## S. M. DAMON IS HONORED

### FRENCH REPUBLIC CONFERS A DISTINCTION.

Created an Officer of the Public Instruction—The Order and Diploma Presented by Consul-General Pollio.

The Government of the French Republic has decorated S. M. Damon, Minister of Finance, by conferring upon him the insignia and ribbon and creating him an officer of Public Instruction. The order was received yesterday, and presented to the minister by M. Joseph Pollio, Consul-General of the Republic. The order is a coveted one, and ranks next to that of the Legion of Honor. It is conferred on civilians who have distinguished themselves in the fine arts, or in the support and extension of public instruction. Mr. Damon has interested himself greatly in the progress of education in this country and has, in his official capacity, been of great assistance in advancing it. This has been recognized, outside of our island confines.

The order is one of those established by the first Napoleon, and dates back to the year 1808. It was at the time that the great emperor was organizing the splendors of his court and empire, when he was attracting around his throne the mightiest minds of the world, and was rewarding with a lavish hand. The order was conferred again in 1844 and 45, by royal decrees of the Citizen King, Louis Philippe. It was also the subject of decrees in 1850 under Napoleon as Prince President, in 1865, by Napoleon III, as Emperor, and in 1885 and 1898 under the present Republic. The patent of the order is signed by George Leygues, Minister of Public Instruction and of Fine Arts, and is countersigned by the Minister of Foreign Affairs. The badge of the order is composed of fern leaves crossed, and the ribbon and button, a deep purple. Mr. Damon is to be congratulated upon the honor conferred upon him.

## HER MAJESTY, THE QUEEN

### CONTRACTS ARE APPROVED

ITALIANS TO COME TO CANE FIELDS OF HAWAII. HEADED OFF THIS TIME BEFORE IT HAPPENS.

Reception at Commissioner Hoare's This Morning—Decorations at Drill Shed for Great Ball Tonight. The home of Hon. W. Robert Hoare, in Palama, was the scene today of a brilliant reception in honor of Her Majesty Queen Victoria. The affair took place in the front parlor just off the lanai. The music had a position just off the driveway. All of 300 people called. They began to arrive at 11 o'clock. From that hour to 1 there was a constant stream. President Dole, Minister Mott-Smith, Minister of Finance, Attorney-General Cooper and Colonel Soper arrived together shortly after 12 o'clock. The visitors during the two hours of the reception included Government and military officials, consular representatives and the general public. Features of the reception were refreshments which were served during the entire time.

### BALL TONIGHT.

This evening the grand ball will take place in the Drill shed. Guests will be received at 8:30 and at 9 o'clock the grand march will take place. Music will be supplied by the Hawaiian band.

Never in its history has the Drill shed been so elaborately decorated, as it will be this evening. George Dall and a large number of men have been engaged all day upon it. The chief decorator has had the assistance of dozens of other people.

Dodd's big tent occupies a position directly in front of the Drill shed. The public will be admitted over a carpeted floor through it. On either side of the tent will be the refreshment bars. Inside of the front entrance of the Drill shed is the large American League flag. Just over the door is a pretty arrangement of colored lights that will attract a great deal of attention. On top is a crown in red lights; just beneath are the letters V. R. at the left is the date 1819, and at the right 1899.

The whole building is a forest of palm leaves with flags and bunting interspersed. Not a particle of the wood or iron work of the structure is to be seen, so elaborate is the decorative scheme. The foot lights on the stage are covered with green and orange bunting. At the right is a British and the left an American flag. At the rear is a large British shield, a large affair, in bright and attractive colors.

Over the canopy national flags are so thick that they entwine. Rows of Japanese lanterns are arranged between the effect, adding to the attractiveness of the scene and at the same time assisting the strong arc lights in the building.

The company rooms are reserved and marked as follows: A ladies' cloak room; B general reception room; C ladies' reception room; D beverages; G committee room; H gentlemen's room. Over H's room is a large portrait of Queen Victoria painted by Frank Davey.

It is expected that the crowd will be the largest seen at a dance in Honolulu in a great while.

## CONTRACTS ARE APPROVED

### ITALIANS TO COME TO CANE FIELDS OF HAWAII.

Government Favors the Project, but Insists on Having Peasants—Commissioners Appointed.

