## NEW TERRITORIAL PRISON

### MODERN STRUCTURE PROJECTED FOR HAWAII.

Plans Already Prepared—To Take the Place of Oahu Prison—Buildings of Concrete and Steel.

O. G. Traphagen has completed plans for a new Oahu prison. The idea is something after that of the State prison of Minnesota, which the local man also designed. The only changes are such as are made necessary by the tropical climate of this country. The plans are being looked over by the Attorney-General and Prison inspectors and, after essential alterations, will doubtless be approved.

The need of a new prison has been manifest for some years. It is a notorious fact that the present institution is far too small, is not safe and is far from being in a good sanitary condition. It would never be difficult for a criminal to escape from one of the cells. There is a constant danger of fire. Many times it has been necessary to put two men in one of the small cells, the accommodations being so inadequate.

According to the new plans the present prison premises will be wiped out altogether. Around the premises will be erected a stone wall eighteen feet high, four feet thick at the bottom and two feet thick at the top. At each corner will be a watcher's tower.

The main prison will consist of four buildings of concrete and steel, two stories high with basements. They will contain 352 cells for men and eight for women. The cells will be all of solid steel and will set back twenty feet from the walls of the buildings. Inside of the buildings will be a hallway extending all around. Then will come the cells, or "cages," in tiers one above the other and in two rows, with a hallway between the rows. Each cell will open outward. By a mechanical device either one or all of the cells in a building may be thrown open at once. Each cell is equipped with a steel closet and a steel ventilator pipe leading to the roof.

The cells are thus absolutely secure. In addition to these precautions there are bars over the windows of the buildings and safe doors at the ends of the interior hallways and at the ends of the buildings themselves. As every particle of material in the cages is of steel there is no possibility of a man getting out and absolutely no danger of fire. Under one of the buildings are twenty dark cells. Under another is a store room while dormitories for trustees are under the other two. The cells for women are upstairs in the building immediately over the entrance.

The jailer's quarters are outside of the wall in front. Down stairs are offices, dormitories for guards and the other apartments necessary there. The jailer's house is on the second floor. It is equipped in the most modern manner, having all the conveniences of a home.

In the rear of the yard will be the dining hall, chapel, hospital, etc. The first two are really immense lais. The hospital will contain fifteen beds for men and three for women. It will have its dispensary and separate kitchen. On the right of the grounds will be the bath-rooms and laundry. Upon returning from work each day the prisoners will be required to bathe themselves and wash their clothes.

Just how much the buildings will cost has not yet been figured out. It is certain, however, that the sum will be quite large, as the steel itself will mean money. However, such buildings would be permanent in every respect.

## ALL RECORDS BROKEN

### BUSIEST DAY YET IN THE HARBOR.

More Foreign Steamers in Port Than Were Ever Here at One Time Before.

Today was a record-breaking day in Honolulu harbor. There were eleven foreign steamers at the docks, which is more than were ever in the harbor at once before, and twelve deep water sailing vessels. Two more transports are due at any moment, having left on the same day as the Hancock and Paëbia, and about half a dozen sailing vessels should arrive in rapid succession. This promises to fill not only every berth but all the room in the steam as well and it is making lively times for the harbor master's office, the pilots and the custom house employees.

Three steamers, the Toyo Maru, the Yorhime and the Norwegian Tiyra, are in the stream awaiting a chance to dock. The Australia and City of Puebla are at the Oceanic wharf, the Port Stephens and Hancock at the Pacific Mail, the Senator is at the Fish Market wharf, the Lennox at Emmes and the Ben Mohr and Siam at Irmgard wharf. With the exception of the Ben Mohr, every one of the eight army vessels wants coal, so that Colonel Rublen is having the busiest time yet. Any workman who wants a job on the waterfront is not compelled to look for it very long.

There was a general making of calls this morning among the various steamers, whose captains and other officers are nearly all well acquainted with one another, and with some the meeting here was an unexpected one. Captain Struve of the Hancock, was many times congratulated upon his rapid rise from the position of second officer to captain of the finest transport owned by the United States Government.

### TWO BATTERIES GOING.

The Ben Mohr Will Take Sixth Artillery Men.

Two batteries of the Sixth Artillery, which has been stationed here until it was begun to seem like a body of local men, will go to Manila on the transport Ben Mohr, which will probably leave here Wednesday morning. They are batteries A and N, both of which already have men at the front, among those who deserted here, stowing themselves on transports rather than submit to the delay in going forward. Captains Marsh and Foote and Lieutenant Patterson have been provided with staterooms on the transport and there is space reserved for the men who are to leave here, about 200 in number.

