SILVER.

Mr. Atherton has handed us an article from the New York Times, of Jan. 28th, which is headed, "Fighting the Silver Nuisance." Our great republican neighbor—we might almost appropriately say, patron—is face to face with a very serious currency question. While, in this country, the decision in favor of a gold standard has been made, and only awaits the convenience of the Government to be fully established; in the United States, whose gold coin is the standard measure of money-value for Canada on the one hand and Hawaii on the other, there is a controversy going on, as to whether gold should not be made the single standard of currency for her own people. The Times, in the article referred to, discusses the bill reported by Mr. Morrill from the Senate Committee on Finance, for the redemption of trade dollars and the conditional suspension of the coinage of standard dollars. This measure it considers, "so far as it goes, a practical piece of legislation." First of "several excellent features," the Times says the bill "disposes of the trade dollar question in a manner as satisfactory as could be expected after the varied and unusual blundering in which that question has been involved." As amended by the Senate committee, from the form in which it was received from the House, the bill proposes to give a standard silver dollar for any trade dollar presented before the first of next July at any Sub-Treasury. This would give four months from the first of March for the redemption of this "unfortunate coin," and although speculators who had bought up the coins to get a profit would get it, that could not well be avoided in any measure that provided for relieving those who accepted the coins in good faith before the public uprising against them. The bill also provides that the redeemed trade dollars shall be melted up, and that, at their bullion value, they shall be counted as part of the \$2,000,000 worth of silver to be coined monthly into standard dollars, provided that not more than half a million dollars' worth shall be so used in any one month. This limitation the Times regards as a concession to the silver men, to protect the artificial market provided for them at the expense of the "helpless taxpayers." In the second place the bill deals with the "standard" dollars—"so-called," the Times observes, "on the lucus non principle, because they do not conform to any known standard of actual value recognized on the face

of the earth." The bill authorizes the renewal of negotiations with foreign nations, to endeavor to get them to open their mints to the "free coinage of silver, with full legal tender value, at an agreed ratio to gold." In case no treaties are made to effect that object, then after the first of August of next year, the law directing the coinage of silver dollars is to be suspended. The Times considers that the only justification of the postponement of the suspension of silver coinage, lies in the entertainment of the hope by a certain number of law-makers, that an agreement can be reached between a sufficient number of the nations of the world, for the free coinage of legal tender silver at a common ratio to gold, which will keep the value of silver fixed at the ratio so determined. It, however, regards the attempt to bring the other nations round to the policy that would suit the silver men, as useless. We give the concluding remarks of the Times in full, for the benefit of those people in this country, who look upon the Currency Act of 1884 as a measure devised mainly for the benefit of wealthy capitalists and speculators. There are such people, and there are those who know better but endeavor to propagate the absurd notion for purposes best known to themselves:—

"There is absolutely nothing in the history of the action of the Governments of the countries constituting the 'Latin Union,' or in that of the action of the more important Governments of Germany and Great Britain outside the union, or in the movement of public opinion in any of these countries, to give authority to the inference that any such agreement can be reached. Nor is there the slightest encouragement in the history of the quixotic experiment that has been tried by the United States for nearly eight years to encourage the belief that such an agreement between some or all of the principal commercial powers would bring about any such results as the bi-metallicists hope for it. On the contrary, the opinion has gained ground, and has been strengthened by our experience, that compulsory coinage of silver at any fixed ratio to gold, while it might produce confusion and intensify the disturbance arising from other sources, cannot control the causes that produce an inequality in the purchasing power of the two metals, varying from time to time. Instead of free coinage at a fixed ratio, the only policy that can avoid trouble is to accept as the common standard the one metal, gold, which is everywhere of like value, and to leave the relations of silver to it to be regulated by the laws of exchange. We shall have no steady peace and prosperity, as far as currency is concerned, until this be done. In the meantime, if a plan to renew the hopeless fooling with other nations on the subject is necessary to secure common sense legislation on the suspension of coinage, the inconvenience and delay must be borne as best they may."

EDITORIAL NOTES.

At noon the committee of the Chamber of Commerce awaited a reply from the Government to its proposals. It has not transpired what the nature of the proposed basis is, but we are assured it is couched in acceptable terms.

Mr. Robertson, the Erromangan missionary referred to in a local item yesterday, remarked to the writer that he was agreeably surprised to find Honolulu such a fine city. He had conceived the notion that it was a village of one straggling street along the beach, with gaping natives lounging at the corners. During the Australia's stay Mr. Robertson called upon Chief Justice Judd and some of his own country-folk living here.

"A Montreuil" has a very readable and accurate account of Christmas and New Year in Honolulu, in the Montreal Witness of a recent date. It is to be hoped he will not stop at this effort to make known to his countrymen the charms of this his adopted home. He is, we happen to know, a recently arrived but already popular and useful member of the community, and the letter referred to proves him to be as handy with the pen as with the pestle and mortar.

Some of Mr. Sala's sayings during his brief visit were worth noting, and it seems a pity that those who were enabled to go round with him did not get more of his remarks down. In speaking of his preconceived idea of the place, he said he in turn ex-

pected to find an American, an English, and a Hawaiian town, but when he came he found Honolulu was not any of them. He remarked, upon returning from the drive about town: "It's a perfect revelation. I expected to see two or three acquaintances, but I have been meeting friends at every turn."