The Board of Immigration met with the Cabinet at 10 o'clock this morning on the matter of permitting the importation by planters of Italian laborers, for the cane fields of Hawaii, on a basis of terms suggested in correspondence between Consul F. A. Schaefer and the Italian Government, of which mention was made in The Star some days ago. At a meeting of planters held last week it was decided to accept the proposal of the Italian Government for laborers on the same terms as those imported from the Portuguese colonies from time to time. A form of contract was drawn up, and that is what the Cabinet had to consider today.

It was decided by the Cabinet and the Board of Immigration together that the importation of Italian laborers should be allowed with a single proviso, i. e., that the laborers come from the northern provinces of Italy and be of the peasant class. No importation from the southern sections and cities of Italy would be favored. Joseph Marsden, who is now in Italy, and Mr. Benton, son of the Hawaiian consul at Rome, were appointed commissioners of the Cabinet to see that the laborers were from the section and of the class prescribed.

This ruling of the Cabinet and the Board will be satisfactory to the planters. Applications for permits will at once be made out and will likely go forward by the steamer on Friday. The number to be ordered in the first lot has not yet been determined. It is learned from a prominent agency this afternoon, however, that the first order will probably not be for over 1000 although other orders will quickly follow. The remainder of the Cabinet session was devoted to discussing the new Hawaii railway project. W. O. Smith, Mr. Brown and Mr. Gehl were present. The matter was left substantially as it was before.

### THE NEW EXCHANGE.

#### The First Session Will Be Held Tomorrow.

The Hawaiian Stock Exchange will hold its first session tomorrow afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. For the present the sessions will be held in the office of J. H. Schnack.

At the meeting to complete the organization E. C. Winston was made president; J. H. Schnack, vice-president; J. S. Walker, treasurer, and William Savidge, secretary. The exchange starts out with eight charter members, and a number of applications for membership have already been received.

### TO AUGUST TERM.

In the ejectment matter of Mary K. Tibbitts vs. S. M. Damon, et al., defendants have filed a general denial to the complaint. The case has been continued, by stipulation, to the August term.

### HAVE A HOLIDAY.

In Judge Stanley's court yesterday afternoon the native jury was excused until again called. The foreign jury was excused until Thursday morning.

### BIG TRANSPORTS.

None of the big transports like the Grant, Sherman, Sheridan and Hancock will call at Honolulu, according to present orders. All the transports that can carry coal enough to make the trip through to Manila without stop will do so. Those that cannot will call here.

### STAMP SALES IN MANILA.

During the months of January, February and March of this year, there were sold in the Manila postoffice \$17,174 worth of postage stamps. The principal buyers were United States soldiers.

### R. S. T. U. AND V.

#### First Military Use of These Particular Letters.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 17.—The Presidential camp vacated by the Engineers last night has been filled with 600 of the casual detachment under command of Captain Crittenden and Lieutenant Merrill. Five new companies were organized this morning, with the letters R, S, T, U and V, the first time these letters have ever been used in designating companies in the regimental formation, even in the artillery, calls for only fourteen companies.

For traditional reasons the letter Q was omitted, this being the time-honored designation of the guard house company.

The first section of the Sixth United States Infantry, to sail on the transport Sherman next Monday, passed through El Paso, Texas, last night, and will be here on Friday. The rest of the regiment left San Antonio at noon today.

## ANOTHER JAMESON RAID

### HEADED OFF THIS TIME BEFORE IT HAPPENS.

Like Sir James Boyle, Krueger "Smells a Mouse; Feels it in the air; Nips it in the Bud."

PRETORIA, (Transvaal Republic), May 16.—The arrest at Johannesburg early this morning of eight alleged former British officers on the charge of high treason has caused intense excitement here. The prisoners were brought to Pretoria by special train. After they had been lodged in jail they were visited by the British diplomatic agent here. The officers arrested are Captain Patterson, formerly of the Lanciers; Colonel R. F. Nicholls, Lieutenant J. Tremlett, C. A. Ellis, lately a private detective at Johannesburg; Lieutenant John Allen Mitchell, formerly of the Horse Artillery; former Sergeant J. Fries, J. P. Hooper and Nichols. None of them have been in the employ of the British South Africa Chartered Company.

The Executive Council of the Transvaal is sitting in secret session this evening considering the arrests.

