KILLED UNDER HIS CART

TERRIBLE DEATH OF A NATIVE LABORER.

His Skull Crushed by the Wheel of a Coal Cart—Companions Give No Assistance.

A native laborer named Kekeona met a most horrible death at the foot of Fort street this morning, while hauling coal to the steamer Mikahala. One of the wheels of his cart passed over the entire length of his body, crushing his skull in so that his brains were scattered about the street. In spite of his terrible injuries, the unfortunate man breathed for nearly half an hour, during which he lay on the Inter-Island wharf without any medical attendance.

The accident occurred shortly before 9 o'clock in the midst of a busy crowd of natives hauling lumber and coal and other freight. Kekeona had a cart load of coal and was just about to turn into the Inter-Island wharf when it was one of his cart's wheels brushed against a wagon loaded with fertilizer. The native fell to the ground directly in front of his cart, laying alongside of the horse. The horse stopped. A score of natives and Portuguese saw his danger and shouted excitedly, but Kekeona lay as if stunned. The horse started forward and in the presence of a crowd of witnesses not one of whom had made an effort to drag him from his peril, Kekeona was run over from head to foot, the great weight of the coal sending the cart wheel deep into his flesh and mashing his skull as if it had been an egg shell.

The workmen around gave vent to shouts of horror and stopped the horse, too late. Kekeona lay still in the rain, his face and head presenting a most ghastly sight. Some of the laborers did not even stop work, others ran from the ghastly spectacle. The police were notified and Kekeona was removed to shelter on the wharf. For nearly half an hour he continued to breathe, death ending his misery just as Deputy Marshal Chillingworth arrived with an officer.

The accident was in part due to the overcrowded conditions at the foot of Fort street. The confusion of coal and lumber wagons and natives carrying lumber to and fro make narrow escapes a daily occurrence.

Those who witnessed the accident from a distance were indignant in denunciation of the laborers who were near Kekeona when he fell. There was ample time when the horse stopped to rescue the victim but no one gave help. Kekeona was allowed to lie helpless till the animal started again.

Kekeona was about fifty years of age. He was unmarried and had no relatives here excepting two brothers. Deputy Marshal Chillingworth arrested one of the men who were on the wagon with which Kekeona's cart collided and the man is held at the prison pending an investigation. An inquiry is being held this afternoon. The verdict will probably be that the deceased, whose full name is Kekeona Anekolia, came to his death through injuries received by being accidentally run over. He will be buried in the Catholic Cemetery.

FAST BECOMING A WASTE

NEGLECT IS TELLING ON A PUBLIC PARK.

Beauty of Thomas Square Being Destroyed by Lazy and Incompetent Workmen—Bureau to Blame.

The complaint of residents of the Thomas Square neighborhood against the condition of the park is fully sustained by the facts. The square is really in a miserable looking fix, and the parties responsible for its condition would seem to deserve a thorough "roasting" at the hands of the community.

The worst part of the park is the half from the band stand to King street. Over this entire area the grass is parched and dying. In fact, in the past six months most of it has disappeared entirely. The bushes, which are so luxuriant about the time the legislature meets, are also parched and show plainly the lack of water and attention. This is specially true of the young palms.

The fence and hedge row of this end of the square are also in a deplorable condition. In many places the fence is down or nearly down, and neglected that is almost criminal. The bushes forming the hedge-row are parched and stunted. Looking into the park from King street the impression one gets is of an embryo waste, patches of brown, dying grass and numerous stunted, parched bushes forming the picture.

The Beretania street side looks better. This is probably due to a better distribution of large, protecting trees. On the whole area, however, there is not enough grass for a goat's break, fast. The bushes and hedge-rows look healthier than those of the lower side, though the fence is in many places in a pitiable plight.

The cause of the condition is unquestionably lack of attention, or neglect. The park is in charge of an old Portuguese, who, to all intents and from all accounts, never has had experience in such matters. Under his eye are two lazy fellows who work like a pair of Palms. One of them, who yesterday afternoon they were engaged cutting the grass from around a small bush. It is painful to see them work. It is understood that the caretaker's business bossing these two old men, and the business of the two old men is getting out of as much work as possible.

"The cause of the bad condition of the square," said the caretaker yesterday, "is lack of help. Three men are not enough. I need at least six men here all the time and two or more at Emma Square."

The impression one gleaned from an afternoon watching the laborers was that a regiment of men, working as they do, would accomplish little. A strong boy would be more serviceable than the present force.

