THE CHINESE BUREAU.

During the last quarter of the biennial period Chinese immigration has been practically suspended, no conditional labor permits have been issued since April 30, 1897. Return perlimited to one year. Six months permits to merchants and travelers are issued under \$500 bond. The action of the Executive in restrict ing Chinese immigration was induced by the intimate relations now existing between this country and the United States of America, and by a desire to conform as nearly is possible to the laws of tha country respecting Chinese immi gration. The gross receipts of this bureau have been \$24.439; thcost of maintenance has been \$6,686.17; showing a net realization to the government of \$17,-752.83. J. W. 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
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

Sun Sulks Behind the Steeps-He Wouldn't Stay Another Winter for All of Klondike's Gold.

I am interrupted in this letter of a lighter vein to report the sad and sudden death of Mr. Miles, the trusted and greatly beloved bookkeeper of the Alaska Commercial Company. He had gone on one of the little stampedes near Dawson, six miles below, and, sep arating from his companions, was soon after found dead in the trail. Heart failure, it is said. He was from Michigan, later of Seattle, where he was a grain broker of some fortune and great enterprise. He leaves a widow here. And only a short time before one of a party on a stampede to Indian gulch suddenly collapsed, and would have died had he been alone.

A little time ago, when telling of three men being found dead in and about Dawson, I took occasion to say that a man not well assured of his vital forces might best serve himself and those dear to him by staying at home and attending to his affairs at his own fireside, for the strain here is terrible, terrible; and not entirely on the body, but the mind as well. I don't like to alarm anybody; and you will bear notice you who have followed me in these letters that I have always taken the brightest view of all situations; but it is a daty to say that I know some few men who will leave here wrscks, both in

body and mind. The days here have now dwindled to a dim little ray of light; the sun is sulking away back yonder somewhere behind the broken Klondike steeps, and the huge, bare white back of Quartz mountain. We have not seen his cheery face for days and days, and do not hope to see it again for weeks to come. But the moon, the great white melancholy moon, lorn and large and cold, walks in solemn widowhood right up overhead, and around and around; we see her all the vast night long and nearly all the narrow strip of day. The whiteness and silence are of a kind that I abhor, and the thought of my warm Contra Costa steps and my little familiar moon, lighting up the Golden Gate, make me homesick. I would not be tied up in this lorn, large, desolate largeness another winter for all the Klondike gold you could point to me with a dozen North poles in a thousand years. True, the summers are superbas glorious in colors and sweet odors as they are brief; alive with water fowl, fishes and insect life. And these mighty winters, too, are thrilling and inspiring in their terrible glory for a time; but when you have lived down three months of this vast white silence as if all earth lay still and stark dead in her white shroud, waiting the judgment day, and then find five months still fronting you, why, then you want to go home.



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

MISSIONARY BROKEN DOWN.

Isolation in China for Years Upset His Mind.

Rev. G. Robinson, another striking personality of the intermediate cabin, is a preacher of the Christian religion whom the Chinese point to mysteriously as a terrible example, says a report of the arrival of the steamer Empress of China appearing in the Victoria Colonist. He has been expound-ing the doctrines of Methodism for years somewhere in the neighborhood of Chinkiang and along the rivers of Shanghai, his connection being with the church in Chicago, and his zeal inducing him to adopt even the custume and the queue of his neighbors. Not long ago his mind gave way, it is said, through his protracted isolation rom civilization, and he is now being taken home to Sault Ste. Marie, where his mother resides, by a brother missionary, Rev. A. N. Cameron, who also has become half Mongolianized during long

residence in the country.

Robinson, who was originally a
Toronto local preacher, gave little trouble on the journey to Shang hai or on the voyage, but just as the Empress reached the William Head station yesterday he became impressed with the idea that a devil had possessed him, and made an attempt to throw himself over the rail. In this he was frustrated, but as he appears to be growing more dangerous increas ed vigilance will be observed by his keeper during his trip across the continent.

FORAGE CAOPS,

The Michigan experiment station h been doing valuable work in tasts the forage plants that will thrive that state, and consequently in t whole line of states in the same latt tude. These results are particularly in teresting to dairy farmers. Summed up they are as follows:
While the Michigan station has had

a fair degree of success with alfalfa it is not prepared to say that it will take the place of red clover in that state. It yielded nearly five tons of hay per acre at four cuttings in one season, but it requires good land, sufficiently rolling to drain well. On low, black land it winter kills in Michigan. It should be sown in spring by itself at the rate of 20 pounds of seed per acre. If land is clean, sow broadcast; if weedy, sow in drills and cultivate. If weeds come up, mow them before they go to seed, and unless heavy enough to smother the al-falfa leave them on the field.

Kaffir corn matures too late to be of value in Michigan. In the intensely dry season of 1895 it compared favorably with dent corn and sorghum as to quantity of forage produced, but was later than either in maturing. The Michigan season is too short for it. Beginning in March, 1895, a plat

each of crimson clover and red clever was sown each month till November. The total yield of the crimson clover plats was a little in excess of that of red clover. June and July seem to be the best months for seeding crimson clover

Sacaline has proved worthless. It is troublesome to start and to get rid of, hard to handle and cure, makes a poor, woody forage, and is not more produc-tive than corn forage.

The flat pea is also hard to start, not very productive and is not relished by any sort of stock.

Hairy vetch, sometimes called sand vetch, winter vetch, Russian vetch or Siberian vetch, is considered very promising in Michigan. Sown in the fall the running plant, often creeping on the ground a distance of ten feet from the stem. A series of unfavorable clover seasons ending with 1895 led many Michigan farmers to fear that red clover was no longer reliable in that state, but 1896 brought a very heavy crop. The root borer has now appeared, but it is hoped that its numbers will steadily decline.

as in New York. The Michigan station made an interesting and instructive experiment on a field of clover seeded with rye. A third of the field was cut over and crop re moved just as the rye was heading out; another third when the rye was in full bloom, and the last third after the rye

had ripened. The result was remarkable. Though favorable weather ensued, the last third produced as much weeds as clover, the second third had a thin stand of clover sprinkled with weedy patches, while the first third sent up a thick stand and vigorous growth of clover.