The British Agent and Charge d'Affaires, Cunningham Green, had an interview with President Krueger this afternoon and expressed regret that men who had worn the Queen's uniform should be concerned in such a movement. President Krueger replied that he would not believe the prisoners were British officers until it had been proved, adding that he hoped the affair would settle in the hands of the law.

JOHANNESBURG, May 16.—Further warrants have been issued. It is asserted that the officers already arrested are also preparing to organize a corps in Natal, the British colony between the Orange Free State and the Indian ocean, to assist the projected movement at Johannesburg.

CAPE TOWN, May 16.—According to advices from Pretoria the charge against the prisoners is that while serving in the army privately they are really engaged in enlisting men for the purpose of rebellion when they were ready to give the signal. It is said that the enlistment roster included 2000 men and that a number of incriminating documents were found at the time the arrests were made.

LONDON, May 17.—The consul of the Transvaal here has received the following telegram from his Government, dated Pretoria, May 16:

"Richard Nicholls, describing himself as a colonel; George Patterson, a captain; Edward J. Tremlett, Charles Ellis, John A. Mitchell, and Fries and Hooper, were arrested yesterday morning on the sworn declaration of three Englishmen on the charge of high treason in connection with the alleged object of the enrollment of troops to create a revolution in the Transvaal. The men held possession of the town until British troops from Natal could come to their assistance.

"One of the prisoners alleges that he was acting under instructions from the British War Department."

A prominent Chamberlain said to the representative of the Associated Press: "My own view is that a few irresponsible men met together to discuss means of defense in case the necessity for such action arose. Those who are acquainted with Johannesburg know that such pretensions are necessary. There was the greatest unrest and ferment there when I left. But the statement that there has been a conspiracy during the past four months, and that the South African League was connected with it is untrue. No Highlanders are to possess a rifle, yet at every corner are policemen armed with rifles and revolvers. The feeling of alarm on the arrival of the Boer artillery can be conceived.

"It is a significant fact that the men arrested are practically unknown, and that the feeling which in 1896 was limited to the capitalists class has now gone lower down and has reached the ordinary working class of shopkeepers of Johannesburg."

### VERDICT FOR PLAINTIFFS.

The ejectment matter of Opule Kaulaheha and G. S. K. Kaulaheha vs. John M. Kaulaheha, et al., was heard in Judge Stanley's court yesterday afternoon before the following jury: John Bright, George Gray, George Peha, B. Huston, C. S. Weight, M. C. Amama, A. Schmedden, E. E. Mossman, Rudolph Duncan, Theo. Wolfe, Samuel S. Mahuka and John Buckley. A verdict was returned for plaintiff for the property claimed, none dissenting. Exceptions to the verdict were taken by the defendants. Lyle A. Dickey for plaintiffs; Kaula, Kaulaheha, Achi and Johnson for defendants.

## ANOTHER MAKAWELLI DEAL

### THE STOCK WILL BE PLACED ON THE NEW YORK AND BOSTON MARKETS—POLITZ IN THE DEAL.

Another deal in Makawelli has been made. An option on a majority of the stock, a little over 10,000 shares, has been given at \$25.

When the Hecht option fell through Edward Politz took the matter up with Mr. Alexander in San Francisco, and completed the deal with the exception that Mr. Alexander wanted to consult his partner, Mr. Baldwin, and came down on a late steamer for that purpose.

Henry St. Goar, Mr. Politz partner, left San Francisco May 14th for the East to put the stock on the New York and Boston markets.

Many of those who were interested in the Hecht option are interested in this, because it is not known here whether Mr. Hecht is, but Mr. Strasburger is. This means that all the jarring elements among the brokers which seems to have been the cause for the Hecht deal falling through, have been reconciled.

This is another evidence of Politz' determination to handle only gilt edge island securities and is bound to have a good influence in the Eastern markets. At the office of Alexander & Baldwin it was said that in the absence of Mr. Baldwin no statement concerning the matter could be made.

The ball this evening, given in honor of the eightieth anniversary of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, promises to be a brilliant affair. It is but natural that the people of this community should desire to honor the natal day of this noble lady. She has been personally interested in Hawaiians for many years, and small as this state was during its period of independence, the Queen received several of its prominent people. Among the Americans there is a strong feeling of regard for the Queen, and every Britisher feels it an honor to have so true a woman at the head of the State.

