THE LATE RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

A CHARGE OF MANSLAUGHTER.

In the third degree, against Pierre Bourgue, Ernest L. Parker and Pale Mahi, in causing the death of Adele W. Brown, Mildred Brown and Russell W. Brown, at Wailuku, Maui, on February 14th, 1884, was heard at Wailuku on February 28th, before Hon. L. Ahole, sitting as Examining Magistrate.

Hon. Paul Neumann, Attorney-General, appeared for the Crown, and Mr. W. O. Smith appeared for the defendants Bourgue and Parker.

The following witnesses were examined for the Crown: Charles Kanaeholo (k), conductor; Lia (k), who did all kinds of work; Nicholas (k), Uluhani (k), Alexander Skelton, one of the engineers.

The evidence for the defence was given by W. D. Rowell, Superintendent of the Kalamoi Railroad; Keala (k), fireman; Ernest L. Parker, engineer; T. W. Everett.

Palea (k), who pulled out the coupling pin, made a statement to the Court.

The evidence for the prosecution disclosed that it was customary to put wood under the wheels of the cars, when they stopped, and to set the brakes, although no signal was given to do so. That the brakes sometimes did not hold and all the employees knew it. That several of the boys were in the habit of pulling out the coupling pin. That the brakes on the two cars that got away would hold only one pair of wheels each. That, some time ago, cars loaded with sugar had got away. That the signal of two whistles was given to put down the brakes, and that only one whistle was blown. That the cars were never quite stationary before they were uncoupled. That the brakes would hold on a level but not on a grade. That many of the cars were out of order. That the car repairer, Mr. Bourgue, was supposed to keep the brakes in order. That there was no rule for employees to examine the brakes or report when they were out of order. That the cars had run away twice before. That a signal of one whistle was given to set the brakes, and two whistles to uncouple the cars. That it was not the engineer's duty to see if the brakes were in order. That the engineer acts as conductor except so far as the collection of fares. That Captain Hobron had given orders not to run the trains faster than seven miles an hour.

The evidence for the defence disclosed that there is a train on Wilder's road at Mahukoua which has no brakes on the cars. That Mr. Bourgue was always ready to do what he was asked and was a faithful man. That it had not seemed necessary to employ a separate conductor from the engineer. That Mr. Parker was not by any means a reckless man. That the whistle blew once only before starting after the runaway cars. That no signal was given to uncouple. That the brakes on two of the cars would not hold.

That none of the men were allowed to pull the pin without orders. That, at Spreckelsville, the pin is pulled without a signal and without the engine coming to a full stop after orders have been given by motion of the hand. That Parker, the engineer, had done all he could to prevent the accident after the cars ran away, and that no cars had run off the track since he had been on the road. That the men were not instructed to block the wheels and that the brakes were not tested on the day of the accident. That it was nobody's business to see that the brakes were in order. If all the brakes on a train of cars are out of order and Bourgue is not notified to repair them, they are sent out as they are. He is to repair them when he is notified to do so. That the engineer only acts as conductor for taking sugar but for no other kind of freight. That the conductor, who collected the fares, told the engineer where to stop and leave freight. That it was the duty of any of the train men to see that the cars were in order. That the signal to pull the pin was always given by hand. That the locomotive is always able to hold the cars that it pulls.

Palea stated that Parker motioned to him, with his hand, to pull the pin.

A *Nolle Pross* was entered in the case of Pierre Bourgue and Palea Mahi.

In the case of Ernest L. Parker he was discharged.

A careful review of the testimony shows that there has been some laxity in the manner of running and working the line, and that probably if another foreigner had been engaged, as conductor, the accident would not have occurred. This improvement has, we believe, been since effected.

The examination of the cars and the brakes appears to have been almost everybody's business and consequently nobody's business.

The appointment of an inspector of machinery to examine periodically all locomotives, steamer and mill engines, and machinery and rolling stock of every kind would tend to lessen the risk of explosions and accidents to which the mills, their employees and the traveling public are liable. It would be far more satisfactory to pay a competent man a good salary to do such work, and endeavor to legislate against the occurrence of accidents, than to be compelled to witness or record such a disaster as the one we have briefly summarized.

Ah Kau, for a similar offence, forfeited his bail \$25. The gentlemen insulted each other by using the epithet "you're an Irishman."

Ah Hong, who has been remanded periodically from 11th February, on a charge of perjury in the second degree, was again remanded to 4th Inst.

Jack, an insane person, was committed to the Asylum.

Reed Deep Sea Sounding Explorers, was 1260 fathoms. THE Casino was crowded on Sunday afternoon, an extra bus being run on the line. Nolte's novelty grows in popularity.

"THE KOHALA DOCTORSHIP."

It is further noticeable that, so far as can be learned by inquiry, the petition circulated for Doctor Bond by the natives and containing 300, more or less, Hawaiian signatures, has never received any attention or any reply from the President of the Board of Health. And this fact is laid in contrast with his interminable palaver about these specially "dear people."—E. C. B. in the Saturday Press.

It is only fair to the President of the Board of Health to state that on January 7th a letter was written, by the Secretary of the Board, to Dr. Wright and others, acknowledging the receipt of the petition. The letter further stated that, as Kohala had a physician who had an allowance from the Board, and as this physician had not sent any notice of his resignation, the Government could not provide a subsidy for a second physician for the district.

Dr. Thomson had also written to the Board with reference to the rumor of his resignation, and the Secretary of the Board replied to the doctor, on the same date, that it was not contemplated to make any change in the position he was then filling.

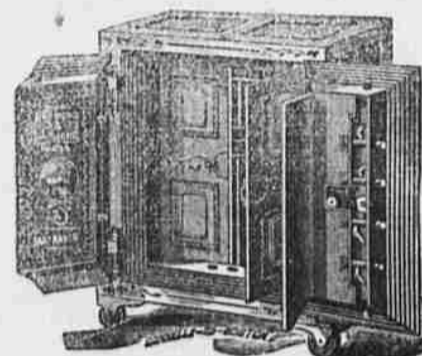
