### Death of Lieutenant Cobb.

Shortly after midnight Monday morning First Lieutenant Thomas N. Cobb Jr., of the Twenty-ninth Infantry, United States Volunteers, succumbed to smallpox on the quarantine island. He was one of the victims of the disease removed to the island from the transport Lawton, which was here recently from the Orient on her way to the Coast. He was one of the first smallpox patients to be brought here, having become afflicted with the disease on the Lawton while on his way home. He, with another patient, a physician, was removed from the Lawton upon her arrival here and taken to quarantine island. It was thought at the time that he would recover.

It was not thought wise to attempt to preserve the remains, and the body was therefore cremated.

Lieutenant Cobb's death will be reported to the War Department and, through this source, communication can be had with the relatives of the deceased.

### Aguinaldo Asks For Surrender.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—The War Department received today, after the Cabinet meeting, a voluminous dispatch from General MacArthur. From what has leaked out it is understood that a part of the budget is the manifesto which Aguinaldo has prepared or had prepared for him, calling on the Filipinos in the field, to come in and take the oath of allegiance.

## POLITICAL SUICIDE.

Delegate Wilcox succeeded last night in persuading a number of Hawaiian leaders to call themselves in the future the "Independent Home Rule Republican Party." Does Mr. Wilcox believe for a moment that the Harbor and River Commission, which sent him here, will be satisfied with this very doubtful surrender of the Hawaiians to the Republican party in the States? He knows better, and he must understand that the Republicans here will send a delegate to the next national convention and utterly ignore the new party with the many names of Mr. Wilcox.

As an independent party the Hawaiians will receive recognition in Washington and hold the balance of power here. As an Independent Home Rule Republican party, they will simply make fools of themselves.

The representatives of the people, who were induced by Wilcox to accept the new name for their political organization will soon find out that they will meet scorn here and laughter from the Mainland.

Mr. Wilcox has attempted to commit political suicide again, and it is a pity that the distinguished Hawaiians, at last night's meeting didn't give him a chance to carry out his obvious intentions of obliterating himself from the "milky way," which gains its bright substance from Judge Humphreys. No, he wanted to talk and this is what he is reported as saying, (It will be seen that he didn't lose sight of Wilcox:

"Many people tried to cast me down," said Wilcox; "there were letters from here calling me an adventurer and other bad names; my letters to Aguinaldo were dug up and printed and George Gear went personally to Washington to get the house to declare my seat vacant. It was not long, however, before Gear dropped on his knees before me and asked to be forgiven. The Bible says we must forgive our enemies and I forgave him. That was right according to Scripture; but deep down in my heart I had it in for Gear. But it was not only Christian to forgive him, but it showed me to be a statesman and a diplomat. I knew it would be bad to fight the nominee of the President; to permit him to be confirmed would make me friends. After I had forgiven Gear, Senators and Members came to me and said: 'You are an extraordinary man—after all that man has done to you you forgive him and heap coals of fire on his head. You are a diplomat.'"

"I have been advised at Washington," he said, "to come home and advise you about your political future. What I want to say is what has been put into my mouth by wise men, your true friends. They bid me say to the Hawaiians, 'If you want to

make your Delegate great and powerful at Washington, send him back as a Republican. Never send a Delegate who is not a native Hawaiian and a Republican. The Republicans pass all the laws. They have the good things to give. They can make every Hawaiian a present of land in his own country.' I do not want," continued Wilcox, "to be like a tall coconut tree which yields no fruit. But I will not make any formal proposition tonight. You know in a general way what it is to be, so go home now and sleep over it, and tomorrow night come back to this hall and have your say. Whatever you decide I only want to serve you. Think over this well and tell me what to do. Be unanimous. In unity there is strength. Don't be like the wind that blows this way today, and another way tomorrow. Whichever way you decide will be blinding on me."

Mr. Wilcox has been able heretofore to crawl out of any hole in which he fell during his checkered political career, but we think that he has tried the game once too often and that, if he went before the masses tomorrow with his "Republican" tag he would be relegated to the class of "has-beens." In the meantime, we hope he will make all the dough he can from "Colonel Mazuma" who is now in Washington.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Mr. J. D. Paris represents the Hawaiian Canary birds in the District of Kona in a very proper manner. He spoke against the Dispensary bill today and voted for it. He is undoubtedly a Kona "canary bird himself." "Ah—yaa, Mr. President, Ah Yah!"

