The TV schedule has been rearranged as follows:


Sunday, June 14th - State Senate candidates (4th & 5th Districts).

SUBJECT: TV Schedule for Primary Campaign

1/2 hr. Early

After reviewing available dates and time slots at the three TV stations, the Campaign Committee has arranged a TV schedule for the primary election campaign to include four one-hour programs, beginning Sunday, June 14th, through Wednesday, June 17th, from 10:40 to 11:40 P.M., on Station KGMB-TV. These programs will be arranged as follows:

Sunday, June 14th - National and State candidates (U.S. Senate, U.S. House, Governor and Lieutenant Governor).

Monday, June 15th - 5th District State House candidates (8th through 13th Representative Districts).

Tuesday, June 16th - 4th District State House candidates (14th through 17th Representative Districts).

Wednesday, June 17th - State Senate candidates (4th and 5th Districts).

In planning this schedule, the Campaign Committee was confronted by two major problems: (1) a large number of candidates; and (2) a very limited amount of available time. We were unable to buy any extensive block time because to have done so, would have conflicted with programs of individual Democratic candidates, particularly during the last week of the campaign. As much as possible, we are trying to avoid competing with other Democratic TV programs and with the coffee hours which are being arranged by the various representative districts. Although the hour of the programs is late, we intend to publicize them through newspaper advertising in order to attract as many viewers as possible.


The format of these programs will follow the question-and-answer technique which has been used in the past. Candidates will be grouped at tables according to their various districts and will be asked questions by the presiding moderator. All candidates planning to appear should prepare the following in advance:

1. A brief introductory statement, not to exceed 30 seconds, summarizing your background and qualifications for the office which you are seeking.

2. At least two questions, which can be asked you by the moderator and to which you have prepared answers. Both the questions and answers should be brief and should cover some issue or aspect of the campaign on which you would like to present your views; especially if you are new to TV, it might be well to memorize the answers to your questions.

If at all possible, the questions which you would like to be asked should be turned in to campaign headquarters in advance of the program, so that the moderator will be better able to plan the show.

Particularly for those who have never before appeared on TV, we hope that this series of programs will provide an opportunity to pick up experience and confidence, resulting in a more polished performance in the general election campaign.







TITLE 18. CRIMES

Chapter 29. Elections and Political Activities.

Sec. 591. Definitions.

(1) "Election" includes general or special election, but does not include primary election or convention of political party. NOTE: Some of the provisions of this chapter expressly apply to primary elections.

(2) "Candidate" means an individual whose name is presented for election as Senator or Representative in Congress.

(3) "Political Committee" includes any committee, organization or association which accepts contributions or makes expenditures for the purpose of influencing or attempting to influence the election of candidates (a) in 2 or more States; or (b) in one state if it is a branch or subsidiary of a national committee, association or organization (excluding duly organized State or local committee of a political party).

(4) "Contribution" includes gift, subscription, loan, advance or deposit, of money or anything of value, and includes contract, promise or agreement to make contribution, whether or not legally enforceable.

(5) "Expenditure" includes payment, distribution, loan, advance, deposit or gift, of money or anything of value, and includes contract, promise or agreement to make expenditure, whether or not legally enforceable.

(6) "Person" or "whosoever" includes individual, partnership, committee, association, corporation or any other organization or group of person.

(7) "State" includes Territory and Possession of the U. S.

Sec. 592. Troops at polls. Unlawful to order, keep or have any troops or armed men at polling places.

Sec. 593. Interference by armed forces. Unlawful for officer or member of the Armed Forces of the U. S. to interfere in any way in elections or in influencing elections.

Sec. 594. Intimidation of voters. Unlawful for any person to intimidate, threaten, coerce or attempt to intimidate, threaten or coerce any other person in the right to vote or in the election of candidates.

Sec. 595. Interference by administrative employees of Federal, State or Territorial Governments. Unlawful for any person employed in any administrative position by the U.S. or any of its department or agency, or by any State, Territory or Possession of the U. S. or any of its political subdivision, municipality, agency or corporation, engaged in any activity financed in whole or in part by loans or grants made by the U. S. or any of its department or agency to use his official authority to interfere with or affect the nomination or election of any candidate.

This section does not prohibit any act by any officer or employee of educational or research institution, establishment or agency supported in any amount by any state or its political subdivision or by any Territory or Possession of the U.S.; or by any recognized religious, philanthropic or cultural organization.

Sec. 596. Polling armed forces. Unlawful for any person to poll any member of the Armed Forces of the U. S., either before or after he casts any ballot, as to his choice of candidate, or to publish or release the result of such poll.

Sec. 597. Expenditure to influence voting. Unlawful for any person to make or offer to make an expenditure to any person to vote or not vote or to vote for or against any candidate; unlawful for any person to solicit, accept or receive such expenditure.

Sec. 598. Coercion by means of relief appropriations. Unlawful for any person to use any part of work relief or relief appropriation made by Congress or appropriation made for increasing employment by providing loans and grants for public-works projects, or to exercise or administer any authority given by any appropriation act, for the purpose of interfering with, restraining or coercing any individual in the exercise of his right to vote at any election.

Sec. 599. Promise of appointment by candidate. Unlawful for any candidate, directly or indirectly, to promise or pledge the appointment, or to use his influence or support for the appointment, of any person to any public or private position or employment, for the purpose of procuring support in his candidacy.