Gradually the machinery of the Federal Government is taking up its position on these islands. The Naval station has now its commandant, who will shortly have his offices erected upon the reservation. There comes also the news that something is going to be done on Pearl harbor. What this will be does not seem actually known, though it is surmised that the bar may be dredged at once. There is ample information about the bar, a great deal was collected by Lieutenant Max Woods, some three or four years ago. It is very evident that what money is at the disposal of the Executive will be spent to the greatest advantage.

The condition of affairs in Luzon seems thoroughly favorable to the American Government. In spite of Aguinaldo's blustering dispatch, or more probably the dispatch manufactured by the Hongkong Junta, the rebellion in the Philippines is broken, and all Aguinaldo wants now is to make the best terms possible for himself. The policy of the United States commanders is beginning to tell as it had to in the long run, and peace can now not be so far off.

Bishops can get into trouble away from here, as well as on this little group. Bishop Tugwell has stated that 75 per cent. of the white population of the West Coast of Africa, die from drink, and he has to stand a libel suit from the survivors. It is quite an interesting case. Can a man libel a whole state. Was David guilty of libel when he said "All men are liars," and could it be any bar to the suit, that he made the remark "in haste?" Was St. Paul guilty of libel when he somewhat harshly designated the Cretans as "slow bellies," whatever the elegant expression may mean? The greater the obscurity, the greater the libel it may be. Bishop Tugwell, when he made his sweeping assertion, probably had in mind the example of David and of Paul. But times have changed and the law of libel has become more stringent that it used to be about Jerusalem. It is not wise to follow scripture precept too literally. Bishop Tugwell may have to pay damages, after all.

DAVID HARUM.

A striking book has been published recently. It is David Harum, by Edward Noyes Westcott. Mr. Westcott died shortly after his book was published, and it is his only work. As an elaborate novel it is not great, but as a sketch of quaint character it will take its place along side the creation of Sam Slick, of Artemus Ward's immortal showman, and others of like brilliance. The quaint sayings of David Harum will become household words, as for instance

The's as much human nature in some folks as th' is in others, if not more.

A reasonable amount of fleas is good for a dog—they keep him f'm broodin on bein' a dog.

Do unto the other feller the way he'd like to do unto you—an' do it fast.

These are gems of thought which are told in that quaint language which appeals to every one, educated or uneducated. They are peculiarly American and they are peculiarly good.

COFFEE.

The condition of the coffee trade in Brazil is attracting considerable attention. The great decline in coffee began in 1897, and since then the decrease has been between 50 and 60 per cent, as far as Brazilian coffee is concerned. Hawaiian coffee keeps its price of from 16 to 17 cents a pound, but Brazilian coffee has been as low as 6 cents and even 5 cents.

To meet the depreciation the Brazilians, according to the trade statements, have been augmenting their output, for undoubtedly the production has increased enormously. But knowing what we know of coffee here, it does not seem very clear how any increased planting begun since 1897, could have much influence upon the market in 1899. It might in 1901 and 1902, but not at present.

With all due deference to the trade statements, there must have been increased planting and cultivation of coffee long anterior to the year 1897, and it must have been this abnormal condi-

tion which has sent the coffee of Brazil down with a run.

There has been a considerable colonization from Europe in Brazil, and the colonists have been encouraged to go into coffee upon the chare system. So many trees are planted each year for the colonist, so many for the estate, and the colonist looks after both. In this way, many thousands of acres have been put in, at a very small cost.

It is a case of over-production, and until the use of coffee becomes very much more popular than it is, there will be low prices to be looked forward to. Once, however, a country takes to coffee, it cannot do without it. Coffee becomes a habit, just as liquor becomes a habit, and it is very difficult to shake off. In moderation it is not injurious, and where hard work is to be performed, it is an excellent stimulant. But about this, the coffee planters do not care, they only want to sell their product at good prices. It seems very much as if there would be over-stocking of the market for some time to come. Our Oiaa planters have probably shown their wisdom by dropping the experiment, and leasing their lands for sugar. They will not have so hard a fight to make money.

NEED OF INQUEST.

