FEATHER DUSTERS.

How They are Made--The Kind of Feathers Used--Other Items.

(Chicago Tribune.)

"This is where we make feather dusters," said the proprietor of the establishment, in response to an inquiry by the reporter. "My place has a very large one, but we make a good many dusters in the course of a year."

Referring to the advertisement, the proprietor said, "We have girls to split and bunch feathers, which is very easy and simple process. Now, look here," and leading the reporter to the rear of the room, he showed a small machine of cylindrical shape, with a long, sharp-edged knife placed horizontally above it. "The girl puts the feather between the knife and the cylinder, and the latter revolving, the feather is carried through. In the passage, the stem is split, though the feather is not injured in the least, the object of this being to give pliability. In large factories this is all done by machinery, while in my place the feeding is done by hand. The feather is then run through a grinder, which removes the pith from the stem and smooths or sizes the latter down. Then they are 'bunched.' This consists simply in sorting them out according to size and fastening them together. They are then ready to be converted into dusters, the process of which you can easily understand, it being neither intricate nor difficult."

"What kind of feathers are used?"

"Those of turkeys altogether," except where peacock dusters are made."

"Where do the feathers come from?"

"I get them from the commission houses and they get them from every where, though the western states furnish the most. Chicago is the great feather market of the world, and in the matter of dusters there are made here than in any other city in the United States or Europe. Dusters are shipped from here to New York, San Francisco, and all intermediate points, and even Paris, France, has been supplied from Chicago."

"Are all the feathers of the turkey utilized?"

"Yes, the wings and tail feathers are used for making the dusters, the split duster--those which open wide or flare at the top; the body feathers make what is known as the body duster, which is more compact."

The Dairymen Farms.

(Northwestern Miller.)

S. A. Dairymen of the Dairymen farms at Casselton, D. T., recently said:

"We have this year 32,000 acres in wheat and 3,000 acres (enough to feed the stock) in oats. Nine successive crops have been raised off this land, and this year our wheat averaged fourteen, fifteen, and sixteen bushels to the acre. Next year we will begin to summer fallow, letting about 3,000 acres lie idle each season till it has all had a rest. We expect that after the summer fallow the yield will be from twenty to twenty-five bushels per acre."

"The 34,000 acres are divided into three farms of nearly equal size. For each of these there is a headquarters, with a superintendent, a foreman, an agent, and other officers. These farms are again divided into sections of 2,000 acres each, under a division foreman, who carries out the orders from headquarters, transmitted to him by telephone. Each division has its boarding house, with men cooks. In the spring seeding about 500 men are employed, and during the harvest about 1,000. In the fall the hands are discharged except sufficient to attend the 400 or 500 horses and mules through the winter."

"At each headquarters there is a store, upon which the cooks make requisition for all the provisions. The whole thing is so systematized that we can tell to a cent the cost of a man's stock for man and the cost of seeding, repairing, or plowing an acre of ground. We ship all our wheat to Duluth, and thence to Buffalo, where we find the best market. Today wheat sells in Buffalo for 4 cents more, after the shipping expenses are allowed for, than at Duluth."

NEWS BY THE AUSTRALIA.

We were barely able to allude to the news by the Australia in yesterday's paper, owing to the demand upon our space by legislative and other local items.

The imminent danger of a general European war is at an end, but should the Greek Chambers, from any influence or motive, refuse to obey the orders of the Powers, hostilities between Greece and Turkey could not be long delayed, and this would to a certainty involve Russia and the Balkan States, and probably also Austria.

THE LEGISLATURE.

The Legislative Assembly introduced a good deal of new work in the form of petitions at its sitting yesterday, and advanced several bills a stage. There was nothing in the proceedings calling for special mention. An early adjournment was taken to enable several visiting committees to obey the instructions of the House.

Hawaiian Parliament.

Legislative Assembly—Twenty-third Day. THURSDAY, May 27th. The House met at 10 a. m. Prayer by the Chaplain. The following members answered to the roll call: Their Excellencies J. M. Kapena, Paul Neumann and J. O. Dominis, Hons. Martin, Walker, Liliokalani, Baker, Kaubi, Amara, Brown, Kaulia, Kaulukou, Pahia, Kaunamano, Nahale, Nahiu, Kauhane, Kekoa, Aholo, Kaulau, Richardson, Dickey, Paehale, Kanae, Palohan, Thurston and Kalia. The minutes were read in English and Hawaiian, and approved.

Mr. Thurston presented a petition from the Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific for the repeal of sections 1 and 6 of an Act to mitigate the evils arising from prostitution. The petition, which is a long one, was read through, on suspension of the rules.

