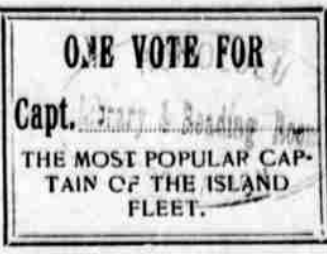

BOERS IN FULL RETREAT

Ladysmith Relieved and Lord Roberts Is Advancing.

Boers Probably Gathering to Defend Bloemfontein—Losses Have Been Heavy—Buller May Now Join Roberts' Force.

(Associated Press Special.) London, March 7.—Field Marshal Lord Roberts has telegraphed as follows:

"Osofontein, March 7, 4:30 p. m.—Our operations today promise to be a great success. The enemy occupied a position four miles north and eleven miles south of the Modder river. I placed General Colville's division on the north bank and General Kelly-Kenny's and Tuckey's division with cavalry on the south bank. The cavalry division succeeded in turning the enemy's left flank, opening a road for the Sixth division, which is advancing without being obliged to fire a shot up to the present time. The enemy in full retreat towards the north and east. They are being closely followed by cavalry, horse artillery and mounted infantry, while Tuckey's division, Colville's Ninth division, and the Guards brigade, under Pole-Saraw, are making their way across the river at Poplar's Drift, where I propose to place my headquarters this evening.

"Our casualties will, I trust, be few, as the enemy was quite unprepared for being attacked by the bank and having their communications with Bloemfontein threatened."

Hard Road Before Roberts.

(Associated Press Special.) New York, March 7.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London, says: "The extent to which General Joubert and President Steyn have succeeded in massing their forces is not yet clear, but they are covering Bloemfontein by a long defensive line on the hills south of the Modder river. Their tactics are the same as those which were employed on the Tugela when the Dutch commandoes covered a distance of eighteen miles, but the country is less favorable for their system of defense.

There is no river in front of them and Lord Roberts has four mounted brigades with horse artillery, with which their line can be turned. The Seventh Division, under General Tucker, has not yet been in action and will probably have the brunt of the fighting if a battle precedes the occupation of Bloemfontein, but it is probable that a frontal attack will be avoided and that General French's brigades will take a long circuit northward so as to shut off a retreat toward the Vet river.

The Dutch forces, if defeated, will fall back upon Winburg, and the high hills between Ventersburg and Senekal, between the Vet and the Vaal rivers. This is described by South Africans as the most formidable defensive position in the Free State and lateral railways lead up behind it at Bethlehem and Kronstad. The Vaal river is a long distance behind these commanding kopjes and the Witwatersrand ridge, of which Johannesburg is the key, lies to the north.

If Lord Roberts has sent a strong body of infantry toward Vryburg and Mafeking, it will naturally be reinforced and converted in due time into a turning column against that strong position.

The results of the Dutch concentration are disclosed in the facility with which the district south of the Orange river has been cleared. General Gatacre's army is not strong, since an entire brigade was called back to reinforce Lord Roberts' corps, yet he has been able to take possession of Stormberg without a struggle. The Boers had retreated from that natural fortress to Rooikop and left the road open to Burghersdorp. The occupation of Stormberg gives to General Gatacre the control of the railway westward to Middleburg and enables him to advance northward toward the Orange river.

Buller Marching On.

(Associated Press Special.) London, March 7.—For lack of news from Field Marshal Lord Roberts, attention turns to Natal. It is reported that General Buller has pushed forward a force along the Harrismith line of railroad toward Van Reenan's Pass, using the railroad freely for communications.

It appears that the Boers intend to take up a strong position in the Glencoeberg range and contest the Glencoe Passes, although it hardly seems likely that General Buller will attempt to force these for the present. His plans, however, are kept almost as secret as those of Lord Roberts.

While waiting for the important developments which are daily expected to occur in the Free State, rumors of peace recur. The second edition of the Times today contains a despatch from Cape Town which says there is a crying need for an explicit statement by the British Ministry that nothing short of annexation is intended in "order to dampen the mischievous agitation that is going on under the pretext of the demand for peace."

Another list of the casualties sustained by General Buller's forces from February 14 to February 27 shows:

Killed, 123; wounded, 573; missing, 54. Of these the losses of the Inniskillings were as follows: Killed, 54; wounded, 162; missing, 22. Dublin Fusiliers: Killed, 15; wounded, 97; missing, 18. Connaught Rangers: Killed, 19; wounded, 105; missing, 8. Royal Irish Fusiliers: Killed, 11; wounded, 63; missing, 22. Scots Fusiliers: Killed, 18; wounded, 68; missing, none.

