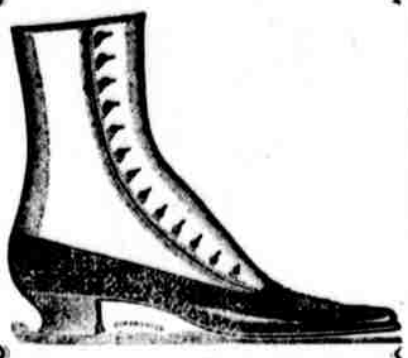

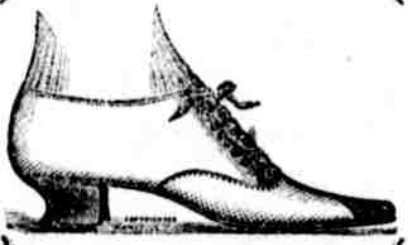

Probate Matters on File in the Clerk's Office.

W. O. Smith, guardian of the Pa-
 pal minors, has filed his annual
 account. It shows receipts of \$268.94
 and expenditures of \$247.79, leaving
 a balance due the guardian of
 \$1647.85. The same gentleman, as
 guardian of the Rich minors, in his
 annual account reports receipts of
 \$1654 and expenditures of \$813.62,
 leaving a balance of \$850.38 due the
 estate. As guardian of the Bridges
 minors Mr. Smith reports receipts
 of \$304.16 and expenditures of \$259.
 16, leaving a balance of \$45 due the
 estate.

Akoi, guardian of Lashia (w.),
 Kaimu, Oahu, reports having received
 from J. Kahaka four horses and
 one cow and calf, and "sold three
 horses and cow and calf, \$50; left
 one horse not sold."
 In Elizabeth Moorhead, plaintiff,
 vs. David Dayton, trustee, and Dan-
 iel M. Corriston and Hugh McCor-
 riston, defendants, the answer of de-
 fendants has been filed. The suit is
 a bill in equity to enforce a trust.
 Plaintiff claims rents from property
 on Fort street, belonging to the es-
 tate of her late brother-in-law, John
 McColgan, under his will, but de-
 fendants say the will gives her only
 the rents from the premises formerly
 occupied by the Geomarine Market.

J. W. Davidson petitions for pro-
 bate of the will of Kaacooko,
 which leaves the wife of petitioner,
 who is daughter of decedent, and
 Emma Davidson and the petitioner
 real estate at Hana, Maui, valued at
 \$1000.

W. H. Barel, assignee of Tong
 Hing, reports receipts of \$130 and
 payments of \$75 in expenses. The
 proved claims amount to \$816.65,
 of which \$799.93 is owing to Thos. H.
 Davies & Co.

Mrs. Elizabeth K. Booth, nee
 Baker, petitions for the appointment
 of her husband, C. W. Booth, as
 trustee of the property she received
 under the will of Malie Kaha, in
 place of J. A. Cummins, adminis-
 trator and trustee, resigned.

David Dayton, administrator of
 the estate of Joseph N. C. Gilman,
 sues August Dreier, administrator of
 the estate of James N. C. Gilman,
 for \$500 damages in trover. Plain-
 tiff alleges that James Gilman held
 a Government bond for \$500 in trust
 for the equal benefit of himself and
 Joseph, his co-tenant, and that since
 the death of James the adminis-
 trator of his estate, Mr. Dreier, has
 unlawfully converted the bond and
 coupons to his own use and enjy-
 ment.

 Newell of San Francisco.

Illustrating What He Meant

Latter day speakers of English
 are getting to be very wordy and
 pompous in the use of our language,
 according to the distinguished lin-
 guist, Professor Whitney, and he

 modesty and simplicity of our an-
 cestors. This advice of Professor Whit-
 ney is no doubt timely. But in ad-
 vising us not to use big words and
 to be clear, pure and simple in dic-
 tion he employs the following words:
 "Avoid all polysyllabic profundity,
 pompous prolixity, and ventriloquial
 verpidity. Shun double entendre
 and prurient jocosity, whether ob-
 scure or apparent. In other words,
 speak truthfully, naturally, clearly,
 purely, but do not use large words."

 Episcopal church at Tokio, who was
 a few years ago a student in Drew
 Theological Seminary at Madison,
 N. J.

At this point the neighbors wanted to leave the house, but Cleary said he would not open the door till he got his wife back.

Mrs. Burke, another witness, admitted in her testimony that she afterward saw the corpse carried out of the house in a bag.

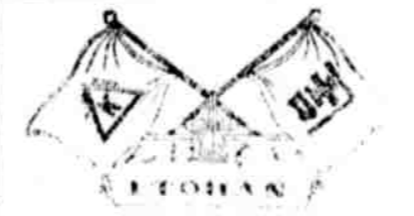

ANOTHER JEREMIAH.