Mr. Dickey presented the following petitions from the district of Makawao: 1. That \$2,000 be appropriated for raising the bridge at Keahuai, Kula, Makawao. 2. Five thousand dollars for improving the roads and bridges, district of Makawao. 3. That one good Road Supervisor be appointed in each district. Referred to the Committee on Public Lands. 4. That the present law relating to Tax Appeal Boards be abolished, and the former law be re-enacted. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

THE SUGAR MARKET.

There have been considerable fluctuations in the San Francisco sugar market, with closing prices as reported in yesterday's ADVERTISER. There were six changes between the 1st and 13th of May, all downward. The first was a reduction of 1/2c on May 4th by the California Sugar Refinery.

ures. These are: (A) Pat. Cubo Sugar, 6 1/2; (A) Crushed Sugar, 6 1/4; Extra Powdered Sugar, 6 1/4; Fine Crushed Sugar 6 1/4; Dry Granulated Sugar, 6; Confectioners' A Sugar, 5 3/4; Extra C Sugar, 5 1/2; Golden C Sugar, 5.

This puts the price of refined sugar on the Coast at the figure at which it stood April 18th, when the recent upward movement began. The highest point was touched on April 23d, since when there has been a continuous decline.

Press advices from New York report an unimportant business in raws, with a more cheerful feeling, and indications that active operations would soon be resumed, the strike now being at an end. It is said that there is no difficulty in obtaining all the labor required at the advanced scale of wages established.

Mr. Kaulukou moved that section 4 be amended by striking out the word "single" before the word "bottle." [The section as finally adopted reads: "Section 4. Section 16 of chapter 44 of the laws of 1882 is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 16. Such last mentioned license shall authorize the licensee to sell and dispose of any spirituous liquors, by the glass or bottle, on the premises therein specified, between the hours of 5 o'clock in the morning and 11 o'clock at night, on every day except Sunday."]

Mr. Thurston moved the eyes and nose be taken. Carried. The following is the result of the vote: Ayes—Their Excellencies Gibson and Kapena, Hons. Kaee, Bush, Kanoa, Macfarlane, Hayselden, Keau, Liliokalani, Baker, Kaulia, Brown, Kaulia, Kaulukou, Pahia, Kaunamano, Nahale, Nahiu, Kaulau, Richardson, Castle, Kanae and Palohan—23.

Mr. Dole presented a petition from one Kaiahakama for the return of taxes collected by mistake in the district of Hanalei. Referred to the Finance Committee. Mr. Kaulukou presented the following petitions from the district of Puna: 1. That the law relating to the appointment of Road Supervisors-in-Chief be repealed. Laid on the table. 2. That the sea fisheries belonging to Konohiki be free to the people, with the exception of one fish, which the Konohiki reserves to himself. Referred to Committee on Public Lands. 3. That the law relating to the sittings of Tax Appeal Boards be amended. Referred to Judiciary Committee. 4. That people who take in sewing and make garments be required to take out a license. Laid on the table.

Mr. Cecil Brown presented a petition from Koolanaloa, with 54 signatures, praying that an English school be established at Lale. Referred to Committee on Education. Mr. Paehale presented a petition from Molokai that the law relating to the appointment of Road Supervisors-in-Chief be abolished. Referred to the Judiciary Committee.

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REPORT OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL. His Excellency Mr. Gulick from the Printing Committee reported ready the report of the Attorney General's Department for the past biennial period. BILLS INTRODUCED. Mr. Richardson from the Engraving Committee reported the bill relating to the regulating of the sale of spirituous liquors, set down for third reading to-day, as engrossed.

Mr. Keau read a first time a bill to regulate the practice of law in the District and Police Courts. Passed to second reading. ROAD TO LENTHIC ASYLUM. Mr. Keau offered a resolution that \$1,500 be appropriated for improving the road leading from Palama road, near the Re-

formatory School, to the Insane Asylum. Laid on the table, to be considered with the Appropriation bill. The honorable member also gave notice of a bill to amend section 160 of the Civil Code.

ADDRESS TO HON. GODFREY RHODES. The President announced that the resolution presented by the Minister of Foreign Affairs to the Hon. Godfrey Rhodes had been engrossed and was ready for presentation.

Mr. Keau moved that a committee of three be appointed to present it to the honorable Noble. Mr. Kalia moved that the Secretary be instructed to send it. Mr. Keau's motion was carried, and the President appointed the following committee: Hons. Keau, Paehale and Nahiu.

Mr. Pahia read a first time an Act to regulate the working and making of roads. Passed to second reading. Mr. Kaulukou read a first time a bill to authorize the Minister of the Interior to appoint Commissioners of Roads in all taxation districts. Passed to second reading.

