Anyone who had to listen from eight o'clock last night till one o'clock this morning to the chanting and cheering of the Democrats at Ala Park, should have the sympathy of everyone. The whole of the men on the Democratic ticket spoke—and they all confined themselves to abuse of the Republican party, and the sugar industry of the country. Many Chinese and Japanese were present, but they soon tired of the profane exhibition of gross ignorance shown in the speeches of the candidates for office, and gradually the crowd moved off. EVERYONE SURE OF ELECTION

On the Eve of Balloting, Both Sides Express Great Confidence.

Many were the predictions made last night, when on the eve of the general election, the different parties got together and spoke what was really on their minds. The Republicans would not hear of defeat, and the Democrats felt the same way about things. A canvass of the principal haunts of the G. O. P. and the Democrats resulted in many different forecasts. While most of the Republican people who attempted to predict what was going to happen at the polls today, were strong in the opinion that it was going to be a landslide, pure and simple, there were more conservative men who contended themselves by saying that the Republicans would win easily enough, when it came to a show down. The Democratic supporters of McCandless would not hear of defeat, and Colonel McCarthy, who was seen at the Democrats' headquarters, was very sanguine about the chances of his party. The colonel willingly made the following statements: "I feel more hopeful for the success of the Democratic party than ever before. We have not much money to keep the fight up with, but we have willing volunteers who are fighting a game battle for the sake of the principle that the party stands for. Seventy-five per cent of the men who are working for the party are going to work without pay. We are getting better representation in that way than at any time when we are doing the things we're getting paid for their services." FORECASTS FROM OTHER ISLANDS

Kuhio Will Sweep Hawaii and the Garden Island--Democrats Not Sanguine.

(Wireless to The Advertiser.) HILA, November 7.—Manager Cyril Smith, of the Republican committee, announced the following as his forecast of the voting on the Big Island tomorrow. "Kuhio will carry the island by the biggest majority he has received since the election of nineteen hundred and four." "Kuhio is trying to make it unanimous for him as a result of the early and consistent work the Delegate has done for the home leaders there." "Notley has helped Kuhio, who will get the Home Rule support in Kona." "Republicans will elect two senators and Holstein will be returned to the house from Koloala." "W. H. Boers, the Republican candidate for county attorney, will head the county ticket, with S. K. Pau, the fusion candidate for sheriff, second." Democratic Forecast. Metairie, the manager of the Democratic campaign, who has just returned from a tour of the county, predicts that McCandless will have a vote on Hawaii from two to four hundred larger than he polled in 1908. He will carry Kanihi by fifty majority and will have a sweeping victory in North Kona and Kohala. The Democrats will elect both senators, five supervisors, and their fusion ticket. 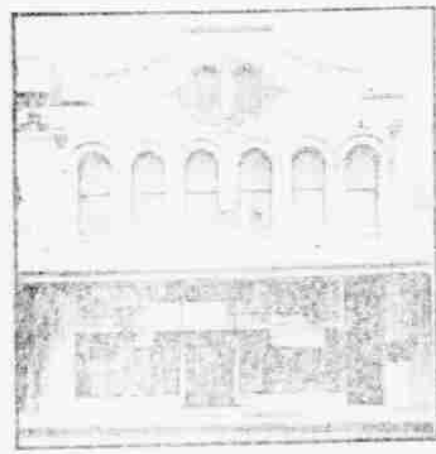
AOS VOTANTES PORTUGUEZES:

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WASHINGTON AGOG WITH INTEREST OVER THE BATTLE

No such Washington interest in politics has been seen for decades, not even in a presidential campaign. The "feel" of a Democratic victory quite generally has stirred the voters of both parties, whose names happen to be in the Federal City. Whether they want a Democratic victory or not does not affect their interest.

But After All —

And after all, there is general wonderment whether it will be a Democratic victory. The Republicans are remarkable for their ability to carry off a defeat. In the past few weeks, in close races, which have turned the scales, will it be so this year? If the campaign were not so far gone just now, there would be more hope of some good side turn to Republican advantage. A lot of Washington was seen and heard talking of a Democratic landslide. Those who put pen to paper to figure on the basis of past elections are more apt to say that a Democratic victory, if at all, will be by small margins.

A Light Vote.