Sec. 600. Promise of employment or other benefit for political activity. Unlawful for any person [candidate or not] directly or indirectly to promise any person any employment, position, work, compensation or other benefit which is provided for or made possible, in whole or in part, by any Act of Congress, in consideration or as a reward or favor for any political activity or for the support or opposition to any candidate or any political party in any election.

Sec. 601. Deprivation of employment or other benefit for political activity. Unlawful for any person, directly or indirectly, to deprive or attempt to deprive or threaten to deprive any person of any employment, position, work, compensation or other benefit under any work relief or relief appropriations made by Congress on account of race, color, creed or any political activity, support of, or opposition to any candidate or political party in any election.

Sec. 602. Solicitation of political contributions. Unlawful for any candidate or any officer or employee of the U.S. or any person receiving any salary or compensation from money derived from the treasury of the U. S., directly or indirectly, to solicit, receive or be concerned in any manner in the soliciting or receiving contributions for political purpose from fellow officers or employees.

Sec. 603. Place of solicitation. Unlawful for any person to solicit or receive any contribution in any room or building occupied in the discharge of duty by any person receiving salary or compensation from money derived from the treasury of the U. S. or in any navy yard, fort or arsenal.

Sec. 604. Solicitation from persons on relief. Unlawful for any person to solicit or receive or be in any manner concerned in soliciting or receiving any contribution for any political purpose from any person known to be entitled to, or receiving compensation, employment, or other benefit under work relief or relief appropriation made by Act of Congress.

Sec. 605. Disclosure of names of persons on relief. Unlawful for any person, for political purposes, to furnish or disclose any list or names of persons receiving compensation, employment or benefit under work relief or relief appropriations of Congress; unlawful for any person to receive such list or names for political purposes.

Sec. 606. Intimidation to secure political contributions. Unlawful for any officer or employee of the U. S. to discharge, promote or degrade, or in any manner change the official rank or compensation of any other officer or employee, or promise or threaten to do so, for giving or withholding or neglecting to make contribution for any political purpose.

Sec. 607. Limitations on political contributions and purchases. (a) A person is limited in making contribution, directly or indirectly, to or on behalf of any candidate for an elective Federal office, or to or on behalf of any committee or other organization engaged in furthering the candidacy for nomination or election of any candidate or the success of any national political party, to the sum of \$5,000 during any calendar year or in connection with any campaign for nomination or election.

(b) Unlawful for any person to purchase or buy any goods, commodities, advertising or articles of any kind or description, the proceeds of which, or any portion thereof, directly or indirectly, inures to the benefit of or for any candidate for an elective Federal office or any political committee or other political organization engaged in furthering, advancing or advocating the nomination or election of any candidate for any such office or the success of any national political party.

Sec. 607. Making political contributions. Unlawful for any officer, clerk or other person in the service of the U. S. directly or indirectly to give or hand over to any other officer, clerk or person in the service of the U. S. or to any Senator or Member of or Delegate to Congress, any contribution on account of or to be applied to the promotion of any political object.

Sec. 609. Maximum contributions and expenditures. No political committee shall receive contributions aggregating more than \$3,000,000, or make expenditures aggregating more than \$3,000,000 during any calendar year. Any contribution received and any expenditure made on behalf of any political committee with the knowledge and consent of the chairman or treasurer of such committee is deemed to be received or made by such committee.

Sec. 610. Contributions or expenditures by national banks, corporations or labor organizations. Unlawful for any national bank or any corporation organized by authority of any law of Congress, to make contribution or expenditure in connection with (a) any election to any political office; (b) any primary election or political convention or caucus held to select candidates for any political office. Unlawful for any corporation whatsoever, or any labor organization to make contribution or expenditure in connection with (a) any election at which Senator or Representative in Congress are to be voted for, or (b) any primary election or political convention or caucus held to select candidates for any of such offices. Unlawful for any candidate, political committee or other person to accept or receive any contribution prohibited by this section.

Sec. 611. Contributions by firms or individuals contracting with the United States. Unlawful for any person entering into contract with the United States or any department or agency of the U.S., for (a) rendition of personal services or furnishing any material, supplies or equipment, or (b) selling any land or building, to the United States or any of its department or agency, to make any contribution or to promise to make any such contribution to any political party, committee or candidate for public office or to any person for any political purpose or use. This section applies to contracts where the performance or the materials, supplies, equipment, land or building is to be paid in whole or in part from funds appropriated by Congress, and is applicable during the period of negotiation for such contract or the period of performance. Unlawful also for any person to knowingly solicit any such contribution from any such person or firm for the purposes and during the period mentioned in this section.

Sec. 612. Publication or distribution of political statements.
Unlawful (a) to publish or distribute, or (b) to deposit in the mail, or (c) to transport in interstate commerce, or (d) to cause to be published, distributed, deposited in the mail or transported in interstate commerce, any card, pamphlet, circular, poster, dodger, advertisement, writing or any other statement relating to or concerning any person who has publicly declared his intention to seek, among others, the office of Senator or Representative in Congress in a primary, general or special election, or convention of a political party, or has caused or permitted his intention to do so to be publicly declared, UNLESS it contains the names of the persons, associations, committees and corporations responsible for the publication or distribution and the names of the officers of each such association, committee or
