CONGRESSMEN VISIT MAJURO

The most important civilians who have been in the Marshall Islands visited Majuro on Saturday, November 12. The Congressmen who came were interested in finding out for themselves what laws it would be best for them to pass to govern the Trust Territory. The President of the United States has said that the islands of the Trust Territory and Guam and Samoa will soon no longer be governed by the Navy Department but by the Department of the Interior which now is in charge of Hawaii, Alaska and many other possessions of the United States. Guam already has a civilian governor from the Department of the Interior.

The Congressmen were escorted by Admiral Fiske and other Naval Personnel including Captain Hale from the Navy Department in Washington. Important representatives of the State Department and the Department of the Interior were also with the group.

The Congressmen had lunch at the Officers Club. Then they visited the hospital and dental office and talked with some of the important Marshallese here at Majuro. Then the group visited the school where they heard the students sing "The Star Spangled Banner" and "Anij Meram". All of the group were given a hat to keep them cool as they travel around in the Trust Territory. The group then visited with Island Trading Company, inspecting the warehouses before leaving on the plane for Kwajalein.

ALLEGED MURDERER
ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

Guam News. During the height of typhoon Allyn's rampage, Fredrico Ventura, Filipino National, from Camp Quezon, confined for past few days in the police lock-up in Agana pending trial for murder, and assault with a deadly weapon with intent to commit murder, attempted to commit suicide by slashing his throat with a tin can.

Ventura, according to police reports, had attacked and killed Juan Cubangbang, a fellow Filipino at Camp Quezon, with a straight razor and scissors while Cubangbang was sleeping. Later the same night, Ventura attacked on Lorenzo Real, causing serious injuries. Real was able to stagger to a nearby hut and repeat the name "Ventura" three times before he passed out. Ventura, after being admitted to the Naval Hospital for treatment, police noted yesterday, attempted to tear loose the stiches placed in his throat by medical authorities. He is now under close surveillance and control.

LEGION COMMANDER ANSWERS JEWISH BOY'S QUESTION

FORT WAYNE, Ind., Nov. 21- (U.P.)—The National Commander of the American Legion came forward recently with an answer for the little Lynn, Mass., boy who wanted to know: "Why did my daddy have to die?"

The question was posed tearfully by Lawrence Goldstein after he came home to his mother bleeding from a fight with several larger boys.

He was beaten because he was a Jew.

And he wanted to know why his father, an Army private, was taken from him in the Battle of the Bulge.

His mother, Mrs. E Sylvia Goldstein, doubted if she was "smart enough" to answer him and put the question to the public.

"Won't someone please answer Larry for me?" she asked. It was not an uneasy job, but it was undertaken by Legion Commander George N. Craig.

"Your father was a real American," Craig told Larry.

"He could not stand by and condone mass punishment of human beings. There were evil men who tried to enslave all free people, and your father went to war to prevent the wholesale destruction of human rights and freedom."

All true American, whether Catholics, Protestants or Jews, fought to re-establish international law so such outrages should not go unpunished."

"Because such brave men as your father died, America today remains free and our minorities are protected," Craig said.

NAVAL ADMINISTRATION NEARING GOAL FOR SCHOOLS IN ISLAND VILLAGES AS FIVE NEW SCHOOLS OPEN IN TRUST TERRITORY.

With the opening of five new elementary schools in the Ponape, Truk, and Palau Districts of the Pacific Trust Territory, the Navy Civil Administration under Adm. A. W. Radford, USN, High Commissioner of the Trust Territory is nearing its goal of one school for each community having five or more children of school age.

The Naval Administration now maintains 140 elementary schools in the Carolines, Northern Marianas, and Marshall Islands. Religious missions, whose activities have been encouraged by the Trust Territory Administration, operate 15 additional schools. Enrollment in these institutions, which include grade one through six is 7,689 in the public schools and 1,123 in mission schools.