During the week before the last steamer sailed from the Coast, 518 immigrants arrived in California. The rate at which the land in that State is being settled is as remarkable as the rush to its gold fields in 1849. By and by some of this stream of emigration, or of the generation springing from it, will be capable of being attracted to the delightful climate and productive soil of these Islands, if only land for settlement can be made available. An enlightened land policy is an essential condition of a prosperous future for this nation.

The barkentine Eureka left San Francisco February 16th for Honolulu with an assorted cargo valued at \$6,000.

An exchange says, "a lady has changed her religion, being determined, she says, to avoid her husband's company in the next world."

The Gazette asks, "Does the Road Supervisor draw a salary now, and if so what for?" The Road Supervisor says he does, and it is for minding his own business.

The Royal Hawaiian Band will give a concert at the Hotel to-morrow evening. Two new pictures by Messrs. Tavernier and Strong will be on exhibition in the parlor.

To-morrow morning at 11 o'clock, at Brewer's wharf, Auctioneer Adams will offer for sale the fine American bark Ceylon. This vessel is 646 tons register, a good sailer, and is well fitted in every respect.

This evening at 7:30 o'clock, at the Fort Street Church, Mr. Thos. S. Southwick and Miss Anna J. Breeze will be united in the bonds of matrimony. A reception will be held later in the lecture room.

In the Supreme Court, at Chambers, before Justice Austin, in the bankruptcy of A. W. Richardson & Co., claims to the amount of \$11,686.40 were proved. Messrs. W. C. Parke and Geo. W. Smith were elected assignees.

COLONEL Iaukea, Collector-General, will ship on Saturday by the Alameda to San Francisco a little over 5,000 tins of opium, which has been seized since he first took office. It should realize something over \$15,000 after all expenses are paid.

The S. S. Alameda will sail on Saturday at noon, sharp. The Post-office mail closes at 10 o'clock; a late letter bag at 11:30, on payment of an additional five cents. See that your letters are properly directed and stamped before dropping them in the office.

At the San Francisco Stock and Bond Exchange February 16th, 3 3/4 was asked for Hawaiian Commercial Co.'s shares. Only 3 1/4 was bid. For Hakalau plantation shares 3 was bid. Before the session was over 15 shares of Hawaiian Commercial Co. were sold at 3 1/4.

Mrs. John Magoon died at 1 o'clock this morning at her residence, Queen street, from malarial fever. The deceased was a very active member of the Bethel Union Church, and will be buried from there this afternoon at half-past three o'clock.

SAM LEE keeps a wash house near the Chinese Theatre and does the washing for one of our well-known citizens. Someone entered his premises this morning and stole two undershirts, two vests and one pair of drawers, belonging to this citizen, which were all ready for taking home. A certain party is suspected of the theft.

A LARGELY attended meeting of the members of the Bethel Union Church was held last evening in the vestry of the church. A committee reported that a charter of incorporation had been received, which it was decided to accept. The meeting adjourned for one week, so as to allow the committee time to prepare the rules for the government of the church. At the same time the trustees will be elected.

By order of H. F. Glade, Esq., administrator of the estate of Herman Schriever, deceased, Mr. E. P. Adams will sell on Saturday at 12 o'clock noon, the Schriever homestead situated in Nuuanu Valley, also a valuable piece of land on King street adjoining the Bethel Church, with the buildings and improvements thereon, and the lease of a piece of kalo land at Kauhakoku, Honolulu, for the term of one year with privilege of renewal.

In the Police Court this morning five native boys were charged with assault and battery on a Chinaman. The evidence was very lengthy and so conflicting that His Honor gave the boys the benefit of the doubt and they were discharged. Ah Sue, for having opium in possession, was fined \$50 and sentenced to one month's imprisonment. Ah Sing,

the Chinaman caught smoking opium on the Alameda yesterday, was granted a remand until to-morrow, so as to obtain two witnesses.

Lross & Levey will hold their regular cash sale to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock, selling amongst other things, sugar, furniture, harness and dry goods. At 12 noon, they will sell one top buggy, one second hand cut under carriage, and one bay and one black carriage horse.

Those persons using fire-arms should be very careful. Marshal Soper tells us he has had several complaints from persons who have heard bullets whizzing past them. Only the other day, when Mr. James Dodd was driving a number of Japanese out to Waikiki to attend the funeral of one of their number, he heard a stray bullet whiz right past him, but was unable to say where it came from.

The Honolulu Athletic Association elected the following officers yesterday for the ensuing year: President, Mr. S. B. Dole; Vice-Presidents, Messrs. Fred. Wundenberg and J. F. Brown; Secretary, Mr. J. B. Castle; Treasurer, Mr. C. Bolte. It was decided to raise a sufficient sum on mortgage of the Gymnasium to pay off some debts incurred by the Association. Instead of fourteen Directors as heretofore, the number will be five and consist of the officers as above named. It was also decided to let the building when possible.

POSTMASTER General Whitney has lately had struck off a new shade of the ten cent stamp. It is a light brown colour, and a very attractive one. There are now three shades of the ten cent stamp, black, brick and light brown. As soon as stamp collectors hear of this new stamp there is no doubt there will be a great rush at the Post Office for them. There is a great demand abroad for Hawaiian stamps, and we are not surprised, for there is no country that can boast of a more attractive set when complete.

One of our best known white express drivers was arrested this morning for violating express rules by leaving his carriage without an occupant. His case will come up to-morrow. Some of the white drivers are very indignant at the vigorous manner in which the new hack inspector prosecutes his duties. Those are the kind of men wanted in office, and there is no doubt that Macy is working a reformation among drivers which is for the public good and safety.
