AMERICAN LETTER.
 SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 24, 1891.
 POLITICAL.
 In an interview the other day Governor Glick of Kansas said that Congress would pass a free coinage bill which would be vetoed by the President, and a compromise would then be made for the free coinage of American silver, that the tariff and not free coinage would be the question upon which the next national campaign would be fought. Mr. Glick believes that Cleveland will be the Democratic nominee for President and that he will not only carry the States he did in 1888, but some of the Western States heretofore considered Republican.
 The Springfield (Mass.) Republican believes that Major McKinley is the chief rival of President Harrison for the Republican Presidential nomination.
 The New York World in an editorial says: "Both honest politics and common sense indicate the necessity of waiving the claims of Cleveland, the claims of Hill, the claims of all the other moss-covered candidates and concentrating every energy on the election of a new man from the broad-shouldered and level-headed and wide-awake west. In saying this we reflect the opinion of a growing majority of the people. It has always been our ambition to hold the confidence of the great number. We have a right, therefore, to speak with some authority when we say that the popular demand made on the Democratic party is that it shall choose a candidate free from entangling alliance with any ambitious local organization, one who will give the country a chance to vote on national issues, pure and simple, without any complication that must be explained or any associations which must be now ended."
 Advices from Berlin on the 18th say that an interesting feature of the Reichstag is a new party known as the Colonial party. The members belong to and vote with their respective parties on all other subjects, but in regard to the interest of the colonies they are united.
 News has been received from Ottawa, Ont., stating that either the Emperor of Germany or the President of the Swiss republic will be asked by the British Government to represent Great Britain in the Arbitration Committee to be appointed to settle the Behring Sea question.
 A special from Madrid on the 21st says: Every member of Spain's Cabinet has resigned in view of the impending crisis. The Queen Regent has instructed Senor Del Castillo to form a new Cabinet. The resignation of the Cabinet was precipitated by Senor Silva, who is the Minister of the Interior. At a meeting of the Cabinet last Saturday he announced his desire to resign, saying he did not wish to retain his portfolio, since he had learned that the politicians of Spain were in accord with the Conservative program. Premier Castillo tried to dissuade him from the step he contemplated, but without avail. The Minister of Justice, Senor Vallayerdo, thought that the entire Cabinet should resign inasmuch as a political crisis existed. They agreed and turned their resignation over to the Premier who in turn presented them to the Queen. After some consultation with the Premier, the Queen decided to accept them.
 News from Lisbon on the 16th says that the Portuguese Republicans were badly defeated in the elections of the 15th.
 The result of the election to fill the vacancy in the House of Commons from the city of Cork, created by the death of Charles Stewart Parnell, is announced as follows: Martin Flavin (McCarthyite) 3669; John Redmond (Parnellite), 2157; Captain Sarsfield (Conservative), 1161.
 TROUBLE IN BRAZIL.
 Dom Pedro, ex-Emperor of Brazil, may yet reign among his chosen people. Recent advices state that it is not unlikely that he may be called again to the throne before the present disturbance comes to an end.
 Senor Medonca, Brazilian Minister at Washington, received the following from the Brazilian Minister of Foreign Affairs at Rio Janeiro, on the 21st: "Telegrams daily received confirm the reports of complete tranquility in all the States except Rio Grande, where the constitutional authorities were deposed and a provisional Junta proclaimed, presided over by Dr. Brazil, who declares himself hostile to the Federal Government. The Government is taking measures to suppress the anarchical movement. The blockade of the port of Rio Grande will be decreed. The Government proceeds with all moderation."
 The Government has issued orders for an additional force of troops to proceed at once to Desterro, the capital of Santa Catharina. At Santa Paula a popular outbreak is momentarily expected. It is stated on good authority that a large force of troops

Daily Bulletin

Pledged to neither Sect nor Party, But established for the benefit of all. TUESDAY, DEC. 1, 1891.