A case in which an inquest should have been held is that of Kaili, who died yesterday at the hospital. As readers of The Star will remember, Kaili was injured at the iron works last Thursday afternoon. At the time, the authorities at the iron works did not consider the accident a serious one, and one of their officials criticized The Star for reporting it so fully. But people do not always know how serious an accident may be, and certainly a boiler, rolling down the side of a man is hardly the same thing as a canary bird walking over him.

As far as can be learned no blame is attached either to the iron works or to the fellow workmen of Kaili, but there is nothing official to prove that such is the case. From the point of view of the iron works authorities, one would think that they would desire to have an inquest held to clear themselves and the fellow workmen of Kaili. At present, that there was no carelessness, rests upon bare assertion. What every body connected with the iron works ought to wish is to have an official clearance of all blame in the matter. Inquests are as much for the purpose of proving people guiltless of carelessness or crime, as they are for bringing guilt home.

The position of The Star should be clearly understood. In calling attention to this case there is not the slightest intention to cast the slightest aspersion upon the iron works or the management, but it is not right that an accident should occur, ending fatally, without there being proper official enquiry.

In this matter there is no question of burial certificate, for the man died in the Queen's hospital, and the surgeon there could of course, certify as to the immediate cause of death. But there is another aspect of this case, which needs investigation. The man was injured last Thursday. He was not taken to the hospital until Monday. What treatment did he have, during that period? Was he treated at all, or was he not treated? If he was not examined by a doctor until Monday, whose fault was it that he was not attended? These are pertinent questions which can be asked by a jury, and satisfactory answers can only be given to a jury.

It was only a few months or so ago that a man was drowned while going ashore in a boat. It was stated that the accident was the fault of the unfortunate man who suffered death. But there is to this day no proper record of the fact. There was no enquiry. There should have been one. Whenever a death occurs from accident there should be an inquest as a matter of course. The Star claims that when ever a sudden death occurs there should be an inquest, and The Star is right in its claim, though such a proposal scares legislators and officials stiff with the contemplation of possible cost.

The cost after all is trifling. What we want to establish is the sanctity of human life. It is a precious thing to its owner, it is regarded as a precious thing by the State. When ever life is cut off suddenly or apparently without a cause, there should be official enquiry as provided by law. There is no disgrace about an inquest. It has no more stigma than the obligation of having a funeral when a person dies. Both officials and private individuals should wake up to constant vigilance in this direction.

## ANOTHER CAPITAL IS OURS

SAN ISIDRO OF THE FILIPINOS CAPTURED.

Lawton With Tact and Ability has Covered Bulacan Province With His Column—The Tin-clad Navy.

NEW YORK, May 16.—A cable to the Sun dated Manila, May 17, 11:40 a. m., says: General Lawton's column has driven the insurgents out of San Isidro, the rebel capital, and is now in possession of that place. No details of the fighting have yet been received.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—The following dispatch has been received at the War Department:

MANILA, May 17.—Adjutant-General Washington: The situation now is as follows: Lawton, with tact and ability, has covered Bulacan province with his column and driven the insurgent troops northward into San Isidro, the second insurgent capital, which he captured this morning. He is now driving the enemy northward into the mountains. He has had constant fighting, inflicting heavy losses and suffering few casualties. The appearance of his troops on the flanks of the enemy behind the entrenchments thrown up at every strategic point, and the fact that he has been very demoralizing to the insurgent and has given them no opportunity to reconcentrate their scattered troops. Kobbes column with gun boats is proceeding up Rio Grande.

MANILA, May 17, 11:40 a. m.—General Lawton's advance guard, under Colonel Summers of the Oregon troops, took San Isidro, the insurgent capital, at 8:30 this morning.

The expedition under Major Kebbe of the Third Artillery, consisting of the Seventeenth Infantry, a battalion of the Ninth and one battalion of the First Artillery, left Calumpit at daybreak today, marching up the Rio Grande to General Lawton's division at Arayat. A flotilla of canoes loaded with supplies also proceeded up the river. Both forces were conveyed by the "tin-clad" army gun boats under Captain Grant.

Aguinaldo's ex-secretary, Escamito, who was arrested here on February 21, is employed as official interpreter by the authorities.

6:25 p. m.—Colonel Summer's command, consisting of the Twenty-second Infantry on the left, the Minnesota regiment in the center, and the Oregon and North Dakota regiments on the right, preceded by scouts and accompanied by Scott's Battery of Artillery, advanced from Baluarte at daylight. The troops first encountered the enemy two miles from San Isidro, the rebels retiring when our artillery opened fire. Just outside the town a rebel force estimated to number 2000 men, was entrenched. It made slight resistance and quit its position when our troops turned their right flank.

