EMPLOYERS AND EMPLOYEES.

Complaints are frequently heard of late among housekeepers and others who employ servants, about the very independent ways of the average "help" in this country. It is an old story in older countries than this. *Punch* has celebrated "servant galism," in England, and in American cities the independent airs and insolence of domestics is proverbial. Here, however, it is comparatively a new experience. Servants generally demand and receive much higher wages to-day than was paid in former years, and are in many ways the masters of the situation; but the most serious annoyance experienced by employers is the unreliability of the employees. The lady of the house, for instance, has no guarantee over night that her cook will be on hand to get breakfast in the morning, for if these autocrats of the kitchen take the notion they "stand not on the order of their going, but go at once," without deigning to give notice. And so with some other classes of employees, who, getting their week's wages at 4 o'clock on Saturday, never show their faces again. This may, and not infrequently does seriously disarrange the employer's business plans, and subjects him to loss. There ought to be a remedy for this state of things, and the State should provide one. By law, a tenant is allowed ten days notice before being ejected from his hired premises. There should be a statutory regulation for the relations between employers and employees, so that neither the one can be summarily deserted, nor the other discharged without a reasonable previous notice.

New Stock.—By the Caibarien yesterday, were received some choice stock in the way of Cows and Bulls. Those in want of a good milking cow for Family or Dairy purposes or a good bull for breeding, would do well to call and examine this new importation. They can be seen at Dowsett's Dray Yard, on Queen street.

Mr. G. D. Froeth's resignation of the office of Superintendent of Water Works does not take effect until the 1st of July next.

His Ex. W. N. Armstrong received a cablegram by the mail yesterday, from Messrs. Hoffnung & Co. It is dated London, April 27th, and says: "The Monarch sailed from the Azores on the 11th April, with 203 men, 198 women, and 84 minors, all under contract. One or two steamers will follow soon. Send further orders promptly, during present favorable disposition."

The schooner Cassie Hayward sailed for San Francisco yesterday, with 312 tons of sugar, and 2 passengers.

The brigantine W. G. Irwin sails for San Francisco to-morrow, with a full cargo, and passenger list.

The City of Sydney arrived yesterday afternoon from San Francisco, which port she left on the 8th inst. at 4:26 P.M., arrived off this port at 2:48 P.M. She brought 37 cabin and 21 steerage passengers, and 107 tons of freight for this port. May 11th, at 8 A.M., she spoke the bark Inglewood, 120 days out from Liverpool, bound to San Francisco.

LEGISLATIVE.

Mr. Pilipo, from the select committee to examine into the question of the re-leasing of the Hawaiian Hotel, asked and was granted further time

A bill to increase the pay of Representatives to \$500 per session was passed to be engrossed.

The Post-master General read first time a bill to authorize the establishment of the system of postal money orders, which was ordered to be printed.

Mr. Kamakele read a bill to reduce the poll tax to 75 cents.

Mr. Pilipo asked that an item of \$5000 be inserted in the appropriation bill for an artesian well in North Kona, Hawaii.

The bill to abolish passports was referred to a select Committee, consisting of Messrs. Smith, Wilder, Aiwohi, Aholo and Pahia.

The bill to increase the jurisdiction of District Justices (assault with dangerous weapons) was passed finally.

A bill to give to constables one-half the fine in certain cases, was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

The resolution of inquiry as to the appropriation of last session of \$30,000 for the Pali road, came up. The Minister of the Interior stated that when he took office, nothing had been done on the road, and that Mr. Carter had informed him the amount was insufficient. The Minister had however sent a competent person to make a survey of the road, which had been completed and was now in his office. A road can be built there, according to the plan, whereby a loaded wagon can easily be drawn up the pali. It would cost from \$40,000 to \$45,000, and as soon as the appropriation is made, work will be commenced.

A running comment here followed by several representatives, on the system of appropriating money by the Legislature for specific objects, and then to be diverted to other uses by Ministers, and some pretty sharp things were said.