The San Francisco Chronicle of November 23 reports that, in addition to the Charleston, now about due here, the cruiser Battinore will be despatched to Honolulu immediately after her overhauling at Mare Island. The report goes on to say that it is considered important for the interests of the United States to have a good display of force in Honolulu harbor during the coming elections, and that the presence of Admiral Brown, who is popular with the Hawaiian Government, will aid materially in strengthening United States chances for securing coaling station privileges. "With the Pensacola already there," the Chronicle says, "Admiral Brown will have three vessels to give support to the negotiations he will be authorized to conduct in connection with coaling stations." Probably some of this reporter's talk is mere water front gossip. "Negotiations" is a queer name for what three warships are expected to support, on behalf of a great nation, against any possible objections on the part of a powerless and friendly little country. Three warships to superintend the elections of an independent neighbor—this is a strange commentary on President Harrison's remark, in receiving the Chilean Minister the other day, that "the policy of the United States had always been to refrain from meddling with the national affairs of neighboring nations." Another reason for regarding the Chronicle's explanation of the massing of warships at Honolulu as largely imaginative is that the United States maintains a Minister Plenipotentiary here to conduct all diplomatic business with this Government, and the commissioning of a naval commander, backed by a powerful squadron, to do the Minister's work, would be a violation of every principle of friendship and magnanimity with which we have been crediting the United States in her relations to the Hawaiian Kingdom.

A RECEPTION.

The commander and officers of H. B. M. S. Garnet paid an official visit to Her Majesty the Queen this morning. They were presented by Major J. H. Wodehouse, British Commissioner. Her Majesty was attended by Major J. W. Robertson, Chamberlain, His Ex. S. Parker, Minister of Foreign Affairs, Governor A. S. Cleghorn and staff, and ladies-in-waiting Mrs. Chas. Wilson, Mrs. Chas. Clark and Mrs. C. A. Brown. The Household Guards, as guard of honor, were stationed in front of the Palace and received the gentlemen with "present arms." The Royal Hawaiian band was also in attendance.

Governor A. S. Cleghorn, accompanied by Major S. Nowlin, paid an official visit to H. B. M. S. Garnet this morning.

His Excellency C. N. Spencer, accompanied by Rev. Bishop Willis will shortly pay a visit to the Leper Settlement, Molokai.

Two Government land sales of land on Hilo, Hawaii, and at Kula, Maui, will take place to-morrow at noon at the front entrance of Ali'oli Hale.

H. B. M. S. WARSPITE, the largest warship in the Pacific, arrived at Santa Barbara, Cal., Nov. 16, en route from Esquimalt to South American waters.

A DESPATCH from London dated Nov. 17, says: The 4-masted schooner E. K. Wood from Newcastle, N. S. W., for Honolulu, put into Sydney leaking.

The Yacht Casco, in which Robert Louis Stevenson visited these islands, has been sold to Victoria parties for \$5000.

At the reception to the officers of H. B. M. S. Garnet this morning an accident happened to the rig in which the officers were being driven away, which compelled them to foot it to the landing.

Mr. O. C. Swain, delivery clerk at the Post office, surprised his most intimate friends by returning with a bride on the Australia this morning. Congratulations.

Mr. Chas. Dudoit, heading a company of four gentlemen, has purchased the steamer Waimanalo. The company has secured the contract for one year for carrying mail (post) to the Leper Settlement at Molokai.

The tug-of-war tournament to take place on December 21st promises to be a grand success. Additional entries have been made with Mr. C. J. McCarthy, C. W. Ziegler has entered Germany; J. Camara, Portugal, and W. F. Love, Hawaii.

A PASSENGER named Mrs. Buckholz from Honolulu on the German bark H. Backfeld died on the vessel while she was lying in port at San Francisco. The lady had suffered somewhat during the passage and was two weak on arrival to remove from the vessel.

A MEETING of the Y. M. C. A. was held yesterday evening to consider the feasibility of a combination being formed with the Healanu boat club, with the object of establishing an athletic association. The meeting reached no conclusive end, and it was decided by the association to appoint a committee to investigate a proposed amalgamation with the Honolulu Athletic Association.

A NATIVE named Barko died Sunday night and was buried yesterday. He had been a driver for Lewis & Co. for twelve years, and that firm buried him. Barko was on board the steamer Idaho, plying between here and San Francisco, in 1868 as a servant to the late Allen Judd, who was freight clerk. There were on the same steamer at that time Messrs. Harry Webb, J. T. Downey and R. French now living ashore in Honolulu.