The Dispensary bill was killed in the Senate this morning and this crude attempt to regulate the liquor traffic in the Territory without the electors being consulted proved an error on the part of the father of the bill Senator Russel, and his easily-led dummy Senator Kanuha. The bill was absurd from beginning to end and if it had been taken up section by section it would have been found full of the most incongruous provisions. Dr. Russel, as a "reformer" and a political boss has not been a success. His pet bill is killed and we suggest to the cosmopolitan gentleman that he leave the Senate and retire to the wilderness of his Puna coffee ranch, where he can "dispense" liquor ad libitum or dispense with it.

How Governor Dole could sign the bill relating to the employment of minors in places where liquors are sold, is a mystery to any one who is not yet convinced that the illness of his excellency is due to softening of the brains. He probably did not understand that the bill will force Hackfeld & Co., Hoffschlager & Co., and others to dismiss their apprentices, if we may use that word in speaking about the young men who are employed in those firms, and who have the misfortune of being under 21 years of age and still anxious to earn an honest living. Section 2 of the Act is very plain and directed against the wholesale houses. It reads:

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any keeper or proprietor of any place where intoxicating or spirituous liquors are sold or dispensed, to permit any minor to visit or remain in the room where said liquors are sold, kept for sale or dispensed. That the law will be declared unconstitutional goes without saying. But it seems absurd to us that a man of the giant intelligence of Hoogs, should have introduced such an inequitable bill, and that the Governor should have signed. It reflects no credit on Legislature or Governor.

## At the Mint.

On March 16, there will be a meeting of the directors of the Mint, to discuss the question of coinage, and the size of the equivalent to be poured out for a quarter. The stockholders are requested to meet later on in the new beer garden, back of the Mint, and there express their views on dividends and reserve funds. The President hopes that there will be a full attendance.

## A Wise Resolution.

When the obnoxious Dispensary bill was called in the Senate yesterday, Senator Cecil Brown introduced the following resolution:

Whereas, Senate Bill 42, otherwise known as the Dispensary Act, has been made the order of the day for consideration at this day's session of the Senate; and whereas, the proposed measure is radical in the extreme, and will if passed require a large amount of money to carry out, among other things, the measures proposed by said Act, and;

Whereas, At the last general election no mention was made in the platforms of any of the political parties to the electors of this Territory, or any measure regulating the traffic of liquor, nor upon any temperance measures, nor upon any measure of like nature, and;

Whereas, In matters of this importance it is to the interest of all persons that the opinion of the electors of the whole Territory should be expressed, and their wishes and desires known through the ballot box, and;

Whereas, The question raised by said Act, and also such other questions incidental and pertinent to this measure, having never been submitted nor passed upon by either political party of a majority of all the voters of the Territory being an unknown quantity thereon,

Now, therefore, be it resolved, that Senate Bill 42, otherwise known as the Dispensary Act, be laid on the table, and that no further action be taken on the matter until such time as the electors of this Territory have had a chance of expressing their opinion thereon, at the next general election.

## Unjust Reflections.

The Advertiser on Monday insinuated that the Secretaries of the two houses of the Legislature had been "kolobe" in having sent to their homes respectively, writing desks and typewriters, and paid for them with warrants on the treasury. The following was read in the Senate on Monday:

HONOLULU, T. H., April 15, 1901. The typewriter provided for the Secretary of the Senate has been and is being used by him at his residence with the full knowledge and consent of the accounts committee of the Senate.

There is nothing in the usual possession of this typewriter, desk, etc., by Mr. Cayless, but what has been and is perfectly proper, open and above board, and any statements or insinuations to the contrary are unjust to Mr. Cayless.

**The Danish West Indies.**

LONDON, April 5.—At Copenhagen it is understood that the United States Government is inclined to take umbrage at Denmark's hesitation to accept the American offer for the sale of the Danish West Indies. The general opinion, including that of the royal family, it is said, has become almost menacing, but Denmark has the moral support of the European powers.

**Hobson's Merrimac.**

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, April 5.—The wreck of the collier Merrimac, which was sunk at the entrance to Santiago harbor by Lieutenant R. P. Hobson and his little band of heroes during the Schley-Sampson blockade, will be blown up with dynamite tomorrow.

Although Admiral Sampson figured out that the sinking of the Merrimac would keep the Spanish fleet in the harbor, it proved only a slight hindrance to navigation.

**Drifted to Sea.**

TERRITORY OF HAWAII,

United States District Attorney for the Territory of Hawaii.