The boys of the Sixth have shown themselves to be a well-behaved, well-disciplined lot of men while here and the people of Honolulu will wish them luck at the front. Among the batteries that remain behind there is much disappointment and eagerness to get transfers to A or N.

## SPLENDID BOER STRATEGY

### JOUBERT ADVANCES TOWARD THE SOUTH.

Gen. White Repulses the Enemy About Ladysmith—The Boers Reported to Have Lost Very Heavily.

LONDON, November 26.—A special dispatch from Estcourt, dated November 20, says a report has reached there of a battle at Ladysmith on Wednesday, November 15, lasting from day-break until 2 in the afternoon. Many Boers are said to have been killed and many are also reported to have been taken prisoners. The British losses are spoken of as much less. Another battle is said to have occurred Thursday and is described as the heaviest yet fought. The Boer dead, it is added, number hundreds, while the British losses were comparatively small.

LONDON, November 19.—Full details of the fighting about Ladysmith on November 9 have now been received. The Boers attacked in full force opening with artillery fire at 4 in the morning. They advanced under cover of their guns to positions on the edges of Kopjes adjacent to those occupied by the British. The attack was on all sides of the town. The main fight was between the Free State and Newcastle railway lines. The Boers advanced and made a deep trench in front of the British lines. After some hot fighting, the Boers withdrew for their horses, leaving the trench unguarded. The King's Rifles advanced and occupied this trench, and when the Boers returned with their horses, gave them such a hot fire that the Boers fled across the open where the British artillery poured an effective shell fire into them. At other points the Boers were repulsed and the fighting was over by 11 o'clock.

Nothing important occurred until November 14 when a strong British force chiefly artillery and cavalry reconnoitering near Colenso came upon a force of Boers and drove them back to their main position. Ladysmith is able to hold out for months.

LONDON, November 20.—The Boer's strategy, according to this morning's dispatches, shows no signs of weakening. According to latest intelligence from the seat of war, they have made preparations to meet the new plan of campaign which the British were forced to adopt because of the investment of Ladysmith. A Boer force of 10,000 men, under Generals Joubert and Botha, is said to be moving south to meet the British advance from Estcourt. General White will, therefore, be left with but a weak force against him.

This force, however, may be entrenched and, therefore, will be difficult of attack. The relief column will have a hard task before it if the enemy is as strong as reported.

Estcourt is menaced by bodies of the enemy at several points. Due west, probably at Emersdale, there is a force of Orange Free State burghers. On the northeast of the railway there is a contingent under Commandant Grobler, while there are other Boers at Weenen and Greytown. The English position is considered as safe as at Ladysmith itself, for General Hildyard must now have a large number of men under his command.

Buller's original plan for an advance by three columns upon Bloemfontein and Pretoria has been temporarily broken up by the dispatch of a division to Natal for General White's relief, by the need of relieving Kimberley and by the appearance of Boers in some force in the strategic triangle enclosed by the railways joining Stormberg Junction, Rosmead Junction and Sprinfontein.

The Boer invasion of Cape Colony is proceeding apace. Aliwal North has been occupied by a Boer command 600 strong. At Knapsburg is a command of 1000 men; at Naauwpoort one of 600, and at Burgersdorp another of 500. No advance has as yet been made on the British camp at De Anr.

## DAMON STILL MINISTER

WASHINGTON, November 17.—The President has refused to accept the resignation of Mr. Damon, the Hawaiian Minister of Finance, and that official will remain in office at least until such time as Congress provides for a system of government for the Hawaiian Islands. Mr. Damon's resignation was tendered at a time when he was in Italy seeking to secure the emigration to Hawaii of Italian laborers.

This creates a most peculiar situation here. As a matter of fact Hawaii seems now to have two Ministers of Finance. Theo. E. Lansing was appointed early in the month to succeed Mr. Damon. He was appointed under a clause of the Hawaiian Constitution which provides for such appointment in case of the absence of a Cabinet head over two months.

### NEW WHARF MATTER.

The new Dillingham wharf project was the subject of Cabinet discussion at the second meeting held yesterday afternoon. There is a tacit approval of the plans, although the scheme will first have to be submitted to Washington, as the lands to be utilized are a part of the public domain.

## THE WORK OF THE ARTISTS

### FIRST VIEW OF THE FALL ART EXHIBIT.

Larger Number of Paintings Than Ever Before—Landscape Predominant—In These Hawaiian Scenes Most Numerous.