Mr. T. S. Douglas has received a letter from Marion D. Egbert, an attorney of South Bend, Wash., formally announcing the death of Capt. Cuthell, in the wreck of the ship Strathblane. Mr. Egbert having found among the lamented captain's effects a friendly letter from Mr. Douglas. An item not heretofore published here is that Capt. Cuthell sacrificed his life to save another. He gave his life-preserver away to the passenger Lewis, who was, however, killed by being battered about by the waves.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—"His conduct does not necessarily imply collusion with villainy."

"Malfeasance in office has not been directly proved against him."

"We do not affirm that all his acts may not be susceptible of an honorable interpretation."—P. C. A., Monday, Nov. 30.

The above quotations from its editorial columns of to-day are the proofs (?) upon which the Advertiser bases its conclusion that "the Marshal is not fit to occupy the position of great trust and responsibility which he now holds and he should be removed at once."

In other words they start in with direct accusations and wind up by saying that they have assumed these things. In another part of the same editorial they state: "There are men who stand so high in the community, whose reputation for probity and rectitude is such that they are above reproach, and can take with impunity such a course which would subject others to the greatest suspicion."

In other words, the actions were not such as to cause suspicion in themselves, or if performed say by the nominee of the Advertiser, but only cause suspicion in the minds of the Advertiser people when done by the present Marshal who is not their choice for office.

"He does not possess, for he has not earned, the confidence of the community. If he ever was in the enjoyment of that confidence it was by a precarious tenure."

The above quotation is self-contradictory and, moreover, untrue. Nine years of service as Superintendent of Water Works, under every extreme of ministerial and partisan Government, showed his capabilities in that respect, and the confidence bestowed in him by the Fire Department in electing him thrice successively as Chief Engineer in the teeth of the strongest and most bitter opposition ever known, show in what esteem and confidence the community of all shades and sects of party and party government have held him.

And now the Advertiser, unmindful of its previous stand on questions of public importance leaves the legal and constitutional modes, as well as reason and logic, and thinking only of the way to get its nominee in, calls for a mass meeting, at which it could get off another of its hysterical and illogical screams, which put one in mind of the old rhyme: "I do not like thee, Dr. Fell. has been ordered to proceed there with all possible despatch.
 British merchants are receiving many Brazilian orders for machinery, apparatus, etc., for developing Brazilian industries, but they decline to fill them at present, fearing a further fall in the rate of exchange, although the Brazilians offer to deposit with the Bank of England an ample amount of paper currency as security.

PACIFIC COAST EVENTS.

San Francisco had a \$100,000 fire on November 16th, which destroyed Spaulding's carpet establishment on Tehama street, three smaller shops and two dwelling houses on Fifth and Howard had a narrow escape. There was a regular stampede in the vicinity when it was rumored that it had caught. The losers by the fire were partially insured.

Samuel is queen of the turf and Palo Alto is King. Marvin drove the latter at Stockton on November 17th, breaking the world's stallion record, and winning for the Palo Alto stables all the records of the world. He made the mile without a slip in 2:08 1/2, but broke after he passed the finish. Stanford may well feel proud of his stables.

District Attorney Barnes has requested Governor Markham to demand from the Canadian authorities the surrender of Chris Buckley. There seems to be a question whether Buckley's case is covered by the extradition treaty and Governor Markham is considering the case.

The Sacramento Grand Jury is investigating the late Legislative waste-basket scandals. Witnesses from various portions of the State are in attendance.

The work of the San Francisco Grand Jury is like the mills of the gods, they grind slowly but they grind exceeding sure. The boodlers are bringing great pressure to bear against every effort to uncover their nefarious transactions.

The National Bank which failed in San Diego recently will re-open in thirty days.

There is an intense rivalry among the delegates who are now in convention at Washington for the purpose of determining on a site for the Republican National Convention. Up to date San Francisco's chances for getting the convention seem very bright. The vote of twenty-five States is necessary to decide the question.

The cruiser San Francisco arrived from Chile last Thursday night and the following day left for Vallejo where she exchanged salutes with the navy yard battery. She was at once placed on the blocks and work commenced to get her ready for another voyage. An abundance of electric lights enables the men to work overtime and she will get away in about eight days. No work will be done on Sundays. Admiral Brown and the officers are loud in their praises of the big cruiser and commend the construction and equipment in the highest terms.

