TRAGIC VOYAGE OF JOHN ENA. SAN FRANCISCO, October 1.—The American bark John Ena, which arrived in Kobe recently, has had a most tragic voyage from New York, which port she left on April 11 last. Captain Madsen who is in command of the John Ena said that the last four months have been the most trying time he has ever experienced. When still in the neighborhood of Sandy Hook, in a perfectly calm sea, one of the men fell from aloft, and landing on one of the after davits was killed instantaneously. On the 16th day of June, when sixty days out, 150 miles southwest of the Cape, a hurricane was encountered. Both masts were washed overboard and one of the boats was broken up by the heavy sea. A young man who has some slight knowledge of navigation, but who had been but one year aloft was appointed chief officer, and a few days afterward he was knocked down by a big sea and had his arm broken, being thereby rendered useless for the rest of the voyage.

CONTRACT FOR BARKENTINE. SAN FRANCISCO, October 4.—Peterson & Company of this city have awarded a contract with a firm at Everett, Wash., for the construction of the largest barkentine on the coast. It is to be a four-master, with a carrying capacity of 2,000,000 feet of lumber. It will cost in the neighborhood of \$85,000.

TWO STEEL TRAINING SHIPS. WASHINGTON, October 3.—Secretary of the Navy Moody has included in his estimate for the fiscal year 1903 the sum of \$750,000 for two steel training ships, one for use on the Pacific Coast. Provision was made for these ships last winter in the Senate amendment offered by Senator Perkins, but it was stricken out in conference.

LABEL FOR SALVAGE. SAN FRANCISCO, October 4.—The Humboldt Lumber Manufacturers' Association filed a label in the United States District Court yesterday against the barkentine Kate Flickinger for salvage services performed by the libellant's tug Ranger in rescuing the barkentine while disabled near Eureka, Humboldt County. The court is asked to fix the value of the services.

SHORT OF PROVISIONS. SAN FRANCISCO, October 4.—The schooner Mary Buhne, which left Topoloampo forty-seven days ago for Eureka, put in here yesterday short of provisions. When the vessel sailed her food supply was none too generous, and when light winds and then a heavy storm prolonged the trip to unlooked for length, starvation with a big S boarded the little craft and proved an uncomfortable shipmate.

CONVERSION TO OIL-BURNERS. SAN FRANCISCO, October 4.—The Pacific Mail Steamship Company will shortly commence the work of converting the steamships under its flag into oil burners. Plans for the change have been made and accepted and the work will be done as rapidly as the Panama and Oriental schedules will allow. Oil stations will be established in the Orient and at Panama. The supply of liquid fuel for the Oriental stations will be drawn from the Russian oil fields. The Panama station will be supplied from California.

MRS. NATION AT YALE

NEW YORK, September 30.—A special to the Sun from New Haven, Conn., says: Mrs. Carrie Nation faced the Yale students yesterday, and after her rather forced retirement said that the Yale men were very tough. In less than five minutes after Mrs. Nation's arrival on the campus a thousand students faced her. They brought along several dogs that could do some tall barking when necessary, an Italian with a barrel organ and front of the Yale Glee Club. Right in front of her were scores of students puffing away on cigarettes. Occasionally she walked down into the crowd and snatched the cigarettes from the lips of the students. During her address on the evils of whisky and tobacco the students broke in on her again and again with the college yells. While she was discussing the liquor evil the Yale Glee Club and a thousand students began singing "Good-by, Booze," and then took up "Down With King Alcohol," and wound up with "Show Me the Way to Go Home, Carrie." These melodies rather rattled her, for she went back at the boys with the remark: "You are on the road to hell." "Oh, fudge, Carrie," shouted back the college lads. That settled it. Mrs. Nation could not stand it any longer, and she snatched the barrel organ and snatched several cigarettes as she passed. "The nasty things," she remarked as she pitched the cigarettes into the street. Then she retired greatly discomfited to her hotel.

TO TRY FARMING. Los Angeles, September 28.—S. A. Drummond left Riverside for San Francisco yesterday where he will join J. C. Bryan, and both will sail October 1st on the transport Thomas for the Philippines. Drummond returned over a year ago from active service in the Philippines, after making thorough investigations into the possibilities of growing fruit, grain and vegetables on the islands. So favorably impressed is he with the future of the Government's new possessions in this direction that he and Bryan will go there to engage in such pursuits. He will take with him a large variety of buds, cuttings, seeds and so on to try in the soil of the Philippines. Drummond's family will follow him to the islands.