The Kiloaham Art League opened its fall exhibition of art work with a first view reception last night. The attendance was excellent. The exhibit both in numbers, in quality and in the number of contributors exceeds any previous exhibit. In decorative work and china painting there are not as many exhibitors nor as many exhibits as have sometimes been previously shown.

Landscape work largely predominates, and in this Hawaiian subjects, as is natural, greatly outnumber all others. One general tendency observable in these Hawaiian scenes is the choice by nearly all the artists of scenery that presents only the level districts of the Islands. Even where prominences or mountainous formations are shown, it is where these rise out of the level land. The typical Hawaiian scenery as it presents itself to everyone who comes to the Islands, the mountain formation pierced by deep, rugged and picturesque valleys, has been almost wholly neglected. Howard Hitchcock in two of his admittedly most successful pieces has seized on this feature of Hawaiian scenery. His success in this direction ought to be an incentive to others.

There is very little portrait work in the exhibit. But what there is, is good. H. M. Mott-Smith's portrait of his brother, E. A. Mott-Smith, is a splendid piece of work. In work of the imagination the exhibit is also deficient. There are a number of "studies" which are essays in this direction, several excellent ones by H. M. Mott-Smith, and one, catalogued as a "Study Head," the serious careworn but kindly face of an aged woman, by Lilla G. Marshall which is decidedly one of the best things in this domain, in the exhibit.

### SUPREME COURT.

The Supreme Court yesterday handed down a decision in the case of Cecil Brown and H. Focke, trustees under the will of James W. Gay vs. J. E. Anderson. The decision is by H. P. Weber sitting with Freat and Whiting in the absence of Chief Justice Judd. The point decided was that "an unattested written agreement purporting to be executed by two parties may be introduced upon proof of claim by the other of a substantial and abiding interest thereunder, without further proof of execution."

### ALMOST A RIOT.

There came near being a riot in Japan sea Saturday night. A Japanese named Mariana was fighting with a fellow countryman when Hoolala, a large native intervened. Immediately the fight stopped and both Japs turned upon the mediator. In a minute the street was full of Japanese, all after the native. Police arrived in the nick of time and arrested Mariana. In Police Court he was fined \$5 and costs for assault and battery.

### ROAD ACCIDENT.

Frank Santos, driving W. R. Castle's buggy, ran into a brake driven by Joe Francisco on Union Square yesterday morning. Both rigs were turned over and both drivers were hurled out. Neither was hurt save for a few bruises on an arm of Francisco. The accident was due to the carelessness of Santos, and a great many witnesses were very indignant at him for it.

## DEATH OF HENRY F. POOR

### LAST OF A KAMAAINA EARLY THIS MORNING.

Was Quite Prominent in Old Monarchical Days and Had a Host of Friends. Died at Insane Asylum.

Henry Poor died at the Insane Asylum at 6 o'clock this morning after an illness of several years. The funeral will take place from Ed. A. Williams undertaking parlors at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Deceased was the eldest son of Mrs. C. F. Bush, Emma street, and was born in Honolulu, June 8, 1856. He leaves a mother here; a brother in New York; Willie Bush, a half brother, here; and Mrs. C. K. Hopkins, half sister, here. He was not married.

Poor began his career when quite young as a clerk in the bank of Bishop & Company, and was later with Castle & Cooke. He was secretary to Colonel C. P. Iauka at the time of the trip of the King around the world, and was also secretary to John E. Bush on the famous Samoan mission. For quite a long while he was clerk of the Supreme Court and was subsequently, for several years, in the Postal Savings Bank. Being an adherent of the old cause he lost his position after the overthrow in 1893 and after that attended only to his ranch business at Kapahulu.

Deceased was well known to all the old-timers. He was at one time quite prominent and was always well liked by everyone. Once he was a member of Hawaiian Lodge, Masons.

NO BIDDERS FOR OPIUM

THE AUCTION SALE OF DOPE A
FAILURE.

Board of Health Unable to Sell Thirty-
Five Hundred Tins in the Custom
House.

The Board of Health's decision to sell
the captured opium that is in the cus
tom house will have to be reconsidered,
or else a big reduction in the valuation
must be made. The attempt to dispose
of the dope at auction last Saturday
ended in failure. No one was willing
to give anything like a reasonable fig
ure for the stuff, under the terms of
the sale, which were very strict regard
ing the method of disposing of the op
ium by the purchaser.

