NEW YORK'S SOCIAL WAR.
The History of the Quarrel Between Two
Society Leaders.
(Brooklyn Eagle.)

A society man with whom I had a long
talk a short time ago remarked after he
had settled the destinies of pugilism and the
opera in America: "It is rather amusing to
those of us who are in the swim, you know,
to see how little newspapers really know of
social affairs. Here is a tremendous row go-
ing on in New York society—one which has
never before been equalled in the history of
the town—and yet not a word of it is to be
seen in any of the society columns of the
papers. If such a thing were to take place
in London instead of New York, Truth,
Vanity Fair and all of the other society jour-
nals, would almost go to the point of losing
extras concerning it. Here it seems to have
escaped the notice of the papers entirely.
How do you account for it?" "Perhaps the
thing is not worth the attention of the
papers," said the world, the attention of the
papers when Mr. Astor is snubbed and cut
dead before fifty people in Newport by Mrs.
August Belmont? "Is it so?"

"It is. The history of the quarrel which
has already divided New York society into
two distinct factions is this: In the first
place, Mrs. Astor, as you are undoubtedly
aware, is a social leader of great prominence
in New York. Her family, which is con-
nected by marriage with the Loxesville, the
Van Alens, the Lyonses and indeed with
half the distinguished swell people of New
York, stands in the foremost position. I
suppose the Astors are the greatest family
in America in social ways. Mrs. August
Belmont, who is the daughter of Commodore
Perry and comes of a family 100 years
older than the Astors, is a very in-
fluential social leader. She is
the only real rival of Mrs. Astor.
It has long been understood that
there is considerable jealousy between
the two ladies. A few years ago the young
son of the Belmont family, Mr. Oliver
Belmont, married a daughter of Mrs. Whit-
ting and took her to France. They separated
and the bride came back to her mother's.
The Whittings are very aristocratic people
and extremely popular besides. They are, I
am told, distantly connected with the Astors.
Whether this is so or not, they are hand in
glove with the Astors and hence hostile
to Mrs. Belmont. Young Mr. Belmont has
done his best to get into society, and his
mother has pushed him vigorously, but it
doesn't seem to be a success. Mrs. Belmont
declared last summer at Newport, that the
Whittings were the cause of her son's unfor-
tunes, and she announced that she would cut
anybody who recognized them. Mrs. Astor
saw Mrs. Whitting a luncheon a few days
after this to show her contempt for Mrs.
Belmont and the latter cut her dead the
next time they met. Each of the ladies
exercised her utmost influence among her
friends, and society is divided into two
distinct bodies, with New York's two society
leaders at their heads. "Who will win?"
"Well the Astors have been winning at
everything for the last 100 years, and I
think they will keep up their prestige."
"William Waldorf Astor didn't win his seat
in congress." "No, but he was appointed
minister to Rome, which was a congressman
and goes him ten better."

"No Gentlemen!"
(Boston Courier.)
"He's clever, and he's a right good fellow,"
we recently observed of a rising young
"Bostonian" and so far as we know he is
all right, but isn't a gentleman." The criti-
cism had no reference to birth or circum-
stances, but certainly good as any-
where in America, the wealthy Bostonians
to the contrary notwithstanding, the au-
thors of the young man's social success,
in very good circles, is a
phrasing, sufficiently endowed with gen-
tle gold, he is accomplished and even ag-
gressive, yet was the strictures passed upon him
that he is not a gentleman, and the worst of
the case is that it is unquestionably true.
The young man is well dressed, he commits
no gross solecisms, he does not go about
pulling down his cuffs in the manner made
familiar to the Boston theatre-going public
by a certain popular leading man; he is very
respectably proficient in social customs and
conventions; and yet—yet—is certainly not
a gentleman.

Without fulfilling the desires of cynical
and captious readers by attempting to give
in half a dozen words a complete and ac-
curate definition of the term gentle-
man, we are willing partially to define it by
reference, as far as may be done by a brief
consideration of the shortcomings of the un-
fortunate individual who quite unconsciously
serves as a text. He is, in the first place,
utterly intolerant. In literature and politics,
or whatever branch of human thought an
opinion may be expressed, he seems to have
not a grain of sympathy, he seems to conceal
his feelings—not only that his own conclusion
in the matter is infallibly correct, but that
any mind must be an absolutely mental rag-
bag which for a moment entertains any other
opinion.

