A CLUB MAN'S FORTUNE.

"I am very much indebted to the Times," said a young club man yesterday to a reporter, "for the Times has made my fortune. I have had just about enough spending money for several years to pay my billiard and cigar bills, and now I am perfectly independent. It is a very comfortable feeling, too, to be worth somewhere in the neighborhood of \$200,000."

The reporter, of course, asked for particulars.

"You see," said the young man, "I saw an article in the Times a good while ago showing how much money a man might have when he was old if he saved the money he would otherwise spend for cigars—say, thirty cents a day. It figured up to \$109.50 for the first year, and kept on increasing very fast after that, till, after sixty years of saving, it amounted to more than \$50,000 at compound interest. Well, I could discount that, because I smoked more than three cigars a day, and paid more ten cents apiece for them. I never smoked less than five a day, and always paid twenty cent apiece for them. I thought I might as well borrow that, and in she went. Sure as you're alive they dealt me another nine and a pair of fours. I won the pot, of course, with \$45 in it."

"Did you keep on playing?" the reporter asked him.

"The game was just breaking up," said the young man. "That \$45 wasn't much use to me, and I concluded I would either turn it into a few hundred or lose it entirely. So I tackled baccarat. Well, to make a long story short, I came out of the baccarat with over \$3,000. It was all won with my four-dollar cigar fund, you know, and now I have the call on that game, for I can keep right on smoking and let my \$3,000 be growing all the time. Just figure it up for yourself. She doubles every ten years, sure as fate. That's \$6,000 in ten years, \$12,000 in twenty years, \$24,000 in thirty years, \$48,000 in forty years, \$96,000 in fifty years and \$192,000 in sixty years. That's nearly \$200,000 at ordinary compound interest. But by judicious investments I can make her double that. It makes my head swim to think of it. I'm not much past twenty now, and that will make me eighty, and when I reach the venerable fourscore I'll have \$200,000 or \$300,000 waiting for me. It's all, mind you, because I stopped smoking for four days. It was a good investment, and I advise all young men to stop smoking and get rich. Have a cigar?"—N. Y. Times.

OBITUARY.

On Tuesday evening Mr. Jason Perry, an old and respected resident of this city, died at his residence, of aneurism. Mr. Perry arrived in these islands about 1850, on board a whaling vessel. He was then a young man of little over 20 years of age. He first obtained employment in the shop of a Mr. Autone, a fellow countryman. Afterwards he started a business of his own near the corner of King and Richard streets. Then he shifted to the corner of Nuuanu and Hotel streets. He made, in conjunction with Mr. Pico, some unsuccessful whaling ventures, after which he restricted his operations to his own shop, but for some time past he has attended to his ranch at Waialae. For many years he acted as arbiter in all disputes or business differences in which his countrymen were concerned, and by everybody, both amongst his own countrymen and those of other nations, he was respected and admired as an honest and upright man. He acted as Portuguese Consul for some years. His funeral took place yesterday afternoon, at 3:30. He leaves a large family to mourn his loss.

G. W. Glass globes, of all sizes and the customary shapes, Russian and Morocco leather goods are profusely represented, and a line of the finest bound photo and scrap albums he waiting purchasers to put them in the finest rooms in Honolulu. These albums are bound in every variety of elegant binding that can be thought of. Some are bound in the finest leather, others in glove kid, others again in cloth. Gilding makes them resplendent on the outside, but not so much as the beautiful floral decorations do the pages as we turn them over. On one page the portrait of our friend can be enshrined in wreaths of roses. On the next with graceful sprays of heather, lilies, etc. They are in the latest style, and contain spaces for the cabinet size so much in favor at present.

But to see is better than to hear, and if you wish to see what ought to be in your house first call in at your earliest convenience and you will be shown round with the greatest of courtesy and civility.

RAILROAD TIME TABLE.

By the courtesy of the Road Supervisor we are enabled to publish the following time table of the Beretania street Railway, which has been compiled in accordance with our suggestion of last week. The Consular flags were flying at half-mast yesterday out of respect to the memory of the late Jason Perry.

To-day at 10 a.m. in the Beaver Block Mr. E. P. Adams will sell by auction the dry goods, etc., belonging to the estate of the late J. G. Tucker.

Five pigs were found on one of the wharves on Tuesday night by the Police. They are now at the Station House awaiting the owner's appearance.

A drain is now in course of construction along Halekauwila street, from Fort street to the harbour, entering it behind Ryan Bro's boat house.

Mr. S. McKeague's boarders will now have a good time. All the cells at the Station House have been repainted and cleaned. They are now models of what a cell ought to be in that matter.

YESTERDAY the case of Wiseman vs. Luning was settled by the defendant delivering up the book and paying the costs of the Court.

At last another of our suggestions has been adopted. The Palama and Kalili bus now advertises its destination to all by a handsome sign affixed to its roof. We hope to see the others follow suit.

While the drain from the Beaver Block to the harbour is not yet finished, why do the Government not take hold and have a system of drains constructed? It would tend to keep the streets less in want of repairs.

On Wednesday morning at 6 o'clock, some natives were seen pursuing an escaped lunatic along King street. They were throwing stones at him so as to stun him, but fortunately did not succeed. He was finally lassoed by a policeman at the corner of Maunakea and King streets. He had an axe in his hand with which he threatened his pursuers when they came too close.

Fort street, as far as Merchant street being now finished, the Road Supervisor informs us that he is going to proceed with Queen street, finishing that in the same style as Fort street has been done, and making a foot path along the mauka side. Then Halekauwila street from Fort to Alakea, and Alakea from Queen street to the Likelike wharf, will be also attended to, and a foot path in each case made so that pedestrians will then be able to get to the wharves in all directions, without having to wade through the mud in wet weather. The making of these streets will tend to relieve the lower end of Fort street of much of its traffic.

Something for Everybody—a new discovery, The Magnesio-Calcite Fire Proof Safes,

Jewel Cases and Bond Cases.
 At a test of the fire proof qualities of the Magnesio-Calcite, held on the sand-plot near the City Hall, San Francisco, Nov. 27th, a pile of about a cord of pitch-pine wood was prepared, and five gallons of tar poured over it. 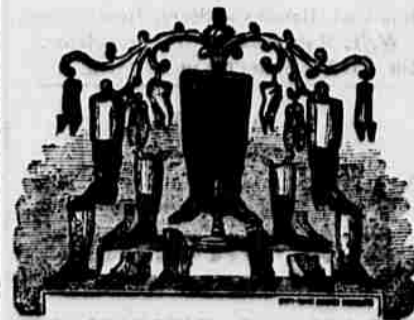

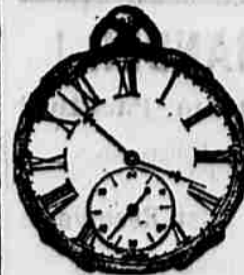