The auction was conducted by James
F. Morgan. A few possible purchasers
gathered to bid. Mr. Morgan announce
ed that the buyer would be required to
give bond to ship the opium away from
the Hawaiian Islands within thirty days
and to produce papers from the collec
tor of the port to which it was sent,
showing its arrival there. It was stated
that the government would
make no guarantee as to the quality of
the stuff in the tins nor even guarantee
that it was opium at all.

Under these rules 3,500 tins, worth
about \$5.00 each were put up. After
a good deal of discussion a bid of fifty
cents was made. No better offer was
tendered and the dope was withdrawn
from sale. It now remains for the
Board of Health to say what shall be
done with the opium. It is in all kinds
of tins and packages and is a mixture
of all qualities. It would be worth
more than the board values it at, if it
could be disposed of here.

STRUCK BY BEER BARRELS.
A native laborer was severely injured
during the night work on the cargo of
the S. S. Miowera, Sunday night. Six
barrels of beer tumbled from mid-air
on to his shoulders and body, but he
was lucky enough to escape with only
a broken leg.

The cause of the accident appears to
have been a slip in a rope used in hoist
ing the cargo. The six barrels of beer
were lifted out of the hold in the ordi
nary way, all tied together. As they
were about to be lowered to the dock
they suddenly slipped from the ropes.
All six barrels fell around the native,
who was almost directly under the lot.
His leg was badly fractured. The in
jured man was removed to the hospital
for treatment.

Consul Macrum has been treated with anything but courtesy by the Boer government in Pretoria. It is rather an unwise policy to be discourteous to a United States Consul, especially as the time will come when the good offices of the Great Republic may be needed.

It says something for Honolulu that it can turn out such an exhibition of art as is shown by the Kilohana Art League. There can be no doubt that exhibitions of this kind give a distinct stimulus to the artistic taste of the community. It is gratifying to notice that the exhibitions grow larger from year to year, and that the pictures exhibited show marked improvement. The Kilohana Art League is the first and only art center of the Pacific.

The Boers have made a strong attack on Ladysmith and have been repulsed with heavy loss. As far as Ladysmith is concerned there is now no need of any anxiety. The town is in a condition to hold out for months. The crucial point in the war, however, will be the fight between the relieving column and the force of 13,000 Boers under General Joubert, which has gone down south to meet it. It looks very much as if the tide was turning in South Africa.

The campaign in the Philippines is going on merrily enough. The American cavalry are keeping Aguinaldo on the dead run, the infantry occupy the towns as they are evacuated by the insurgents, many of whom are developing into "Amigos," and the navy is waiting patiently on the coast, watching it as a cat does a mouse, to pounce upon the fleeing Aguinaldo should he try to escape. The game which Aguinaldo is playing is very nearly up and he must begin to realize that it is one thing to have the anti-expansionist send pamphlets which are mostly used for pipe lights, and quite another thing to meet the expansionist with a rifle and a persuasive bayonet. There is going to be peace in the Philippines and the bulk of the people are most eager for it. The United States is the country that can give and keep peace though at the cost of considerable national sacrifice.

**MORE THOUGHTS.**

With due deference to adverse opinion, the principal of decentralization is essentially Republican. In point of fact it is the essence of Republicanism. Decentralization is the protest and practice of a people against one man power, which is monarchy, and monarchy is the antipodes of Republicanism.

If one looks at the territorial law as it appears in the United States Statutes, one finds that it assumes an organization by counties and each county elects its county officers. Also all justices of the peace must be and all militia officers may be elected.

In a State, the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Treasurer, Superintendent of Public Instruction, the Judges of the Supreme Court are elective officers. In many States, though not in all, the Regents of the State Universities are elective and the same may be said of the Controller or Auditor.

It can, therefore, be very clearly shown that the essence of American Government is the elective theory. Where power is handed on, as in the case of the Federal Secretary of State, Secretary of the Treasury, Attorney-General, and so forth, the appointing power has been elected and holds its power from the people, by the will of the people. But this is going perhaps too deeply into the very essence of government.

When discussing the future government of the Territory of Hawaii there is no question whatever of State Sovereignty. What one has to consider is the mere management of the internal affairs. With us it is a question of getting out of swaddling clothes, and putting on the "toga virilis," the garb of the citizen and the man. It is education in local self government that is needed.

The main idea before us is whether or not we are to have a direct influence upon our own local affairs. Each particular part of the Islands ought to have such direct influence. One of the grievances of Hilo is that it has not had such influence in the

past, and the contention of Hilo in this particular is just. Hilo has voiced its objections, and no doubt Maui will voice similar views when it has a mouthpiece of its own.