With the list of casualties issued Monday this makes the total cost to the rank and file in the final relief of Ladysmith 1859 men.

Costly Boer Mistake.

(Associated Press Special.) Boer Camp Biggersburg, Saturday, March 3.—The Federals have fallen back on the Biggersburg chain that crosses Natal south of Dundee. The retreat from Ladysmith was due to the mistake of a certain commandant, in ordering his men to retire from the key to the position without any reason for the move. On the receipt of bad news from the Modder river Wednesday it was resolved to send the wagons back to Biggersburg and soon long strings of ox wagons lined the roads.

Over a thousand wagons took the westerly route to the laager southwest of Ladysmith. Another convoy was sent to the foot of Drakensberg. A large number of tents captured from the British at Dundee and also the ammunition was abandoned. The chief difficulty was in dismounting "Long Tom."

Independence or Death.

Brussels, March 5.—The Transvaal agency here confirms the statement that President Kruger is ready to conclude peace with Great Britain on the basis of the independence of the two republics, and that otherwise the struggle will continue to the bitter end. The agency believes that the Afrikaner element in Cape Colony and Natal will rebel rather than allow annexation.

Senate Takes Up Porto Rico.

(Associated Press Special.) Washington, March 7.—The Senate Committee on Appropriations today authorized a favorable report on the House bill providing that the revenues collected from Porto Rico be expended in that island.

The bill was amended so as to include only the money collected to January 1, 1900. The clause of the House bill authorizing the refunding of future revenue collections was stricken out.

Banking Hours Changed.

By agreement of the local banks, commencing with Monday next banking hours will be from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m., instead of 9 to 2 as at present. Saturdays the hours will be 10 to 1. The change is made in conformity with the general banking hours elsewhere.

First to Take the Dose.

Rev. Joseph E. Duroo of Kohala took an injection of the plague preventive this morning at 9 o'clock. Mr. Duroo was the first citizen to follow in the footsteps of Drs. Wood and Day.

More Plague in Sydney.

Sydney, N. S. W., March 6.—The fourth death from the bubonic plague occurred here today.

A little baby about two years old at the Vineyard street detention camp had a wonderful escape from death this morning. The child managed to crawl between the railings of a veranda and fell on to the corner of a step about twelve feet below. It struck on the shoulder and head but in some wonderful way not a bone was broken and except for bruises the child now seems to be all right. Some blood appeared in the mouth but this was caused by the child biting its tongue. There was no other injury whatever.

FOR HARBOR IMPROVEMENT

Chamber of Commerce Recommends Scheme to U. S. A. Commission.

Also Urges Dispatch in Dredging and Construction of Docks—Representation of Chamber in Philadelphia Commercial Museum.

President T. Rain Walker, Secretary J. G. Spencer, J. B. Atherton, W. F. Allen, C. M. Cooke, F. A. Schaefer, H. A. Isenberg, R. F. Lange, E. E. Paxton, J. M. Dowsett, L. E. Pinkham, A. J. Campbell, F. J. Lowrey and Rudolph L. Auerbach were present at the monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce this morning.

Mr. Atherton reported verbally from the committee on the Channel quarantine wharf, announcing the beginning of operations, as yet experimental, at the wharf. Approved.

The president introduced the subject of improvement and extension of the Honolulu harbor lines. With a map before him he described certain propositions that he hoped might meet with

President's Decision. President Dole, to-wit, at the Executive Council session read the following telegram from the Secretary of State, dated March 6: "The President has not considered it wise to convene the old Legislature, expecting the Council of State to provide for requisite expenditures until Congress adopts the Hawaiian territorial bill. He approves Act No. 1 of the Council of State. (Signed) JOHN HAY."

favor from the United States authorities. A pending agreement between the Hawaiian Government and the Oahu Railway & Land Co. was explained, and a paper signed by many merchants submitted which gave the opinion that the plans in question would double the existing wharf accommodation in Honolulu harbor.

Mr. Atherton moved, seconded by Mr. Cooke, a resolution approving of the proposed plans.

Mr. Paxton, representing the railway company, gave further explanation of the scheme.

