**TELEGRAPHIC ITEMS**

Bulgarians have been arrested and tortured to secure information of Miss Stone.

A ten billion dollar company of eastern capitalists has been incorporated in Arizona.

The people of Tekva, Washington, use a fire hose on an individual of anarchistic tendencies.

Financial circles in France are feeling the effects of the collapse of Russian securities and banks.

The Democrats of San Francisco have nominated Joseph S. Tobin, at present supervisor, for Mayor.

Mustangs, or desert horses, are to be killed by hunters in Arizona, a grand hunt having been organized to kill them off.

In Kansas City a fortune of \$100,000 is awaiting I. Herbert Wisner and his sister Bertha. They have not yet been found.

An eccentric Stockton man who dies, wills that his ashes shall be scattered from the top of a tall building in San Francisco.

The Huntington mansion, on California and Taylor streets in San Francisco, is to be eventually given over to some hospital.

A decree has been issued by Captain Leary that all the sailors at League Island navy yard must learn to sing "The Star Spangled Banner."

Judge Morris, in the United States District Court, decided that the extra tariff duties levied on sugar imported from Russia into the United States is legal.

A new treatment by injecting cocaine in the spinal column, the effect of which is to stop pain while preserving consciousness, has been successfully tried at Stockton.

A report from a committee in the House of Bishops was presented declaring the expediency of appointing a bishop for the Philippine Islands without unnecessary delay.

State Superintendent of Prison Collins has given orders that Czolgosz, the murderer of President McKinley, must not be the subject of notoriety while in Auburn prison awaiting electrocution.

Columbian Liberals fired on the British Steamer Quito, one cannon ball making a hole in her above her water-mark. Shortly after the British warship Icarus left Panama for a destination not made public.

France wants Russia to reduce the duties on French wine and brandy, but Russia asks corresponding reductions in the duties on wheat and other agricultural products, as well as the revocation of the sanitary rules affecting Russian cattle.

Lord Kitchener reports to the War Office from Pretoria under today's date that General French's columns have captured Commandant Schaeper, but does not state whether Schaeper's commando, which has been active in Cape Colony, was captured or not.

Prince Cling has written to the Ministers of the powers, requesting the withdrawal from Peking of the foreign business establishments. He says that Peking is not a treaty port, that foreign business houses have been illegally established here and should be moved to treaty ports.

A dispatch from Managua, Nicaragua, Oct. 8, says: Severe seismic disturbances caused by volcanic action in the Pacific, raising the level of the ocean, occurred at 9 o'clock last night. The Pacific coast of Nicaragua was flooded to a depth of eight feet, and much damaged was done.

Lorenzo Snow, fifth president of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, better known as the Mormon Church, died rather unexpectedly at his private residence, the historic Bee Hive House, October 10. President Snow during his life was the husband of nine wives and the father of forty-three children. Three of his wives are still living.

**LOCALS**

There has been considerable talk recently about arranging for a prize fight on Maui, but the idea has been abandoned. Quite right.

The Ladies' Guild of the Anglican Church will hold a bazaar at the Settlement Building, on the evening of Saturday, November 16, and not on Nov. 23, as was reported.

A swarm of bees have taken a suite of rooms in the garret of the Maui Hotel, and are laying in a supply of fresh honey for Manager Hagenkamp who proposes to burglarize them shortly.

Cane planting, which was temporarily checked on account of the dry weather has been resumed with vigor, and about the usual acreage will be put in, but will be harvested proportionately later.

Rev. E. W. Thwing has accepted an invitation to occupy the pulpit of the Pain Foreign Church at 11 a. m. tomorrow for the purpose of delivering a lecture on China from the missionary standpoint.

Heavy rains are reported at Hamakua, and in fact all throughout the parched regions of Hawaii. This is cheering news no less on account of checking forest fires that of saving starving cattle and horses.

On Monday morning a general rainstorm prevailed on Central Maui, and it has rained some every day since, with prospects for plenty more, which proves a very grateful relief from the last eight months of drought.

Manuel Coelho, the Portuguese who was convicted of having stolen a pig in Kula, was again arrested last Sunday morning for stealing \$110 from Hans Amundsen, proprietor of the Maui Stables, and was committed by Judge McKay for trial at the December term.

While the Superintendent of Public Works was visiting Maui this week, his attention was very forcibly invited to the condition of the road between Wailuku and Maalaea Bay, and it is possible that means may be provided to repair some of the worst portion of the road.

A practice game of base ball was played at Wel's Park last Sunday afternoon, and a regular game will be played tomorrow afternoon between the Morning Stars and the pick of the M. A. A. Quite a hot game will be played, if the rain does not interfere.

Judge J. W. Kalea entertained Supt. Boyd and Deputy Campbell at an elaborate luau at his residence in Iao Valley on Thursday afternoon. A large number of the prominent citizens of Wailuku were among the invited guests, and the occasion proved a very a delightful one.

