## RUN OVER IN THE STREET

**BAD ACCIDENT TO LADY ON A BICYCLE.**

Victim in the Hospital and May Die of Her Injuries - Police Looking for Brake and Owner.

There was a frightful road accident on Union Square about 10 o'clock this morning, as a result of which a lady is in the hospital and may die of severe internal and external injuries.

The lady's name is Mrs. Bush, a new arrival. She was on her wheel when run into by a bicycle, driven by a woman, apparently a Portuguese, and a small boy.

The brake struck the bike, knocked the lady into the street and the wheel passed over her. The woman in the vehicle jerked the reins, the horse stopped, moved rapidly backward and the wheel of the brake passed over the victim a second time.

Seeing what had been done the woman in the brake became so frightened that she jumped out and ran away in the direction of Kawaiahao church. The boy whipped up the horse and drove off.

In the meanwhile a big crowd had gathered. Mrs. Bush was picked up and taken into the office of Dr. Sinclair, near by. Examination revealed the fact that the wheel had passed over her body at the top of the stomach and again across the forehead. She was partly delirious and was in terrible pain. As soon as possible she was taken in a hack to the Queen's Hospital.

The police patrol wagon arrived shortly after the victim of the accident had been taken away. A thorough search is being made for the woman owning the brake, and there will be an investigation into the cause of accident.

### KAANAPALI.

Pioneer Mill Plans to Improve the Landing.

The Pioneer Mill Company is planning considerable improvement in the landing at Kaanapali. The water deep right up to the shore and it is proposed to build a wharf that will enable steamers and other vessels of good size to come right up to it. The sea at this point is nearly always smooth.

The bark C. D. Bryant is expected next month at Kaanapali with a cargo of coal for Pioneer Mill.

### WERE TWO CARLSONS.

The announcement that a man named Carlson, recently employed at Captain Nell Company's iron works, had been sent to the Insane Asylum for treatment, unfortunately caused confusion and some annoyance to people related to another man altogether. It appears that two Carlsons worked at the foundry mentioned. One is now employed on the plantation of the American Sugar Company at Kaunakakai; the other is in the asylum. The wife of the former applied at the station house this morning, and her distress was relieved when the sick man was described to her.

### JAPANESE RETURNING.

The Toyo Maru sails at 5 o'clock this afternoon for Yokohama. She will take from here about 150 returning Japanese most of them laborers who have worked on their contracts.

The Japanese Emigration Society through whom these Japanese were brought here and are being returned has between 300 and 400 ready to return. Those who do not go on the Toyo Maru, will go on the Hongkong Maru.

## MINISTER DAMON TO ROME

**WILL ARRANGE FOR ITALIAN LABORERS.**

Proposal to Planters and Government Now Under Consideration—Will Meet Officials of Italy.

Minister S. M. Damon may extend his coming trip abroad as far as the sunny fields of Italy. He may sail by the steamer on September 22, and, as the situation now is, will be gone for an indefinite period.

In Italy he will be important business. It will be to strengthen out the complications which frustrated the plans of some months ago to bring Italian labor to Hawaii for purposes. He will be so equipped with official introductions as to be able to treat directly with the Government at Rome.

Mr. Damon is the father of the Italian labor project. He brought the first here and has made a success of them. So well is he pleased with his experience that he wishes to see the honest, hard working peasants of the northern district of Italy at work on all the plantations of the Islands.

The minister will do no actual enlisting of labor nor will he arrange the details of this business. His proposition to the Planters Association, as submitted and discussed informally yesterday, was to lay the ground work of a scheme for the planters to work upon. In other words he will open the market; the planters will do the rest.

This morning the subject was before the Cabinet and was fully discussed. Undoubtedly the mission will be fully approved and Mr. Damon will be given all the authority in the premises that he may desire. When action has been taken the Planters' Association will be advised and that body will approve the mission and will particularize what it will do. That is, there will be an agreement as to how many laborers they will take and upon what terms.

It is understood that F. A. Schaefer, consul for Italy in Honolulu, is thoroughly in accord with the new effect to bring Italians to Hawaii. He has especial confidence in the mission of Mr. Damon. Mr. Schaefer is taking, in connection with the project, every measure to refute the yarns sent out from San Francisco about the ill treatment of Italians here. He has written his Government fully about the matter and will send them further details from time to time.

