LOCAL & GENERAL NEWS.

The Kinu is due to-morrow morn-
ing from windward ports.

morrow afternoon.

The attendance of the natives in
the Supreme Court this day was not
so large as yesterday.

Full evening dress on the part of
gentlemen will be required at the
Palace ball to-morrow evening.

Emma Hall, appears elsewhere.

The R. M. S. Alameda is due from
San Francisco Saturday en route to
the Colonies with eight days' later
news.

A game of baseball between the
Unknown and Nipise baseball clubs
will be played to-morrow at the Ma-
kiki baseball grounds. Game com-
mences at 3 o'clock.

A difficulty between the Tram-
ways Company and its men was satis-
factorily settled yesterday, thus aver-
ting a general strike against long
hours combined with low pay.

OCTOBER TERM.

Test of E. W. Wilcox for Conspiracy
--Before the Hon. or the Chief
Justice.

Monday, Oct. 21st.
The first witness called for the
prosecution was Robert N. Boyd,
who after stating that he was absent
nearly eight years in Italy, returned
two years ago, knew Robert W.
Wilcox, went on to give exactly the
same evidence as in the Loomens
trial. This evidence was given very
full in the Bulletin, and it is not
considered necessary to repeat it.

Boyd's cross-examination com-
menced at 4:30 o'clock.

Just before adjournment at five
o'clock, Mr. Rosa addressed the
Court with regard to the two charges
pending against Wilcox, and asked
that one of the charges be cleared
of record.

The Attorney-General considered
request had no right to make such a
request.

The Court considered the motion
premature.

The King vs. Manuel Perry.
Larceny. Appeal from Honolulu
Police Court, where the defendant
was fined and sentenced to one
month's imprisonment. He now
pleaded guilty, and asked for mitiga-
tion of sentence. The Court sen-
tenced him to pay a fine of \$25 and
be imprisoned at hard labor for ten
days.

Tuesday, Oct. 22d.
The Court opened at 9:35 a. m.
The hearing of the Wilcox case
was delayed by the non-arrival of
the witness, Robert N. Boyd. He
came in at five minutes to 10 o'clock
and stated to the Court that he un-
derstood the hour for opening was
10 o'clock.

The cross-examination of Boyd
was then continued by Mr. Rosa.
The witness stated that he had paid
visits to the palace and barracks
previous to July 30th, that the Prin-
cess Poomaikalani and Prince Ka-
laniana'ole passed in and out the
palace yard on the morning of the
30th, that the Princess was cheered,
that the palace could easily have
been taken. The witness stated
that the bullet which went through
his leg must have been fired from
the Music Hall. Soon after day-
break he saw Hoapili Baker enter
the palace grounds with Mr. Robert-
son, the Vice-Chamberlain. Saw
Baker talking with Wilcox in a
friendly manner. Robertson asked
Wilcox for permission to go to his
room. Robertson did not order the
crowd in the yard to disperse. He
would not have given evidence in
this case if he had not been left free;
would have protected the King in
the palace. Heard that the palace
soldiers were in our favor and also
two companies of the Honolulu Ri-
flers, I think C and D, not quite sure.
Heard the Chinese were in favor
with us. This made us feel more
cheerful, and surer of obtaining our
object. We felt sure that we would
get the new constitution. Wilcox
never cautioned me not to carry on
the movement. Jack Kuamoo said
he had a good deal of influence with
the natives. Do not remember him
saying he had the palace password.
Jim Kauhane said he had a good
many friends among the palace
soldiers.

By Mr. Hatch--Wilcox told me
the Chinese were to join us, did not
state the number. He said the Chi-
nese were going to raise a revolution.

By the Court--I saw the papers
containing the new Constitution, did
not read them. Wilcox had them.
George Markham was next sworn
and gave similar evidence as that in
the Loomens case. New evidence
brought out was that Wilcox told
him he had got \$200 from G. Aio
alias Goo York, who had since left
for China. Markham went with
Wilcox to Sam Kum Lung's store
on Hotel street to get red shirts and
caps. Saw Papa there. The shirts
and caps were not paid for. Saw
the same shirts and caps on the
night of the 29th at Wilcox's resi-
dence. They went to You Nin &
Co.'s store on Nuuanu street and
agreed to buy twelve bull dog pi-
stols at \$5, also some cartridges.
Wilcox told the Chinaman to charge
them to him. I went to L. Aho's
store, Nuuanu street, on the after-
noon of the 29th about rice bird
guns.

At noon the court took a recess.
AFTERNOON SESSION.
The Court resumed at 1 o'clock.
George Markham's examination
was proceeded with as follows--
When I went to Aho's I saw the
salesman, also saw two cases of rice
bird guns. I reported to Wilcox
that Aho had guns, and he told me
after he had been up to the store
and got twelve guns. In the even-
ing I went with Kauhane in a hack
to get the guns. Know the hack
driver, he is a Hawaiian. First went
to Aio's store to get four more guns,
found Papa had got them. Then
went to J. E. Bush's house on
Punchbowl and got one gun. Bush
was not there, understood he had
gone to church. His wife gave me
the gun. Then drove to Aho's
store, found him there, asked him
for the guns Wilcox had ordered.
He said "here they are." I put
them in the hack, there were 12
guns. We took them out by the
back gate. Aho opened the gate
for us. Then went to You Nin &
Co.'s store, by the rear entrance.
We got some pistols. Then went to
Princess Liliuokalani's residence,
entering on the Ewa side, and took
the firearms collected into Wilcox's
room. Later on went to Ho Fou's

to get some liquor. The natives
wanted gin to give them Dutch cour-
age. Did not get the gin. Wilcox
gave the order for the body of men
to move from the Princess's resi-
dence to the palace on the night of
the 29th. If the palace was not
opened we were to use giant powder;
I had some of it, so had Boyd. I
fired my gun at the Music Hall.
Also fired my rifle twice at the
same building. Got too weak to
hold my gun in consequence of the
wound.