**Fathers Boardman and Magevney at Wailuku.**

On Thursday evening last, Rev. Marshall Boardman and Rev. Eugene Magevney began a series of Mission Services which will conclude on next Tuesday. The first sermon of the series was delivered on Thursday evening by Father Magevney to a large audience, and was a forceful and eloquent presentation of the theme, "Violation of God's Law." On last evening Father Boardman delivered an interesting elucidation of the topic, "Confession of Sins." Tonight, Father Magevney will speak on "Eternal Punishment," and Father Boardman to-morrow (Sunday) night's, will be "Wages of Sins." The concluding sermon will be delivered on Monday evening to be followed by the Papal Benediction.

Every morning during the Mission, at 6 and at 9, a. m., practical instructions are given on the Commandments and the daily duties of christian life. In the afternoon, children are instructed in their home and christian duties. Devotional at articles are blessed daily after last Mass.

The reverent gentlemen leave for Hilo on Tuesday, where they will conduct a 10 days mission, from Nov. 3 to Nov. 19. They will then visit the volcano and other points of interest on the big Island, returning to Honolulu in time to leave for their home in Chicago about Nov. 15.

**Disastrous Tunnel Accident at Pain.**

On Thursday morning at about 10:30 four Portuguese were running a tunnel at the old Pain Plantation Well and Pump, near the sea-beach, when the tunnel caved in, almost burying the men. One of them escaped with but little injury. Antonio Freitas, the father of Joseph Freitas of Spreckelsville was very seriously injured about the head and had one rib broken, but is resting easily and will recover. Another Portuguese was also seriously injured and taken to the hospital, but will recover.

John Techeira, the fourth man was entirely covered by debris, and when he was released life was found to be entirely extinct. The unfortunate man came from Portugal to Maui about five years ago, and has ever since made his home at Pain. He leaves a wife, and a son about 10 years of age.

**Dedication of Chinese Mission Church.**

The result of sincere and persistent Christian missionary influence and teaching on the Chinese residents of Maui has crystallized into many pretty forms, the most noteworthy of which is a dainty but commodious church erected on the Settlement grounds in the rear of the kindergarten building, entirely by funds subscribed by the Chinese themselves, who exhibited a commendable sense of personal pride in their desire to build their church without financial aid from the outside.

The dedication exercises of the Chinese Mission Church will be held on Sunday, November 3, at 11, a. m. Mr. F. W. Danon, Superintendent of Chinese Mission work, and Rev. Mr. Thwing, Assistant Superintendent are expected to arrive on Maui-noon, and will both be present at the dedication services. A cordial invitation is extended to all, to be present.

**Supt. Boyd and Campbell Arrive.**

In response to an urgent wireless message sent by Supt. W. E. Bal, Superintendent of the Wailuku Water Works, Supt. Boyd, accompanied by Mr. Campbell, arrived on the Claudine, to look into the damaged condition of the Wailuku reservoir.

It is evident to anyone who examines the injury that the whole trouble lies in the fact that the cement lining of the reservoir was defective, and that no amount of patching or filling in will cure the defect. The only thing to be done is to take out the present coat of cement and put in a coat that will stand. There is no money in the treasury for this purpose at present. Mr. Boyd was asked why some of the surplus earnings of the Wailuku & Kahului Water Works could not be applied to the purpose and he replied that red tape and the auditor's office stood in the way of prompt action. The imperative need for immediate repairs to the reservoir will, it is hoped, lead to early means being adopted to re-cement the reservoir.

**SHIP KINROSS ASHORE.**

News was received early this morning that the Kinross, which left Kahului yesterday for Kihel went on a reef in Maalaea Bay last night, with pilot Bob English on board. Capt Murray, formerly of the "Antiope" went over this morning to take charge of the wreck in the interests of all concern. No particulars received.

**Personal Mention.**

R. E. Berg, manager of Grinbaum, and Mr. Willits an oil man, were passengers on Wednesday's Claudine for Hana.

Mr. Geo. D. Schrader is rapidly recovering from the effects of his recent injury, and will soon be able to be out again.

Mr. A. Enos writes from San Francisco that his health is improving, and that he hopes to be in Wailuku again early in November.

Judge Kepoikai found himself unable to leave Maui as soon as he had expected, to resume his labors as Fire Claims commissioner in Honolulu.

Mr. Kawaloha head fisherman of A. N. Kepoikai and father to representative S. Kawaloha died suddenly on Thursday afternoon Oct. 24, 1901, at Wailuku.

Mr. A. R. McLane, passenger and freight agent at Paia, is spending a few days in Makawao for relief of a dangerously severe cold which he contracted at Paia.

Mr. G. W. Carr, of the U. S. postal service to whom the Islands are largely indebted for their present excellent mail route system, spent several days in Wailuku this week as the guest of the Windsor Hotel.

Surveyor James T. Taylor is running out and readjusting a number of old survey lines among the ranches east of Haku plantation, this week.

The Paia central Telephone Office will be closed on Sunday to put in a lightning arrester board. If you are obliged to ring up Paia central, however, ask for Paia Club House, or Tam Yau, Makawao.

Mr. Chas. Lefkin manager of the National Bank of Wailuku, arrived from the Coast on last Saturday's Alameda, and will probably reach Maui on Wednesday. The first of November is slated as the day of opening, but it is quite probable that actual business will not begin until the arrival of the fixtures, books etc. from the Coast, they having been shipped on the Flint which left S. F., October 15.