The original order to Italy was for 1000 men, with women and children, the number of actual immigrants would probably be increased to two or three thousand. This was the first order, and would have been followed by others. As it well known it failed.

## HIGBY FOUND NOT GUILTY

**VERDICT IN MOLOKAI ASSAULT CASE.**

Assault Matter That Attracted Attention of Two Islands—Storekeeper up for Selling Liquor.

In the matter of J. R. Higby, one of the more important assault cases before the present term of the circuit court, a foreign jury this morning returned a verdict of not guilty. This matter comes from Molokai. In it there were apparently a slapping bee on one side and a pistol play on the other. There were a number of prominent witnesses, including the manager of Kamalo plantation and Dr. Oliver, Paul Neumann appeared for the Government and Charles Creighton for defendant.

At noon a jury was drawn for the J. R. Higby case. The defendant is a storekeeper in Kalihi, and was convicted in the police court. E. P. Dole represents the Government and Creighton and Correa the defendant in the matter.

In the assumpsit matter of C. E. Williams vs. Ruth Horn and George D. Deane, garnishes defendant has moved that the appeal be dismissed for the reason that requirements respecting bond, etc., have not been complied with, as preferred by K. Naholuwa.

In the matter of Makio vs. Adamu and Albert Horner, foreclosure of mortgage, defendant Horner has moved that the complaint as it refers to him.

James Thompson has been appointed master to examine the accounts of E. H. E. Wolters in the matter of the bill for accounts and cancellation of mortgage.

In the Wailua stock case today W. A. Bowen is again on the stand. Among other things he has exhibited and explained the books of the plantation.

In the assumpsit matter of Dr. G. W. Burgess vs. H. Kolomoku plaintiff has moved that same be placed on the calendar.

Thomas R. Mossman has been appointed administrator of the estate of the late Puanani under \$200 bonds.

### HONOLULU MEN COMING.

Quite a Few Now on the Road From Manila to Their Homes.

In the next month to six weeks a number of Hawaiian soldiers will return to Honolulu from Manila. Harry Murray, Lube, Fanef, White and five or six others are now in San Francisco, waiting to be mustered out. Prof. Harker, Olwee, Nelson and a dozen others are some where on the road. As F. C. Evans, Lewis, Padikin, Rose and ten or twelve others enlisted in regular regiments they will not show up here in quite a while. It is also understood that Spencer Lane, who was an orderly with General King, will remain in the army.

Lieutenant Sun Widdfield, Honolulu's officer in the Philippines, will, of course, remain here. He wears one bar in a company of a new regiment.

Harry Evans writes that it is very cool and unpleasant in San Francisco and that he will probably return direct to the Islands. It was his intention at one time to go to the Omaha exposition first.

## PUPILS FROM FOUR RACES

**SOME NOVEL FEATURES AT THE SUMMER SCHOOL.**

A Class Composed of Chinese, Japanese, Portuguese and Hawaiian Children Receive Their First School Lesson.

A novel and interesting feature was introduced in the summer school this morning. Miss Flora J. Cooke took a class of children who had never been in school, and none of whom came from homes where English is spoken, and gave a practical illustration of the application of the principles of teaching she has been discussing.

There were four nationalities represented in this class, Chinese, Japanese, Portuguese and Hawaiian. All of them had attended kindergarten, but no other schools. It was evident from the importance of the occasion had been felt in the homes from which the children came, for they were all nicely dressed according to the national ideas of dress of the races they represented. The little Chinese girls wore the most gorgeously embroidered garments with plenty of jade and bronze ornaments on wrists and ankles and in their hair. The little Japs wore fresh, figured kimonos. The Hawaiian and Portuguese boys wore broad white collars with flowing colored ties, and the little girls wore fresh clean holokus.