The resolution was carried unanimously, as follows:

"Whereas, certain plans for harbor and wharf improvements on the northwest side of Honolulu harbor have been recommended by the Hawaiian Government to the proper authorities at Washington; and said plans are now being investigated by a Commission duly appointed for that purpose by the War Department; and

"Whereas, the present wharf accommodations in this harbor are wholly inadequate to meet the growing demands of commerce and especially the rapid increase of the output of this island, resulting in delay, demurrage and detention of vessels, thereby entailing much loss to shippers and seriously impairing the name of Honolulu as a port; and

"Whereas, the individual members of this Chamber having carefully examined said proposed plans, and that the same will more than double the present wharf frontage of this port; that the material to be excavated consists of soft mud and, with the facilities at hand, deem it the most feasible and practicable solution of the present and increasing congested conditions of the harbor:

"Therefore be it resolved, That we approve of said plans as a whole, and earnestly hope and recommend that the same may be adopted, and that in consequence thereof the parties having the matter in charge may prosecute the work of dredging and the construction of new docks with the greatest possible dispatch; and further that the secretary forward a copy of this resolution to the United States Special Harbor Commission now in this city investigating said proposed plans."

A letter was read from the Philadelphia Commercial Museum, stating that this Chamber had been allotted representation in the institution. Dr. Wm. P. Wilson, director, and Mr. Wilfred H. Schoff, chief of foreign department were willing to act as corresponding members of this body, and would accept diplomas as such. On motion of Mr. Atherton, seconded by Mr. Cooke, it was resolved to accept the offer and forward the diplomas.

There being no further business the Chamber adjourned.

BILL PASSES THE SENATE

Nearly All Principal Amendments Were Carried.

Morgan Attacks Measure in Interests of Democrats—Amendment by Clark for the Queen Fails—Pass Without Division.

Washington, March 1.—The bill providing a form of government for the Territory of Hawaii was passed by the Senate today without division.

Clay of Georgia delivered a carefully prepared speech on the Philippines. He favored the adoption of the Bacon resolutions, declaring it to be the policy of the United States to turn over the islands to the Filipinos as soon as a stable form of government could be established by them under the protection of this country. At the instance of Foraker, the Porto Rican tariff bill was made unfinished business and will be considered as soon as the conference report on the finance bill shall have been disposed of, next Thursday.

When Clay had concluded his speech consideration of the Hawaiian bill was resumed; Penrose of Pennsylvania stating that he would not call up the Quay case on account of the unanimous agreement as to the final vote on the Hawaiian Government bill.

Morgan and Democrats.

The pending question was the amendment of Teller relating to the establishment of a District Court with a District Judge in Hawaii, carrying with it the right of trial by jury before the court. Morgan of Alabama resumed his speech, begun yesterday, antagonizing on technical grounds the proposed amendments.

He asserted in connection with a discussion of the judicial features of the measure, that the bill as it stood now would legislate out of office every Democrat in Hawaii. He declared his belief that some Senators were determined to give a political complexion to the Hawaiian Judiciary.

Foraker, chairman of the Committee on Pacific Islands and Porto Rico, interrupted Morgan to report back the House Porto Rican tariff bill, with the preamble and all after the enacting clause of the House bill stricken out and the Senate bill providing for a government for Porto Rico substituted.

Certain amendments to the Senate bill were also reported, including one fixing the tariff on Porto Rican products at 15 per cent of the tariff fixed by the Dingley law.

When the consideration of the Hawaiian bill was resumed, Teller's amendment was adopted.

Clark for the Queen.

Clark of Wyoming proposed an amendment appropriating \$250,000 to be paid to Lilioukalan, late Queen of the Hawaiian Islands for all interest she may have in the crown lands the sum to be repaid from the revenues from the crown lands. Clark maintained that it was only the part of equity and justice that the Queen who had been deposed by the United States forces should be reimbursed for the losses she had sustained. Mr. Cullom offered an amendment holding that the late Queen had no rights in the matter. She was here, now, he said, consulting lawyers as to her claims against this Government, and his understanding was that many of them had informed her that she had no good claim.

The amendment precipitated a general discussion of the deposition of the Queen, participated in by Jones of Arkansas, Pettigrew of South Dakota and others. Pettigrew said he was opposed to the bill and to any effort made by this Congress to provide a government for the Islands. He favored turning the Hawaiian Islands back to their people, and permitting them to make the best of them.