His air toward one who would argue with
him is that of divinely inspired condescension,
pensively tinged with the most active con-
tempt. He is not discouraged by the line
and rule standard; and should one resent his
impertinence it would be difficult, afterward
to find a satisfactory reason for so doing;
yet constantly he means to be so great an
intellect to his interlocutor, even when the
latter is his superior in experience, wisdom,
age, rank, or whatever advantages one to pre-
cedence in America, that he is short of a
kick would seem to be its due and neces-
sary consequence. It is but another piece of mental
arrogance that our young man studies in the
line of action of his friend, assumes that
their decisions are whatever seem to him
best, and in various ways is a self-appointed
guide and commander to the; always, it
must be understood, in a high, hearty, witty
fashion which it is impossible to resent and
difficult to resist.

Not to prolong the catalogue of his
offenses, it will be evident that at least the
young man is very sensitive to the bounds of
other people.

The Zealandia left her moorings at 6:50 p. m. on Saturday, and forthwith proceeded on her voyage. She got clear of the land before darkness set in.

Edward Hanlan, the oarsman, was a through passenger by the Zealandia. He admits that he is a played-out champion of sculls, and will now turn his attention to other matters.

There was a rumor current in town yesterday to the effect that the boiling lava in the Volcano pits had sunk out of sight; but we could find no reliable confirmation of the story.

Thanks are offered by the George W. de Ludy Post to all persons who supplied flowers on Decoration Day, and also to the ladies who so tastefully arranged the wreaths of flowers at Harmony Hall.

Now when the pass-zoo of three thousand miles across the Atlantic has been traversed to us in six days, we may soon hope that steamers from San Francisco will come over the two thousand miles to Honolulu in four days.

Mr. L. J. Levey informs us that Mr. Gayland, a theatrical manager, passed through the Zealandia, and, in a conversation with Mr. L. had stated that the Hicke Minstrels will be up on the next trip of the Alameda and stay over to perform in Honolulu.

A friend of ours suggests that the best way to thoroughly advertise the Hawaiian Islands, is to have a panorama of the most attractive scenery, including the volcano, painted on a large scale. The exhibition of these views would make known the Islands wherever it travelled.

Mr. W. Colbeck, until recently commercial editor of the Daily Telegraph, Sydney, N. S. W., called at the Advertiser's office last Saturday afternoon for a talk upon news matters. Mr. C. is a through passenger to San Francisco by the Zealandia, and intends making California his future home.

The sidewalk now being laid on the Waikiki side of lower Fort street, is evidently intended to be of the most lasting kind. Several inches thick of broken rock will underlie a covering of gravel—the whole kept together by a substantial wooden curb which stretches along from the Custom House to Queen street.

Mr. Mitchell was connected in partnership in his city with the late Mrs. Ira Richardson, in the mercantile business; and was a native of New York State—Brooklyn we believe. He was seventy-one years of age when he died, and had been in delicate circumstances for some time previously.

The performance of the Variety Company at the Opera House, on Saturday evening, was not largely attended. More than the programme was "gone through," and among the specialties worthy of notice was the singing of the Na Lani Ehiku Club which was very fine and elicited three encores. The Stanleys, Miss De Vere, and the Irish comedians, Gallagher and Jenkins, did their parts well.

The Friend reports seven thousand dollars raised for the North Pacific Mission Institute under the care of Rev. Dr. Hyde. It is hoped to secure at least ten thousand dollars. Hon. S. N. Castle has given one thousand dollars. It is very desirable that the new buildings should be completed before October. Subscriptions or contributions of any amount may be made to W. W. Rev. E. G. Porter, of Lexington, Mass., came up from New Zealand on the Zealandia, and will spend a month or more in the Hawaiian Islands. He has been two years absent from home, visiting all the different mission fields, in Turkey, India, China, Japan. He was a class-mate of Judge Hartwell in Harvard University. At present he is staying with Rev. Dr. Hyde, with whom he used to be associated in Christian work in the States.

The late Capt. A. W. Peiro, whose death notice appeared in our issue of 1st inst., was one of the best known of Honolulu business men. He was originally a whaling captain, and finally settled down as a ship-handler in this city. He was a close business man, frank, successful in whatever he undertook, and generally respected. Captain Peiro leaves behind him a widow and two daughters—one of the latter is the wife of Dr. Emerson.