In point of fact, what The Star contends for, and what the bulk of our Island citizens desire and have worked for in the past, is local self government. In making the remarks that have been made there is no desire to run counter to the bill soon to be laid before Congress, nor is their any wish to tear it up. But there is a duty devolving upon thinkers to express the views which seem of value, and this question of local self government is one which is really vital to us. It would be almost criminal to allow it to slip from our grasp for want of a few words to set the issue clearly before the people of the Islands. Local self government is government of the people, by the people, and that is, in essence, the true American system of government.

In replying to criticism upon the views expressed in yesterday's Star it is necessary point out that this paper did not "admit" that the appointments made by the executive would have to be confirmed by the Territorial Legislature. There was no admission at all. It was a statement of fact, and it was shown that under that provision it would be necessary for the people of the Territory to concentrate their efforts to obtain a thoroughly good legislature.

The present is eminently the time to discuss these questions. It will be no use discussing after congress has acted. Of course whatever congress does will be accepted with satisfaction, but it is wise to have differing views expressed.

**COUNCIL OF STATE.**

A special meeting of the Council of State will be held at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon to consider the petition of Ihara for a commutation of sentence and other matters.

**EXECUTOR'S ACCOUNTS.**

J. Rubinstein as executor of Low How, deceased asks the Circuit Court for approval of his accounts and discharge from his trust. He charges himself with \$314.88 and asks to be allowed \$294.49.

**FRANK L. HOOGS.**

Letters received from Frank L. Hoogs indicate that he is enjoying his visit to the coast thoroughly. He expects to arrive here on his return, December 6.

**UP HILL ON A "MOBE."**

The feat of making the ascent of Mount Washington in an automobile has just been accomplished by F. O. Stanley, of Newton, Mass. "The trip from Newton to Pinkham Notch, a distance of about two hundred miles, was made by Mr. and Mrs. Stanley in their automobile at the rate of about eighteen miles an hour," says The Automobile, New York. "The distance from this point to the summit is something more than ten miles on a rather even grade, which would not be so bad for a short distance, but it ends only at the top. The carriage used by Mr. Stanley is a steam carriage, using gasoline for fuel. Two gallons are said to have been required to make the ascent, which at the usual price of seven or eight cents a gallon would not make the expense very heavy, unless water came high in price, of course, as it has in some sections of the country the past dry season."

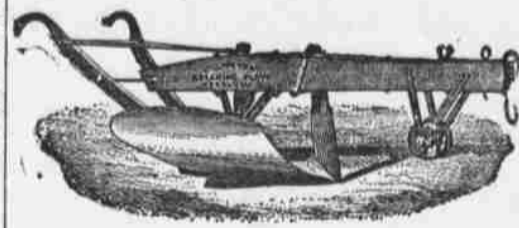

## A REMARKABLE CAMPAIGN Just Received

SPLENDID OPERATIONS IN THE PHILIPPINES.

Aguinado's Army and Government Fading Away—Young's Cavalry Sweeping Over the Country.

MANILA, November 20, 8:25 A. M.—Only fragmentary reports reach Manila of the operations north, which, when the story is known, will prove to have been the most remarkable campaigning of the Philippine war. General Lawton's division is spread thinly over the territory beyond San Jose, where the telegraph ends. General Young's two regiments of cavalry are continuing their rapid sweep into the new towns and are being shoved forward to hold the towns taken—all in a country whose natural difficulties are increased indescribably by tropical rains, making rivers of creeks and swamps of fields. Wagon transportation is supposed to have been practically abandoned, the American troops living on captured supplies and the little produce the insurgent levies have left. Filipino provincial governors seem to be seeing the final triumph of the Americans and are sending in their allegiance, and, incidentally, requests to be retained in office.

# THE HANCOCK AND PUEBLA ON COLLEGE GRIDIRONS

TWO FIRST CLASS TRANSPORTS ARRIVE.

The Hancock Now the Best Troop Ship Owned by the United States Government.

The Army transport Hancock, now the finest troop ship owned by the United States Government, arrived this morning, with the City of Puebla close behind, from San Francisco, the two vessels bringing the 44th and a part of the 43rd Infantry. The Hancock brought three days' mail from the mainland. Both vessels encountered very rough weather on the way and were badly shaken up.