Quarles of Wisconsin followed Pettigrew, making his maiden speech in the Senate in opposition to the proposition to pay to the former Queen any sum of money. Referring to the dark picture drawn by Pettigrew of the result of the annexation of Hawaii and the acquisition of other territory by the United States, Quarles said: "I had thought that the Senator from South Dakota had exhausted his means of chasing ghosts out of our insular possessions, but here he brings up a bogie man from the Sandwich Islands and sets him to gyrating before the Senate to frighten somebody."

Platt of Connecticut opposed the amendment, declaring that the right to the crown lands was in the people of Hawaii and not in the Queen. The amendment was laid on the table without division.

Platt of Connecticut offered an amendment providing that the territory of Hawaii should not at any future time be admitted to the Union as a state or be attached to any State of

the Union, but it was ruled out on a point of order. The measure was then passed without division.

Morgan's Strong Speech.

Washington, Feb. 28.—Notwithstanding the agreement made by the Senate to vote on the Hawaiian government bill at today's session, the final vote on the measure was postponed until 4 o'clock tomorrow.

Allen made a general attack upon the bill. He declared that the Republican party was "actuated by a wild and unrestricted dream of power," and was taken to task by Spooner, who said that the annexation had been accomplished and was beyond review, and he could not understand how any Senator could refuse, as Allen had, to assist in the betterment of any measure that might be brought before the Senate.

Teller of Colorado offered an amendment to the section of the bill providing Judges for the Hawaiian courts, creating a Territorial Judge who should have full jurisdiction over all national matters excepting those relating to admiralty.

The discussion of the amendment continued for two hours and a half.

Morgan, in concluding a long speech, declared that he would prefer to see the bill defeated rather than to have it passed in its present crippled form. He had assisted in the preparation of the bill, but it had been amended out of form, and he would advise the people of Hawaii to remain as they are for a hundred years rather than accept such a plan of government.

Without yielding the floor, Morgan gave way to a suggestion of Cullom that the bill go over, and that a final vote on the measure and amendments be taken at 4 o'clock tomorrow. To this the Senate agreed, and at 6:20 o'clock adjourned.

Appropriation List for Council of State

At the Executive Council session today, the statement of expenditures of the Board of Health was received.

The following items for the Attorney General's Department were voted into the proposed appropriation bill: Salaries and pay rolls ..... \$45,000 Current account ..... 20,000

It was voted that the Council of State be requested to appropriate the following amounts: Current account ..... \$1,020,351 41 Salaries and pay rolls ..... 313,767 83 Loan fund ..... \$31,500 00 Subject to the approval of the President of the United States.

Minister Damon read a statement prepared for the Council of State of the proposed expenditures and financial resources of the Republic of Hawaii as affecting the various special appropriations asked for during the biennial period ending December 31, 1900.

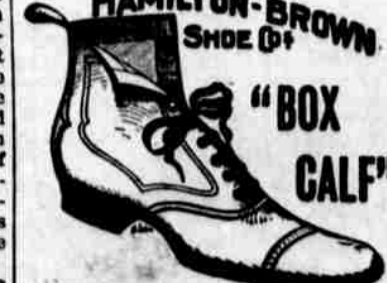
Minister Young read a petition from several of the Hawaiians who were deprived of their homes on account of the recent burnings by the Board of Health, asking that under certain conditions they be allowed to live as tenants at will on some Government lands not otherwise disposed of. The idea was favored by the Council.

The offer of land by the Bishop Estate for the extension of Pauahi street was accepted, and the Minister of the Interior authorized to take steps to deal as best he can with the present tenant.

**San Francisco Has**  
 a Plague Scare

San Francisco, March 6.—A case of what is supposed to be bubonic plague though the exact nature of the disease is yet uncertain, was discovered in Chinatown tonight. The patient, who is a Chinese residing at 104 Dupont street, was immediately isolated and the whole of Chinatown placed under strict quarantine regulations. No fear is apprehended of the spread of the disease, whatever it may prove to be.

San Francisco, March 7.—A large force of police is being kept in Chinatown to maintain the quarantine placed upon that section pending the outcome of the bacteriological examination of those portions of the body removed from the suspected Chinese. The physicians interested in the case are not yet prepared to make a definite statement regarding the case, but from others who have had experience in such matters it is learned that the case will hardly prove to be one of plague as the dead man has long been a resident of this city. Had he been a recent arrival from the Orient greater alarm would be felt. The cordon of police now watching Chinatown is kept there simply as a precautionary measure.

