TOPICS OF THE DAY.

One idiot wants martial law proclaimed to stop the cholera. He might as well, at the next eclipse of the moon, bang a drum and shoot off guns, in the Chinese fashion, to prevent the dragon from devouring it.

Congressman Hilborn says he doesn't want to be governor of Hawaii. He is wise. He also denies that he advocated annexation at that celebrated masonic banquet. Probably his hearers colored his remarks with their own feelings. Many people do.

What the Star doesn't know about British politics and politicians would fill a book. Mr. Chamberlain has been an acknowledged leader for years. So much so, in fact, that in the recent coalition cabinet appointments much disagreement was expressed by the Conservatives who thought Salisbury had conceded to him too great a share.

The Spalding cable grab was said to require a cost of between three and four million dollars. Of this, one million was to be subscribed here, and one by San Francisco capitalists. The latter have shown such appreciation of the scheme that they are only going to try to put up a quarter of what the gallant and rufous Colonel asked them for. And they don't even guarantee that.

The Advertiser deserves credit for publishing a symposium of opinions on the best methods for united action in stamping out the cholera. In this we find that both Chinese and Hawaiians have lost faith in the honest endeavors of the Government to work for the common good. It is in order now for the Republic to gain that lost confidence of the people, of which it boasted so often, but which it never had. Let it take THE INDEPENDENT'S advice.

The Advertiser discusses editorially the Bishop of Honolulu's letter to the Bulletin the other night. When the good Bishop writes anything, it is to the Advertiser like a red rag to a bull. But for filth, obscenity and scurrility this last outbreak of the Advertiser out-herods Herod. Evidently the reference to the local "Puritan" want of reverence for religion and sacred things, has roused it to a pitch of fury and blackguardism hitherto unequalled. But it hasn't advanced a single argument.

Our Colonel—we mean McLean, formerly of the U. S. marine corps—objects to any of his officers referring to the rule and regimen of Soper and Fisher with approval. Sure, he wasn't here then. If he had been—and had also been an officer—he would have taken his ham and eggs, and boiled tongue and green peas, with great satisfaction—and then missed them now. In future, in regard to court martials, he had better conduct them himself, in the capacity of court, judge advocate, and revising officer. Residing in Honolulu

NECESSITY VS. LAW.

Mr. Rufus Spalding may be correct when he says that the residents of Kauai have no legal right to prevent passengers from Honolulu to land on Kauai when they come with the approval and permission of the Hawaiian Government. Mr. Spalding is undoubtedly correct in his view as far as the law is concerned, but it seems to us that he should be the last to blame his friends on Kauai from adopting all possible measures of preventing the spread of the disease to that island.

The Kauai people know that there is cholera in Honolulu. They know that in proportion to our population the disease has taken rather serious dimensions and that the death rate is a much higher percentage of the cases than experienced elsewhere. They also know that the cholera was brought here by the steamer Belgic. That in spite of quarantine, the Board of Health, the Honolulu doctors, our alleged excellent sanitary system, our police and Colonel McLean, the cholera filibustered ashore and has taken hold of Honolulu.

Who under such circumstances can blame the Kauaites for being careful and refusing to blindly depend on the wisdom and discretion of the Board of Health, the doctors, etc., in Honolulu? Kauai has got no cholera. The Garden Island feels also happy in having no Board of Health, very few doctors, hardly any police, no colonel, and no quarantine. The only one of these items the good people want is a quarantine, and as the Board of Health wouldn't furnish them with one, but sent 79 Chinese from the Belgic instead they made one themselves and a very effective one it was. Their action may not be strictly correct in law and may be annoying to Mr. Rufus Spalding, but all circumstances considered any sensible man will approve and applaud Kauai upholding necessity vs. law.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Would it not be well for the Board of Health to prevent the gathering of people in the courts during sessions. Yesterday and today the Police Court was jammed by a motley crowd of spectators of all nationalities, and none of them

had any business there. We believe that there is more chance of spreading the disease among the crowd which gathers in the house of the law (as administered in Hawaii) than in the House of God.