In a majority of States, however, the registration has been light. It seems certain that a small vote will be cast. The party leaders have been arranging an issue about the significance of the registration, but, on the whole, it seems to be in favor of the majority's party. It would be no surprise if the voting totals this year were fifteen or twenty per cent less than at the presidential election two years ago. That recalls the small voting totals of the big three candidates. Even in 1902, when Cleveland was elected for a second term by a majority regarded as unbroken, although small in comparison with the McKinley, Roosevelt, and Taft majority, there was a very great number of Republican stay-at-homes. As a matter of fact these stay-at-homes made the Democratic majority possible in most States.

There is little or nothing to make the Democrats stay at home on Tuesday, November 8. For once in twenty years the party is well excited. In many States, like New York, Ohio, Indiana, New Jersey, and Connecticut, they have fairly strong candidates and are pretty well supplied with campaign funds. Then it has been in the air for six months that the Republicans were up for a hearing.

The last session was full of the usual wrangling, which has been recognized as a large body of thought. It is true that the Republicans have a good many of the popular vote, but their defeat is when they appear in a practical campaign. They have not been so good as they were in 1902. REPORTS MADE BY

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Taft Approves.

President Taft was asked to approve of the arrangements for the Colonel's Ohio appearance and did so gladly. It may have been an accident that the first announcement came from the President, as it would naturally have been announced in Ohio by the Republican state committee. But the state committee had previously been apprised and so there was no discord on that account.

Many interpretations are put upon Colonel Roosevelt's decision to speak in Ohio. Some think it is because Representative "Ned" Longworth, his son-in-law, has senatorial aspirations, against Senator Dick, who has an unofficial primary endorsement. The ex-President might be contributing to a favorable sentiment for the bestowal of a sign upon Mr. Longworth by getting an record for the state ticket, headed by ex-Lieut. Gov. Warren G. Harding.

But many have been quick to point out that in speaking before Ohio audiences Colonel Roosevelt puts himself on record by that act as favoring the Ohio Republican platform. That document did not embody the progressive doctrines that ex-Senator Garfield fought for. It endorsed the tariff law and it also contained a declaration for the reorganization of President Taft in 1912. This platform was especially objectionable to the Iowa insurgents, headed by Senator Cummins, whom Colonel Roosevelt is to address on the same trip that takes him on a speaking tour in Ohio. Therefore the queries as to whether the Colonel by this course is not likely to inflame the western insurgents, who were outspoken in denunciation of his course as the master of the Saratoga convention. They hailed the results of this convention as evidence of Colonel Roosevelt's dishonesty and covered the New York Republican platform with the charge of Democratic greed, so vigorously that they drove him to explanations.

Want Cummins' Help.

The Colonel is very anxious to get upon good terms with Senator Cummins, as is President Taft. Colonel Up Against It.

There seems to be little question that he realizes the serious and embarrassing position in which he now finds himself. If his party is overwhelmingly defeated in New York State, the responsibility will be placed on his door. And if Senator Beveridge should fail in his election in Indiana and there could be party success in other States where the Colonel has been campaigning, such a result would be a short of disasters to him politically.

It can be easily understood, therefore, how the ex-President will concentrate all his energies upon winning New York State. Those familiar with his political methods know that he will fight till the very last day and hour and that he will throw every possible resource into the balance.

None as the campaign progresses towards the end, something sensational is expected from him every day. Of course, he knows when he went into the New York campaign and made his great contest for the control of the Saratoga convention that the odds were heavily against him. He is quoted as having told a political friend that he believed there were only two Republicans, who could win the governorship of New York. One was himself and the other Governor Hughes, now associate justice of the Supreme Court. At about the same time he made it plain that he would not accept the gubernatorial nomination himself and it was also soon made clear that Governor Hughes would not stand for another term, although Colonel Roosevelt sought to persuade him to resign his place as associate justice.

Must Win New York.

But political history has been making rapidly since the Saratoga convention met and adjourned in late September. Colonel Roosevelt's troubles may or may not have multiplied in the meantime, but certainly the importance to him of winning the New York State campaign has increased. Success there is now almost absolutely essential to his continued political prestige and for the time being he would be very glad to have the friendship of President Taft's supporters. Whatever he has in his mind about a third term, he would be mighty glad to have that subject effaced from the minds of the voters for a couple of weeks.

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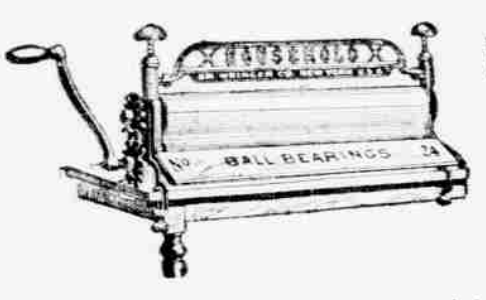