What is needed is inspection at reasonable intervals by the bureau and a hustling up of the men employed to work in Thomas Square. If something is not done, and very soon, the park may as well be cut up into building lots.

David Haughis, the secretary of the Bureau of Agriculture, was seen regarding the above. He states that the trouble is caused by a scarcity of water. The well on the grounds is furnishing but a poor supply. "Hardly enough water to irrigate the hedge," added the secretary. A suggestion was made some time ago to have the Government furnish a supply from the street mains, but no steps were taken in this direction. This change is necessary. It is Mr. Haughis' opinion that the Beretania street pumping station has affected the well in the square.

PELL OF A CAR. An elderly Chinese woman fell of car Number 3 near the Old Plantation yesterday afternoon and had a leg quite badly bruised. It was at first thought the member was broken, but this proved not the case. A wheel of the vehicle was stopped within a few inches of the prostrate woman. Attorney General Cooper was a passenger on the car at the time of accident.

CAMP-FIRE OF G. A. R. There was a full attendance and an enjoyable time at the annual reunion and camp-fire of the G. A. R. held in Harmony hall Saturday evening. It took the form of a smoker. Pork and beans were served and several speeches were made. One was a patriotic address by Special Agent Sewall.

HILO RAILWAY LANDING

CABINET APPROVES WAIAKEA DIVISION.

This Practically Settles the Squabble Between the Rival Railway Companies—Both Have Terminals.

The Cabinet held a special meeting this morning to act upon the application of the Hilo Railway Company to the Minister of Interior for the approval of its second division of road, to be known as the Waiakea division.

This division is the line of road between the proposed terminal and Hilo bay and the boundary line between Keauau and Waiakea. The letter asking for approval was written yesterday, and prompt action was requested. A. W. Carter was present for the Hilo Railway Company; W. O. Smith was present for the Kohala and Hilo Railway Company and Thomas Rain Walker appeared for the Waiakea Mill Company. The latter two gentlemen, on behalf of their respective concerns, withdrew all objections to the proposed authorization, whereupon the Cabinet approved the application.

This practically settles the conflict about landing, about which more or less was said last week. It appears that a satisfactory settlement of the matter was reached between the two rival companies on the outside, due, however, to the determined attitude of the Cabinet in the premises.

As the matter now stands the Hilo Railway Company has its outlet, in accordance with its original petition. The Kohala Company still holds ample territory along the front at Hilo for its terminal and landings.

THE FLAG TODAY. Punahou Preparatory Raised It At 9 This Morning.

Oahu College is the pioneer in the matter of the Stars and Stripes over school houses. In his last report respecting the Preparatory school President Hosmer recommended as follows: "It is recommended that the United States flag be raised over the Preparatory School building every morning at 9 o'clock and be taken down at the close of school."

In accordance with this recommendation the flag was raised over the Preparatory this morning at 9 o'clock and will be raised every morning in the future. On every public occasion the last ten years the flag has been raised over the college.

BEAR AFTER THEM. Whalers Have Been Selling Liquor to Alaskans.

SAN FRANCISCO, September 15.—Advice just received in this city tell of the flight of the three whalers, William Bayles, Bowhead and Jeanette, from the revenue cutter Bear in the Arctic Ocean. The whalers had been selling liquor to the Alaskan natives in the vicinity of Port Clarence. They heard of the approach of the Bear and put to sea.

Lieutenant Jarvis, commander of the Bear, learned of the illicit traffic immediately after he reached Port Clarence, and went in search of the fleeing whalers. The three vessels had a good start on the cutter, and at the time the letter was written, July 20th, it was the general opinion that they had a good chance of escaping.

The selling of whisky to the natives is strictly forbidden, but the whalers do a large and remunerative business in this line nevertheless. The Bear has been on the lookout for the offenders for some time, and Lieutenant Jarvis said before leaving Port Clarence that he was going to capture the offending whalers or stay out for them all winter. If the vessels are caught it will be a serious matter for the master and owners. The government has issued special orders in regard to this liquor traffic and no leniency will be shown.

DIANK WOOD ALCOHOL. VALLEJO, September 14.—Two marines of the cruiser Philadelphia died yesterday from the effects of drinking wood alcohol. Michael Owens succumbed in the city jail in the morning and Richard Conroy passed away during the night at the naval hospital. Conroy told the surgeon that he and Owens had purloined on Tuesday night some of the ship's alcohol that is used to distill shellac and drank it.

