LOCAL NEWS. The Mariposa leaves at noon to-day. The Central Park skating rink will re-open to-day. Mr. Charlie McCarthy is fixing up his new cigar store just two nice for anything. One of the Catholic School buildings on Fort street near the Catholic Church is being re-roofed with corrugated iron.

The Myrtle Crew Jr. were out for practice last evening for the first time this season. They took a pull around the spar buoy and back. Mr. R. S. Smith leaves to-day for his new field of labor. The Press will probably receive some interesting San Francisco letters from his pen. May luck attend you Brother Smith.

The Royal Hawaiian Band played last night at the Hawaiian Hotel. The music sounded like old times—at any rate the boys haven't forgotten how to make hollow brass vibrate. Thank you Mr. Berger.

Mr. Edward William Langley and Miss Sarah Kirk Allen were married last night at half-past eight o'clock by the Rev. E. C. Ogel at his residence on Nuuanu street. The marriage was a private affair.

It is reported on the streets and seems to be generally understood that Hon. J. M. Kapena, who leaves by the steamer Mariposa to-day, will go to Japan from San Francisco on a special mission for the Hawaiian Government.

"Roxy," the popular hack driver, is going to the Coast by sailing vessel the last of the week. "Roxy" declares the town has become too dull for him. It would be safe, however, to wager he will be back in the Spring—he went to San Francisco once before.

Mr. S. H. Davidson, the pitcher of the Honolulu Base Ball Club, who broke his arm throwing a ball from short stop to first base, about a week ago, was yesterday able to walk about the house and it is expected that he will be out on the street again this week.

In one of yesterday's locals we stated by error that a partnership had been entered into by L. J. Levey and L. L. Cohen, we should have stated that the new partnership had been formed by J. Lyons and L. L. Cohen. Mr. L. J. Levey starts in business for himself.

Mr. Cecil Brown spent the most of last week at Honolulu and Kahuku ranches. While there he transferred between 300 and 400 cattle from Kahuku to the fattening paddocks of Honolulu. Mr. Brown reports that the artesian well at Kahuku has reached a depth of 160 feet and that the workmen are now boring through hard rock.

The editor of the Hawaiian Chinese News is evidently still engaged in wrestling with the rudiments of the English language. Among the curiosities of newspaper literature in its columns may be found the following advertisement headings: "Union Feed & Co.," "Pacific & Co.," etc. The paper otherwise appears to be well proof-read—at least we didn't detect any other errors.

Yesterday afternoon about half-past two o'clock, a horse and dray loaded with goods, driven by a native, backed off the Likelike wharf near the barkentine Kikihai. There were two Japanese on the dray at the time and the whole load, japs and all, except the native driver, went into the water. The horse was drowned and the only things which remained on top of the water were the two japs and a bunch of brooms. The japs were rescued and along towards four o'clock native divers succeeded in fastening ropes to both dead horse and the dray which were hauled up. The horse and dray belonged to Mr. W. P. Akau.

The last number of the new Portuguese paper O Luso Hawaiian contains an article elucidating and expounding the new immigration scheme. Among its news from the Azores is given a list of 36 newspapers published and sustained by the Portuguese there, which shows them to be, at least, a reading people. A suggestion is made that a Portuguese Band be started in Honolulu, to be under the instruction and management of the late leader of the Portuguese Band in Hilo. This week's issue of the paper will be issued to-day.

The following protest, written in verse by one of the indignant sufferers, against the practice of taking dogs to church in Honolulu has been received. It is to the point and rather unique: "The poor have the gospel preached, The meek, the lowly born; Will owners of dogs remember this, Who treat God's house with scorn? Need they thoughtlessly bring Curs' heads the sacred roof, Distracting distressed, sin-burdened souls? Awake to Love's reproof. Is't high or low church service Will reach the ear of God, On isn't the whine of the restless cur That will lighten the 'chastening rod?' 'Tis the worshippers who bear On loving hearts and true 'Do unto others as ye would Have others do unto you.'