The matter of dress, however, was quickly forgotten when Miss Cooke took the class in hand. She began by showing them some square bags made out of brightly colored material, some red, some blue and some orange. She took up the color first, talking to them about that, writing the name of the color out on the blackboard and having them do it. Then she took up the dimensions and shape following out the same process, making the subject concrete. So that at the end of the half hour exercise, each of the little pupils knew each of the colors represented and could spell it out on the blackboard; had some idea of measurements and dimensions and could represent on the blackboard fairly well by straight lines the dimensions of the bags from actual measurements made by themselves and could write out these dimensions on the blackboard.

Miss Cooke's class from San Jose, not only keeps up but is actually increasing. Miss Zonia Baber in the department of geography and chalk modeling has aroused a great deal of interest. Chalk modeling is the technical name for the process of graphic illustration by means of chalk on a blackboard. Miss Baber in her work seeks to show how the study of geography can be made interesting by beginning with the geographical features immediately surrounding the school and leading up from these to a comprehension of the larger features of geography.

Prof. Hiltz has been unable on account of sickness to take up the subject of color work, and Miss Pearly, who recently came from San Jose, to take a position in Kawaiahao Seminary has had charge of this department in the summer school. She has interested a large number of teachers in it and quite a number have provided themselves with the material and have taken up the brush exercises.

Under the title of "General Topics," there have been discussions of different branches of educational and school work. Inspector General Townsend next week will take up the exhibit of school work which is a part of the summer school and explain and discuss it.

Next Monday at 11:15 o'clock Prof. A. S. Bickmore will lecture on the subject of "Visual Instruction," which he originated and which has now become an important part of the educational system of the state of New York.

## NEW PUBLISHING COMPANY

**FRANK AUSTIN PLANNING TO BRANCH OUT.**

Option on Press Publishing Company's Business—Prospects of the New Deal Seem Quite Favorable.

Editor Austin, of Austin's Weekly, has obtained an option on the plant of the Press Publishing Company on Bethel street and other properties and purposes incorporating the whole into a newspaper enterprise of considerable proportions.

It is proposed by the promoter to issue the present block of 8000 shares of Press Publishing Company as preferred stock, to draw up to 12 per cent before any dividends are declared on common stock. The capital will then be increased to \$100,000, as authorized in the charter, the balance of \$30,000 being issued as common or speculative stock.

Austin's Weekly will be issued as now, except that considerable improvement is promised. Thrum's Annual and other publications will also be issued from the presses. Mr. Austin figures the net income per annum now in sight as \$2520, or a surplus over 12 per cent dividends on preferred stock of \$1

**SALARIES.**  
English Newspaper Men Are Behind the American.

It is customary for the Times, the Telegraph and other wealthy papers of England to "retain" prominent writers and famous correspondents so that they shall not contribute to any other. For example, Archibald Forbes used to receive £1000 a year, but he received a retainer of £300 to £400 a year to monopolize his services. He accepts this with the understanding that he is always ready to obey orders for articles in his special line, and will not write for any other newspaper. When he is actually employed he receives additional compensation.

As a rule the salaries paid by the London newspapers are much smaller than those received by journalists in America. There are a few men like Sir Edwin Arnold who receive large compensation. His salary is said to be \$15,000 a year, but the ordinary editors, reporters and correspondents do not average half as much as men of corresponding positions in the United States. Fifty dollars a week is considered a big salary. The managing editor of one of the most prominent and wealthy newspapers in London has said that the best paid man on his staff received \$60 a week.

**CANADIAN STATESMEN.**  
Salaries of the Minds that Rule Canada's Destinies.

Some interesting figures have been published as to the various salaries that are paid to Canadian statesmen, from which it appears that Dominion ministers have salaries of \$7000 per annum, except the premier, who gets an extra \$8000. The senators are appointed for life by the crown. They are eighty-one in number, and are paid sessional allowances and railway fares. The House of Commons consists of 213 members, elected for five years, and each member receives \$1000 as a sessional allowance, his traveling expenses to and from Ottawa; but he forfeits \$5 for every day's absence beyond a certain limit fixed for each session. Ministers of the Ontario Government receive a salary of \$4000, except the premier, who gets \$7000, and members are paid \$600 each session.