Owens was buried this afternoon and Conroy's funeral will take place tomorrow.

The crew of the Boston have been discharged or transferred and the ship will go out of commission tomorrow.

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MR. E. P. COLVIN, DETECTIVE

COLLECTOR GIVES HIS FRIENDS A SURPRISE.

Says He is a Man-Hunter After a Desperate Criminal and Leaves on the Belgian King.

E. P. Colvin, formerly collector for the steam laundry company, left yesterday for Manila on the army transport Belgian King. Before going Mr. Colvin confided in his friends with a remarkable story of crime and mystery, representing himself as a detective engaged in the pursuit of a criminal whom he is tracking half round the world. The man who is wanted left on the transport Columbia last week, said Mr. Colvin, and so the supposed detective packed his grip and engaged passage on the next transport.

None of Mr. Colvin's friends here were aware of his secret business in Honolulu. He arrived here about three weeks ago and took a position in the laundry office. "That was all a bluff," he announced as he stood on the Oceanic dock yesterday waiting for the Belgian King to leave. When asked for particulars as to his long man-hunt, Mr. Colvin took refuge in the professional necessities of his situation, but he would be imprudent to give details, he declared. But he was willing to say that the object of his hunt was a murderer, who had been wanted in Chicago for about a year. He thought the man who shipped as one of the Columbia's crew, Mr. Colvin was much in evidence on board the Columbia before she left and talked of taking passage on her.

Mr. Winston, manager of the steam laundry, was wholly unaware that his late employe was a sleuth in disguise. When asked about the matter he stated that he knew nothing more than that Colvin had gone to Manila on the Belgian King. "Colvin has worked here in Manila for several months," he said; "and I have never seen any signs of his having any other employment. I can scarcely believe that he was very deeply involved in any detective business. I understood that he was going to Manila in the hope of getting a commission in the army."

Mr. Colvin was a soldier during the late Spanish unpleasantness and served through the Cuban campaign, entering as a private and being mustered out as a non-commissioned officer. His home is in Cincinnati. After leaving the army, according to his story, he was connected with the United States Secret Service and now he is jogging the steps of a desperate criminal. He made quite a number of friends during his stay here, to all of whom his statements as to his mission came as a great surprise. Some of them are unkind enough to talk of pipe-dreams, but at any rate Mr. Colvin packed his things and sent them aboard the Belgian King and is now on the briny deep headed for Uncle Sam's troublesome domain in the far East.

**PROFIT TO SIR THOMAS**

**THE INTERNATIONAL YACHT RACE WILL PAY.**
Captain Hay Describes the Englishman as a True Sportsman—Advertising Schemes on Large Scale.

The great international yacht race is looked upon as pure sport and Sir Thomas Lipton, who has built the Shamrock to try for the America cup, is generally supposed to have made his great outlay on the enterprise simply as a wealthy Englishman who desires to see his country get the cup that has so long been contested for. But there are those who say that all the dollars Lipton has paid out to fit the Shamrock against the Columbia will come back to him and more too, as returns from this greatest advertising scheme ever attempted. Sir Thomas Lipton is one of the largest advertisers in the world and he has built up a business that has no equal competitor in its line. If his entry into international yacht racing is an advertising scheme, it is a most successful one.

Captain Edward H. Hay, U. S. N., who is assisting Commander Merry in the construction of the new naval dock here, is one resident of Honolulu who is watching for the result of the great race with the keenest interest and who enjoys the personal acquaintance of Sir Thomas Lipton. Captain Lipton some years ago, before the latter had announced any intention of taking up the battle that Lord Dunsraven was defeated in so many times. He declares that the new contestant is a true gentleman and sportsman and that "if we have to lose the cup there is no one to whom it might go with less dissatisfaction among Americans than Sir Thomas Lipton."

Captain Hay calls Sir Thomas the greatest advertiser in the world and has many times met with his "Ads." in Honolulu for the next transport. He regards the Shamrock business as sport. "Once I entered the bay of Naples," said the captain "to find every fisherman's sail bearing a notice of Lipton's. The bay is crowded with fishermen's boats. Sir Thomas visited there and offered to buy every one of them a new sail if he would use it with printing on it as ordered. The result was a bay full of sails bearing notices of Lipton's teas. In China and other unexpected places I have seen his advertisements and they are on the cars of a small railroad system at my home near Boston."

