FRIDAY : : : : March 19th. ABOUT PROGRESSIVE BORROWING AND TAXATION.

Colonel Sargood, the new Minister of Defense in the Victorian Government, stated at a public meeting in Melbourne recently that the Victorian loan of £1,500,000 had realized in London £700,000 (\$350,000) more than had been expected.

This statement presents but a very faint idea of the financial significance of this loan operation. The actual public debt of the Colony of Victoria, the smallest except Tasmania and Fiji in the Australasian Dominion, inclusive of this loan, is £29,831,992 (\$149,159,900); and the population, according to the "Victorian Year Book," will be a round million within the first half of 1886 at the present rate of increase.

At the close of 1884 Victoria had 1,663 miles of railway completed and thirty-nine miles in course of construction, all of which belonged to the Government. These cost £21,620,706, or within £8,211,286 of the aggregate public debt to-day.

National defense has been another heavy drain upon the resources of Victoria in common with other Australasian colonies, and the end of this outlay appears to be a very long way off indeed, judging from the attitude of the Imperial Government, as represented by Admiral Tryon, commanding the Australian Station, who has been instructed to concert defensive measures with the Colonial Governments.

fensive works naturally become a charge upon public loan, and swell the amount of unproductive expenditure.

Up to 1862 the revenue of Victoria was mainly derived from customs duties, licenses and land sales. A protective and borrowing policy being inaugurated about 1862, the sources of revenue were enlarged, and now consist of indirect and direct taxation, land and public works revenue, which latter include income from water works as well as railroads and telegraphs.

We mention these salient points in the public policy of one of the most progressive, and despite its public debt, one of the most solvent countries in the world. It is a policy that can best be described as one of "progressive borrowing." But for its huge public debt Victoria would be very far behind its present condition of material prosperity, despite its gold and wool export.

CHUN HOOK'S WORK.

A Large Quantity of Stolen Property Found Under a House in Nuuanu Valley.

For the past two days officer Mehrtens has been at work trying to find out where Chun Hook, the notorious Chinese burglar, had been staying from the time he escaped from prison till his capture the other night by officer Kauhane. It was pretty generally conceded that he was the party who had been entering Chinese stores by boring holes through the outside boards, and that he must have had a hiding-place for his stolen articles.

However, officer Mehrtens yesterday made a big discovery. Underneath an unoccupied and dilapidated old house in Nuuanu Valley above the new reservoir, and not far from the Nuuanu Dairy, he found the following articles: One blanket, satchel, four packages of tobacco, black felt hat, two chisels, one of them very much bent; one pair cotton drawers, pair white socks, pair black cloth pants, two brown jumpers, several packages of cigarette paper, blue denim shirt, three pistols, two boxes of cartridges, one knife (rather rusty), two three-cornered files with handles, cigarettes, card matches, a number of Manila cigars, tobacco in a cloth bag, a candle and twenty-five door keys of various sizes.

Officer Mehrtens, assisted by Turnkey Burns, brought the articles down to the Station House, where they now are. Lo Sam Sing, who keeps a store on Nuuanu street, nearly opposite the White House, was sent for, and he identified a good many of the articles, particularly the clothing, as his property.

It may be that Chun Hook had other hiding places, and that more stolen property may yet be found.

During the past three weeks the Waimanalo Sugar Plantation has taken 303 tons of sugar from 44 acres of cane. The Hon. J. A. Cummins lost a gold watch on it, as he made a bet with his planter that it would not yield 300 tons. They expect to get 4,000 tons of sugar this year.

The appointment of Mr. Graham, son-in-law of Lord Crabrook, to the post of Clerk of Parliaments, over the head of Sir Erskine May, has excited much angry comment in England. Sir Erskine May is the acknowledged authority on Parliamentary forms and proceedings.