Captain John C. Lorenzen commander of the steamer Likelike, while lately in San Francisco, applied for examination before the Underwriters Board of Examiners for a ship master's certificate for that port. After a thorough and most satisfactory examination Captain Lorenzen was granted a first-class certificate. The honor attaching to a first-class certificate for the port of San Francisco will be fully understood when it is stated that heretofore only 122 first-class certificates have been granted by the San Francisco Board. Captain Lorenzen also obtained from the Board an unlimited steamship license for passenger traffic from that port, which is equivalent to a guarantee that he is capable of taking a steamship to any port of the world. Many of the regular captains of old steamer lines have failed to secure one of these certificates first mentioned. With this sort of backing Hawaiian and foreign passengers need have no fears in sailing with Captain Lorenzen. It is not very likely that he will ever run his ship into any of the Islands.

Y. M. C. A. Items. Major H. C. Dane will deliver his popular lecture on "The Great Naval Battles of the Rebellion" next Friday evening at 7:30 (note the change from 8 o'clock). His eloquent and vivid delineation is from the standpoint of an eye-witness, and from abundant testimony, never fails to please.

The Y. M. C. A. class in vocal music under the direction of Prof. Yardley will be re-organized and hold its first session this evening. The class is open to young ladies as well as gentlemen, and all desiring musical training as beginners or otherwise are requested to be present at 7:30 this (Tuesday) evening in the Association Hall.

Notes From Hawaii. Reports throughout Hamakua district are encouraging for a good crop of cane.

The people of Hamakua district are anxious by waiting for improvements to be made on the road between Laupahoehoe and Kukuiahae.

The Hamakua Mill Co. are making additional improvements in their mill. New machinery for the triple effect and the maceration process is on the ground.

The Likelike arrived at Hilo September 10th, at 3 A. M. It seemed quite like old times to see her again in command of her old officers, who are now in command of the Kinau.

Mr. Milton Holmes proprietor of the Hawaii stores at Hamakua and Hilo broke his leg last Wednesday by his horse stumbling on the Papaikou bridge between Hilo and Laupahoehoe.

Hilo planters and many other persons were delighted to hear that the American Refining Company had made contracts for sugar from many planters, and that the sugar ring is at an end. It is hoped that more prosperous times may soon be looked for.

"Woodman spare that tree." A splendid cocconut tree that had stood long in the principal street of Hilo was lately cut down by order of the Road Supervisor of Hawaii. Some people thought it a shame to destroy a tree that was so beautiful and which took so many years to reach its present size. It makes Hilo, and in fact would make any place look more beautiful to have the cocconut tree growing. Such trees should be allowed to stand unless an obstruction, which this tree was not.

W. H. Chaplain, a young man who was in the employ of the Hilo Telephone Co., swindled three Chinese stores in Hilo a short time since, two out of \$150 each, and another out of \$100, by presenting what he said was a good draft on Bishop & Co., Honolulu, and was very willing to take silver, which was too much for the smart Chinamen who were ever ready to make money. He also went away without paying the rent of his room, a bill at a store, hire of two horses for himself and wife to visit the crater, and a doctor's bill. He always had a bright smile on his face, said he had traveled in Australia and China and had been a book-keeper in San Francisco and wrote a beautiful hand. He sailed for San Francisco by the last trip of the Alameda.

The Surveys Party. Most of the members of the Maui survey party returned to town last Saturday, they were: Professor Alexander, Mr. F. S. Dodge, Mr. D. D. Baldwin and Mr. F. L. Clarke. The Surveyor General and his assistants did some good and useful work in locating points by which the Government Survey of East Maui can be completed next year. The party visited the crater of Haleakala and declare that in the grandeur and extent of its scenery it far surpasses Kilauea. The party visited, for the first time probably, a remarkable crater cone, into which they descended and found the roof as well as the floor covered with white crystals, some of which were brought back and will be submitted to Prof. Van Slyke of Oahu College for analysis. The volcanic scenery of the crater of Haleakala is on the most magnificent and stupendous scale imaginable. During the trip Mr. Baldwin, and Mr. Clarke did considerable botanizing. Mr. Clarke discovered a very beautiful and probably new native gardenia in full bloom. The flower is quite large, of a snowy whiteness and exhales a most delicious perfume. A full account descriptive of the scenery of some of the localities visited will be published in the Press in a few days.