The Minister of Foreign Affairs said he regretted that Mr. Carter was not here to answer for himself in this matter of the Pali road. But he believe there had been no intention on the part of that gentleman to disregard the wishes of the Assembly. Soon after the close of the last session Mr. Carter had made enquiries and was satisfied that the appropriation was insufficient; and what would have been the use of beginning the work and then stopping for lack of means to finish it. Besides, at the time mentioned the small-pox epidemic, with its heavy expenses, was upon us.

Without disposing of the subject, the House adjourned.

Latest Foreign News.

The following are from late papers received by the mail steamer yesterday evening:

Washington, May 2—The Chinese bill, with the Senate's amendments, was passed by the House. It is a ten-year taboo.

Ralph Waldo Emerson is dead. Lord Frederick Cavendish, the new Chief Secretary for Ireland, and Thomas H. Burke, Under Secretary, were stabbed to death in Phoenix Park, Dublin, on Saturday evening, May 6th. No clue to the assassins, said to have been four in number. The crime is supposed to have been due to fanaticism.

The bodies of Capt. De Long and his boat's crew have been found. They evidently died of starvation, but no particulars have been received.

The President had stated his intention to sign the new Chinese Bill on Monday, May 9th.

MR. ELI JOHNSON.—This celebrated temperance lecturer arrived by the City of Sydney. It is arranged that he is, at present, to deliver three lectures only in Honolulu, two in English and one in Hawaiian. His first lecture will be given to-night in Fort Street Church. His theme will be "What they Drink and how they make it." Of this lecture Gov. St. John, of Kansas, says: "It is one of the most powerful lectures I ever listened to, and one that should be heard by every citizen in the land." Philip Phillips, the noted singer, says: "Mr. Johnson is a most effective speaker. I have heard him lecture with thrilling effect in the large halls of London." Mr. Johnson will also lecture again in Fort Street Church on Friday evening, and to the natives Sunday evening in Kawaiahao church. Mr. Hallenbeck also arrived by the City of Sydney, and will begin his evangelistic word in Fort Street Church Sunday evening.

There will be a meeting of the British Benevolent Association this evening at 7½ o'clock, to hear the report of the Committee on the proposed ball on the Anniversary of the Queen's birthday.

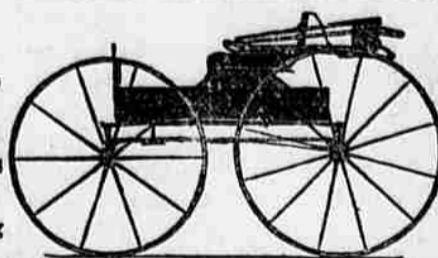

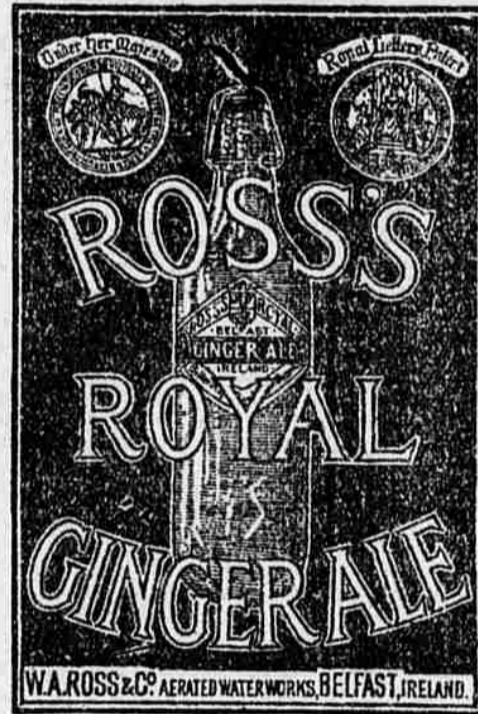