The Nineteenth Century as Viewed by a San Francisco Priest

Eloquent and logical was the lecture delivered to a large audience in St. Mary's Cathedral last evening by Rev. P. C. Yorko for the benefit of Presentation Convent, says a report in the San Francisco Call. He took as his theme "Signs of the Times." In the course of his address he said: "The Christian era will soon be out of its teens. On the threshold of the twentieth century it is but natural that we look back on the nineteenth.

"The nineteenth century is a wonderful period. Fifty years ago the boasting was loud; lately it has been more subdued. The cause is that its promises have not been fulfilled. The United States has been the embodiment of the nineteenth century. We have had liberty, yet we are crying about corruption. We have had immense resources, yet we have strikes and poverty. We have had universal education, yet in Auburn and Sing Sing 84 percent of the convicts can read and write and 6 percent are graduates of colleges.

"The nineteenth century has recognized these weak spots and tried to correct them. Its remedy was machinery. Against corruption it gave us the Australian ballot, and now that the Australian ballot has failed it wants to give us a voting machine. Against poverty it gives us everything from high tariff to single tax. Against immorality it gives us compulsory education and resolutions of Boards of Supervisors. It makes a machine out of public opinion, but we have discovered that public opinion can be manufactured to order. When newspapers fail it offers Lexow committees and grand juries.

"These remedies were useless. The committees were quarrelling over the spoils before they adjourned. "The cause of all the evil is the lack of personal morality. Man has free will, and his free will can only be moved by ideals. Unfortunately his ideals are mere success. The only hope is the growth of Christian morality. Not a mere sentiment, but a morality which is a sanction. It may be more beautiful to think of being good, but human nature needs a sanction.

"When hell grows unfashionable, a heaven quickly follows."

CHARTER OF THE BULLETIN

Pledged to neither Sect nor Party,
But Established for the Benefit of All.

TUESDAY, APRIL 16, 1895.

An article in the Advertiser advocates the appointment of a Minister to Japan, to supersede Mr. Irwin, Charge d'Affaires at Tokio. Mr. Irwin, it appears, is after all only a "labor contractor" for the Hawaiian planters. It has taken a long time to find out this fact. Is not the suggestion just a feeler for the appointment of some Government pet as Minister to Tokio? Japan is the larger nation, however, and ought to lead off in magnifying the relations between the two Governments by appointing a Minister to Honolulu.

Great nations seem to be getting into trouble with little nations all round. Washington is found ineffectual for Hawaiian diplomacy and Great Britain has a "jaw" with both Nicaragua and Venezuela. There is also, according to late accounts, a serious tiff between France and Paraguay. The Paris Figaro announces that the Government of Paraguay has withdrawn the exequatur of the French consul on the ground that he incited colonists to leave the country without previously repaying the government advances made to these colonists. As a slight token of retaliation the French Government has withdrawn the exequaturs of all the Paraguayan consuls. And there you are.

Several owners of trotting and pacing horses are expressing their dissatisfaction over the proposed program for the June races. They want a 3 minute class in which foreign-bred horses will be eligible. It is also argued that the 2:40 class should be abolished and a 2:30 class substituted, as there are several horses in the country too fast for the 2:40 class, that would have to be entered in the free-for-all, in which they would be outclassed. Horses with a record better than 2:30 would then be entered in the free-for-all. There are at least four horses that could compete in the last race. This proposition, it is considered, would give all owners a fair show for their money. It will be brought up and discussed at the next meeting of the Jockey Club.

Captain Cochrane struck a live subject in his lecture the other evening, when he referred to the great disparity between the price of grapes in California and what they fetch in Honolulu. It cannot lie in the absence of competition between local fruit dealers, of which there is a host both white and Chinese, and there does not appear to be any suspicion of a combination to hold up prices. It would be in order to advocate the organization of a consumers' union, to look for remedies for this and cognate communal grievances, but the fate of organizations for mutual benefit in Honolulu has usually been not encouraging for new action in that line. The Merchants' Protective Association, formed to abolish quarterly in favor of monthly settlements, is a not very remote example of convulsive but abortive effort to secure a common boon by organiza-

tion. There ought to be enough grapes raised at home to bring down prices, but as there is not it is too bad that the 18 cents margin between the price in California and that here for the same article, mentioned by Captain Cochrane, cannot be reduced.

THAT FOOLISH POLICY.