This morning a United States mail carrier managed to get into Chinatown through the lines but was caught and held by the police. His detention caused some trouble and it was only after a deal of negotiating between the municipal and government officials that the man was allowed to go his way. No one is allowed to pass in or out of the district, and householders and hotels employing Chinese cooks and waiters have been put to great inconvenience because their help have been detained within the lines. Chinese merchants are making some complaint owing to the temporary loss of trade and the street car line passing through Chinatown have suffered to some extent owing to the fact that cars are not allowed to go through the quarantine lines.

**REGULATIONS FOR SHIPMENT OF FREIGHT.**

Office of the Board of Health, Honolulu, H. I., March 19, 1900.

Shipment of goods to the other Islands may be made under the following conditions and restrictions:

1. The "kinau" and I. I. S. N. Company wharves shall be kept as quarantine wharves.
2. Goods of American and English production or manufacture may be shipped if in original unbroken and tight wood or metal containers, said containers to be subjected to disinfection by acid solution at said wharves.
3. Goods of American and English production or manufacture in original packages, or in re-packed containers, providing such containers have openings left equal to one-eighth the surface, may be taken to the P. M. S. S. dock for fumigation by sulphur for twelve hours.
4. Machinery and corrugated iron, after acid disinfection.
5. Coin, which must have been boiled, after acid disinfection of container.
6. Rice, if prepared direct from paddy under supervision of an agent of the Board of Health at Hopper's rice mill, packed in new sacks and delivered in covered drays direct to the wharf, without further treatment.
7. Flour, feed, fodder, fresh vegetables and fruits from new quarantined wharf, or from clean vessels in the harbor, only.
8. Coal, in bulk or bags, brick, lime, cement, fire clay, and acid fertilizers without treatment.
9. Lumber, to be thoroughly wet with salt water at the vessel, and in all cases to be discharged into the water at point of destination.
10. A charge for disinfecting and fumigating as indicated may be made by the transportation companies.
11. No responsibility is assumed for damage arising in connection with treatment of goods.
12. Goods of such nature that damage would likely be sustained, from either of the methods mentioned, may be shipped without further treatment, provided they are kept in the hot air plant at a temperature of 230 degrees F. for one hour, and a certificate to that effect accompany the goods; transfer to be made on covered drays to wharf.

The Australia is a good ship. Hawaii loves her "and all that" but when she is a prominent factor in delaying the mails Honolulu is disposed to request that the mails be placed on the faster ship.

With Ladysmith relieved and the theater of the war transferred to Boer territory, the British army is now about where it expected to be about three months ago. Naturally the British are overjoyed that the offensive strategy of the Boers at all points has been overcome and the war carried into the enemy's country.

The easy road of the Hawaiian bill in the Senate may well cause the people renewed confidence that Congress will have settled our affairs by the first or middle of April. Although the measure has undergone marked changes and will probably emerge from the House with still more, these amendments as a rule have been in the interest of a strong American control and the establishment of a true American territory.

CHINESE CIVIL WAR.

(Associated Press Special.) Chicago, March 7.—A special to the Record from Victoria, B. C., says: According to Asiatic advices by the steamer Empress of India, the recent coup d'etat of the Empress Dowager of China, in which the Emperor, Kwang Su, was deposed and the six-year-old son of Prince Tuan named as his successor, bids fair to embroil the Celestial Empire in civil war.

Russia Crowds Japan.

(Associated Press Special.) New York, March 7.—A dispatch to the Journal and Advertiser from Odessa says: Among the officers of the volunteer fleet of cruisers who recently returned here from the Far East, there is a strong belief that the enormous garrisons being formed at Port Arthur, Dalia and Vladivostok will be utilized soon as a coercive lever for compelling the Japanese to abandon their pretensions and acquisitions in Korea.

A Juvenile Offender.

Manuel Silva, a Portuguese lad of eight, was presented before the bar of the police court charged with malicious mischief in pulling up plants in a yard. Judge Wilcox looked curiously over his spectacles at the juvenile culprit, for whom a plea of guilty was entered with a request from both Marshal Brown and Mr. Vivas to dismiss him with a lecture.

SHIPS TO BE REGISTERED

Washington, March 4.—Senator Nelson's attempt to include in the general Hawaiian bill, which passed the Senate today, a provision extending the navigation laws of the United States to the islands, failed when Senator Culom withdrew the proposed amendment at the instigation of Senator Pettigrew. Under the amendment, seven vessels that were granted Hawaiian registry after annexation and supposedly for the purpose of coming under the American flag with the rest of the Hawaiian merchant marine, were not discriminated against, although the Committee on Commerce had reported adversely on such action as contemplated in a separate bill.