**New Political Party.**

The story printed in the Bulletin relative to a new political party in Hilo is true up to a certain point. The Hawaiians of this island, particularly in Hilo, decided sometime ago to withdraw from the Home Rule party and affiliate with the Republicans. The attacks of some of the Honolulu papers upon some of the appointees of a Republican administration, however, put them at sea and what would have been increase in the ranks of the Republican party on Hawaii now forms a nucleus of a secret political organization which will eventually become an opponent of the Republican party at the polls. Up to three months ago matters were shaping themselves well but the bitterness of the fight in Honolulu has had an effect upon the Hawaiians that is to be regretted. This information comes from a gentleman not in politics but who is in close touch with the Hawaiians. — Hawaii Herald.

## PURSUIT MEANT DEATH.

Turkish Troops Called Off.

NEW YORK, October 14.—A cable to the World from Constantinople says: The American missionaries, Haskell and Baird, and United States Consul-General Dickinson, are trying to resume negotiations with the brigands for ransoming Miss Stone.

The Turkish commander on the Bulgarian frontier had laid all his plans and disposed his men to surround the brigands last Saturday at noon. Secretary Spencer Eddy of the American Legation here learned that if the commander undertook to carry out his plan Miss Stone would be put to death. He went to the house of Tewfik Pasba, the Turkish Minister of Foreign Affairs, at 3 o'clock Saturday morning, and demanded that the Turkish troops be withdrawn immediately.

The order was promptly telegraphed to the frontier, the Turks retired and to Bulgarian soldiers who were co-operating with the Sultan's men in the surrounding movement also fell back. The diplomatic corps here applauded Secretary Eddy's acting, for they believe that any attempt to rescue Miss Stone by force will result in her murder.

Brigands Capture a German Business Man.

LONDON, October 15.—"It is announced from Bucharest," says a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Vienna, "that Herr Rosenthal, the representative of a German firm, has been kidnaped by Bulgarian brigands at Silestra. The Roumanian Government has sent a protest to Sofia, and the Bulgarian Government has ordered troops to pursue the brigands."

"It is rumored that the Macedonian committee has decided to capture every foreigner within reach in order to attract European attention to the bad state of public security in Macedonia."

Russia's Trade In

China Almost Gone.

NEW YORK, October 14.—A cable to the Times from London says: The correspondent of the Times at Odessa says recent returns in regard to Russia's trade with China bear eloquent testimony to the severity of the blow dealt to Russia by the outbreak in China. In the first four months of this year trade by the Kiakhta route amounted to 850,000 roubles (\$437,750), as compared with trade in the corresponding months of last year of 6,800,000 roubles. In the light of these figures, remarks the correspondent, the attitude of the Russian journals toward the restoration of Manchuria to the Chinese is intelligible.

Boers Again Melting Away.

NEW YORK, October 14.—Heavy rains have temporarily interfered with communication between the columns in the field, says a Dundee, Natal, dispatch to the Times. As was feared, the Boer force, in trying to make good its escape, has melted into small groups.

Commandant-General Botha and the main body of burghers, accompanied by three commandants, have reached Pongola forest, near Luneburg, Transvaal.

LONDON, October 14.—A special dispatch from Cape Town says that owing to the restrictions of martial law the pro-Boer South African News has been obliged to suspend publication.

Russia Active in the Balkans.

VIENNA, October 14.—The Reichswehr announces that a conference will shortly be held in Belgrade of the diplomatic representatives of Serbia, Bulgaria and Montenegro, and that a Russian Minister will be present. It is expected here that the conference is a Russian move toward the formation of a definite Balkan dreibund.

Crossing the Mediterranean by Balloon.

PARIS, October 15.—The balloon of Comte de la Vaulx, which left Les Sablettes, near Toulon, Saturday night on a voyage across the Mediterranean, was reported yesterday near the Balearic islands with all on board well.

## SHIPPING NEWS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.—The Pacific Mail Company's steamship Siberia is to be launched at Newport News next Saturday. She is being built a twin sister of the Kolea, which was launched on March 23d and is now being put in readiness for her first voyage to this port.

These steamships are to ply between San Francisco, Honolulu and the Oriental ports, and they will be a very noted addition to the rapidly growing passenger fleet of the Pacific. Twice as great in tonnage as the largest passenger steamships now going out from this port, they are intended to match the great Atlantic liners in size, speed and magnificence.

Some idea of the size of these ships is given by the statement that the distance around the rail is about a quarter of a mile.

The bark W. B. Flint cleared the port of San Francisco for Kahului October 15th with a small cargo. The Flint will take sugar at the latter port.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8.—The transport Grant, after one of the most notable service records, is going on the dry docks for an overhauling. She was towed out from the transport dock today and is now lying in the steam.

Wilders's flagship Kinau may be sent up to San Francisco the first part of next year for General repairs and to have an entire new set of boilers put in to replace those now in use. Just when the staunch flagship will start upon her 2,000 mile journey is indefinite, but her departure will certainly take place before March, as her boiler permit expires dy that time.—Advertiser.
