at Iwilei. I am Hawaiian born. I am surprised at any Hawaiian making such statements."

Mr. Fred W. Beckley, the member of the House of Representatives made a speech today which proved him a young Hawaiian of great ability, an honor to his race and a man whom the Hawaiians can proudly uphold as their representative in their political affairs. Mr. Beckley was justly bitter against the "haole" who had claimed that Governor Dole was justified in refusing an extension of the session of the Legislature on account of the dilatory work of the Hawaiian members. Mr. Beckley waxed warm when he told Leok Robertson that the neglect of the duties pertaining to a legislator was due to the "white" members of the House and not to the much despised Hawaiians who are to be blamed for the failure of this, the first legislature of the Territory. We compliment Representative Beckley on his forcible and noble address in behalf of the Hawaiians. He will always have in the future the support of the men who love the Hawaiians and of the Hawaiians who called him their champion.

Lorrie A. Thurston's hatred and bias against the late Judge George Richardson, who defeated him at every election in these Islands and in every Legislature under the monarchy has now to be vented on an inoffensive boy, an orphan, who has had the honor of being nominated for a cadetship at West Point. We apologize to Mr. Thurston for not knowing or rather not remembering that General Grant is a "has-been." American Generals are not quoted or referred to in the great European military schools, and the writer admits that all he remembered of Mr. Grant was some transactions in Wall Street. Through the whole Advertiser editorial relating to Richardson going to West Point, which appears this morning we notice and feel Thurston's race feeling towards the Hawaiians. Mr. Thurston will probably be surprised to learn that the young man has the very highest recommendations from Oahu College, from his employers in the government and from many honorable men, who know him and wouldn't like to class him with a "white" kanaka, like Mr. Thurston is. Of course Mr. Thurston has had the honor of being fired out of Washington, because he didn't know enough to be an ordinary diplomat. With the wonderful influence gained by the gentleman through that experience, he may down young Richardson, and we understand that the young man's friends will advise him to stay here and take no chances in fighting the influence of Mr. Thurston at West Point and Washington. The Hawaiians will please take notice and remember Mr. Thurston.

We invite any intelligent reader to peruse the following report presented in the Legislature:

The minority of the committee on taxation has used all the time of the session in examining into the affairs of the present system of taxation and in discussing the same without coming to any definite conclusion. A portion of that committee, appreciating that the expenses of the government must be met, the fire claims paid, and public improvements carried out throughout the Territory during the biennial period, and that only a few days of the session remain in which to pass the necessary legislation, respectfully submit the following:

- We recommend that the tax on property be raised from 1 percent to 1 1/2 percent;
  - That the inheritance tax be increased and graded;
  - That the tax on large carts and wagons be increased;
  - And that the poll tax be abolished.

HONOLULU (T. H.), April 9.—Treasurer Lansing has just made a report to Governor Dole, which indicates that the Territory is running very short of funds and will soon be without cash for current expenses. The cash balance is now down to \$160,000 and running expenses are about \$100,000 a month. There will be no income until the Legislature provides some and today it was found necessary to suspend some road work.

The stockholders are requested to meet later on in the new beer garden, back of the Mint, and there express their views on dividends and reserve funds. The President hopes that there will be a full attendance.

## LEGISLATION.

On Wednesday, April 8, Governor O'Leary sent to the New York Senate at Albany a bill of 1000 pages, being a revised charter for the city of New York, with the request that it be considered at once. The Senate passed the bill within one hour on the day of its receipt. The next day, Thursday, the bill passed the Assembly within four hours, and on the next day, Friday, the bill was on its way to New York City bearing the Governor's signature.

This action may be dwelt upon by our legislators with profit and by Gov. Dole with equal profit if the facts reach his comprehension, we mean by this if he has capacity of mind to perceive and understand.

### THE GOVERNOR IS MISTAKEN.

We doubt that Mr. S. B. Dole is following or responding, to the best interests of the Territory by declining to the first Legislature an extension of time in which to settle and dispose of vital measures for the welfare of this little commonwealth, forcibly annexed to the Great Republic of the United States.

THE INDEPENDENT doesn't want to break open old political sores and as the Governor knows, there is no ill-feeling towards him as a citizen of the Territory and an old resident of Hawaii.

Would it not be good policy on his part to try to smooth the hostile feelings which necessarily arose in the days gone by, when Mr. Dole one day was a sworn servant of the Queen and the next day a cursed rebel?

We have tried to say "pau" to the ill-feeling which naturally arose among the Hawaiians, during those disastrous days. But when we find the organ of Thurston daily abusing a young Hawaiian, whose skin is as white as that of the owner of the Dole-Thurston organ, and heaping abuses on the boys who have Hawaiian blood in their veins, we believe the moment has come, when, in mass meeting assembled, the voters of this country should meet and publicly announce through a resolution that the people of Hawaii have no faith in the present Governor and desire his immediate retirement.