Dear Sir:—I have just received your favor in which you say the "bearer's son has drifted out to sea in an open boat, and the father has applied to me for relief. I understand that he is a citizen of the Territory, and as the national officers can offer no relief, I have referred him to you."

Upon receipt of your letter I immediately saw the Superintendent of Public Works, and he has placed the Territorial Tug at the service of Mr. Thomas Foster in his search for his son. I also at once communicated with the High Sheriff, and the Police Department will render all aid in its power. A diligent search is already in progress to ascertain whether the information is not possibly incorrect, and the boy somewhere in the city. In case he drifted out of the harbor, as his father believes, last night without sail or oar, the prevailing winds have probably already carried him so far that he cannot be overtaken by the Territorial Tug; and in that case, the only chance of saving his life seems to be through a ship which can make a somewhat extended cruise. The Territory has no such vessel, and, under the circumstances, I feel justified in appealing to you as the legal representative of the Federal Government, to see if the naval authorities have not power to take such measures at once as may be necessary to save this young man's life. I will meet you and them at any time and place that will suit their convenience.

The foregoing letter explains itself, and is given to the afternoon press in the hope that it will lead to information which may aid in the rescue of the young man. The Territorial Tug started out on ten minutes notice in search of him. The United States Ship Iroquois is being put in readiness, and if no information is received, it will start out to aid in the search by orders of Captain Pond, at daylight tomorrow morning.

**Hymen Reigns Supreme.**

A very pretty wedding took place last evening at the Central Union Church when Maurice Brasch and Miss Mabel Waity were joined in holy wedlock by the Rev. W. M. Kincaid.

The bride is the daughter of the well known partner in the bank of Bishop & Co. H. E. Waity; and the bridegroom is a prominent merchant who has resided here for a number of years.

Miss May Damon acted as bridesmaid and when leaving the church little Miss Waity, a sister of the bride, and Master Douglass Damon threw roses along their path indicating the wish of all the friends of the young couple that their future will be a dance on thornless roses.

Mr. and Mrs. Brasch will spend their honeymoon at Haleiwa Hotel, for which plane they departed in a special train.

**Death of a Veteran Printer.**

After a prolonged illness Thomas P. Spencer passed away yesterday at his home near Liliha Street. Deceased was a very bright Hawaiian and a first-class printer. He had worked in every newspaper office in Honolulu and was always considered a valuable man. He edited Hawaiian newspapers and published several stories in the Hawaiian language which he had at his command. "Tom" as we called him in the old day when the Elele and Holomua, and the Ka Leo o ka Lahui were the leading papers made friends wherever he worked. Sickness overtook him and another bright Hawaiian has joined the advance brigade. He was about 43 years of age and leaves a wife and four children.

**An Important Resolution**

In the House of Representatives Mr. Beckley introduced the following important resolution which may have far reaching results:

Whereas, the Governor has admitted to a committee of this House, that the trip of J. F. Brown, Commissioner of Public Lands, to Washington, D. C., was authorized and directed by him, and that among other things, the said J. F. Brown was instructed by the Governor to advocate the repeal or modification of that clause in section 55 of the Organic Act which reads as follows: "That no corporation, domestic or foreign, shall acquire and hold real estate in Hawaii in excess of one thousand acres; and all real estate acquired and held by such corporation or association contrary hereto shall be forfeited and escheat to the United States, but existing vested rights in real estate shall not be impaired."

And whereas, E. P. Dole, attorney general of the Territory of Hawaii, has recently rendered an opinion that leases of public lands by corporations in excess of one thousand acres or in addition to the land held in fee by such corporation, is not prohibited by the above mentioned clause, and

Whereas, there is an evident desire on the part of public officials of this Territory to remove all obstacles and allow corporations to increase their, already too large holdings and thereby monopolize all the agricultural lands to the great loss and detriment of the citizens of this Territory,

Therefore, be it resolved, by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring:

That we, the representatives of the people in the Legislature assembled do firmly and solemnly protest against the repeal of said clause in the Organic Act, and most respectfully ask that the Attorney General of the United States be directed by the President to commence suits in the United States courts for the recovery of all public lands in Hawaii illegally and unlawfully disposed of, and if necessary, that said suits be appealed to the Supreme Court of the United States in the interest of the people and for protection against the inordinate greed of corporations in trying to control, practically, all the public lands in this Territory.

That certified copies of these resolutions forthwith be transmitted to the President, the Attorney General, the Secretary of the Interior, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States, and to our Delegate to Congress from Hawaii.