The British Imperial Government has agreed to a scheme of redistribution of the postages between Great Britain and the Australian colonies, and to the proposal to call for tenders for the carriage of mail matter on the terms and in the manner set forth in the agreement lately entered into between New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia. This has reference to the Eastern postal route, via the Suez canal.

Highwaymen on the Waikiki Road.

Last evening, shortly after half-past 10 o'clock, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Macfarlane were driving home from the Opera House, and when near the Sunny South, on the Waikiki road, they noticed a cloud of dust and a commotion ahead of them, as if some trouble was occurring. Mrs. Macfarlane got very nervous and her husband drove a little faster. They had only gone a short distance when they passed two suspicious-looking white men on horseback. This caused Mr. Macfarlane to drive still faster. In a few moments he came up with a soldier riding in a brake. He was dressed in the Prince's Own uniform, and was in a terribly excited condition. He stated to Mr. Macfarlane that as he was coming along he was shot at from a Chinese house near Marshallfield. The ball hit the back of the brake, so that he had a very narrow escape. He turned down the lane leading to Moehonua's place. Deputy Marshal Dayton was communicated with about half-past 11 o'clock, and will investigate the matter.

Civil Court.

BEFORE POLICE JUSTICE BICKERTON. THURSDAY, March 18th. Wilder Steamship Company vs. Kealakai, deserting contract service. Ordered to return and pay costs.

Three suits for nonpayment of water rates were discontinued, and one was settled out of Court.

C. T. Gulick, Minister of the Interior, vs. Paneohau, assumpsit for \$57.50 for water rates. Judgment for plaintiff for \$40.82, including costs.

Geo. H. Lane, Tax Collector, vs. Kamala, assumpsit for \$5 taxes, with 10 per cent added. Judgment for plaintiff for \$8.50, including costs.

Short Postage.

There are quite a number of letters at the Post Office for the Australian Colonies which have not sufficient postage on them. Of course they will be forwarded to their destination, but double postage will be charged at the other end. The letter postage to Australia or New Zealand is twelve cents, and two cents for each newspaper.

The goldsmith having smelted his bench scrapings, sweepings, etc., and formed a "button" of them may roughly estimate the percentage of the precious metals he has collected in this way: A certain quantity of the button is taken and drawn out into a wire which must be of exactly the same length as a wire of fine silver drawn through the same hole. Silver being nearly one-third lighter than gold, it follows that the wire of fine silver must be lighter than the one which was made from the button specimen, and the increase of weight of the wire under test corresponds to the gold contained in it.

HOW COSTLY FABRICS ARE CLEANED

Treatment of Fine Laces—Cleaning Velvet—Renewing Actresses' Costumes.

A careless waiter or an accident at the dinner table may cause the apparent ruin of laces, silks, or velvets worth large sums of money. If the lady tries to clean them herself she makes matters worse and makes it impossible for the professional cleaners to do anything with them afterward.

"The treatment of fine laces," said a cleaner, "is an extensive and troublesome process. A thick blanket of soft soap is sewed around a bottle, and on this the lace is pinned. It is quite impossible to rub lace, as it would tear it to pieces. The bottle is then placed in a bath of soapy warm water. After soaking for twenty minutes it is boiled for some time and then allowed to cool. It is dipped in several baths of clear water until all the soap seems to be removed. The lace is then removed from the bottle, and after part of the water is driven out by a gentle pressure, it is hung up to dry.

"After a time it is laid on a soft cloth to dry still more. When still slightly damp it is placed on a hair cushion covered with flannel, and is fastened there with lace pins. This is a work of skill and patience. A velvet is cleaned by the same process, but with a weak solution of gum arabic and when dry again, it is almost as good as new.

"The method of cleansing velvet is a secret; it can be greatly freshened by steaming it over boiling water, care being taken to expose the wrong side of the velvet to the steam, but this is useful only where the damage is not very great. I can tell you only that the process is a dry one, and chalk is used in it. Velvets that have been wet is hard to treat, but we have been able to do wonders with it.

