It looks as if the special committee to which the Married Women's Property Act was referred, was appointed with the particular object of killing the Bill.

The Bill which taxes practitioners in the Supreme Court a license fee of \$50.00 and in the Inferior Courts \$25.00, proceeds to be applied for the benefit of the Law Library, passed its second reading yesterday, after an animated debate.

The Law Library is very deficient in some very important respects, and is languishing by reason of a lack of income. The appropriation which it has hitherto received, \$1000 for the biennial period, has been entirely inadequate to the requirements of the case.

THE public has already been informed that Mr. Trainor, the man who fell from the steamer Australia to the dock, afterwards died at the hospital. The full history of the affair, however, has not been published. It is this:

The man fell from the steamer just before twelve. Dr. Rodgers saw him as he lay on the wharf, and recommended that he be taken to the station house, and then, if he should prove to be seriously hurt, removed to the hospital. He was taken to the police station in a cart. At that time, one of the officers says, he smelt strongly of liquor, and possibly he was supposed to be drunk.

Now, we do not propose to comment on all this at present. We content ourselves with a statement of the bare facts. Perhaps it may turn out that this is one of those cases where no one is to blame. Perhaps it was nobody's business to see that this man was not left to die, lying on a stretcher in the corridors of the police station.

We do not wish to be guilty of the common fallacy of attributing everything good or evil in the country, to some political cause, but in the case of the Postal Savings Bank the inference that these figures show an increased general confidence in the Government, presumably as to its stability and good faith, is too obvious to be resisted.

At the semi-annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Queen's Hospital the usual routine business was disposed of. The Treasurer's report will be published hereafter. The Physician's report reads as follows:

HONOLULU, May 31, 1888. To the Trustees of the Queen's Hospital—Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending May 31, 1888: The total number of patients at present in the Hospital is 40, viz.: 24 Hawaiians (16 males and 8 females), 3 Chinese, 1 Japanese and 12 of other nationalities; 14 paying. The number of admissions during the quarter was 85, viz.: 25 Hawaiians (19 males and 6 females), 15 Chinese, 2 Japanese and 43 of other nationalities. Discharged 71, viz.: 21 Hawaiians (14 males and 7 females), 6 Chinese, 2 Japanese and 42 of other nationalities.

The causes of death were as follows: Beriberi 1, carcinoma 1, consumption 6, disease of brain 1, disease of heart 1, fever 2, injury 1, peritonitis 1, typhoid fever 1. The highest number of indoor patients was 49, lowest 34, daily average 43. Number of prescriptions 1,257. Calls at the dispensary 158.

The number of patients treated in the hospital was as follows: March 67, April 75, May 72. Respectfully submitted, ROBERT MCKIBBIN. A committee consisting of Messrs. Cartwright, Laukea and Mackintosh were appointed to investigate and report upon the causes which account for the comparatively small number of native patients at the hospital.

ROCHESTER (N. Y.), May 20th.—What appeared at first to be an aurora was noticed in the northwest sky about 9 o'clock this evening. The supposed aurora increased in length and brilliancy and was finally discovered to be the tail of a large comet. The direction was downward of the north. The tail was very broad at first, but gradually narrowed, while the light from it increased. Astronomers here cannot identify the comet.—[Call.

THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

Tenth Day. FRIDAY, June 8th.

The House met at 10 o'clock, the President, Hon. S. G. Wilder, in the chair. Minutes of eighth day's session were read by the secretary and interpreter, and confirmed.

Rep. Kalauka presented a petition from twenty-seven residents of Honolulu praying (1) that the House look into the matter of private ways, (2) that the law relating to private ways be amended, (3) that the law state how wide private ways should be.

Rep. Brown moved the petition be laid on the table to be considered with the bill given notice of by Noble Castle on the same subject. Carried.

Rep. F. Brown reported three bills printed. NOTICE OF NEW BILL. Noble Waterhouse gave notice of: An Act to prevent the issue of commercial paper as a circulating medium.

Noble Baldwin read, a first time: An Act to amend Section 20 of an Act entitled An Act to repeal Chapter X of the Civil Code, and to regulate the Bureau of Public Instruction, approved January 10, 1885.

Rep. Kamaouha asked the Minister of Finance: 1. If it is true that \$22,858 48 had been taken from the Treasury within the last two years ending March 31, 1888, to pay the expenses for the steam tug, and if \$5,269 48 is still due by the Government for such service? 2. What caused the expenditure of \$17,589 within the last three months ending March 31, 1888, for this service?

Attorneys and Counsellors—Second reading of an Act relating to attorneys and counsellors at law and to practitioners in the inferior Courts of the Kingdom. Considered section by section. The third section, providing that attorneys and counsellors at law pay certificate fees of \$50 and practitioners in the inferior Courts \$25 a year, brought on a long and spirited debate, in which Messrs. Castle, Thurston, Kalauka, F. Brown, Hitchcock, Kamaouha, Smith, Kaubi, Green, Young, Waterhouse and Widemann took part. Messrs. Kalauka, Kaubi and Kamaouha claimed that the payment of the fees would bear unjustly on native practitioners. The application of the proposed fees for the purpose of purchasing books for the law library, specified in another section of the bill, Rep. Kaubi claimed, would be no advantage to himself and other Hawaiian lawyers who are not versed in the English language.