**KLONDIKE REVENGE.**  
A returned missionary from southeastern Alaska tells of a strange custom among the Indians of that region. When a difference arises between two of them, and a friendly settlement seems impossible, one of them threatens the other with dishonor. He executes his threat by tearing up a certain number of his own blankets. The only way his antagonist can get even with him is by tearing up a greater number of his own. If the contest is prolonged, it results in the destruction of all the blankets they have, each Indian destroying his own. The one who destroys the greater number is the victor.

**WISHED FOR HIS DEATH**  
WHY DREYFUS WAS TREATED SO  
BRUTALLY.  
The Story That the Parisian Journals  
Aurore and Figaro Have Recently  
Told in Full.

The significance of the treatment to  
which Dreyfus has been subjected is  
made known in the Paris "Aurore" in  
which Clementine details the suffer-  
ings of the famous prisoner as follows:  
"Even if he had been guilty of the  
crime of which he was accused, the pun-  
ishment ought not to be more than five  
years' deportation. But Dreyfus would  
not even hear of a legal protest; he nee-  
ded the justice of the charges against  
him in every detail, and refused to ask  
for clemency for fear that this might  
be interpreted as an admission of guilt.  
"Life in the climate to which he was  
sent is in itself damnable. The French  
officials never stay more than two years  
at a time. It was hoped that Dreyfus  
would die in two or three years at the  
most. When the atmosphere in his hut  
became intolerable, he would go into  
the narrow space between the hut and  
the stockade. The heat was here still  
worse, and often he fainted. Then his  
jailers hoped that he had died. They  
threw him upon a pallet, ready for  
the inquest. But he always revived,  
though his continual fever, the exces-  
sive use of quinine and his many faint-  
ing fits caused excessive weakness in an  
otherwise robust body. To reduce his  
chances of life, the preservers he ordered  
from Cayenne were taken from him and  
his ration of milk was denied to him.  
Food which he could not eat was given  
him instead. But he would not die.  
"To all this must be added the tor-  
tures of the mind. The letters his rela-  
tions wrote were never given to him in  
the original. He was permitted to  
see the handwriting. Copies, copied,  
mutilated and altered, alone were given  
to him. At last the entire correspond-  
ence was withheld, and he was told that  
his family had abandoned him. A few  
books were left to him; but if he wrote  
down ever so trivial a thought, the pa-  
per was torn to shreds before his eyes.  
At last he copied chapter after chapter  
as the minimum of brain work neces-  
sary to keep him from becoming in-  
sane."

The death of Dreyfus was so neces-  
sary to the conspirators, it is further  
said, that Paty du Clair informed the  
minister of colonial affairs that an at-  
tempt would be made to liberate Drey-  
fus. Then followed, at a time when his  
friends were already active in their en-  
deavor to procure a revision of his sen-  
tence, an increase in his punishment.  
He was placed in irons. He was put up  
on bread and water. It was then that  
the famous stockade was built, which  
Louis Hanet, a member of the French  
Institute, describes graphically as fol-  
lows in the Figaro:  
"Between the box which served as his  
hut and the stockade, the distance was  
only 40 centimeters (15-16 feet). I beg  
every reader to note this carefully.  
Fancy yourself walking in a narrow  
groove, touching the wall on each side,  
in a climate like that of Guiana. This  
lasted a year. At last when the pris-  
oner was too frequently in danger of  
asphyxiation, the doctor demanded a  
change. Then only the box was raised  
a little, to enable the hot tropical sun  
to reach the prisoner. No wonder that  
Mme. Dreyfus was not allowed to visit  
her husband. She would have descried  
these things. Somebody would have  
been found to ask questions in Parlia-  
ment."

No wonder that the authorities pro-  
vided a coffin and the materials needed  
for embalming the unfortunate pris-  
oner. It should be remembered that all  
this is true to the letter. M. Lebon, the  
then colonial minister, does not deny it.  
The only excuse is the rumor that an  
attempt would be made from America  
to liberate the prisoner.—Literary Dig-  
est.

John Cassidy's improvements in the telephone system have begun at Waikiki, and the town is anxiously waiting for the change to come its way. There will be a deal of mental bad language saved when an improved system begins in town. Well! everything comes to him who waits.

There is much work in the true Samaritan way done by our ladies. Sometimes it comes to the surface, sometimes it does not. The fruit and flower mission presided over by Mrs. Holmes, does some really kindly work which is a blessing to patients who though not necessarily poor in purse are poor in the lack of gentle and kindly attentions which only good women can give.