### Death of Lieutenant Cobb.

Shortly after midnight Monday morning First Lieutenant Thomas N. Cobb Jr., of the Twenty-ninth Infantry, United States Volunteers, succumbed to smallpox on the quarantine island. He was one of the victims of the disease removed to the island from the transport Lawton, which was here recently from the Orient on her way to the Coast. He was one of the first smallpox patients to be brought here, having become afflicted with the disease on the Lawton while on his way home. He, with another patient, a physician, was removed from the Lawton upon her arrival here and taken to quarantine island. It was thought at the time that he would recover.

It was not thought wise to attempt to preserve the remains, and the body was therefore cremated.

Lieutenant Cobb's death will be reported to the War Department and, through this source, communication can be had with the relatives of the deceased.

### Aguinaldo Asks For Surrender.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—The War Department received today, after the Cabinet meeting, a voluminous dispatch from General MacArthur. From what has leaked out it is understood that a part of the budget is the manifesto which Aguinaldo has prepared or had prepared for him, calling on the Filipinos in the field, to come in and take the oath of allegiance.

## POLITICAL SUICIDE.

Delegate Wilcox succeeded last night in persuading a number of Hawaiian leaders to call themselves in the future the "Independent Home Rule Republican Party." Does Mr. Wilcox believe for a moment that the Harbor and River Commission, which sent him here, will be satisfied with this very doubtful surrender of the Hawaiians to the Republican party in the States? He knows better, and he must understand that the Republicans here will send a delegate to the next national convention and utterly ignore the new party with the many names of Mr. Wilcox.

As an independent party the Hawaiians will receive recognition in Washington and hold the balance of power here. As an Independent Home Rule Republican party, they will simply make fools of themselves.

The representatives of the people, who were induced by Wilcox to accept the new name for their political organization will soon find out that they will meet scorn here and laughter from the Mainland.

Mr. Wilcox has attempted to commit political suicide again, and it is a pity that the distinguished Hawaiians, at last night's meeting didn't give him a chance to carry out his obvious intentions of obliterating himself from the "milky way," which gains its bright substance from Judge Humphreys. No, he wanted to talk and this is what he is reported as saying, (It will be seen that he didn't lose sight of Wilcox:

"Many people tried to cast me down," said Wilcox; "there were letters from here calling me an adventurer and other bad names; my letters to Aguinaldo were dug up and printed and George Gear went personally to Washington to get the house to declare my seat vacant. It was not long, however, before Gear dropped on his knees before me and asked to be forgiven. The Bible says we must forgive our enemies and I forgave him. That was right according to Scripture; but deep down in my heart I had it in for Gear. But it was not only Christian to forgive him, but it showed me to be a statesman and a diplomat. I knew it would be bad to fight the nominee of the President; to permit him to be confirmed would make me friends. After I had forgiven Gear, Senators and Members came to me and said: 'You are an extraordinary man—after all that man has done to you you forgive him and heap coals of fire on his head. You are a diplomat.'"

"I have been advised at Washington," he said, "to come home and advise you about your political future. What I want to say is what has been put into my mouth by wise men, your true friends. They bid me say to the Hawaiians, 'If you want to

make your Delegate great and powerful at Washington, send him back as a Republican. Never send a Delegate who is not a native Hawaiian and a Republican. The Republicans pass all the laws. They have the good things to give. They can make every Hawaiian a present of land in his own country.' I do not want," continued Wilcox, "to be like a tall coconut tree which yields no fruit. But I will not make any formal proposition tonight. You know in a general way what it is to be, so go home now and sleep over it, and tomorrow night come back to this hall and have your say. Whatever you decide I only want to serve you. Think over this well and tell me what to do. Be unanimous. In unity there is strength. Don't be like the wind that blows this way today, and another way tomorrow. Whichever way you decide will be blinding on me."

Mr. Wilcox has been able heretofore to crawl out of any hole in which he fell during his checkered political career, but we think that he has tried the game once too often and that, if he went before the masses tomorrow with his "Republican" tag he would be relegated to the class of "has-beens." In the meantime, we hope he will make all the dough he can from "Colonel Mazuma" who is now in Washington.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Mr. J. D. Paris represents the Hawaiian Canary birds in the District of Kona in a very proper manner. He spoke against the Dispensary bill today and voted for it. He is undoubtedly a Kona "canary bird himself." "Ah—yaa, Mr. President, Ah Yah!"