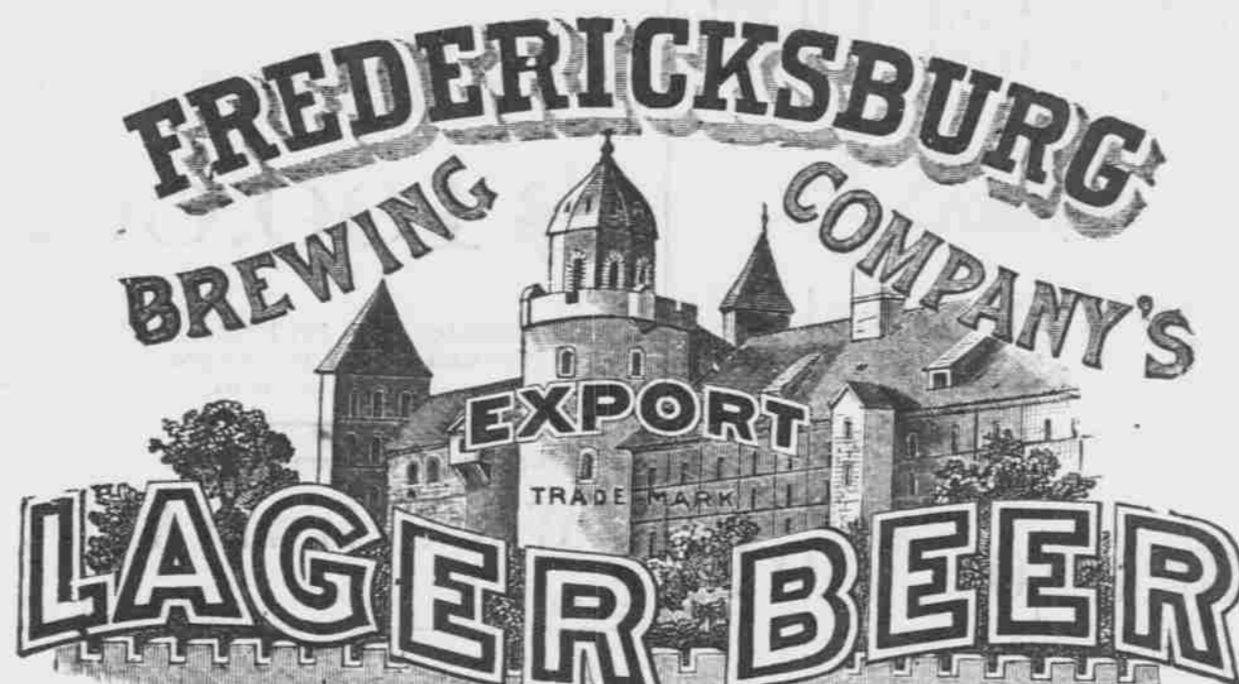

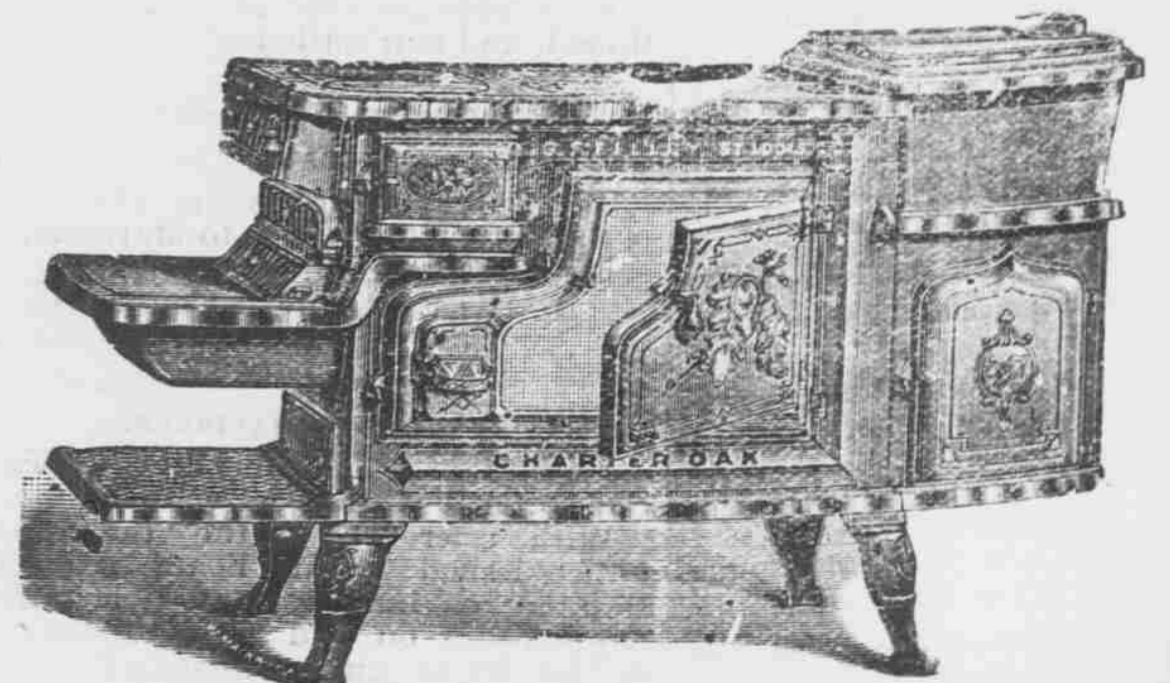