In addition to the headquarters and officers of the 44th, the Hancock has on board Colonel C. R. Greenleaf, head surgeon of the Department of the Pacific, U. S. A., and Major Reese, paymaster, who is taking a million dollars in coin with which to pay soldiers in the Philippines.

The officers of the 44th on the Hancock are: Colonel McClellan, Majors Eppitt, Allen, McCoy, F. Crumpton, Maus, Captains Crossfield, Leonard, Samuels, Malley, Bissell, Ketchum, Smith, Bateman, Weller, Stuart, Lieutenants Parker, Wilson, Rayson, Jackson, Lewis, White, Gould, Goring, Parsons, Bennett, Perry, Henry, Lynch, Kowitz, Cadden, Haverford, Blair, Cusick, Schlachter, Thomas, Captain John J. Bradley is the transport quartermaster. There are 1017 privates and non-commissioned officers of the 44th Infantry on board.

H. K. Struve, formerly second officer of the Hancock and first officer last time she called here, comes as captain this time. C. J. Beugreire is first officer, D. S. Goodall second officer and James Swan third officer. Frank E. Schupp is purser and J. J. Murphy chief engineer. The Hancock was considerably improved while in San Francisco last time and is now a model troop ship.

The City of Puebla is one of the best passenger vessels taken for the transport service. She was placed alongside of the Australia this morning to await departure of that vessel before she gets a dock. The Puebla has only been here once or twice and is probably on her last voyage here. Captain Thomas and purser Hanshaw have made many friends here who hope they will be put on the Seattle run. As passengers the Puebla carries Lieutenant Colonel A. L. Wagner, Majors H. P. Birmingham, S. Howell, M. R. Curry, and Lieutenant L. P. Smith. Lieutenant F. W. Feiger is the quartermaster in charge.

Miller, acting assistant surgeon, U. S. A., are also on board. There are three contract nurses, Mrs. C. Bedell, Miss M. Bowman and Miss A. P. Klein. The other passengers are M. Josephson, commissary clerk; E. Wufels, quartermaster commissary; E. Lockhard and R. Wrigley, paymaster's clerks.

# THE NEW SEATTLE LINER

ONE OF THE STEAMERS FOR HONOLULU TRADE.

The Port Stephens Chartered With the Port Albert to Run Between Here and the Coast.

The British steamship Port Stephens, which lies at the Pacific Mail wharf, will soon be calling here regularly as a passenger and freight liner between Honolulu and Seattle, if the charterers carry out their present plans. But for the fact that the United States government took hold of her for army service she would have been on the route by this time, with the Port Albert, another steamship of the same kind, owned by the same company.

The Port Stephens is one of the largest steamers that ever called here. She is a six thousand-ton vessel, 360 feet in length and a comparatively new steamer. She was built in England in 1894 and is owned by the Anglo-Australasian Steam Navigation Company of London. The Port Stephens was recently chartered by Waterhouse and Company for the Honolulu trade from Seattle, but was taken by the government as soon as she reached the coast. It is thought that she will make another trip to Manila after the present one is ended, to take horses or mules, and will then be released, so that it will be three months before she is ready to sail on the trips for which she was brought to the Pacific.

The Port Stephens is commanded by Captain R. Whitehead, who has been with her on many trips between London and Australia and in other parts of the world. The captain has passed by Honolulu many times but has never called here before. He is very favorably impressed with the place and is looking forward to the time when he will be coming regularly. Captain Whitehead thinks of making Honolulu his home, when his company carries out the plans it has in view. The Port Albert may be in here in a short time, as she has been taken as a transport. She is now in Manila.

The other officers of the Port Stephens are First Officer W. Gray, Second Officer Muir, Third Officer Bowman, Chief Engineer A. J. Freeman, Second Engineer Macrone, Third Engineer Deans.

The Port Stephens will leave here about the end of the week.

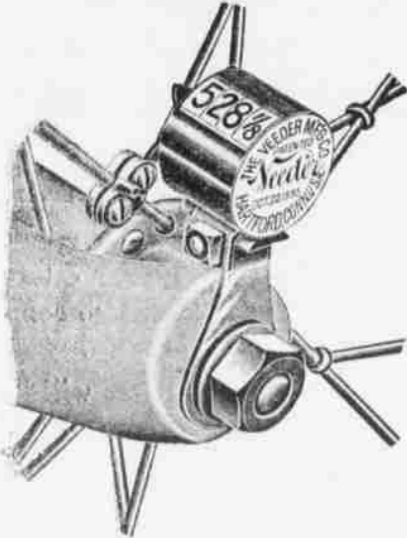