**FIFTEEN LEFT BEHIND.**
Fifteen soldiers of the 24th Infantry were left behind by the Belgian King yesterday afternoon and are waiting in Honolulu for the next transport. They claim not to have known the hour of sailing of their vessel. Twelve men reached the dock just as the ship was heading into the stream. They say that Major Shunk looked at them through his glasses and that they beckoned him for a boat, but he paid no further attention to them. Last night the men reported to the Artillery commander at the old barracks.

The house was prettily decorated for the occasion. Music was supplied by the quintette club. The Egeria expects to get away tomorrow, and the reception was in the nature of a "farewell."

Archbishop Ireland, of St. Paul, in a recent interview declares that he is a friend of France. He strongly objects to any measure that savors of a boycott and believes that the Exposition will be a success if not a single American should attend it.

A number of people have good reason to believe that Sir Thomas Lipton, owner of the yacht Shamrock, built his boat solely for an advertising measure. If this is so, no one will deny Sir Thomas the end he seeks. He has proved to be a liberal man and his enterprise in entering his yacht to compete for the big cup has been applauded on both sides of the Atlantic.

Baron Fava, the Italian Ambassador at Washington, is said to be anxious to take a fall out of the State Department for inaction relating to the Italians lynched in a small town in Louisiana some months ago. It is said that the Baron will attempt to induce his brother diplomats to join him in an effort to impress upon Secretary Hay the importance of guaranteeing the treaty rights of foreigners in the United States. It is also said that the Italian Ambassador will not make much headway in this. The Baron is anxious to have the matter settled for fear that he may lose his place. He was up against a similar snag in 1891. At that time he was unable to hurry the United States in the Mafia cases, was recalled by Marquis Rudini, the Italian Premier, but subsequently the Government paid \$5,000 to the families of each of the Italians killed in New Orleans. The correspondence at that time between Baron Fava and Secretary Blaine brought out the fact that the Government would not be hastened and that citizens of foreign states were not guaranteed a greater degree of protection in the United States than was accorded her own citizens.

William J. Bryan recently visited San Francisco. He was in that city long enough to brush his clothes, take a walk up Market Street, make a speech and then board a train for the East. In this brief time he saw and heard everybody in the Bay City and found that San Francisco merchants were opposed to expansion. Mr. Bryan said: "I was delighted with the enthusiasm displayed and all but unanimity on the subject of imperialism. It had been said that imperialistic policy would govern San Francisco, as, under its maintenance, that city would be greatly benefited by the arrival and departure of the troops for the Philippines. But this is not the case. The sentiment is largely anti-imperialistic, and I believe on this account we will gain more Republican votes than we will lose among the Democrats." Of course, Bryan is a trifle "nutty" on the proposition of the United States acquiring outside territory. For campaign purposes, he believes it to be wrong. But it will take more eloquence than the Nebraska orator possesses to convince the Pacific Coast merchants that expansion is a mistake. San Francisco business men have been so discriminated against by railroads that her natural markets are now invaded by eastern men. The bulk of her business is now in the export line and without the Hawaiian and Oriental trade, San Francisco would be in a bad way. The conduct of the merchants in the past proves that Bryan is in error. During the years that the annexation of Hawaii was pending this country had no friends more staunch than the members of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce.

**RAILWAY ACCIDENTS.**

According to the Literary Digest, statistics compiled by the experts attached to the Interstate Commerce Commission reveal the fact that there 247,500 miles of railroad track in the United States—enough to build fifteen double-track roads from Cape Horn to the Kondike. The force of men employ on these roads is as large as the largest standing army in the world, and they receive enough in wages each year to pay Germany's national debt six times, while the railways' earnings could perform the mighty task of placing Spain on her feet financially. The report deals with the great number of casualties during the past year. It shows that of the 1,141 killed and 15,645 injured among railway employees in 1898, no less than 279 deaths and 6,988 injuries resulted from coupling and uncoupling cars. This fearful sacrifice might have been almost entirely prevented had the act of Congress relating to brakes and couplers been enforced.

The total number killed on the railroads during the year was nearly seven thousand. The Hartford Courant says of it: "Would you believe that the number of American citizens killed or wounded on American rail-

roads in the twelvemonth which ended June 30, last year, was far in excess of the number of American soldiers killed or wounded in last year's war with Spain and this year's campaign in Luzon, put together? That is the story told by the Interstate Commerce Commission's figures. Here these are in all their grimness: Killed on the railroads, 6,859; wounded on the railroads, 49,882; total of railroad casualties, in one year, 47,741. Only 221 of the killed were passengers. The risk of sudden death accepted by the individual American citizens who buy a railroad ticket and takes his seat in the car is very slight, though quite appreciably greater in this country than in Europe. The number of railroad employees killed in the year in question was 1,958. This leaves 4,680 victims to be accounted for. A considerable percentage of them were tramps—lazy or footsore fellows who stole transportation once too often. The deadly grade-crossing and the track-walking habit account for most of these. In that one year, 2,945 were passengers, 31,761 were railroad employees, 6,176 were others."