The vessels are owned by J. J. Moore & Co., John Rosenfeld's Sons and Captain William Matson, all of San Francisco. They are the Star of Italy, Star of Russia, Star of Bengal, Star of France, Euterpe, Falls of Clyde and Villacott. It is said that the owners complied with the Hawaiian laws prior to January, 1899. The difficulty arises from the fact that the islands were annexed in July, 1898, and were not eligible to American registry. When the matter was called to the attention of Attorney General Griggs he decided it was against the policy of the United States, and further granting of American registry to vessels of Hawaiian registry was prohibited.

FIRE INSURANCE CASE

Judge Silliman is still hearing, from yesterday afternoon, the trial of two cases of A. G. Mericourt vs. Norwalk Fire Insurance Co. by the following jury: Arthur Coyne, F. M. Lewis, W. L. Disney, C. M. V. Forster, John Ouderkirck, H. A. Giles, J. C. Cluney, W. L. Grieve, Manuel Costa, H. C. Patzig, E. M. Marshall and W. B. Nott. Humphreys and De Bolt for plaintiff; Kinney, Ballou & McClanahan for defendant. The suit is to recover over \$5,000 insurance on the O'Sullivan house and contents burned at Kalia in 1898. The defense is fraud. The plaintiff was on the witness stand for about five hours up till the noon recess today and went on again at 1:30 p. m.

It Was a Fake.

Editor Evening Bulletin:—An article appears in an evening contemporary, alleging to be an interview with me, wherein I am quoted as saying that war to the knife was on with the Seamen's Club and certain shipping men in the city. I am sorry that the name of the club should have been brought into the affair at all, as it has no connection with the club at all but was simply a personal matter. It is well known what the Seamen's Club was established for and it has carried out that object beyond the expectations of the founders. The club and its supporters are not on the warpath with any one and don't intend to be but simply to help sailor men and try and make it as pleasant for them as possible, and some of the best people in Honolulu have lent their aid and presence to that end.

\$10,000 for the Queen.

(Associated Press Special.) Washington, March 7.—The Senate Committee on Foreign Relations today authorized the reporting of an amendment to the Diplomatic Appropriation bill appropriating \$20,000 to be paid to ex-Queen Lilioukalanani and providing for an annual donation of \$10,000 to her as long as she may live.

Gen. Otis to Return.

Washington, March 2.—The War Department is satisfied that the backbone of the insurrection in the Philippines is broken, and there will be no further hostilities on a large scale. The postponement was due to the desire to have the sub-committee investigate some facts bearing upon the treaty which have not yet been taken cognizance of.

**Money for the Queen.**

Washington, March 6.—Senator Hoar today introduced in the Senate an amendment intended to be proposed to the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill, providing for payment to Liliuokalani, former Queen of Hawaii, upon warrant of the Secretary of State from any moneys not otherwise appropriated, \$250,000.

**CAPE BOERS REBEL.**

Cape Town, March 6.—Nearly the whole of the Dutch population of the Prieska and Kenhardt districts are in rebellion. Many of the Dutch from neighboring districts are reported to have joined them, notably Piet Moolman, who will lead the rebels to Brandbles. Lucas Steinkamp, commanding the Boers, is reported marching on Carnarvon. It is believed that Gordonia and Victoria West will rise. It is thought that the total number of men in arms will exceed 3,000.

The general opinion of loyalists is that a strong force of British will be required, as a reverse would spread the rebellion.

London, March 7.—A despatch from Osfontein, dated Sunday, March 4th, to the Standard says:

"General Joubert is reported to be in supreme command of the Boer forces here."