A prominent Hawaiian who knows his countrymen intimately suggested to-day that it would be a practical move of the Board of Health to engage the services of the kahunas and pay them a modest salary for advocating and prescribing the sanitary rules of the Board to the Hawaiians.

A kahuna, who is a faith erer, etc., and believed in by numerous Hawaiians, floored a haole yesterday by an "Irish" argument. The haole tried to persuade him to believe that the rules relating to fishing and the eating of raw fishing were sound and necessary. The kahuna answered: "If korela in sea, and bad for us to eat fish, what for not fish get korela and die?"

The Board of Health could assist in restoring confidence in themselves and their agents among the Hawaiian people if they would urge the immediate liberation of all political prisoners. That would be such a practical proof of their aloha to Hawaiians that would at once remove all suspicion of hatred and extermination. Children always like an object lesson.

Mr. A. S. Cleghorn has been interviewed in New York. Mr. Wodehouse didn't go to Washington. On these topics the Advertiser has printed the usual rumors. (It used to object the to other papers printing rumors, itself now is the chief offender in that respect.) The Star can only find in regard to Mr. Cleghorn's statements that, the government here is a military despotism; that business is bad; that the people of the country would vote four to one to restore the Queen, etc., the argument that it would be as easy to say the reverse. Well, talk is cheap on both sides.

Like most people on these islands who only read or have read the inflated sensationalism of Pacific Coast newspapers, the Star fails to understand Mr. A. J. Balfour. Balfour never was a radical. He has always by birth, training, and conviction been a Conservative. He is the nephew of Lord Salisbury. His bi-metallic views are his own and like every true Briton he doesn't urge his own private fads when holding a public office as a public trust. What he may deem correct as an individual he does not insist on as a public official. Perhaps, however, that line of conduct cannot be understood by people who observe politics as carried on here, where everybody who gets office tries to carry out his private opinions and prejudices at once: no matter whether for public benefit or not.

It is understood that the Council of State will meet this afternoon at 2 o'clock. The proposed pardoning of prisoners will be discussed by the august body. If the Council should decide that it will be wiser to postpone the liberation of the large majority of the Hawaiian prisoners until the dread disease now ravaging Honolulu is conquered, the people should receive such decision with gratitude, even if it delays the jubilant meeting with fathers, husbands, brothers, sons, and lovers for a few days. The Authorities may hold that the happiness of the Ha-

waiians released can not be restrained and that luus and general exhilaration will be the result of the pardon. Honolulu wants her sons back but at present she doesn't want luus, fish, pigs etc.

The Bulletin and the Advertiser are engaged in a hand to hand fist fight—with a pen in each—over the new Land Law. The Advertiser shows that the Act is liable to be a failure in its leasing clauses owing to the arbitrary action permitted to the Commissioners. The Bulletin argues the other way, having totally mistaken both what the Advertiser was driving at, and the true meaning of the law. Before the act was passed we characterized it as ill conceived, badly drafted, and unconsitutional. We agree with the Advertiser and still hold our formerly expressed opinion.

BY AUTHORITY.

REGULATION OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH, HONOLULU, Sept. 4, 1895.

The gathering of large numbers of people in any one place in the District of Honolulu is forbidden. This regulation applies to church services, band concerts and all other places where people are wont to meet in large numbers.

REGULATION OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH, HONOLULU, Sept. 3, 1895.

1. Taking of Fish, Shell fish or any product of the sea or water, from the sea, or any harbor, pond, river or stream, between Makapuu Point and Kalaehou (Barber's Point), and from the mountains to the sea, is strictly prohibited.

2. All Saloons and places where spirituous liquor is sold in the District of Honolulu, are ordered to be closed from 6 o'clock P. M. till 6 o'clock A. M. each day.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH, HONOLULU, Sept. 4, 1895.