TRUST TERRITORY SCHOOLS:

In addition to the lower schools, The Trust Territory administration maintains intermediate schools at Saipan, Ponape, Truk, Koror, Majuro and Yap. These institutions cover grades seven through nine. Students who have satisfactory completed elementary school may attend the intermediate school nearest their home island.

Since attendance at elementary school involves overseas travel of several hundreds of miles in certain instances, the Naval administration provides transportation and scholarship assistance for room, board, books and sometime clothing for the students as necessary. Intermediate school enrollment this year is 553.

Highest educational level of the Trust Territory school system are four institutions maintained at Truk and Guam. These are the Pacific Island Teacher Training School at Truk and the medical, nursing and dental schools on Guam.

Candidates meeting the requirements for matriculation in American colleges may do so with scholarship aid provided by the Naval administration and the schools concerned. At present there are three Trust Territory students at colleges in the US and one at the University of Hawaii.

Education was a major element from the beginning in the program of the Naval administration of the Trust Territory, which assumed responsibility for the islands and their peoples in July, 1949.

At the outset, a dearth of adequately trained teachers among the indigenous population of the islands made it necessary to bring many instructors from the United States to carry out a teacher-training program at the same time that grade-school instruction was inaugurated. Progress of the teacher-training program has been such that there are now 252 teachers, principals, district superintendents and other administrative officials in the school system who are indigenous residents of the Trust Territory Islands.

ISLANDERS TEACH

Naval personnel, both military and civilian, now assisting in the educational program total 76. These include doctors and other technical specialists who teach classes in addition to performing the regular duties of their professions.

Except for certain Americans instructing in intermediate and higher schools, all teaching is conducted by island people. All school principals and school superintendents also are persons indigenous to the islands.

The school system of each of the five administration districts—Saipan, Palau, Ponape, Truk and the Marshalls—is administered by a district superintendent. An educational administrator on the district staff acts as advisor to the superintendent, and as liaison for procurement of supplies and other support for the schools.

The mission of the Pacific Islands Teacher Training School at Truk is to assure that instructors are qualified to teach the standardized curriculum for elementary and intermediate schools. Its course lasts two years. A communications school has been added to this institution, and students are taught operation of radio transmitter-receivers as well as communications procedure. It is planned that, when qualified operators are available from this school, widespread use of radio installations on the islands will speed up communication between administration centers and the more remote islands in each district.

EDUCATION ENCOURAGED

As in the United States, teachers are encouraged to continue their studies after graduation from the Truk school. Summer post-graduate courses are taught at the Pacific Island Teacher Training School, candidates being furnished

The Medical, Dental and Nursing schools at Guam train indigenous candidates for participation in the public health program of the Trust Territory administration. At present, health aides who have had short courses of instruction at Navy dispensaries are stationed on nearly every inhabited island. The program envisages ultimately that graduates of the Guam Schools will be assigned to most of the larger municipalities.

LEARN BY DOING

The medical course qualifies its graduates to perform general preventive work and to care for emergency injuries pending treatment by a physician when necessary. Dental assistants are qualified to perform all professional treatment except surgery. Graduates of the nurse course are professionally comparable to registered nurses in the United States.

Supporting the Medical, Dental and Nurse School graduates in their field work are Navy doctors, dentists and hospital corpsmen ready on call to provide such care and hospitalization as each case may require.

Formation this summer of the Micronesian Education Association has provided members of the educational system with a forum of discussion and an organization for the exchange of information. The association headquarters are at Truk.

A Parent-Teachers Association has been founded on Saipan. Instructors in other areas are endeavoring to further the movement.

At the July meeting of the United Nations Trusteeship Council, the chairman of the delegations from the Philippine Republic, commenting upon the Trust Territory school system, said:

100 Percent Attendance

"My delegation, in this connection, cannot put share the satisfaction already evinced by other delegations of the remarkable achievements of the administering authority in the educational field, particularly in securing 100 percent attendance in the school of children of school age, not to mention adults."

In executing the educational program for the Trust Territory, Admiral Radford has had the counsel of the advisory committee on education for Guam and the Trust