Even if it was certain that the Republicans were going to be victorious in the next presidential election, it is none the less bad policy on the part of those who are hoping for annexation at this end of the line to attach their fortunes to any one of the great parties of the United States. There is not the slightest probability that any single party will be potent enough of itself to carry through a measure of such great importance as would be the annexation of outside territory. It behoves both the Government and the people of these islands, if they would secure an early consummation of political union with the great republic, to make no entangling alliances with either of the two leading parties when friends are likely to be needed on both sides. This is not the only phase of the question to be considered, however, for there is another one that should be patent to our wise men, but to which they seem to be oblivious when they talk flippantly as if the Republicans were the friends, and the Democrats the enemies of Hawaii. Does it not occur to them that, once the Democrats are convinced by Hawaiian official and other influential talk that this country if admitted to the Union would be only a "rotten borough" for the Republican party, the Democratic party, now containing many powerful friends of annexation, will come to show a solid front against the project? Anybody with the gumption requisite for a poundmaster ought to realize the folly of inviting such a situation regarding the Hawaiian question in the United States. At the same time, it is folly to predict, at this time, as has been held in this paper before, the result of the next presidential election. The local elections, in which we hear of great Republican gains, are really no criterion of the great national contest of 1896. Many of these, as the news tells us, are due to a general movement in behalf of municipal reform, and as the Democratic party has been usually strong in the large towns, it is proportionately held responsible for whatever there is to reform, therefore has to go down before the besom of revived civic virtue. When the struggle takes place for possession of the executive power at Washington for four years, municipal reform will not be a factor in the case in any but a very minute degree, if at all. The people will judge the present administration by its record and its results. If the dismal prophecies of blue ruin, to follow the not altogether unsuccessful attempts at tariff reform, turn out to have been belied by the condition of the country next fall, then the people of town and country will not need to be instructed upon that point, but will vote according to their interests as well as their intelligence. Great national questions, and not the small affairs of the burgh, will determine the issue in all the doubtful States, Eastern, Middle and Western, and there is no more hope of breaking up the "solid South," at the next election, than there is of a way being made for ships across the Isthmus of Panama by that time. As a small measure of repairing the mischief already done by some of our people here, in "making faces" at the Republicans, it may be useful for our friends across the water to know that many of the earliest and strongest supporters of the revolution for a republic here were Americans of the Democratic party. Also, that at the last presidential election the mock election held in Honolulu, according to custom, resulted in a majority for Grover Cleveland.

MR. ASHFORD'S CASE.

Letter of Explanation from the Deputy Marshal.

EDITOR BULLETIN:

An article appearing in your issue of the 15th, headed "V. V. Ashford's Case," is misleading to such an extent that I deem it my duty to call your attention to a few facts concerning the same.

To begin with, Mr. Ashford is not yet pardoned, he is still a prisoner in the custody of the Marshal and while he remains as such, must be treated as such. The express condition of the pardon is, that it shall take effect from the date of his (Ashford's) departure from the Hawaiian Islands.

Pending his departure he is to be under the surveillance of an officer, to come and go, however, as he pleases and transact such business as he wishes to.

Prior to Mr. Ashford's conviction, as your article states, he was allowed to have his own physician, Dr. Brodie. After his conviction, according to prison regulations, he came under the treatment of the regular prison physician. These regulations do, however, admit private medical attendance, and in Mr. Ashford's case, upon proper representations being made, Dr. Brodie was still continued as his physician, and acted as such up to the time of his departure from the country. After Dr. Brodie left, Drs. Wood and Miner attended Mr. Ashford.

The pardon will be delivered to Mr. Ashford whenever it takes effect, that is, when he departs from these shores.

KEELAN, THE SOUTHERN SPY.

Many a Confederate Secret Will Be Buried in His Grave.

James Keelan, who died a broken down gambler in Kansas City a few days ago, had an extraordinary career as a confederate spy and go between, upon whom hundreds of rebel sympathizers relied for news of their relatives and friends in the southern army. At the breaking out of the civil war Keelan, who was only 15 years of age, began carrying mail between the Missouri secessionists in General Price's army and their friends in St. Louis and Jefferson City. While thus employed Keelan was arrested and tried by court-martial. His youth reduced his sentence to banishment from the state. As soon as he was free he began his illicit mail service and two years later, in 1863, he was captured again in St. Louis. He managed to throw a mail bag containing letters which would have compromised many prominent persons in St. Louis into the Mississippi River. He was tried and condemned to be shot. Assisted by his friends he made his escape the day before that set for his execution. Making his way to Richmond he got employment as a confederate spy, and in this capacity he supplied Jefferson Davis and his cabinet with much valuable information. He also took part in the blowing up of trains containing union troops upon the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad by means of mines under the track. No further accident befell him, though he was active as a spy until the fall of the confederacy. After the war Keelan seemed unable to settle down to steady business and finally became a professional card player, and was always to be found wherever a new railroad was being built.

In person Keelan was slight and had the delicate features of a woman, yet as a spy he showed that he did not know fear. He never talked about his adventures, and numberless secrets of the confederate cabinet and their agents and allies in the north were buried with Keelan.

HE'S A BAD ONE

Let Clear Only to Commit a Fresh Offense.