The enemy's loss was fifteen men killed and twenty wounded. Our troops also captured three prisoners and many rifles. On the American side one soldier of the Oregon regiment and one of the Minnesota regiment were slightly wounded.

After capturing the town Colonel Summers troops continued the advance, pursuing the retreating rebels for several miles.

### DEPUTY MARSHAL INVESTIGATES

Deputy Marshal Chillingworth this morning investigated the accident to Kall in the iron works, which caused that man's death yesterday morning. A number of men who witnessed the accident were questioned. The evidence all went to show the accident to be such that no one was to blame, in any way for it. Chillingworth decided that a coroner's inquiry was not necessary. Thus the facts may never become of official record.

**VICEROY'S MOTHER-IN-LAW**

MRS. LETTER CAUSES A STORM IN A TEAPOT.

Laws of Etiquette Broken and Aid-de-camp Resigns—Daisy Letter's Noble Lover Comes to the Rescue.

NEW YORK, May 13.—A cable to the World from London says: Private letters from Simla bring tidings of something like a revolution in the viceregal household, owing to the pretensions of Lady Curzon's mother, Mrs. Letter, Captain Mead, one of Lord Curzon's aids-de-camp, has resigned and other members of the viceregal staff are reported to be in a state of suppressed mutiny.

The trouble began with the giving of orders by Lord Curzon that when Mrs. and Miss Letter went driving together they should be escorted by an aid-de-camp. There is no place on earth where the rules of etiquette are so absolutely observed as in this colony, and an Anglo-Indian officialdom was astonished by Lord Curzon's action. Tradition has prescribed that sons, daughters or sisters of the viceregal may have a viceregal aid-de-camp in attendance, but such a distinction has never before been claimed in this colony. This point was conceded reluctantly by the starved officials, but was bitterly resented by their wives.

There has also been much trouble and heartburning over the precedence of the viceregal mother-in-law and sister-in-law at viceregal entertainments. Mrs. Letter insisted upon being taken in after her daughter, the viceregal's wife, and Mrs. Letter apparently could not understand what the trouble was all about and the intense enjoyment she derived from her quasi regal honors was the most irritating feature of all to the superseded wives of the high officials.

PROCLAIMS A HOLY YEAR.  
Jubilee at the Century's Close Also Announced.

ROME, May 11.—The Pope has solemnly approved a bull proclaiming the present year a holy year. The Vatican today issued a papal bull proclaiming a jubilee at the close of the century, 5,000 copies of which are in Latin and 5,000 in Italian. This document, which is officially given to the world on Ascension day, is a species of political testament from the Pope. It will be contemporaneously received by all of the bishops, nuncios and apostolic delegates, and at the same time promulgated from the four Roman basilicas, St. Paul's, St. John Lateran, Santa Maria Maggiore and St. Peter's.

TROOPS COMING HOME.  
California Volunteers Will Leave the Philippines This Month.

WASHINGTON, May 11.—In response to requests for information sent by the War Department General Otis today cabled that he would begin sending home the volunteers about the end of May. The first troops to be returned will be the First California Infantry, two battalions of which are at Negros and one in General Owenshine's brigade, south of Manila. Their places will be filled by regulars arriving on the Hancock. The transport Indiana is now at Negros, so the Californians can be taken to Manila at any time without delay.

ADMIRAL DEWEY.  
MANILA, May 13.—The flagship Olympia, with Admiral Dewey aboard, will depart for home next week. She will dock and be cleaned. She will then head for Suez. Captain Barker is already in charge of the fleet, with the Baltimore as his flagship and Lieutenant Eberle as Flag Lieutenant. Captain Wildes has taken command of the Oregon and Captain Whiting will take the Boston home.

ELIHU THOMSON SAFE.  
The Elihu Thomson has reached San Francisco. She touched first at Santa Cruz. When she arrived there she was in a very disabled condition. A San Francisco tug was immediately telegraphed for and towed the Thomson to San Francisco, where she is being repaired.