The following regulations have been adopted by the Board of Health in regard to the sending of freight and permitting passengers to go from Honolulu to the other islands:

FIRST: The steamers W. G. Hall and Kilauea Hou, having had no direct communication with Honolulu for a period of time longer than the incubation of Cholera, may be considered clean. These ships shall, however, be disinfected by fumigating the holds and all enclosed spaces with sulphur dioxide and washing the decks, deck houses, bulwarks, etc. with a 1 to 1000 solution of bichloride of Mercury. The crews in the meantime are to be removed to Quarantine Island, there to bathe in carbolic acid solution and change their clothing to those that have been cleansed by boiling or fumigation. After returning to the ships they are to be anchored outside of the harbor and from there allowed to depart with such passengers and freight as the Board of Health may permit.

SECOND:—Such other Inter-Island steamers as the respective companies designate may be disinfected in the same manner and their crews disinfected as those of the W. G. Hall and Kilauea Hou. They are then to anchor outside of the harbor for a period of five days and if no sickness of a contagious nature has developed on board during that period they may be allowed to depart after inspection of an agent of

the Board of Health with such cargo and passengers as the Board of Health may permit. An officer of the Board will be kept on the steamers while in quarantine, at the steamer's expense.

THIRD:—All first cabin passengers, who will have their baggage fumigated, bathe in carbolic acid solution and then enter five days quarantine on board their respective steamers lying at anchor outside, may be allowed to depart at the end of five days after passing a satisfactory inspection by an Agent of the Board.

FOURTH:—Until further order, no freight will be allowed to be taken from Honolulu for any other port of these Islands—excepting flour, rice, hay, grain, coal in bulk and coin which has been disinfected, excepting only upon special permission in writing from the Board.

FIFTH:—No freight will be allowed to be shipped from Honolulu for any other ports in these Islands, excepting from the Inter-Island Wharf. An officer of the Board will be stationed at that wharf to supervise all freight and his orders must be obeyed.

SIXTH:—All passengers desiring to depart from Honolulu for any other port under the above conditions will please report at once at the Office of the Board of Health, where their names may be registered and instructions given.

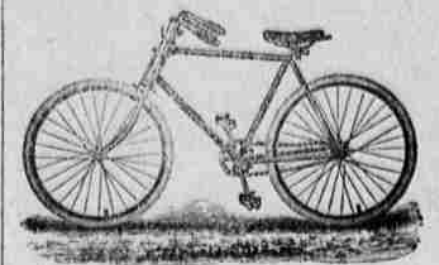

The Kawaihou Club's services are not much in demand at present. No parties, no luaus.

By order of the Marshal all saloons will be closed from 6 p. m. to 6 a. m. till further notice.

C. Brewster, formerly steward of the Kinau, died this morning. The cause of death was paralysis.

The Mokoli'i left for Maui and Molokai last night with mail and provisions for the leper settlement.

Professor Lyons and family and Hiram Bingham, Jr., left for San Francisco in the Martha Davis yesterday.

The mail for the Australia will close at 12 m. Registered letters and parcels must be delivered before 11 a. m.

The Hawaiian band will give a concert at the Hawaiian Hotel to night for the benefit of guests departing by the Australia.

Shut up the saloons from 6 p. m. to 6 a. m. Give a dinner at the Hawaiian Hotel and the band gives a concert. How consistent!

The Kilauea Hou will leave for Hawaii during the day with mail, provisions and, probably, some passengers from the Australia.

Rice on Maui and Hawaii is now up to \$9 and \$10 a bag. So says one authority. Another says \$6 at each. Here in Honolulu it is \$4.50.

The funeral of Mrs. George Davis took place yesterday from the residence of Miss Peabody on Vineyard Street at 3 p. m. The Bishop of Honolulu officiated.