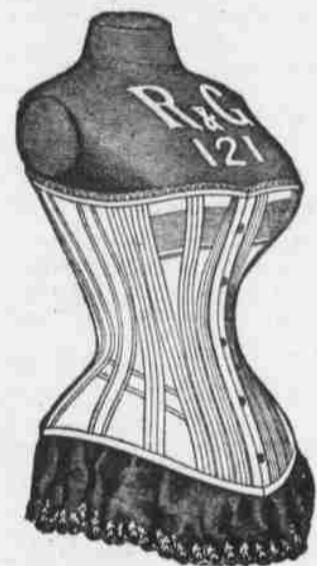

### TROUBLES OF A CAPTAIN

THE BELGIAN KING'S MASTER STIRS UP PLENTY.

A Dispute Over Bills and a Possible Fine for Violation of the Rules of the Port.

Captain Weiss of the transport Belgian King had a troublesome time getting away from port yesterday and if he returns there may be even more trouble in store for him. Yesterday's difficulties developed over some bills for merchandise purchased here which the former local agents of his vessel declined to pay. The prospective difficulties lie in an investigation being made by custom house officials of the captain's right to take passengers from this port without entering his vessel at the custom house. There is a fine of \$100 for captains who do this.

A local commission house acted as agents of the Belgian King before she was chartered by the United States Government. When he arrived in port Captain Weiss thought that this firm would still consider themselves agents for the vessel. He made a number of purchases here and sent the bills to the office of Alexander & Baldwin. The latter promptly had the bills redelivered to the captain, notifying him that they had nothing to do with the Belgian King as long as Uncle Sam had her. This is the rule followed by all shipping agencies, army transports being regarded as Government property while they are under charter. For a time Captain Weiss had visions of legal proceedings by the firm he had dealt with to get their money before he left, but he made a trip up town and was able to settle accounts for himself, though he is reported to have had to do some lively work to get money for the unexpected draft upon him.

The taking of a passenger from this port without proper entry being made is a violation of local passport laws which are supposed to be familiar to all captains that come here. Transports are allowed to come and go as war vessels are making no entries at the custom house, it being presumed that they will receive no passengers. E. P. Colvin of this city left yesterday on the Belgian King as a passenger for Manila, but there is no record of such a fact at the custom house. The matter is being investigated with a view to ascertaining whether Mr. Colvin's business is such as to allow him to leave in such a way. The law allows men in the army service to leave without passports.

### ANOTHER YACHT RACE.

Contest Between Third Class Yachts Next Sunday.

Another yacht race is being arranged for next Sunday. This time it is the third class yachts that are to contest and the course proposed is to Pearl harbor and return. About six yachts are expected to enter the race, which is exciting much interest among lovers of the sport. A spanking breeze is looked for on the course and the sail will be a good one. The yachts are likely to enter are Professor Lightfoot's Marion, Mr. William's yacht Pokil, the Abbey M., Mr. Dow; the Edith L., Mr. Dowsett; the Volante, Mr. Tollafsen and Mr. Conklin's yacht. Several of these have already been entered by their owners and it is hoped that the others will fall in line. Of the six mentioned the Marion is probably the fastest boat, and the Pokil comes next. The start is from the boat houses at about 9 o'clock Sunday morning.

### NO VISITORS ALLOWED.

Commodore N. J. Weaver of the yacht Norma was surprised by a new order from the marshal's office yesterday evening. Accompanied by Chester Doyle he started for his pleasure craft from the boat landing but when he arrived the policemen on board refused to let Mr. Doyle go on board. The order had gone forth that there must be no visitors on the yacht without a permit from the marshal. The commodore and his guest returned to shore and secured the necessary permit. The vessel is in custody of the police and it was deemed necessary for her protection and safety that rules for visiting her be made.

**BIG TREASURY BALANCE**

WHERE SO MUCH MONEY HAS COME FROM.

Tremendous Increase in Customs Receipts and General Taxes Since Annexation.—About the Future.