News of the movements of three cruisers was received on the 20th. The Newark is at Boston where she is taking in stores and ammunition, preparatory to sailing for the South Atlantic States. The Boston had arrived at Bahia, Brazil, en route to the Pacific Station, and the Yantic was making her way under sail to the Cape Verde Islands on the 20th.

MORE RIOTS IN CHINA.
 A correspondent from Shanghai on the 16th inst. says: "The capture of Tehwai, near Foo Choo, Tuesday, by 15,000 rebels, was a well organized affair, the rebels being armed with repeaters, and led by capable men. The outbreak was directed mainly against the authorities, though anti-foreign cries were heard. The officials seem to be powerless and European residents are apprehensive of a spread of the revolt. The British Consul believes the recent quietude was only temporary, spring and summer being a favorable period for outrages in China. Light draft gunboats are absolute necessities to protect Europeans in the interior and at the treaty ports, where massacre will inevitably follow any foreign demonstrations, unless special preventive measures are adopted. The real culprits are still free, being protected against arrest by exalted officials. Agents of the Pekin treasury have paid the indemnities agreed upon, £2000 to the sufferers at Huchu, and £4000 to the families of Europeans killed at Husseh. American Missionary Dart believes that trouble will be renewed in the spring."

GENERAL INTEREST.
 The new reciprocity treaty with Germany will probably be announced at the coming meeting of the German reichstag. The details have been perfected and the treaty has been made, but the German minister requested the privilege of making the first formal announcement in Germany.

Canadians are pouring into the United States. On one train, the other day, there were 530, who intend to make their homes hereafter in the United States.

Hiram Chase, a full-blooded Indian of the Omaha tribe, has been admitted to practice in the federal court. He was educated at the Indian schools in the East and graduated last year from the law school of the University of Pennsylvania. Mr. Chase is the first Indian ever admitted to the practice of the law in Nebraska.

The International Peace Congress has approved the proposition that the

lithium and straits be made neutral, as the late advices from Rome. The proposition to hold an international arbitration council in Chicago was postponed. The next Congress will be held at Bern.

A despatch from India states that dynamite was exploded on the hills of Madras at the altitude of 500 feet for the purpose of producing rain, and the explosions produced brisk showers over an area of four or five miles square.

The Richmond, Va., Dispatch says in a recent editorial: The Southern States ought to vote a pension to Mrs. Jefferson Davis, and Virginia should lead the movement. It is nothing but fair and proper that we should put her on the same footing that the United States Government places the widows of its Presidents. The duty devolves upon the States that composed the Confederacy. As the Confederacy is a thing of the past, it cannot be a very costly precedent for us, inasmuch as there can never be another Confederacy, therefore never another widow of a Confederate President." Mrs. Davis and her daughter are visiting in Memphis, Tenn.

Don Pedro Montt, the Chilean Minister, made his bow to President Harrison on November 15th and was formally recognized as Chile's accredited representative. He made a formal address, expressing the wish that the friendly relations subsisting between Chile and the United States would be continued and strengthened. Pres. Harrison replied reciprocating Senator Montt's sentiments and declaring that the policy of the United States had always been to refrain from meddling with the national affairs of neighboring nations. In referring to the charges that American officers had lent aid to Balmaceda he said, "This Government was quite as determined in its refusal to allow war vessels to carry the silver of Balmaceda as it was to give aid to those opposing him."

HILO JOURNAL.

At a Foreign Church sociable held at the house of J. A. Scott, Wainaku, 17th inst., the "Future of Hilo" was spoken of by several gentlemen and one lady. A gentleman from Maui was the first speaker. He commenced as follows: "To be or not to be, that is the question. Whether it is nobler to sit in shanties on the beach and let the tidal waves wash over us, and earthquakes upheave us, or fly to the hillsides and erect homesteads, and wait patiently for the government to make roads to them in the sweet mahope. Or to sail the waters of the broad Pacific Ocean and hunt for the lost North Pole, find it, bring it here, and plant it on the rugged mountain height of Mauna Loa, and then gather all the scientific world around it for a merry maypole dance. Thus I say would the future success of Hilo be secured. Ice would be cheap, Honolulu monopolies would be crushed, oily butter a thing of the past, fresh venison replace the present shoe leather, ice cream a daily luxury, and doctors' practices just a-booming. My friends, as I see into the future, and see our natives in flowing robes and bare feet, weaving the beautiful leis around that frozen pole to keep it warm, and look upon the crowds of pilgrims from every land under the sun literally pouring into our village and filling our hotels and suburban villas to overflowing, the question of the future success of Hilo is practically settled. Only one little thing remains to be done for success equal to that depicted on each side of the signboard in front of the Volcano stables of our friend Wilson, Hilo.

