The letter of Mr. Scott, published in yesterday's ADVERTISER, contains a fair offer to bring the question of Mr. W. I. Bishop's ability to read minds to the only satisfactory test, a strictly scientific one. We fancy there are a great many persons in Honolulu besides Mr. Scott who will not yield their disbelief until their reason has been satisfied, as well as their senses surprised.

The report of the special committee on the Police Building accounts, made to the Legislature, discloses a new set of facts which throw a whole flood of fresh light on the methods of the piratical gang who used to have possession of the Government. Out of about \$91,000 charged to the appropriation, above \$15,000 was used for other purposes altogether. The individuals who managed affairs made up a fund from different appropriations, whenever there happened to be a convenient balance on an account, and then they used the money according to their own sweet will. The Legislature lent itself to the frauds and illegal practices by the unspeakable folly of the appropriation bill which it passed.

The aforesaid individuals also overpaid the contractor, Mr. Thomas, \$2,500 on his contract, and Mr. Lucas \$200 on his. The report is to be published in full, and will interest everyone who likes a spicy and entertaining scandal.

EVERY thoughtful person must feel that it is important now, in our new relations, that no mistakes be made. The vital force of the Government prior to the revolution was centralization. The King had nearly succeeded in centering all power in himself. The revolution and new constitution changed this. The intention of the constitution is to give us, to a certain extent, what England has, a responsible Government centered in the Cabinet. It remains to be seen how our constitution works in the protection of our rights. It was not the intention at all to create an irresponsible, highly centralized Government, and it is complained by many that such will be the effect of the passage of such bills as the Act to abolish the office of Governor, the Police bill, the Military bill, and others. Besides some exhibition of bitterness, this is virtually the complaint of W. Goodale in the Bulletin of June 14th. If it is so, we should reconsider before permitting such bills to become law. But is it true? Will the passage of such bills centralize everything in Honolulu? If the office of Governor is abolished, the duties of the office will be performed by officers who belong to and reside in the several circuits. True, the Sheriffs are appointed in Honolulu, but they are not residents of Honolulu. Can this be said of the Governors? Who appoints them now? Whence came the present Governors? So with other officers; who has appointed them in the past? What changes, for instance, are there in the Police bill? Subordinate officers will be, as hitherto, appointed in the several circuits, probably from persons resident there. These

officers will be accountable to the Sheriffs, who will reside there. Why not be responsible to the Sheriff as to the Governor?

It must be remembered that Hawaii is a small country, and that it probably can be governed as well from Honolulu as from any number of separate points. The principle for which we strive to-day is to have all public affairs accountable and responsible to some one who is ultimately responsible to the Legislature. The people speak through their representatives; therefore it seems a correct system which makes all public servants, who are heads of departments or bureaus, responsible to the Legislature, and all subordinate officers accountable to such heads. It must not be forgotten, either, that one of the foundation stones of the whole reform movement is the abrogation of superfluous offices.

Supreme Court.

FRIDAY, June 15.

BEFORE MR. JUSTICE M'CALLY.

Admiralty division. Collector-General of Customs vs. 407 Hats. Claim of forfeiture for false entry. A. P. Peterson, Deputy Attorney-General, for libellant; no one appears to claim goods. Heard, argued and submitted.

BEFORE MR. JUSTICE PRESTON.

Law division. In re Peter Olesen. Petition for habeas corpus. W. A. Whiting and P. Neumann for petitioner; A. S. Hartwell for the French Chancellor. Besides principals and counsel, the Marshal of the Kingdom and many foreign representatives were present. After the reading of petitioner's application and Marshal Soper's return, Mr. Hartwell made an oral statement of facts not stated in said return. The Court held the return should set out everything justifying the arrest of these men. Mr. Hartwell moved to file forthwith an amended return, to which Mr. Neumann objected. The Court ruled that the Marshal's return was insufficient and that the document to him requesting the men's arrest did not warrant the Marshal in its execution. The petitioner, Peter Olesen, and Adolph Peterson and Henry Foster were ordered discharged. The Marshal's return, thus adjudged insufficient, simply alleges that the men had been arrested and detained at the station, on the written request of Chancellor Bellaquet alleging that they had refused duty on board the French bark Celee.

Police Court.

FRIDAY, June 15.

Larceny—Geo. Harrigan, a draft for \$90 and a silver watch, nolle prosequi.

Assault and battery—In the Chinese Theater case, Ah Wo, Ah Choy and Ah Hop were fined \$10 and costs each. Mahial, who hit a Chinaman on the neck with a plate, was fined \$16 20.

Furious driving—F. Blackburn, hackman, fined \$17 40.

Disturbing quiet of the night—Seven Chinese, who were having a time with a fiddle at Kaapuana the previous night, were reprimanded and discharged.

Gaming—Kodani and Tamis (Jap.), from the 12th, further remanded to the 16th.

On the 14th Emma Kahuakai Quinn pleaded guilty to deserting her husband Peter Quinn, and was sentenced to imprisonment at hard labor forty days, plaintiff to pay costs of \$3 60. The unhappy wife stated to the Court that she liked the prison.

Ready for a Fight.

