ITALIANS ARE GREAT STRIKERS.

The following from the last issue of the Coast Seamen's Journal should prove highly interesting to those people who are advocating the bringing of a horde of Italian laborers into Hawaii:

There were 372 strikes in Italy in 1904, in 315 of which there were 134,332 strikers, with an average of 426 per strike. It can, therefore, be presumed that the number of strikers in the 372 strikes was about 158,500. The causes of the strikes were approximately as follows: Dissatisfaction with wages, 138; hours of labor, 21; work regulations, 18; conditions of solidarity, 41; various causes, 81. The strikes were distributed among the trades and industries as follows: Agricultural industries, 48; mechanical and metal industries, 36; mining industries, 36; textile industries, 60; shoe trades, 38; printing, etc., 4; transportation, 28; all other industries, 49. The results of these strikes were as follows: Favorable to strikers, 31 per cent; partially favorable or uncertain, 40 per cent; unfavorable, 28 per cent.

It is to be noticed that strikes in Italy are on the decrease. There was an abnormal number in the year 1901, spreading to almost every branch of industry or trade in which labor was employed throughout the country. Since that unfortunate year there has been a very noticeable decline.

In the year 1904 there was, in addition to the troubles enumerated, a general strike throughout the Kingdom. It was not of long duration, however, lasting on an average in the various centers about three days (September 16 to 19), but in Milan it was prolonged for five days.

Mother Rice's Illness.

Following is a part of the Garden Island's account of the illness of "Mother" Rice, who, at the age of 89, was stricken with paralysis at Lihue last week:

One of the oldest and best known ladies on the island, Mother Rice as she is affectionately called by all who know her, is an invalid.

After writing some letters last Tuesday afternoon, Mrs Rice was arising from her writing desk when she fell to the floor. She regained her feet and thought no more of the incident, merely telling Mrs W H Rice, Jr, who had been out when it happened, that she felt a little numb as a result of the shock.

On Wednesday morning Mrs Rice found, however, that she had lost control of the left side of her body and therefore had her physician called. Dr Wilkinson pronounced it a slight stroke of paralysis and at once took the necessary steps for the comfort of the sufferer.

Snakes All Pau.

After an official order of some length, Secretary Wilson has made the following ruling in regard to snakes in Hawaii:

In accordance with the authority thus conferred, and for the purpose of preventing the introduction of snakes into the Territory of Hawaii, the order issued under date of May 22, 1902 (Circular No 36, Biological Survey), is hereby amended so that on and after August 1, 1905, and until further notice, no permits shall be issued for the entry of snakes of any kind at any port of the Hawaiian Islands.

Shipments of snakes presented for entry will be immediately destroyed or returned to the port from which exported at the expense of the owner or agent.

WHY SO INSISTENT?

We, of this County of Oahu, will soon face, in the Supreme Court, the matter of the blanket warrants for County pay-rolls. It is, by no means, yet settled. The Board of Supervisors, by the County Attorney, are bent on having it settled, in spite of the turn investigations have brought out by a vindication of Treasurer Trent's un-commented statements, whereby he informed them of what he had found, which then appeared suspicious and still so appears to us. Being Mr Trent's duty to so notify, he has done nothing more than what his duty demanded.

But not so with Attorney Douthitt, who still insists. In one sense, he may be right, to have the matter settled for once and for all time henceforth. But since the exposure of the "system," which has been found to be weak and inexact, why do not the supervisors accept the conditions shown up and try to apply the remedy by cutting it out? There really must be something in the system which is still in the dark

and not yet out, and that it is their desire to retain it, by all means, in spite of the exposures made. Our surmise might be wrong, but in bending all energy, ulterior motives appear on the surface as the main cause for wishing a retention of such putrefaction caused by decayed garbage. Still our surmise may be wrong until proven that otherwise is the case.

Why keep it on, gentlemen? Better cut it out altogether without reference and accept the course adopted. It may entail lots of work, but it is nevertheless right. Because of their desire to handle the money for these pay-rolls may account for maintaining a system found putrid and rotten. In our opinion, they should leave well enough alone, and accept the method which Treasurer Trent forced them to accept and accede to. But to settle the matter for good, we feel that the Court will sustain the treasurer's course as being in accordance with the law on the case made and proved.

DEMURS TO IMPEACHMENT.

"The Independent has decided that a malihini cannot know anything of the workings of a County organization and especially nothing of the County Act of 1905. Charley Williams, who has never been out of Hawaii is of course a much better authority on such questions, than Smith, who helped to frame the act or Wise, who has only been eight years in the country."

THE INDEPENDENT demurs to the above soft impeachment of the Garden Island, because it has never said so. In the matter of County government, THE INDEPENDENT has always held that it was unfamiliar with its organization and workings, and therefore unacquainted with it, and as such it is itself a malihini on that score.