## Two Favorable Reports On the Cable Bill

Washington, D. C., March 6.—The  
 Senate Committee on Naval Affairs to-  
 day ordered a favorable report upon  
 the bill to construct a cable to Manila  
 by way of Honolulu, Midway Island  
 and Guam. It is to be under the di-  
 rection of the Navy Department and to be  
 a Government cable.  
 Senator Hale, chairman of the com-  
 mittee, was authorized to prepare a  
 bill and report it to the Senate. The  
 bill will provide for the immediate  
 construction of the cable only from  
 San Francisco to Honolulu but it con-  
 templates its ultimate construction to  
 the Philippines and to Hongkong. It  
 is estimated that the cable to Honolulu  
 will cost between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,-  
 000.  
 The House Committee on Commerce  
 today ordered a favorable report on  
 a bill for the Pacific cable connecting  
 this country with Hawaii, the Philip-  
 pines and Japan. The measure has  
 been under consideration for a long  
 time, and two sessions were held to-  
 day in order to bring the matter to a  
 conclusion. The bill of Representative  
 Sherman of New York is the one fa-  
 vorably acted on, after the addition of  
 a number of amendments. This bill  
 provides for the private construction  
 of the line, the Government paying  
 \$300,000 annually for twenty years for  
 the transmission of messages. The  
 amount of this annual payment was the  
 last question decided. The original  
 provision was for \$400,000, but after  
 an extended discussion, a reduction to  
 \$300,000 was made. The committee  
 had previously inserted a clause that  
 the cable be all of American make and  
 that the cable ships shall be under the  
 American flag. Another provision calls  
 for the completion of the line to Hon-  
 olulu by January 1, 1902, and to Japan  
 by January, 1903. It was originally  
 estimated that the cost of the cable  
 would be \$5,000,000, but recent esti-  
 mates submitted to the committee show  
 that the rise in prices will make the  
 cost about \$13,000,000. The Govern-  
 ment's obligation, however, is con-  
 fined to the annual payment of \$300,-  
 000.

**More Money, More Men.**  
 London, March 2.—4:30 a. m.—Brit-  
 ons feel that they are living in the  
 presence of momentous events. Tor-  
 nadoes of patriotic excitement are  
 whirling through the country.  
 Lord Lansdowne chose the physico-  
 logical moment to announce the esti-  
 mates, exceeding £61,000,000, and  
 rather startled the public by unfolding  
 the program of the War Office to send  
 out, in addition to the 30,000 troops  
 now abroad, 55,000 fresh soldiers.  
 The estimates have been framed un-  
 der the following adverse conditions:  
 A—Provision has to be made for car-  
 rying on the war in South Africa.  
 B—It has been decided to make an  
 addition at once to the permanent  
 strength of the army.  
 C—Temporary measures will have to

# Mystery in Horse Flesh

Meanwhile the doubtful ones are making an effort to prove the claim that this is not the true Klamath. Jim Quinn wrote the Breeder and Sportsman and received the reply that Klamath was in Southern California. He has now written the owner of the horse to trace the animal's movements. If the claim of the importers of the horse is correct there will be lively times at the June races if Walker decides to put his horse in the free for all. In proper condition, there is nothing in Hawaii that can keep within sight of this noted trotter. On the other hand the horsemen hold that the horse must have gone wrong in some way or else such a valuable piece of trotting property would never have been allowed to leave the States.

Johnny Walker may be the owner of one of the greatest wonders in horse flesh ever landed in the Islands. It is certain his new carriage horse is a big mystery and is keeping the horsemen guessing.

London, March 6.—The War Office has received the following dispatch from Lord Roberts:  
"Osfontein, March 6.—General Gatacre occupied Stormberg yesterday. The lines of railroad north and west will now be repaired. General Clements is at Joubert's siding station beyond Colesberg. The Duke of Marlborough with the Oxford company of the Imperial Yeomanry has left Cape Town for Naauwpoort.  
"General Buller reports Natal now practically clear of the enemy, and that he cannot hear of any formed body of them anywhere. The Boers left some ambulances full of their sick, from which the mules had been taken for transport service."

**Local Expenditures Approved.**  
Washington, March 6.—At the Cabinet meeting today the recommendation of the Hawaiian Council that they be authorized to expend \$390,000 in the suppression of the bubonic plague and in the relief of distressed natives was formally approved. Some doubt was expressed as to the authority of the Hawaiian Council to make this expenditure, but the opinion was unanimous that the gravity of the situation justified that course and the necessary directions will be forwarded at once.

### LADYSMITH RELIEVED

London, March 1.—It is officially announced that Ladysmith has been relieved.

London, March 1.—9:52 a. m.—The War Office has received the following dispatch from General Buller:

"Lytleton's headquarters, March 1, 9:05, morning.—General Dundonald, with the Natal Carbineers and a composite regiment, entered Ladysmith last night."

Durban, Friday, March 2.—Correspondents who have returned here from Ladysmith says that the relief came quite unexpectedly. At noon on Tuesday the firing of General Buller's army seemed to recede instead of approach and the garrison was consequently depressed. Everybody was startled to hear the garrison's 4.7 gun firing. It had not been used much of late, owing to the diminishing ammunition.