The contemptible attitude of the Governor has been of such a character that few Americans would tolerate. He is there of course, but when we did get annexed we thought that the Sand Bag Dole regime was no longer wanted.

### COME ON GIRLS.

There is no question now as to our boys going into politics. We tried to keep them out but Attorney General Dole has rendered a decision which gives the dear girls a chance to vote in this Territory. We hope the dames can also run for the Legislature, and be elected, because the lobbyists are dead tired of working with politicians of the male sex.

How nice it will be to call at the caucus room and whisper, with a kiss, to Miss Senatoress Blank: "Will you give me your vote on the bill relating to the tax on female dogs," and instead of "setting" the masculine drinks up be answered with a sweet voice saying: "You bet your life, how much." Oh! we want Mr. Dole and his opinion. This is his opinion you can take the rest out of him:

"Territory of Hawaii, Office of the Attorney General, Honolulu, H. I., April 25, 1901.

"To His Excellency Sanford B. Dole, Governor of the Territory of Hawaii.

"Sir:—I have the honor, at your request, to submit the following opinion relative to that portion of Section 55 of the Organic Act which provides, that: 'The legislature, at its first regular session after the census enumeration shall be ascertained, and from time to time thereafter, shall re-apportion the membership in the senate and house of representatives among the senatorial and representative districts on the basis of the population in each of said districts who are citizens of the Territory.' In some precincts the women and children are almost entirely Hawaiian born, while their husbands and fathers are mainly Asiatic, ineligible to citizenship. These conditions seriously affect the relative strength of political parties in this Territory, and in a manner that Congress probably did not contemplate; but when a provision of the Organic Act is as plain as the English language can make it and is not in conflict with the constitution of the United States, it cannot be avoided by construction, whatever its consequences may be.

"This provision declares that re-apportionment shall be on the basis of the population in each of said districts, who are citizens of the Territory."

"Section 4 of the Organic Act declares: 'That all persons who were citizens of the Republic of Hawaii on August twelfth, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, are hereby declared to be citizens of the United States and citizens of the Territory of Hawaii. And all citizens of the United States resident in the Hawaiian Islands who were resident there on or since August twelfth, eighteenth hundred and ninety-eight, and all the citizens of the United States who shall hereafter reside in the Territory of Hawaii for one year shall be citizens of the Territory of Hawaii.'

"Sections 60 and 62 of of the Organic Act declare: 'That in order to be qualified to vote for representatives a person shall, first, be a male citizen of the United States; second, have resided in the Territory not less than one year preceding and in the representative district in which he offers to register not less than three months immediately preceding the time at which he offers to register; third, have attained the age of twenty-one years; fourth, prior to each regular election, during the time prescribed by law for registration, have caused his name to be entered on the register of voters for representatives for his district; fifth, be able to speak, read and write the English or Hawaiian language.' 'That in order to be qualified to vote for senators and for voting in all other elections in the Territory of Hawaii a person must possess all the qualifications and be subject to all the conditions required by this Act of voters for representatives.'"

Upon the overwhelming weight of authority, as well as from the Organic Act itself, it seems to me plain that the word "citizen" cannot be limited to those who have the right of suffrage, but also includes women and children, who, by birth or naturalization, are subject to the laws of the United States and of the Territory of Hawaii and entitled to the protection of the laws of the United States and of the Territory of Hawaii.

**LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS**

**TOPICS OF THE DAY.**

The band will play at Makee Isl. and this evening.

Dr. Carmichael has succeeded Dr. Kiyouan as quarantine officer at San Francisco.

Jim Lloyd, vice-captain and coach of the Healan Boat Club, has been sick for the past few days.

Healan minstrel rehearsals have been changed from Monday and Thursday to Tuesday and Friday evenings.

The Oahu College of Music will give a concert tonight at 8 o'clock, in Pauahi Assembly Hall. Friends and lovers of music are cordially invited.

The Hawaiian bonds will be paid off on May 1 by Treasury Agents MacLennan and W. W. Ludlow, who arrived on the China. The funds are deposited in the First National Bank.

Reports brought by the steamer Haalei, which arrived yesterday from Kauai, confirmed the news of a smallpox case at Lihua plantation. R. D. Mead and J. M. Coulson, who were at the plantation, made a hurried departure, fearing they would be quarantined.

At 4 o'clock this afternoon the steamship Zealandia, Captain Dowdell, sails for San Francisco, from the Oceanic wharf, taking mail and passengers. She will also take a quantity of sugar to the Coast. From San Francisco she will proceed to Los Angeles to bring more Porto Rican emigrants to the Islands.

A stevedore, Kline by name, was slightly hurt by the falling of a coal bucket on the Navy wharf yesterday afternoon, while at work on the unloading of the Big Bonanza. He was removed in a hack to his home, after the surgeon of the Iroquois had made sure that no bones were broken, and that the man was not seriously injured.

