The Honolulu Diocesan Magazine, for the quarter ending June 15th, has been laid upon our table. The editorial department of the magazine shows marked ability. The present number contains a three-column article, which endeavors to explain the question of "What is Electro-Homeopathy?" The article in question seems to endorse the "new science," as it is entitled; but from a scientific standpoint it would, perhaps, be impossible to determine upon what grounds the alleged new science rests. It is proposed by the learned editor of the Diocesan Magazine that this latest scientific fad should be tried upon the lepers of Hawaii. There is no sane man who would object to a trial of any believed discovery for the cure of the dread malady, which stings the natives of Hawaii like a leaded lash; but when a cure is proclaimed for a tropical scourge, in the name of science, it should at least be put forth in scientific language.

The style and language of the alchemists of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries must be abandoned, if modern science is called upon as the patron of new remedies for human ills. The time has long since passed in the scientific and medical world, when the vendors of quack medicines can impose upon an intelligent community the following dictum said to contain "the secret of the new science:"

It is neither by trituration nor by liniments, that electro-homeopathic remedies are prepared, but solely by the effect of the fermentation of certain natural substances, chosen with great care, in order to bring about and attain, by their mutual efforts, acting reciprocally on one another, a definite and anticipated result.

The above paragraph is somewhat astounding, as a claim put forth by science, at the close of the nineteenth century; but it is not half so puzzling to average intelligence as the declaration that, "fermentation is a most potent means, not only for setting free and subtilizing all the principal fluids and virtues, contained in the different substances, but also of effecting an intimate union and perfect chemical combination, by aid of which each remedy attains its greatest strength."

If this is not the language of alchemy, what is it? It is certainly not

the language of either science or medicine.

As with all quack remedies, this latest fad asserts that the results have been "marvellous." Every vendor of patent medicines will furnish you with the same "marvellous" results.

It is somewhat surprising that the talented and able editor of the Diocesan Magazine should have fallen into his present belief before the bare theory of "Electro-Homeopathy" had received the sanction of the scientific world. We cannot, therefore, agree with our esteemed religious contemporary in hoping that the next Legislature will consider the theory of "Electro-Homeopathy" before it has been established as a scientific fact.

AN EXTREMIST CRITICIZED.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—The weak point in "Fair Play's" reasoning about "a new way to raise a revenue," in this morning's Advertiser, is the assumption that the use of spirituous liquors, wines, ales, etc., is itself a wrong, an evil, a sin. Murder, arson, etc., are crimes in their very nature, by the determination of universal natural law. This cannot be said of the use of spirituous liquors, etc. One intelligent man says that the use of any intoxicant, in any degree, is a sin. Another equally intelligent man contends that the moderate use of intoxicants is a benefit. Who is right, and who is wrong? First establish beyond controversy that the use of wines, ales, etc., is an absolute wrong before placing it in the same prohibitory category as murder, arson, etc. COMMON SENSE.

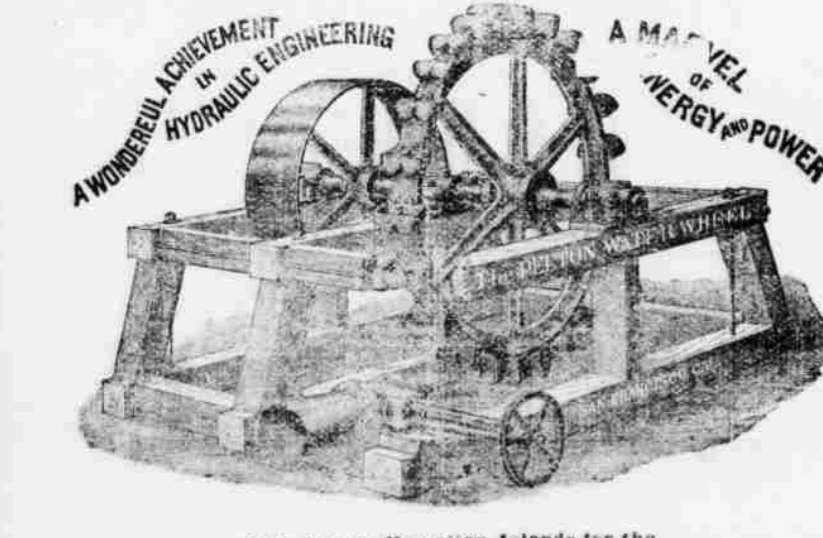