The extraordinary treasury balance at the present time has been a street subject for weeks, and indications are that much more will be said about it. Not in the least the collection of taxes has been so much bona fide cash on hand, and this too, on the very eve of the annual collection of taxes and other established revenues.

The cash balance is now something like \$1,200,000. By the 1st. of January it will be nearly \$2,500,000. This will be after all the withdrawals for salaries, public works, etc. have been made.

The showing is extraordinary, but the explanation is simple. One cause of the increase is the enormous augmentation of customs receipts in the past two years. From January 1st. to August 31st. of this year \$900,000 was taken in customs dues. This is more than was received for the entire biennial period a few years ago. This will go on at the rate of \$100,000 a month or more to the end of the year.

Another cause is found in the increase in property taxes and business licenses. Not in the least the collection of taxes is thing like what they will be at the coming period. It is estimated that the next collection will aggregate something like \$1,200,000, which is twice that of five years ago. The tremendous increase this year will come from increase of valuations of property, new properties opened up and new sugar estates established.

Of course these estimates can not be relied upon as a permanency. Next year, or as soon as the United States takes hold, the custom house receipts will be lost. This will take over a million dollars a year. The post office receipts will go with it. Of course the country will be saved the pay rolls in these immense departments, which is a considerable item to credit.

With the \$2,500,000 on hand at the beginning of American administration the country will be able to discharge all of its obligations and be considerably ahead.

**GILMORE AND HIS MEN.**

The Yorktown Men Are Said To Be Starving.

WASHINGTON, September 15.—The Navy Department has apparently been unable to ascertain anything concerning the fate of Lieutenant Gilmore and fourteen of the enlisted men of the Yorktown who were captured by the Filipinos at Baler more than six months ago.

News concerning this officer and men has reached Washington in letters to military officials from their fellow-officers in the islands. The latest intelligence comes through a Spanish planter by the name of Garza, who was imprisoned by the insurrectionists and subsequently made his escape. Garza described Lieutenant Gilmore and his companions to the officers in Manila. He said that the officer and fourteen men were at Bigau, where they are subsisting off a meager quantity of rice, valued at not more than one peseta per man per day. The allowance was more liberal than that for the Spanish prisoners, six of whom were allotted one peseta per day. There were fully 2,000 of the latter at Bigau, Garza says, and all the prisoners, Spanish and American, showed the effect of confinement and the poor and insufficient food. He is quoted as saying that the captives could not stand such hardship and such fare much longer.

**CULMINATION OF ROMANCE.**

The recent wedding of "Jamie" Wilder and Miss Harnden at Alameda, took place under a live oak tree and was the culmination of a real romance. The couple were fond of each other as boy and girl fourteen years ago, when they carved their names, united by a heart, on the same old oak tree under which, in memory of old days, they were tonight married. The fathers of the two were clerks with Wells, Fargo & Co., in San Francisco in 1850, Mr. Wilder subsequently settling in Honolulu, where he acquired a fortune.

**WILL SEE KAMALO.**

E. R. Biven, L. H. Dee and others left yesterday afternoon for Molokai to have a look over Kamalo plantation. The delegation holds and represents stock in the company. Biven and Dee were among the six men who signed a request for the postponement of the stock sale from Saturday last.

RAWEL'S FIRST LECTURE

A LARGE AUDIENCE GREATLY ENJOYS IT.

Views and a Description of the Maoris and Their Customs—Talk Replete With Good Things.

Rawel, the New Zealand orator, entertained a large audience in a most substantial manner at the Y. M. C. A. hall last evening. The chief feature of his program was an illustrated lecture on New Zealand and the Maoris.

The views projected upon the screen embodied everything necessary to give a clear idea of Maori life. All the most famous bits of scenery were shown. Then there were the native houses, with the elegant wood carving on the doors, views of living rooms and numerous slides showing the outdoor life of the people.

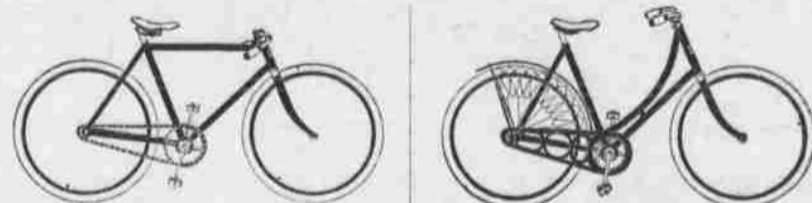