Wildler's steamer Claudine, Captain Parker, arrived from Hawaii ports yesterday morning at 3 o'clock. Today she starts on the new ten days' schedule, rendered necessary by the departure of the Helene for the Coast to be repaired. At 5 o'clock this afternoon she sails for Lahaina, Kahului, Nahiku, Hana, Hamoa and Kipahulu. She is now taking on freight at Wildler's wharf.

Another business block is to be erected at once on Hotel street, adjoining the "Elite." Contracts have been let to Messrs. Hoffman and Reiley for a modern two-story brick building, containing seven stores on Hotel and Union streets, and offices, and probably lodge rooms up stairs. The building is to be completed by September 1st, is to cost about \$40,000. The building will be known as the "Oregon Block." The owners are A. V. Gear, J. Lando, V. Hoffman, J. F. Reiley and L. A. Rostin.

**More Lawyers.**

F. W. Buckley, one of the Representatives in the present Legislature, yesterday applied for examination for admission to practice law in the District Courts of the Territory. He was admitted and took his oath. He is 25 years of age.

Wm. White, aged 49 years, and a native of Hawaii, yesterday applied for an examination and to be admitted to practice law in the District Courts. He is a Senator in the present Legislature. He was admitted and took his oath.

Samuel K. Pua, a printer, also made application, was admitted and took his oath.

**Ex-Senator Wright's Funeral.**

The funeral of the late Senator John N. Wright took place yesterday afternoon, the interment being in Nuuanu Cemetery. The services were first held at the residence, whence the remains were conveyed to the Masonic Temple where the ritual of the body was pronounced under the direction of Brother Fred. Whitney. The members of George W. DeLong post were in attendance.

Night sessions in the Legislature are not a success. The honorable gentlemen, and they are honorable because they say so, should not be doing their pushing of public matters, in the federal buildings. The band ought to be in attendance at every night session.

It is always a pleasure to see a "white" Hawaiian stand up for the people of this country as did the Honorable Julian Monsarrat yesterday in the House of Representatives. Mr. Thurston may take a pointer from the words of Mr. Monsarrat in his fight against George Richardson's son going as Cadet to West Point. It was a bill relating to vagrancy which was before the House and Mr. Monsarrat said (as reported in Mr. Thurston's paper): "Any Hawaiian that says that any Hawaiian is a vagrant says what is untrue. Neither are there any Hawaiian prostitutes at Iwilei. I am Hawaiian born. I am surprised at any Hawaiian making such statements."

Mr. Fred W. Beckley, the member of the House of Representatives made a speech today which proved him a young Hawaiian of great ability, an honor to his race and a man whom the Hawaiians can proudly uphold as their representative in their political affairs. Mr. Beckley was justly bitter against the "haole" who had claimed that Governor Dole was justified in refusing an extension of the session of the Legislature on account of the dilatory work of the Hawaiian members. Mr. Beckley waxed warm when he told Aleck Robertson that the neglect of the duties pertaining to a legislator was due to the "white" members of the House and not to the much despised Hawaiians who are to be blamed for the failure of this, the first legislature of the Territory. We compliment Representative Beckley on his forcible and noble address in behalf of the Hawaiians. He will always have in the future the support of the men who love the Hawaiians and of the Hawaiians who called him their champion.

Lorrin A. Thurston's hatred and bias against the late Judge George Richardson, who defeated him at every election in these Islands and in every Legislature under the monarchy has now to be vented on an inoffensive boy, an orphan, who has had the honor of being nominated for a cadetship at West Point. We apologize to Mr. Thurston for not knowing or rather not remembering that General Grant is a "has-been." American Generals are not quoted or referred to in the great European military schools, and the writer admits that all he remembered of Mr. Grant was some transactions in Wall Street. Through the whole Advertiser editorial relating to Richardson going to West Point, which appears this morning we notice and feel Thurston's race feeling towards the Hawaiians. Mr. Thurston will probably be surprised to learn that the young man has the very highest recommendations from Oahu College, from his employers in the government and from many honorable men, who know him and wouldn't like to class him with a "white" kanaka, like Mr. Thurston is. Of course Mr. Thurston has had the honor of being fired out of Washington, because he didn't know enough to be an ordinary diplomat. With the wonderful influence gained by the gentleman through that experience, he may down young Richardson, and we understand that the young man's friends will advise him to stay here and take no chances in fighting the influence of Mr. Thurston at West Point and Washington. The Hawaiians will please take notice and remember Mr. Thurston.

We invite any intelligent reader to peruse the following report presented in the Legislature:

The minority of the committee on taxation has used all the time of the session in examining into the affairs of the present system of taxation and in discussing the same without coming to any definite conclusion. A portion of that committee, appreciating that the expenses of the government must be met, the fire claims paid, and public improvements carried out throughout the Territory during the biennial period, and that only a few days of the session remain in which to pass the necessary legislation, respectfully submit the following:

We recommend that the tax on property be raised from 1 percent to 1 1/2 percent;

That the inheritance tax be increased and graded;

That the tax on large carts and wagons be increased;

And that the poll tax be abolished.

We present the accompanying bills to cover these points, and recommend their prompt passage.