The war of the transit companies seems coming nearer and nearer. Every now and then there is a skirmish which shows how the land lies, and that all is not peace, and the public rejoices, because strife means emancipation from the tyranny of one of the worst tram systems on the face of the globe. The present tramcar system has no friends, and no one will regret at any moment if it receives its death blow. The Cabinet had a new phase of the subject yesterday, but took it under advisement. The probability is that an answer will be returned which will have to go to the supreme court, as all others have been preparing to go for some time.

The Hilo Tribune gets hold of figures in a fearful and wonderful manner. Where they come from only the Tribune itself knows. The Star's information comes direct from the Custom House and is certified as correct by the Collector General of Customs. In its last issue the Tribune undertook to correct the Star by stating that exports from Hilo for July were \$604,114 48 instead of \$562,632 26. Mr. Ivers vouches for the latter figures. Perhaps Mr. Ivers is also one of those who "deliberately distort" figures to the disadvantage of Hilo, but up to the present neither Mr. Ivers nor his predecessors have ever been accused of it. The fact is, Hilo looks at its own doings with magnifying glasses.

As was shadowed forth in The Star a fortnight or so ago Lahaina is to have a water system following in the wake of the Waialuku plan. A private company is to undertake the work until territorial funds can be made available through a money vote in the forthcoming legislature whenever it may meet. Lahaina, with the increasing plantation interests of which it is the center, is feeling a thorough awakening, and promises to win back something of its former glory. It was, 40 years ago, the most important place next to Honolulu. For years past it has been affected with dry rot, and might be summed up as a symphony in rotten houses and decaying mangoes. But that is all changed now.

According to the statement of one of Hilo's most prominent citizens the Oiaa plantation is spending more money in Hilo than any of the established institutions in the vicinity. Under such circumstances it would be natural to see the so-called supporters of Hilo progress giving what aid they can to the new venture. But far from it. One of the Hilo papers is doing all that it can to injure the plantation. This is a very suicidal policy and shows a narrowness of vision peculiar to a very small community. However low the price of Oiaa stock may be, at present, and that is caused by speculation and the desire of people to unload at a profit, Oiaa as a proposition is all right, and the plantation manager is making things hum. But it is a very ill bird which is fouling its own nest by decrying an enterprise that is calculated to advance the progress of the second city in the Territory.

**FISH.**

A suggestion with regard to food fish was made the other day by one of the island yachtsmen, which may be worth consideration. Not only have successful experiments been made in stocking rivers with food fish, but they have been also made with sea fish. Now our waters, which ought to yield a very abundant supply of the finny tribe, are by no means so prolific as they should be, and fish is frequently both dear and scarce.

As to what has been done there is a very good case in point in San Francisco. Twenty years or so ago there was not such a thing as a striped bass to be found on the coast. At that time first a consignment of 150 of the fish were obtained from the East, and put in the waters of the bay. A short time later another consignment of 300 was let loose and then no further trouble was taken.

This certainly was not a very large nucleus, but in the interval the fish have thriven wonderfully. Not only is

the bay full of striped bass, but the fish are now to be found as far south as Monterey. The fish are no rarity, but a good solid product of considerable commercial value. Last year there were taken out of San Francisco bay alone over 500,000 pounds of this particular kind of fish.

Of course striped bass might not do in our warm waters, but there are other kinds of fish that would, and what our local legislature should do is to give aid to such an experiment. The initial cost would certainly be trifling, while if successful, the returns would be a thousand fold. There is no reason why the coasts of our Islands should not swarm with fish, in spite of the sharks.

**EXPECTING TOO MUCH.**

That the executive of the United States desires to give the Islands as suitable a form of government as possible is certain. Moreover as this is a first step outside the continent, there is a strong desire not to make mistakes as what is done here is very likely to be used as a guide in other appenages of the republic. But there is one thing that must be well kept in mind. In settling what shall and what shall not be the government of these Islands, it is the representative body that has the say and which will give the final decision. People who have lived long here and have become accustomed to Hawaiian methods are apt to lose sight of this fact.