Another gentleman said it was only a matter of time when we would have an electric railway to Kilauea, the crater to be tapped for the electric power; also railways to the top of Mauna Loa and Mauna Kea, splendid hotels on top, where persons could go and recuperate at short notice, elevators down into Mokuaweoweo, where the air is always warm and the scenery grand, and where one can go a-fishing for minerals and catch them in abundance. We are a go-ahead people and expect an electric road to Hamakua.

Another gentleman about the same size spoke rather discouragingly about the railway and it did not please the audience. He was a believer in small pills, so we had no sympathy for him. One speaker remarked that with the lapse of time it has passed into a proverb that two minutes of Hilo's wonderful climate are better than a cycle of Catiay. Hilo has become the greatest sanitarium in the world. Its salubrious climate, magnificent hotels and numerous retreats, furnishing comfort and health to thousands of invalids. A marked feature is the number of aged and young men, men who bear the stamp of a life of great business activity which has prematurely broken them down. The town of Hilo has expanded into an immense city. Its flanks have broadened and Waiakea and Wainaku plantations that were, have gradually been absorbed, and now may be seen magnificent villas, palatial residences dotting the slopes of what were once immense stretches of cane. The woods back of the town have been opened up and now fine roads lead to the slopes of Mauna Kea on which are to be found comfortable hotels furnishing any change of climate desired. On the top of the mountain can be seen from the town a mammoth observatory holding a telescope with the largest ob-

ject glass in the world. The clearness of the air has allowed its scientists to make discoveries which have never been exceeded, a narrow gauge line runs to the Volcano, and from there a gravity road winds in a tortuous way to the top of the mountain. The trip down so much resembles tobogganing that it has become one of the popular features of the country and has attracted extensive notice.

A lady said: In my dreams last night I thought I heard a solemn voice that said stand up to-morrow night and speak a word for the women of Hilo, for nine chances out of ten the brave and gallant gentlemen who have that subject in hand will leave them entirely out of the question. That was a dreadful command, but there was nothing to do but obey. So here I stand to speak a word for the women of Hilo. The good work has already begun. Have we not the first woman lawyer in the Kingdom? Have we not the first woman physician in the land? And behold before you the first woman orator of Hilo! A fair Queen rules our Paradise of the Pacific, and when Hilo, the Eden of that Paradise, has grown to be the great city some of these gentlemen have described to you, I prophesy that it will be governed and controlled by women. The first mayor of that city will be one of our grand-daughters. The professors in those great institutions of learning will be chosen from the ranks of our great-grand-daughters. As artists, musicians and authors, the women of Hilo will lead the world. We shall also have an institution where cooking, nursing, and other departments that will be useful to woman will be taught, and all mankind and kind woman will shine fair as the moon.

A gentleman spoke of the need of a new building for the Union School—the miserable tumble-down building replaced by a splendid building, an honor to these islands. In time more to follow, but larger when Hilo becomes a city. Another spoke of how Hilo had increased in size since he came here twenty years ago, and what we might expect in the future, such as a line of steamers from Hilo to San Francisco, splendid wharves, an opera house, theater, parks, fountains, immense number of newspapers. The Record and Journal all in one, with more brains to furnish editorials that will guide the nation, no continued stories, special cables to all parts of the world. No one will ask the whereabouts of Hilo any longer, for Hilo will be the capital of the Kingdom. No pent-up Honolulu will contract our powers, for the whole boundless islands will be ours. We shall write to the Pope to come here, so that there would be lots of pilgrims come and see our great Crater, the wonder of the world, and leave their money so we shall never be hard up. There were others who took part, but I must omit them for want of space. Dr. Wiggins and Mrs. E. E. Richards each sang a good selection and were fully appreciated. In the first part of the evening Tiddleywinks was played. Toothsome refreshments were also enjoyed. All had a good hearty laugh.

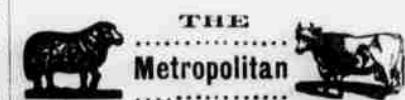