What THE INDEPENDENT did say, it criticized both Attorneys Wise and Carl Smith for giving exparte opinions with regard to the police situation on Hawaii, which we still consider as being wrong. The appointing power of police officers is vested by the County Act in the various Sheriffs, and not in the Boards of Supervisors, and Carl Smith, who help frame the act, should know better. But Wise is hardly wise enough to know otherwise than that he is a partisan, and Smith too, of the worst stripe.

Chaley Williams, County Attorney of Hawaii, may have "never been out of Hawaii," but he beat William S Wise, "who has only been eight years in the country" in the race for the office, clearly showing that he was, indeed, the better man of the two, the Garden Island to the contrary, notwithstanding. And furthermore, Williams, a Hawaiian, has the reputation of being a better lawyer than Wise is a poor one. The latter's name belies him as he is not such a "wise" one, after all.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

If Sheriff Brown really wants to find William H Belcher, said to be the defaulting mayor of Paterson, N J, he has certainly not gone the right way about it in advertising the fact broadcast.

It was very kind of Attorney General Andrews to send one of his deputies to Hawaii to help out the county attorney, but we cannot see why the Territory should be called upon for any such purpose. Hawaii went into the county scheme with her eyes open, and if that county cannot afford the expense of legal work it is her own fault. Certainly the Territory should not be drawn upon in such a matter.

Treasurer Campbell is going from one extreme to the other and is licensing every person who wants to sell liquor—lately Chinese and Japanese storekeepers. The result is readily apparent. It seems that the finely fitted and respectable saloons will have to close and that the town will be filled with joints, scrambling in legitimate and illegitimate ways for trade. If this policy of the Treasurer is kept up Honolulu will soon be as bad as New Orleans and "Barbary Coast" of San Francisco.

REDMOND MEETS HONOLULU IRISH.

Distinguished Man Royally Entertained Here By His Countrymen.

My reception in Honolulu has astounded me," said William Redmond, the member of the British Parliament who was here yesterday, upon taking his leave. "I expected nothing, but in place of that I have had nothing but entertainment from the moment I arrived and I have most thoroughly enjoyed it. Honolulu and the Islands will hereafter have a warm place in my heart."

There was some doubt about the coming of Mr Redmond on the coming of the cablegrams from San Francisco were rather vague. The Irishmen of Honolulu were alive to the possibilities, however, and had a big rally at the wharf at an early hour. The case of small-pox on the steamer unfortunately delayed the landing of the distinguished visitor. In reply to the inquiries of the committee, Dr Cofer stated that Mr Redmond would be ashore by 11 o'clock and he kept his word, the Quarantine officer landing him from his own launch at that time.

Mr Redmond was met by Thomas F McTigue, Colonel C J McCarthy, John Sullivan, E A McInerney, P F Ryan and the other members of the committee. After a spin through the principal streets he was driven to Nuuanu Pali, where he had a view of one of Oahu's greatest sights. Upon returning, the party repaired to the Moana hotel at Waikiki beach where an elaborate spread was waiting. This included edibles and drinkables in copious quantities.

The banquet was a feature of the day. It was replete with toasts and the like, Mr Redmond responding to one himself in a most happy vein. It lasted so long that a request had to be telephoned in to hold the steamer from 2 to 2:30 o'clock. Later it was requested that the steamer be held to 3 o'clock, which was complied with. At that time the jolly Irishmen—who were then especially jolly, as may well be imagined—accompanied their guest to the harbor and bade him a rousing aloha and bon voyage.

The Mikahala brought the following cargo from Kauai this morning: 371 bags sugar, 250 sheep, 108 bags taro, 120 bags rice bran, 25 empty casks, 25 boxes pears, 3 barrels do., 6 bundles hides and 52 packages sundries.

The Kauai's cargo from Hawaii last night consisted of 917 bags sugar, 781 bags coffee, 17 head cattle, 122 bundles hides and 6 barrels bottles.

F L Strauss, whose buggy was run into by an electric car a week ago, was worse injured than was at first supposed. He is still in the Queen's hospital.

Queen Liliuokalani, Hon J A Cummins and a party of about twenty all told, left for Waialua this morning, by train, all occupying a special car.

The brig Gallies has sailed from San Francisco for San Diego and Honolulu. She has been sent out to make meteorological surveys in the north Pacific.

Two Inter-Island steamer captains went up on the Kinau and Mauna Loa, respectively, yesterday to inspect the buoys along the Maui and Hawaii coasts.

Engineer Douse, of Puunene, who is accused of throwing gasoline on a Japanese and setting it afire, has been bound over by the grand jury in the sum of \$5000.

It is rumored again today that a change in the management of the Young hotel is imminent. It is not thought, however, that Mr Lake will be asked to return.

News arrived yesterday that the German warship Condor, which is now at Samoa, will shortly leave there for a cruise in the North Pacific and will call at Honolulu.