The Dispensary bill was killed in the Senate this morning and this crude attempt to regulate the liquor traffic in the Territory without the electors being consulted proved an error on the part of the father of the bill Senator Russel, and his easily-led dummy Senator Kanuha. The bill was absurd from beginning to end and if it had been taken up section by section it would have been found full of the most incongruous provisions. Dr. Russel, as a "reformer" and a political boss has not been a success. His pet bill is killed and we suggest to the cosmopolitan gentleman that he leave the Senate and retire to the wilderness of his Puna coffee ranch, where he can "dispense" liquor ad libitum or dispense with it.

How Governor Dole could sign the bill relating to the employment of minors in places where liquors are sold, is a mystery to any one who is not yet convinced that the illness of his excellency is due to softening of the brains. He probably did not understand that the bill will force Hackfeld & Co., Hoffschlager & Co., and others to dismiss their apprentices, if we may use that word in speaking about the young men who are employed in those firms, and who have the misfortune of being under 21 years of age and still anxious to earn an honest living. Section 2 of the Act is very plain and directed against the wholesale houses. It reads:

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any keeper or proprietor of any place where intoxicating or spirituous liquors are sold or dispensed, to permit any minor to visit or remain in the room where said liquors are sold, kept for sale or dispensed. That the law will be declared unconstitutional goes without saying. But it seems absurd to us that a man of the giant intelligence of Hoogs, should have introduced such an iniquitous bill, and that the Governor should have signed. It reflects no credit on Legislature or Governor.

### At the Mint.

On March 16, there will be a meeting of the directors of the Mint, to discuss the question of coinage, and the size of the equivalent to be poured out for a quarter. The stockholders are requested to meet later on in the new beer garden, back of the Mint, and there express their views on dividends and reserve funds. The President hopes that there will be a full attendance.

## A Wise Resolution.

When the obnoxious Dispensary bill was called in the Senate yesterday, Senator Cecil Brown introduced the following resolution:

Whereas, Senate Bill 42, otherwise known as the Dispensary Act, has been made the order of the day for consideration at this day's session of the Senate; and whereas, the proposed measure is radical in the extreme, and will if passed require a large amount of money to carry out, among other things, the measures proposed by said Act, and;

Whereas, At the last general election no mention was made in the platforms of any of the political parties to the electors of this Territory, or any measure regulating the traffic of liquor, nor upon any temperance measures, nor upon any measure of like nature, and;

Whereas, In matters of this importance it is to the interest of all persons that the opinion of the electors of the whole Territory should be expressed, and their wishes and desires known through the ballot box, and

Whereas, The question raised by said Act, and also such other questions incidental and pertinent to this measure, having never been submitted nor passed upon by either political party of a majority of all the voters of the Territory being an unknown quantity thereon,

Now, therefore, be it resolved, that Senate Bill 42, otherwise known as the Dispensary Act, be laid on the table, and that no further action be taken on the matter until such time as the electors of this Territory have had a chance of expressing their opinion thereon, at the next general election.

## Unjust Reflections.

The Advertiser on Monday insinuated that the Secretaries of the two houses of the Legislature had been "kolobe" in having sent to their homes respectively, writing desks and typewriters, and paid for them with warrants on the treasury. The following was read in the Senate on Monday:

HONOLULU, T. H., April 15, 1901.

The typewriter provided for the Secretary of the Senate has been and is being used by him at his residence with the full knowledge and consent of the accounts committee of the Senate.

There is nothing in the usual possession of this typewriter, desk, etc., by Mr. Cayless, but what has been and is perfectly proper, open and above board, and any statements or insinuations to the contrary are unjust to Mr. Cayless.

**The Danish West Indies.**

LONDON, April 5.—At Copenhagen it is understood that the United States Government is inclined to take umbrage at Denmark's hesitation to accept the American offer for the sale of the Danish West Indies. The general opinion, including that of the royal family, it is said, has become almost menacing, but Denmark has the moral support of the European powers.

**Hobson's Merrimac.**

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, April 5.—The wreck of the collier Merrimac, which was sunk at the entrance to Santiago harbor by Lieutenant R. P. Hobson and his little band of heroes during the Schley-Sampson blockade, will be blown up with dynamite tomorrow.

Although Admiral Sampson figured out that the sinking of the Merrimac would keep the Spanish fleet in the harbor, it proved only a slight hindrance to navigation.

**Drifted to Sea.**

United States District Attorney for the Territory of Hawaii.