The usual prayer meeting at the Central Union Church will take place at 7:30 o'clock this evening. Are the churches opened again.

The informal tennis tournament of the Pacific Tennis Club was finished yesterday afternoon. The Atherton brothers were the winners.

The meeting which the Salvation Army intended to hold last evening at Central Union Church as a welcome to Brigadier Keppel did not come off.

Office of Board Health, Wednesday afternoon, September 4, at 3 o'clock the total cases to date were 33. Of these there are 27 dead; new to 3 p. m. 2. There is 1 recovered and 4 remain in the hospital.

It is understood that Mr. W. H. Wolters, formerly of the Pacific Saloon will shortly have charge of the Beehive Saloon on Nuuanu street. Major Wolters is a famous host in Honolulu, and will undoubtedly make a success in his new quarters.

The Hawaiian Rowing Association, A. G. M. Robertson, President, met at noon and decided to indefinitely postpone the annual regatta which was to have taken place on the 21st. This was done owing to the present cholera trouble.

L. B. Kerr has just received a new lot of Sun Hats, wide brims, which he is selling at 25 and 35 cents each, just the thing for this warm weather. Also a lot of Black and White Sailors Hats, suitable for School Children; 50 Cents will buy two of them.

J. M. Vivas is confined to the house through a slight indisposition.

Miss Ethel Carter was married to Fred Waterhouse at the home of the bride at 11 o'clock yesterday morning. The wedding was strictly private, only the families of the parties being present. The young couple will spend their honeymoon at Luakaha.

The W. G. Hall was fumigated yesterday. The crew will be disinfected to-day and the steamer anchored outside. The passengers from the Australia will be transferred in a fumigated boat. The Hall will probably leave late this afternoon.

California Grapes, Peaches, Nectarines, Apricots, Celery, Cauliflowers, Fresh Oysters and crabs are amongst the ice house, goods received on the Australia by the California Fruit Market, Camaricos & Company. The finest quality and the lowest price.

The executive committee of the Hawaiian Cholera Preventing Union—or whatever their name is—met this afternoon. The committee is composed of J. F. Colburn, J. E. Bush, and A. W. Carter. The committee is full of energy, and has secured the services of numerous intelligent Hawaiians, who are visiting all quarters of the town and instructing the Hawaiians. Carbolic soap is distributed gratis to the agents. It is a good disinfectant.

REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH,
HONOLULU, Aug. 31, 1895.

1. No persons are allowed to go
from the District of Honolulu to
any other District of the Island of
Oahu without a permit from the
Board of Health.

2. No freight or baggage shall be
taken from the District of Honolulu
to any other District of Oahu with-
out a permit from the Board of
Health.

3. No Schools, public or private,
on the Island of Oahu, will be al-
lowed to open until further order of
the Board.

4. Church and Sunday School
Services on Sunday, September 1st,
in the city of Honolulu are prohib-
ited.

REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

1. From and after this date all
persons are forbidden to use any
water from the Nuuanu stream, or
Honolulu harbor, or from bathing
in said stream or harbor, from throw-
ing anything, liquid or solid, into
said stream or harbor, or permitting
any liquid or drainage flowing into
said stream or harbor.

2. The sale, in the District of Ho-
nolulu, of fish, shell-fish or any pro-
duct of the sea is prohibited.

3. Until further orders no passen-
gers or freight will be allowed to be
conveyed from the Island of Oahu
to any other island of the group.

4. No letters or mail matter shall
be taken from the Island of Oahu to
any other island of the group, ex-
cepting from the General Post Of-
fice in mail bags; no mail matter
shall be allowed to leave the Post
Office until thoroughly fumigated.

5. The manufacture of poi is pro-
hibited in that portion of Honolulu
bounded by Nuuanu street on the
East, Judd street on the North, and
on the West by a line drawn from
the corner of Judd and Liliha streets,
down Liliha street to the sea.