IN LIEU OF FURLOUGH.  
MANILA, April 29.—According to the orders received from Washington all soldiers who services have been honest and faithful, will receive two months pay in lieu of furlough upon their discharge.

### MADE INSANE BY BATTLE

NERVOUS STRAIN DETHRONES REASON.

Will Be Taken to the Military Hospital for the Insane at Washington—Hopes for Recovery.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 17.—Four insane soldiers now at the Presidio post hospital, will be sent tonight, in charge of a guard of four men, to Washington, where they will be placed in the government asylum for insane soldiers. These men came in from Manila on the Grant and Sherman about two weeks ago, but were held in quarantine with other passengers from these transports, at Angel Island until last night. Two of them are privates in the Fourteenth U. S. Infantry, and the other two privates in the First Montana Infantry. Their names are withheld by the surgeon in charge, as they all have a good chance of recovery, and it would be painful for them to have a public post of insanity.

These men showed no symptoms of madness previous to their Manila service, but were all driven out of their minds by the terrible excitement of war. The intense and oppressive heat of the Manila climate, coupled with the fury of battle, deprived them of their reason. Army surgeons report that insanity frequently results from the immense strain and agony of battle.

One of the soldiers is in almost a stupor and would not be able to find his way about alone in the most familiar place. The methods of treatment at the government asylum are so effective that it is expected that all four will recover.

### ASSOCIATED CHARITIES. Adjourned Meeting Tomorrow For Permanent Organization.

Tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock will occur the adjourned meeting for the purpose of organizing the Associated Charities of Hawaii. At the last meeting it was found impossible to make a start, for the reason that several societies did not have a sufficiently clear idea of the objects of the organization. Time was taken in order that these might acquire and digest full information concerning its purposes and the advantages to be derived by joint work.

George R. Carter and W. W. Hall, two of the enthusiasts, are unfortunately away, but others will be present at the meeting. President Dole will have the chair. It is expected that at least twenty charitable societies will be represented.

### THE WAR IS OVER.

GIBRALTAR, May 17.—In honor of the 13th birthday of the king of Spain the land batteries here and the American cable steamer Hooker, which arrived May 15, from New York, today fired salutes and the vessel was drenched with bunting. The Hooker will tomorrow continue her journey to Manila.

### OVER A MILLION BIBLES.

Large Issue During the Year by the American Society.

NEW YORK, May 17.—The annual meeting of the American Bible Society was held today at the Bible house. The report of the board of managers shows: Receipts from the living, \$100,267; legacies, \$167,671; total receipts, \$267,938. Disbursements, \$266,529; cash balance March 31, 1898, \$3556. The total Bible issues for the year amount to 1,380,882 copies, more than half of which, 719,622, were distributed in other lands. Among the new issues are a duodecimo Portuguese Bible, the Gospels and Acts from the modern version in Spanish, and the New Testament and Psalms in the language of the Marshall Islands. Rev. A. J. McKim has been recalled to the society's service and assigned to duty in Porto Rico. Rev. F. G. Penzotti, for some years past in charge of the agency in Central America, has been invited to take the oversight of Bible distribution in Cuba for a part of the current year. Rev. Jay C. Goodrich has been appointed agent for the Philippines.

### UNDER ADVISEMENT.

Argument in the new Hilo railway matter was finished before the Cabinet yesterday afternoon, following which the President announced that it would be taken under advisement until the regular session of the council tomorrow, Wednesday.

There was not a session of the Cabinet today.

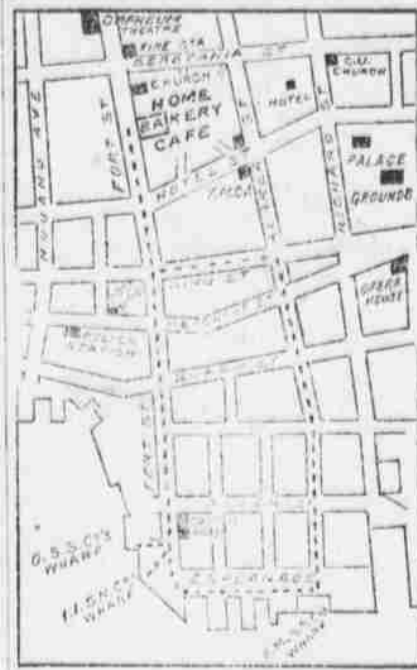
