The sailors from the German man-of-war enlivened our streets this afternoon.

Mr. J. G. Swan has been appointed Hawaiian Consul at Port Townsend, Washington Territory.

MARSHAL Soper has discharged the policeman Akiona, who struck a Chinaman the other day, from the force.

ANYONE might know that the Supreme Court has been adjourned, as officer Felbheir has discarded his Sunday clothes.

THE schooner Eva left San Francisco October 21st for this port, with a cargo valued at \$14,195.

REGULAR monthly meeting of Hawaiian Lodge No. 21. Visiting Brothers cordially invited.

SEVEN drunks in the Police Court this morning netted \$42. And yet Dan O'Connell says you never see a drunken man on the streets.

AT noon to-day the Captain and officers of H. I. G. M.'s Prinz Adalbert were presented to His Majesty the King by H. F. Glade, Esq., Acting German Consul.

THE new missionary steamer Morning Star sailed from Boston for Honolulu, October 22nd, and may be looked for the latter end of January, 1885.

AT the close of the service at St. Andrews Cathedral last evening, Handel's Dead March in Saul was played on the organ, out of respect to the memory of the late Hon. Mrs. C. R. Bishop.

IN the Police Court this morning, Akiona, the discharged police officer, was committed for trial to the next term of the Supreme Court on a charge of perjury. Mr. Russell appeared for him.

THE Hawaiian schooner Malolo, from Fanning's Island to San Francisco, which touched at Laupahoehoe October 5th, was entering San Francisco on the 25th of October, as the City of Sydney came out.

A Chinaman, who driver express No. 195, nearly run over several boys on Sunday at noon, on Bereftania street, and because they did not get out of his way fast enough, he took his whip and struck at them. That man has no business whatever to be in possession of a license.

SOME young native boys were on our streets on Saturday, offering six pheasants for sale, four of them being hen chicks. They looked as if they had been shot with a gun, which is, we believe, contrary to law, and attended with a fine for each bird.

EVERY American male over the age of 21 years will be entitled to vote to-morrow, and no one else, so says Joe Wiseman. His office will be open from 7 to 5 for polling votes. It will be beautifully decorated for the occasion, and Joe will be glad to see all his many friends.

SATURDAY was a very busy day at the Post-Office. First came the mail by the Likelike, then the Kinau's, followed by a large mail from San Francisco by the City of Sydney, and of course a mail had to be forwarded by her to the Colonies. There was also the mail sent by the Alameda, which consisted of 3965 letters and 1016 papers. That is not a bad day's work after all.

SHORTLY after 12 o'clock to-day, J. G. Lewis, well known here as an old shipping master, went into the office of J. E. Wiseman to converse with that gentleman on a matter of business. All at once he gave a gasp and fell to the ground. Dr. Martin was sent for but pronounced him dead when he arrived. The body was taken to the Police Station on a stretcher. The deceased was born here, is about 50 years of age, and was at one time very wealthy.

THE NOVEMBER MONTHLY. In very good time, the Hawaiian Monthly for November has appeared.

Its main editorial matter, occupying three pages, is devoted to a discussion of the future of the country, following up Mrs. Bishop's article in the previous number and newspaper commentary thereupon. While falling in with the idea that the days of the monarchy are numbered, the editor would not like to have the change come suddenly or violently, for very good reasons. Whether it shall do so or not he believes depends chiefly upon the management of affairs by the present rulers. He deprecates strongly, as all wise men do, the rapid running of the nation into debt, which has characterized the present administration, and is apprehensive of matters becoming worse instead of better in that respect. The closing paragraph reads as follows:—"It rests mainly with the native Hawaiians, particularly those in positions of power and influence, to decide how long the native monarchy shall last; whether it shall live out the full measure of

the years which in the nature of things are possible for it, or whether it shall come to a premature, a disastrous and an ignominious end. It is a matter in which they are in some respects more deeply interested than anyone else. In a peculiar sense this is their country, their government and their king. We would that they might rise to the level of their opportunity and act with that patriotism and good sense which would insure the best results, not only for themselves, but for all dwellers within their borders. Whether they will prove equal to the emergency, the immediate future will determine.

Mr. Scott, Principal of the Fort Street School, contributes an article on "Education in Japan," covering four pages and a half. It is intensely interesting, giving a clear insight into Japanese character and progress. The author's past residence in Japan enables him to speak from his own knowledge, while his literary talent yields a very readable production. Any trustworthy information regarding the Japanese will be acceptable to all classes of our reading public, in view of the large accessions of that remarkable people expected shortly to the population of this Kingdom.

Mrs. Wyman's story, "Madeline," is carried forward to the twenty-first chapter.

Mr. Arthur Johnstone produces a meritorious sonnet, sustaining the magazine's credit for good original verse.

Dr. Koch on Cholera and the Comma Bacillus, gives the evidence upon which the famous German doctor concludes that "the comma bacilli are the cause of cholera." This minute vegetable growth, he holds, originated in the swampy soil of Southern Bengal, and, although it is promoted by animal and vegetable substance in stagnant water, its appearance in any new place must be referred to importation from a cholera-infected spot. Several instances are given, where outbreaks of cholera, at first supposed to be of local origin, proved to have been caused by infection from abroad. The reduction of cholera in Calcutta by the introduction of a pure water supply is a suggestive fact brought out in the article.

The other departments—"Editorial Comment," "Fashions," etc.—are up to the usual creditable standard.
