THIS DAY'S DOINGS.

MORNING. Meeting Stock Exchange, at 11. Lyons & Levey will sell at 12 M., lot of fresh apples.

FORT STREET SCHOOL.

We found room two in charge of Mrs. Hendry, who kindly provided us with seats and inquired our wishes. Her pupils, twenty-five in number, are in the sixth grade and in their sixth year at the school. The room was better lighted than that of the principal. The class was receiving instruction in language from Swinton's grammar. The lesson, which was on the subject of adverbs, was partially read from the books, the examples, given therein, being explained by the pupils, or by the teacher in case of their failure of comprehension. The meaning of the word "conjunctive" was known by the class, yet they did not know the meaning of the word "adverb," which was asked them at our request, as the lesson was on the subject of adverbs. The teacher stated that she had "a system of reviews," by which she "mingled one lesson with another," and, if her class had "forgotten any particular work," she made them "go back." Questions were asked concerning the pronouns, the class showing by their answers a knowledge of their different uses, with the exception of the pronoun "thou," which is not referred to in the text book, and which the class said was "used in quotations." Swinton's Fourth Reader and the "Golden Book of Choice Reading" were in use, the latter in selecting sentences for dictation. There is but little geography taught to the sixth grade, as they are supposed to finish it the previous year. No instruction is given in music and singing, the teacher saying that she "knew nothing of them" herself, and that people who devote themselves entirely to the study of these branches "can't study a common school education," they "can't do both together." She did not believe in children "learning languages till they understood their own." Some questions in arithmetic were worked correctly, and the bell announced the joyful news that it was twelve o'clock. The class marched out in an orderly manner. This is the only room in the school which contains but one grade.

Every care appears to be taken that the children shall understand what they are learning; everything was carefully explained to them, and they were repeatedly cross-questioned on the explanations given. During another visit to this school we found the classes in the principal's room receiving instruction in grammar and arithmetic, the lessons given being "beyond the requirements of the grade." In arithmetic, examples in percentages were worked on the blackboards and mentally, they were generally done correctly. One pupil, though occasionally engaged in mercantile pursuits, was somewhat diffident of his commercial knowledge of profit and loss, and expressed his inability to explain the why and wherefore of the various steps taken in working out one sum.

We were then introduced to the Primary Department, under Miss Kinney. This constituted grades four and five, though, according to the "Course of Study" laid down by the Board of Education, grade five is in the grammar school course. There were twenty-six pupils in the room. Specimens of their rough work in arithmetic were shown to us, and also their subsequent analysis of this work, which displayed a thorough knowledge of each step taken in working out the sums. The meaning of the word analysis was asked them, and a few failed to give a satisfactory reply, but that of S. Beckley was very clear. Thompson's practical arithmetic was in use; and the teacher stated that, when

leaving her room, the pupils "were supposed to be ready for fractions," but they had to be "pushed up." "No singing or drawing" was taught, as there was "no time on account of her having two grades in her room." Spelling is learnt by the pupils writing, on the blackboard, words that occur in their daily lessons, all the syllables being separated. Though we differed from the teacher in the division of some syllables, she upheld her reasons for her method of instruction by quoting authorities; no spelling book was used. Swinton's grammar had been introduced "in Mr. Atkinson's time," at her request.

We were then shown some of the original compositions of the class, and kindly allowed to retain two. One of these written by a boy, who only left Norway two years ago, is published below, and we think, considering the short time he has been instructed in the English language, that it is highly creditable to him:

BASE BALL.

Base ball is one of the finest games in the world. It is an American game. There were two games played between the Honolulu and Maui base ball club. I went to see them. There are three bases; first, second, and third. It is generally nine boys who play, one at each base, one pitch the ball another catch it, and about four boys which wait to strike. When he strike, he run to the first base. If the ball gets there before the boy, he is out and have to go to the third base, but if the boy gets there before ball he waits there till he can get another chance, and then he runs to the second base and waits for another chance to run to third base and so on; this is the way the boys play it. I have seen men play it different. I don't know how men play it because I have only seen them do it once.

MR. A. HOFFNUNG has placed the sum of \$200, at the disposal of the Portuguese Commissioner, to be used to assist indigent Portuguese in the country.

MESSRS. A. S. Cleghorn & Co. have just received by the Mariposa a large assortment of English and American groceries, and some fresh Columbia salmon.

A preliminary announcement of an important sale of furniture is made by Messrs. Lyons & Levey, acting under instructions from Messrs. G. W. Macfarlane & Co.

AMONG the passengers leaving by the Mariposa to-morrow are Captain A. McIntyre, Mr. D. K. Fye and child, and Mr. F. T. Lenehan who takes a trip for the benefit of his health.

THE regular monthly meeting of the Y. M. C. A. will be held to-morrow evening in the hall, as usual, the lecture to be delivered by Mr. Hoffnung having been postponed till Monday.

Candidates for legislative honors will have to undergo a searching examination at the hands of the Workingmen's Union. Verb. sag.

A public school is at last to be built at Honokaa, Hawaii, the center of a populous district. The tender of Mr. James Wallace has been accepted for the work.

THE attention of the road supervisor is respectfully called to three holes in the Waikiki bridge. The road there has lately been repaired, and residents hope that the bridge will also receive attention.

THE list of prizes for the various races at the regatta is published in this issue. The total amount offered is \$610, and the winners of \$30 prizes have the option of receiving a silver cup instead of the money.

THE power of appointing a teacher of music for the public schools in Honolulu has been delegated to His Excellency the President of the Board of Education and the Inspector-General of schools.

MANY people at Emma Square on Monday night wished for more tumults, or for their removal, as considerable time elapsed before all were enabled to leave, and it was not effected without some crushing.

THE Library and Reading Room takes a benefit on Monday evening at the Y. M. C. A. hall, where Mr. A. Hoffnung will deliver a lecture on "Tom Hood," giving extracts from his works. The admission is only twenty-five cents. The lecture has been postponed from Thursday.

A VERY heavy swell was noticeable yesterday morning, it was caused by the prevalent westerly winds. On Monday afternoon, though the high tide was small, the water, driven in by the wind, covered the Waikiki bridge. In the evening, at the same place, the rocks, some forty feet from the bridge, were plainly visible.

At Monday night's band concert, Hart Bros had erected a stand inside the Square, and the new and handsome cart of McNerny's modestly remained outside, doing a good business in soda water drinks as well as in ice-creams. The constant tintinabulation of the bell was not generally appreciated after the music of the band boys.

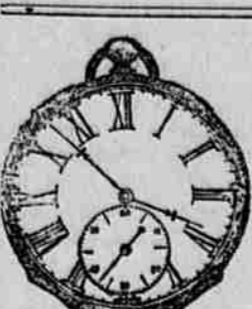