When dealing with our own questions here the custom has been to deal through the Cabinet, because the Cabinet generally carried the Legislature. Upon nearly every question the Cabinet had a working majority. There might be an opposition, but when the voting came upon any important measure, it went the government way.

In the United States there is a true democratic government. If a thing is not made a party measure every man thinks for himself, and out of the 400 members there are some hundreds who do not care to think about Hawaii. They have other things to think about. Not only do they know nothing about Hawaii, but they do not even care to be bothered with information about Hawaii. Their interests are centered on their own state affairs, and anything outside this they consider a bore. No amount of explanation is going to reach these men, and they are most decidedly not going to be led by the administration.

But such men thoroughly understand what a territory is. And if the future government of the Hawaiian Islands comes before Congress as a territorial form of government, pure and simple, this section of Congress will understand and probably vote for it. But the danger to our future lies in asking for peculiar provisions. Say for instance the restricted franchise. The moment that is proposed, a considerable section will start like a frightened horse. It is an innovation, and innovations are not wanted.

That there are many men in Congress who take a personal interest in the Islands is true. That many men are well informed as to the conditions existing in the Islands is also true. But it is as great a truth that the majority of Congress knows very little about the Islands and cares still less. We have no business therefore to ask for or expect special privileges, the privilege of becoming a territory of the United States ought to be quite enough for us.

There are people who look to special privileges. Men who profess to know Congress say that special privileges if asked for will only run up against the inertia of those who do not care to be informed, and who would vote against innovation on principle.

We must bear in mind that the interests of 130,000 people do not cut much ice when put alongside the interests of 70,000,000, that in the minds of representatives of the various states, they cut a very small figure against the state population. All that we can do is to have some one on hand to correct wrong information should it be given out, to render the remarks of our personal friends the more accurate or pointed. If any one goes forward from here with the idea that he is going to influence the legislation of the United States Congress, he is going on a wild goose chase. The value of a man in Washington is to give accurate information, when called upon. But no amount of skill or diplomacy will make Congress budge an inch except when it desires.

## THEY LOSE EVERY POINT

CHINESE IN LATEST HABEAS CORPUS MATTER

All Their Claims Overruled by Justice Frear and the Men Finally go Back to Agent Brown.

As forecasted in this paper some days ago the two Chinese brought before Justice Frear under a writ of habeas corpus for a hearing as to their right to land in Honolulu have been remanded. Chinese Agent Brown and will be returned to Hongkong.

There were several points in this case. When the Chinese were refused a landing by Agent Brown, they were turned over to the police, prosecuted and fined for an attempt to enter the country without legal permission. In the court they claimed that this transfer to the police constituted in itself a landing, that in passing into other hands they left the custody of the United States agent and could not be re-arrested in Hawaii by him.

Held, that though turned over to the police temporarily for prosecution for an infraction of Hawaiian law, the petitioners did not pass out of the legal custody of Agent Brown.

The second claim of petitioners was that though they had purchased their permits in Hongkong they were citizens of Hawaii and had a right to come in. One alleged that he was a half caste and was born on Hawaii.

A most crucial examination on this point, due to its importance, revealed the fact beyond doubt that the men were raw Chinamen, had never been to Hawaii before and were simply lying. Justice Frear so ruled without giving them the "roasting" they deserved.

Point three was that they had been refused a landing by United States Agent Brown and not by Collector Ivers. Hawaiian law prescribes that the latter only may deal with the matter.

The court admits, for the sake of argument, that the Chinese agent is not the final authority, but adds that the petitioners are not entitled to land and that neither the court nor the collector has the legal right to permit them to do so.

Point four was against the jurisdiction of the court to pass upon the acts of a Federal officer. Justice Frear states that he has impressions of his own in this matter, but prior decisions of the supreme court had made it unnecessary to consider the point.

This is a final settlement of the latest Chinese immigration case. It is held to be presumed, however, that it will be the last one, for Honolulu being the outpost of the United States on the Pacific, will receive the brunt of immigration assaults that has hitherto gone to San Francisco.

**"OUR NEW POSSESSIONS"**  
A TIMELY BOOK ON A CURRENT TOPIC.  
In It Trumbull White Has Given a Compendium of Information on a Subject of Interest.