Mr. Amara read a first time a bill to assist in the regulation of prisoners. Passed to second reading. The bill states that after prisoners are convicted they shall be photographed and the name of their offense inserted in plain letters on their shirt and hat band.

Mr. Thurston moved the eyes and nose be taken. Carried. The following is the result of the vote: Ayes—Their Excellencies Gibson and Kapena, Hons. 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refusal, the applicant is to have the right of appeal to a board of arbitration composed of architects or builders. The provisions of the bill are to apply to churches, schoolhouses, town halls or places of assembly, theatres, skating rinks or hotels. Penalties are provided for breaches of the law.

Mr. Kaulukou had a repealing bill passed to second reading May 22d, the object of which is to abolish the office of Road Supervisor-in-Chief, which was created by law of August 11, 1884. It repeals this statute. If passed and approved, there would be no Road Supervisor-in-Chief on any of the Islands.

A bill passed to second reading May 25th to provide a permanent settlement of \$3,500 a year for H. R. H. Princess Poomaikalani during her life. Her Royal Highness is Governor of Hawaii, and "has become enfeebled during the time she has held this important and honorable office." Mr. Nahale introduced the bill. It becomes operative upon Her Royal Highness resigning her present office.

Mr. Baker introduced a bill, which passed to second reading May 25th, providing a permanent settlement for A. Fornander of \$1,000 a year for life. Judge Fornander has long held a judicial office on the Island of Maui, which he has filled with distinguished success.

A bill to provide for the payment of Coroners' juries at the rate of \$5 for each juror, passed to a second reading May 25th. It is in the form of an amendment to section 2 of chapter 40 of the Penal Code. The Coroner is empowered to levy a fine of \$5 for non-attendance upon any person summoned to serve on a jury, unless reasonable excuse be given.

A bill to amend sections 235, 236 and 237 of the Civil Code, passed to second reading May 25th. The first section named is amended to enable the Marshal, Sheriff, or Constable arresting a deserting seaman to retain the fees received for such arrest in addition to their regular pay. Section 236 is amended by giving to the Governors of the Kingdom the right of appointing Constables for each district in the islands, provided that upon conviction for any offense in any Court of the Kingdom they may be removed at any time by the Governors, Marshal, any Judge of a Court of Record, or Police or District Justice. The Constables are to be under the control of the Marshal and his deputies. [If the right of appointment rests in the Governors the right of dismissal should be exercised by the same high officers.] Section 237 is amended to read as follows: "The number of regular Constables shall not exceed, for the island of Oahu, 200; for the island of Maui and its dependencies, 100; for the island of Hawaii, 100; and for the islands of Kauai and Niihau, 50; provided, always, that nothing in this section contained shall be construed to prevent the respective Governors from appointing any number of special Constables to serve without pay in case of and during any great emergency. And all regular Constables shall receive in full payment of their services such annual salaries or compensation as may from time to time be prescribed by the Legislature." All laws in conflict with these provisions are repealed.

On May 25th there passed to second reading a bill to amend section 1, chapter 4, of the laws of 1871, relating to drunkenness. It provides for the first offense a fine not less than \$6 upon any person found drunk on the streets or other public place who creates a disturbance, uses bad language, injures another, or commits any act injurious to the public. For a second conviction, a fine not exceeding \$12, or hard labor not exceeding three months is imposed by the bill, but prosecution must be commenced within six days after the commission of the offense charged. All laws or parts of laws inconsistent with these provisions are repealed. [It appears from the bill as printed that drunkenness, unaccompanied with violence, etc., is not a statutory offense.]

How to Build a Cathedral. The Roman Catholics of Sydney, Australia, have just finished a magnificent new Cathedral, one of the most elaborate buildings out of Europe. A year or two ago a final supply of funds was required and was obtained in a curious manner. The late Archbishop Vaughan became acquainted with Mr. Harry Emmet (of the Emmet & Branscombe "Bonbon" Troupe, now in this city), who had in hand the arrangements of an Old English fair for one of the Sydney Anglican Churches. He proposed the same idea to the Archbishop, and very soon the whole of the unconsecrated stone interior of the Cathedral was made to resemble four streets, with old-fashioned houses, each displaying different wares for sale. Each house had a distinctive sign, and every attendant was in old-fashioned costume. There was a printing house where a newspaper was published daily, and actually a theater where performances by the best actors took place day and night. Twenty-four children were drilled by Mr. Emmet to perform a May-pole and other dances, and guards, courtiers, musicians, etc., were innumerable. The opening ceremony was witnessed by six thousand people, before whom Mr. Emmet appeared in full steel armor and delivered an original opening ode. The Archbishop and choir concluded the ceremony. The fair lasted three weeks, at the end of which time the clear profits were found to be over \$35,000. Could we not induce Mr. Emmet to start something of the kind here?