On hurrying out it was found that the Boers were trying to remove the big gun on Bulwana by the erection of a derrick. This proved that something extraordinary was happening. The other garrison guns then directed their fire on Bulwana with the result that the Boers were compelled to abandon the attempt with the derrick. Later on they placed the gun on a wagon which capsized in a donga.

During the afternoon whenever the Boers were seen approaching, the British resumed the shelling of Bulwana. About 4 o'clock a terrific thunderstorm broke over the town, just after a message had been heliographed from Wagon Hill that the Boers were in full retreat.

Other officers said they believed they could desecr British cavalry, but most people supposed that the wish was father to the thought.

As soon as the storm ceased, the British guns reopened on Bulwana, gradually concentrating the fire on the left and driving the Boers before them with the object of preventing the enemy from hampering any British approach.

An hour later a party of British horsemen could be seen crossing the flat, below Bulwana, at a distance of some miles. It is impossible to describe the excitement and enthusiasm among the troops that followed. Most of the people had been driven into the houses by the storm and did not learn the good news until later. The storm broke out again at 7 o'clock in the evening and continued until 2 o'clock the next morning. It must have seriously hampered the retreating Boers. The British gunners kept a sharp watch to prevent any further attempt to remove the Bulwana guns.

The British naval gun was fired at intervals through the night and in the morning a force was sent out to look after the gun and to occupy Bulwana. Lord Dundonald's force went after the retreating Boers, while 4,000 of the best men of the garrison went towards Islands Lante in the hope of being able to cut off the enemy.

### Hawaii Ships Quarantined.

San Francisco, March 4.—All vessels from Hawaiian ports are now quarantined upon their arrival here, without reference to whether or not the plague exists on the islands from which they come. The spread of the disease from Honolulu to Hilo and Kahului shows that the quarantine between islands is not complete, and no chances will be taken on the result.

The bark Rhoderick Dhu, which arrived late Friday night from Hilo, brought up twenty passengers who are now in quarantine. They are for the most part business people who would ordinarily have come by way of Honolulu. The barkentine Irmgard, twenty days from Hilo, arrived yesterday with a full cargo of sugar and a few passengers. The schooner Robert Lewers was twenty-six days on her way from Koloa, Kauai, bringing 21,800 bags of sugar. Both the Irmgard and Lewers were placed in strict quarantine.

### Hilo Ship Held.

Port Townsend, Wash., March 3.—The schooner O. M. Kellogg arrived at Hoquiam today from Hilo. She was ordered by the United States quarantine officer to come here for inspection and fumigation. The Kellogg sailed from Hilo February 14th.

### Porto Rico Money Will Be Refunded

Washington, March 2.—The President today sent the following message to Congress:

To the Senate and House of Representatives: Since the evacuation of Porto Rico by the Spanish forces on the 18th day of October, 1898, the United States has collected on products coming from that island to the ports of the United States the duties fixed by the Dingley act, amounting to \$2,095,455.88, and will continue to collect under said law until Congress shall otherwise direct. Although I had the power, and having in mind the best interests of the people of the island, used it, to modify duties on Porto Rican products coming into the ports of the United States. In view of the pressing necessity for immediate revenue in Porto Rico for conducting the Government there, and for the extension of public education, and in view also of the provisional legislation just inaugurated by the House of Representatives, and for the purpose of making the principle embodied in that legislation applicable to the immediate past as well as to the immediate future, I recommend that the above sum so collected and the sums hereafter collected under the existing law shall, without waiting for the enactment of the general legislation now pending, be appropriated for the use and benefit of the island.

#### WILLIAM MCKINLEY.

Executive Mansion, March 2, 1900. Within two hours after this special message from the President had been read to the House today the House had passed and sent to the Senate a bill to carry out the recommendation.

The message came like a bolt out of a clear sky to the minority. They were at first inclined to hail it with delight, as a reproof of the majority of the passage of the Porto Rican tariff bill on Wednesday. The Republican leaders, however, had a bill ready to carry the President's recommendations into effect. The bill was passed by a vote of 162 to 107, thirteen Democrats (including De Vries of California) two Populists and two Silver Republicans voting with the Republicans in the affirmative.

Messrs. Cowan and Harris have opened a school of shorthand and typewriting in the Progress block. This is the first institution of its kind in Honolulu and should prove a success.