"Our New Possessions," is the title of a book recently published by the Monarch Book Company of Chicago, treating of the territory acquired provisionally or permanently by the United States as the result of the Spanish war. The book is handsomely gotten up and is profusely illustrated. The pictures for the most part are well chosen and really serve to illustrate the text.

The author is Trumbull White, who brings large capacity and experience and many qualifications and accomplishments to the work. He is a world-wide traveller, and has been trained to habits of keen and careful observation by much experience as a newspaper correspondent in important undertakings. In another direction he has had valuable experience being the author of a successful popular history of the war between China and Japan. So that he brings to the work not only the careful painstaking, discriminating judgment of the historian, but the livelier faculties of the traveler and the newspaper writer. With the exception of the Philippines and Guam, he has been in all the countries of which he treats, so that his work has that touch and color which can only come from having seen the things of which he writes. He was in Hawaii about two years ago, and again a little later on his return from a trip to New Zealand and Australia.

The portions of the book devoted to Cuba and Porto Rico are especially valuable. With those two countries Mr. White was thoroughly familiar. He was in Cuba a number of times before the Spanish-American war and during the war he was there with the army as a correspondent of the Chicago Record. He went with the army to Porto Rico and was all over that island and studied it thoroughly.

While the chapters on the Philippines are confessedly from other sources than the personal observations of the writer, they are written from elaborate research and close touch with the best sources of information, and show the handling which only the traveled discrimination can give.

The portion of the book devoted to Hawaii is not large. But into the space given it, much information is compressed, and that of a kind which cannot but tend to give a correct idea of conditions here, to the American public.

The book is on sale in Honolulu. Mr. White is now on a mission through Siberia along the route of the great trans-Siberian railway for the Chicago Record.

## A LARGE CANE FACTORY

WEST INDIAN SUGAR OUTPUT THIS YEAR.

Improvement in Prospects Owing to Cuban War and Countervailing Duties in the United States.

Minister Loomis sends from Caracas information as to the condition and prospects of the sugar industry in the island. Trinidad, says Mr. Loomis, is one of the most successfully governed and prosperous of the British possessions in the West Indies and is a model colony. The largest cane factory in the West Indies is the Usine St. Madeleine. About nine tenths of the machinery with which the factory is equipped came from the United States. He says:

"The last crop has presented some remarkable features, well worthy the attention of others besides planters, because they are indications of material progress. First, there has been the expansion of the cane farming system to a degree which will be best realized from its financial side. Over \$100,000 have been paid to cane farmers during the last four months, and this, with other expenses entailed, amounts for the year to a total of \$1,000,000. The dearth of notes and gold in the colonial Bank. \* \* \* The flux and reflux of money in the colony indicates a more prosperous condition of things than was previously the case. In view of the fact that no abnormal change has taken place in the cocoa production, it must be due to the improved prospects of the sugar industry."

"The study of this material change for the better presents some interesting features. We first perceive that this year's sugar crop is a large one, exceeding the average of 56,000 tons. Nearly one fourth of the crop has been made by the Usine St. Madeleine, whose output to the closing day has been 13,000 tons—an increase of 1500 tons over the output of last year. This Usine is the premier central factory in the West Indies since the war in Cuba, where previously the Constancia factory and two others exceeded the output of the local Usine. A characteristic of the crop operations has been not only that farmers' canes have been plentifully bought by the factories, but the one or two estates which were threatened with abandonment have continued to exist by also selling their canes to the factories. \* \* \* Another notable feature of the sugar crop this year was the effect of the American countervailing duties, in putting new life into the local and Demerara sugar industry. The same result has been reported in the case of Mauritius in consequence of the imposition of the Indian countervailing duties. The planters of that island are now shipping sugar at remunerative prices to India. And yet, there has been no great rise in the price of sugar to startle the American or Indian consumer, but a fair market has had its inevitable result for an industry established in the nature of things to hold its own, and only prevented from doing so for some years past because of markets artificially rigged by the European buntlers. This affords a clear demonstration of the beneficial results that would accrue to the West Indian sugar industry if countervailing duties were imposed by England."