Dear Sir:—I have just received your favor in which you say the "bearer's son has drifted out to sea in an open boat, and the father has applied to me for relief. I understand that he is a citizen of the Territory, and as the national officers can offer no relief, I have referred him to you."

Upon receipt of your letter I immediately saw the Superintendent of Public Works, and he has placed the Territorial Tug at the service of Mr. Thomas Foster in his search for his son. I also at once communicated with the High Sheriff, and the Police Department will render all aid in its power. A diligent search is a'ready in progress to ascertain whether the information is not possibly incorrect, and the boy somewhere in the city. In case he drifted out of the harbor, as his father believes, last night without sail or oar, the prevailing winds have probably already carried him so far that he cannot be overtaken by the Territorial Tug; and in that case, the only chance of saving his life seems to be through a ship which can make a somewhat extended cruise. The Territory has no such vessel, and, under the circumstances, I feel justified in appealing to you as the legal representative of the Federal Government, to see if the naval authorities have not power to take such measures at once as may be necessary to save this young man's life. I will meet you and them at any time and place that will suit their convenience.

The foregoing letter explains itself, and is given to the afternoon press in the hope that it will lead to information which may aid in the rescue of the young man. The Territorial Tug started out on ten minutes notice in search of him. The United States Ship Iroquois is being put in readiness, and if no information is received, it will start out to aid in the search by orders of Captain Pond, at daylight tomorrow morning.

**Hymen Reigns Supreme.**

A very pretty wedding took place last evening at the Central Union Church when Maurice Brasch and Miss Mabel Waity were joined in holy wedlock by the Rev. W. M. Kincaid.

The bride is the daughter of the well known partner in the bank of Bishop & Co. H. E. Waity; and the bridegroom is a prominent merchant who has resided here for a number of years.

Miss May Damon acted as bridesmaid and when leaving the church little Miss Waity, a sister of the bride, and Master Douglass Damon threw roses along their path indicating the wish of all the friends of the young couple that their future will be a dance on thornless roses.

Mr. and Mrs. Brasch will spend their honeymoon at Huleiwa Hotel, for which place they departed in a special train.

**Death of a Veteran Printer.**

After a prolonged illness Thomas P. Spencer passed away yesterday at his home near Liliha Street. Deceased was a very bright Hawaiian and a first-class printer. He had worked in every newspaper office in Honolulu and was always considered a valuable man. He edited Hawaiian newspapers and published several stories in the Hawaiian language which he had at his command. "Tom" as we called him in the old day when the Elele and Holomua, and the Ka Leo o ka Lahui were the leading papers made friends wherever he worked. Sickness overtook him and another bright Hawaiian has joined the advance brigade. He was about 43 years of age and leaves a wife and four children.

**An Important Resolution**

In the House of Representatives Mr. Beckley introduced the following important resolution which may have far reaching results:

Whereas, the Governor has admitted to a committee of this House, that the trip of J. F. Brown, Commissioner of Public Lands, to Washington, D. C., was authorized and directed by him, and that among other things, the said J. F. Brown was instructed by the Governor to advocate the repeal or modification of that clause in section 55 of the Organic Act which reads as follows: "That no corporation, domestic or foreign, shall acquire and hold real estate in Hawaii in excess of one thousand acres; and all real estate acquired and held by such corporation or association contrary hereto shall be forfeited and escheat to the United States, but existing vested rights in real estate shall not be impaired."

And whereas, E. P. Dole, attorney general of the Territory of Hawaii, has recently rendered an opinion that leases of public lands by corporations in excess of one thousand acres or in addition to the land held in fee by such corporation, is not prohibited by the above mentioned clause, and

Whereas, there is an evident desire on the part of public officials of this Territory to remove all obstacles and allow corporations to increase their, already too large holdings and thereby monopolize all the agricultural lands to the great loss and detriment of the citizens of this Territory.

Therefore, be it resolved, by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring:

That we, the representatives of the people in the Legislature assembled do firmly and solemnly protest against the repeal of said clause in the Organic Act, and most respectfully ask that the Attorney General of the United States be directed by the President to commence suits in the United States courts for the recovery of all public lands in Hawaii illegally and unlawfully disposed of, and if necessary, that said suits be appealed to the Supreme Court of the United States in the interest of the people and for protection against the inordinate greed of corporations in trying to control, practically, all the public lands in this Territory.

That certified copies of these resolutions forthwith be transmitted to the President, the Attorney General, the Secretary of the Interior, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States, and to our Delegate to Congress from Hawaii.