Alale, the old native who was brought in yesterday for alleged insanity, was examined by Dr. Cooper and pronounced not insane. He was set at liberty. The old man went straight to the house of the woman he had threatened to kill during the day, and made an attempt to assault her with a billet of wood. He was prevented by neighbors, and another complaint was made. This morning Alale was again put in the cooler.

Mounted Patrol Drilling.

Captain Cook of the mounted patrol is drilling his men daily. The members of the old patrol and two or three others are about the only ones who can sit a saddle a little bit. The others seem to be strangers to the mount, and it will be some time before they will be able to ride properly. Ernest Renken makes a good lieutenant and looks well in his new uniform.

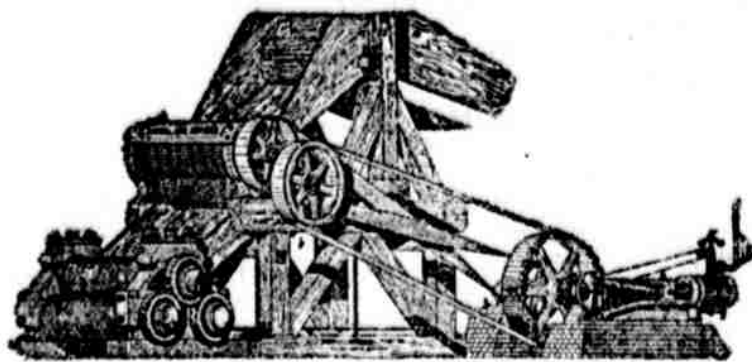

Foreign News Items.

Bismarck never uses any pens save those made of geesequills.

The old whisky trust of the United States is to be sued, to make it disgorge \$2,000,000 of ill gotten gains.

A phonographic desk on which a speaker can record his own oration is soon to be tested in the German reichstag.

One franc for a quarter of an hour's travel and two francs for an hour is the new charge of Paris cab companies.

The New York Assembly bill prohibiting all pool-selling, book-making, bets and wagers has passed the Assembly—ayes 92, nays 1. It now goes to the Senate.

A bronze statue of Flora MacDonald will shortly be erected at Inverness, Scotland, \$5000 having been left by a recently deceased army officer for that purpose.

Sir Forrest Fulton, common sergeant of the City of London, says that crime in the British capital is rapidly decreasing. He attributes this result to the spread of temperance and the influence of the education acts.

The ruby district of upper Burma is about twenty-six miles long and twelve broad, and lies at an elevation of from 4000 to 5000 feet above the level of the sea. The present area being worked for the gems is about forty-five square miles.

A lady is to form one of the crew in the forthcoming Austrian north pole expedition, undertaken by the famous artist and arctic explorer, Julius Payer. She is herself an artist of talent, and volunteered and was accepted at Buda-Pesth.

The latest thing in boycotts abroad is one recently inaugurated by casual paupers who had been in the habit of procuring daily allowances of food at the St. George Hospital, Mile End, London. Becoming dissatisfied with the quality of food doled out they held an indignation meeting and resolved not to patronize the institution.

During a violent windstorm recently at Walsall, England, two chimneys on a hospital were blown down. The bricks fell in a mass on the roof, through which they crashed, carrying with them nine bed-ridden patients from the top floor to the next. None of the patients were killed, and only one or two were even seriously hurt.

The reconstructed banks of Australia are rapidly clearing off the indebtedness incurred as a result of the panic in 1893. The shareholders were called upon to pay something over \$30,000,000, but the periodical calls have been met so freely that, up to the present time, over \$300,000 in excess of the amount due has been received by the creditors.

Cattle belonging to an evicted tenant in Tipperary were saved to the owner in a curious way not long ago. They were to be sold at auction for arrears of rent, but when the first animal was knocked down the crowd refused to take it from the ring. Another cow was sold with the same result, and then the auctioneer abandoned his attempt to conduct the sale.

At an inquest recently on the bodies of seven miners who had been killed in Shropshire, England, through the breaking of a rope attached to a cage, several witnesses testified that for two years they had known that the rope was in an unsafe condition. They had feared to make complaint, believing that such action on their part would have resulted in their discharge.

While discussing the naval estimates in the French chamber, M. Lockroy pointed out that, while these estimates amounted to almost exactly two-thirds of those in England, the value of the French fleet was not half that owned in the island kingdom. He declared that in this regard the future was disquieting. M. Lockroy's remarks caused somewhat of a sensation.

The Rome correspondent of the London Globe writes that the pope is disposed to abolish the law of celibacy for secular clergy. His holiness is said to favor the idea of confining the obligation of celibacy to members of religious orders which impose vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. The sovereign pontiff is well aware that the law of compulsory celibacy is all but a dead letter among parochial clergy in South America, and to a great extent also in Spain, Italy and Portugal, and the dependencies of these countries.