CHARACTERISTICS OF CRIMINALS.

Natural Peculiarities of European Murderers and Thieves.

Recently in France considerable attention has been paid to an examination of the criminal class with reference to its physical and associated characteristics. M. Lacassagne has drawn attention to the frequency of tattooing among criminals and the violent nature of the scenes depicted by them in this voluntary mutilation. The same writer has pointed out that criminals, as a class, are tall. Thus in 800 subjects examined by him 623 were taller by six centimeters than the average, and some exceeded the normal height by ten and twenty centimeters.

These observations were corroborated by M. Ferri, in Italy. In 1882 Dr. Manouvrier remarked that among criminals, notoriously with murderers, the jaw is more developed than is usual; and that while the craniomandibular index normally varies between 12.8 and 13, among the convicts it attains the remarkable number of 14.7. M. Hager and Dallemagne, in a comparative study of the skulls of assassins and ordinary persons, have confirmed the statement that the forward projection of the skull is greater among the former. They have also shown that criminals have a larger facial index and a smaller vertical index than the peaceable citizens, but no difference is observed in the cephalic index.

M. Hager has affirmed the larger capacity of the criminal skull over that of the usual type, the relative proportions being as 1,588 is to 1,490. This, however, has been contradicted by a number of observers who claim the reverse, but it is suggested that it may be explained by supposing that the former examined the crania of murderers only, while in the latter studies those of all classes were included, among which the incendiaries are said to have small heads. Mr. Fleesch has said that affections of the heart exist among criminals to the extent of 30 per cent.; the persistence of Botal's orifice, 10 per cent.; contraction of the vascular system, 5.5 per cent. But his researches upon cerebral lesions are much more important.

He has demonstrated a certain atavism in the cerebral convulsions, already indicated by Benedict, as, for instance, the medium lobe of the brain being shaped as among the mammals, the separation of the median fissure of Sylvius, the formation of an operculum of the occipital lobe. CHARACTERISTICS OF CRIMINALS.

Natural Peculiarities of European Murderers and Thieves.

Recently in France considerable attention has been paid to an examination of the criminal class with reference to its physical and associated characteristics. M. Lacassagne has drawn attention to the frequency of tattooing among criminals and the violent nature of the scenes depicted by them in this voluntary mutilation. The same writer has pointed out that criminals, as a class, are tall. Thus in 800 subjects examined by him 623 were taller by six centimeters than the average, and some exceeded the normal height by ten and twenty centimeters.

These observations were corroborated by M. Ferri, in Italy. In 1882 Dr. Manouvrier remarked that among criminals, notoriously with murderers, the jaw is more developed than is usual; and that while the craniomandibular index normally varies between 12.8 and 13, among the convicts it attains the remarkable number of 14.7. M. Hager and Dallemagne, in a comparative study of the skulls of assassins and ordinary persons, have confirmed the statement that the forward projection of the skull is greater among the former. They have also shown that criminals have a larger facial index and a smaller vertical index than the peaceable citizens, but no difference is observed in the cephalic index.

M. Hager has affirmed the larger capacity of the criminal skull over that of the usual type, the relative proportions being as 1,588 is to 1,490. This, however, has been contradicted by a number of observers who claim the reverse, but it is suggested that it may be explained by supposing that the former examined the crania of murderers only, while in the latter studies those of all classes were included, among which the incendiaries are said to have small heads. Mr. Fleesch has said that affections of the heart exist among criminals to the extent of 30 per cent.; the persistence of Botal's orifice, 10 per cent.; contraction of the vascular system, 5.5 per cent. But his researches upon cerebral lesions are much more important.

He has demonstrated a certain atavism in the cerebral convulsions, already indicated by Benedict, as, for instance, the medium lobe of the brain being shaped as among the mammals, the separation of the median fissure of Sylvius, the formation of an operculum of the occipital lobe.