CANNON WILL BE NEXT SPEAKER

ILLINOIS CONGRESSMAN LIKELY TO SUCCEED—NONE OF RIVALS REGARDED WITH MUCH FAVOR.

WASHINGTON, D. C., September 27.—There is a vast amount of gossip in Washington about who is to be the next Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Within the week several conferences informal in character, have been held in Washington on the speakership question. The claims of Mr. Littlefield of Maine, Mr. Sherman of New York and Mr. Babcock of Wisconsin, have been compared with those of Mr. Cannon.

It is understood that there have been recent conferences among Eastern business interests about the best man for Speaker to succeed Mr. Henderson, and that it has been agreed that Mr. Cannon would be perfectly agreeable to the East.

Spanish Government Pursues Honorable Course. WASHINGTON, September 29.—The treasury department has begun distribution of \$28,500,000 of the government of Spain as one of the annual payments of indemnity due under the treaty of 1834.

The Republican ticket will receive the full support of the Portuguese vote in this district, says the Hilo Herald.

A dispatch states that the total registration of the First Representative District, taking in Hilo, totaled at 1571.

Sixty-one persons took out their American citizenship papers in the Circuit Court at Hilo last Friday and Saturday.

George H. Fairchild and his family returned on the Alameda. They will return to Kaula next week. Mrs. Fairchild has been absent for a year.

CONFERENCE ON THE COAL STRIKE

PRESIDENT WAS NOT SUCCESSFUL—THERE WILL BE NO CALL FOR AN EXTRA SESSION.

WASHINGTON, October 4.—There will be no call for an extra session of Congress to deal with the coal strike situation at this stage. The President especially stated in his appeal to the representatives of the miners and the operators yesterday that he did not act officially in calling them together. He has for the time being exhausted his resources. The matter is again one with which the State of Pennsylvania should deal. If the commonwealth itself unable to control the situation and appeals to him through the constitutional channels, the President will be ready to bring into play the great force of the National Government, military and civil. But for the time being the President has relaxed his efforts.

A great many radical suggestions have been made as the result of the failure of the conference yesterday, and they include everything, from taking possession by the Government to sending United States troops to Pennsylvania without regard to any call from the Governor of that State. It can be positively stated that none of these suggestions has received any serious consideration by the administration.

It is not yet known whether President Roosevelt will issue a statement commenting upon the result of yesterday's coal conference. Some of the Cabinet members will advise against such a course. There is disappointment that the effort of the President met with no better success, but it seems to be the opinion of those who are cognizant of the situation that the administration can do no more. The good offices of the President to settle the strike was the limit of his power.

DISCORD IN AUSTRALIA.

Queensland Anxious To Withdraw But There Seems No Way Out.

NEW YORK, September 29.—The London correspondent of the Tribune cables: Although ominous reports have for some time past been received from Queensland, and Premier Robert Phillip, now openly advocates the secession of that state from the Federal Union, the Queensland cannot be threatened with the ease that the Premier of Queensland has done. The commonwealth constitution act does not make provision for secession, and apparently there are no means of obtaining separation short of an act of repeal or civil war.

Premier Phillip seems to anticipate that he will receive the support of the people who also are dissatisfied with present conditions, but the extreme measure is not likely to be taken. Still, this unrest is having a very prejudicial effect on business in the commonwealth, and nearly every Australian government loan has suffered in value during the last fortnight. The trouble arose out of the fact that Queensland had been hard hit by Federal legislation on the labor question, which practically will annihilate the sugar industry, in which hundreds of thousands of pounds of British capital has been invested.

A NEW CHEMIST.

HILO, October 10.—Miss Marshall Kelsey, who has been acting as Deputy Clerk of the Fourth Circuit Court for two months, leaves this morning for Honolulu. She goes to Kahuku plantation to fill the position of chemist.

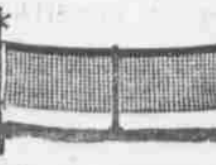