It has transpired at Barbadoes that the British war vessel Canada was ordered to Trinidad to take care of any over-zealous Venezuelans who might feel inclined to invade the island and kidnap General Crespo, a candidate for the Presidency of Venezuela. The troops and police of Trinidad, a body of 500 well-trained men, commanded by an officer of the British army, are quite ready for anything. Service ammunition was issued some time ago, and the warmest kind of a tropical reception awaits any rash individual who may invade British territory.

At Limerick, Ireland, the troops cheered in honor of the Queen's birthday. The crowd outside the barracks responded with cheers for William O'Brien and the plan of campaign.

THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

Fifteenth Day.

FRIDAY, June 15.

The House met at 10 o'clock, the President, Hon. S. G. Wilder, in the Chair. Minutes read and confirmed.

PETITIONS.

Rep. C. Brown presented a petition from the owners of a stock ranch at Waialua for a refund of \$16, taxes illegally collected by J. Amara, tax collector. Referred to Finance Committee.

Rep. A. S. Wilcox presented a petition from Keaha for a refund of \$5, taxes paid twice. Referred to Finance Committee.

Noble Richardson read a petition relating to a mail carrier between Kaanapali and Lahaina. Referred to the Minister of Interior.

Rep. Kalauoka presented a petition from Honolulu praying for an extension of Liliha street to Wylie street. Referred to committee on public lands and internal improvements.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Rep. C. Brown, for judiciary committee, reported on the bill to amend section 1253 of the Civil Code, recommending a new section, with which committee recommend that the bill pass.

(Signed) C. Brown, W. R. Castle, W. A. Kinney, D. H. Hitchcock, John Richardson. The report was laid on the table to be considered with the bill.

Rep. Helekunihii presented a petition from H. P. Halama, for \$5,500, on account of double taxes paid. Referred to Finance Committee.

Rep. Young presented a further report on the military, recommending an amendment to regulate the tenure of office of the Colonel and with this that the bill pass. Laid on the table to be taken up with the bill.

Noble Castle presented the report of the commission appointed by the Legislature of 1886 upon the election laws of the Kingdom, with a draft of a new election law, both of which were read by title, 6th inst. The report and bill are in pamphlet form, in both languages, making a book of 131 pages.

ANSWERS BY MINISTER.

Minister Thurston in answer to the questions of Rep. Hustace, read the following: In answer to the 1st question I would reply that the action of the Chief Engineer appears to have been taken under the authority of section 335 of the Civil Code.

In reply to the 2nd question, I would say that the statute regulating the fire department does not apparently contemplate any interference or control on the part of the Minister of the Interior in the internal management of the department, such management being left to the members of the department. Having, as I take it, no authority in the premises, any opinion which I might express in the matter would be a personal one only and therefore of no consequence.

Appended to the Minister's answer is a detailed statement by the Chief Engineer Wilson relating to the case of foreman C. J. McCarthy, referred to in Rep. Hustace's questions.

Rep. Hustace moved that this reply be referred to a select committee, with instructions to report upon the facts therein involved, and also whether the efficiency of the Honolulu Fire Department requires any amendment to the statutes, relating to the same, and, if so, what amendments?

Rep. C. Brown moved the report be laid on the table. If any amendments to existing laws are needed, we would undoubtedly have heard of them from the government. It is beneath the dignity of the house to take cognizance of any squabble or difficulty arising among members of the fire department. The department is under the charge of the Minister of Interior, and he is fully capable of dealing with the matter at issue. The questions have been answered and that is the end of it.

Rep. Kinney did not agree with the honorable member for Koolau. The fire department is an important division of the public service. He would not like to take part in personal difficulties between its members, but the grievances, if any, of the firemen ought to command attention. A feud had arisen among them and as a result there is danger of companies breaking up. The latter part of the resolution referred to by the member for Honolulu is of value, and he would support it. He thought, however, that the time has come when there ought to be a small paid force. At the same time, no harm can come of referring the matter to a committee.

Rep. Hustace gave reasons for his resolution. The laws applying to the fire department are not as they should be.

Minister Thurston said that he wished to correct a statement made by the member from Koolau, that the Minister of the Interior has authority to control such matters as this; during the past six months, he, several times, had occasion to refer to the law so that he was familiar therewith. Under the law, the Minister has no authority or control over the members or officers of the department. The Fire Department is, by the law, a self-governing body, and not subject to the control of any member of the Government. I do not think this is as it should be; every department connected with the Government should be subject to some responsible head, and while a large measure of self-control might well be left to the department, there should be at least a right of appeal, and some measure of control of the expenditures. A remedy may be found for this by reference to a committee and I therefore favor that course.

Noble Townsend said there ought always to be some remedy for a minor responsibility if imposed upon. Should the chief engineer overstep his authority, there does not appear to be any means of redress.

Rep. C. Brown submitted that there was nothing before the House. The Minister had answered and there was an end of the matter.

The President ruled that Rep. Hustace's motion was in order.

An appeal was made from this ruling, but the President was sustained.

The resolution was adopted and a committee appointed, consisting of Reps. Hustace, Dowsett, Nobles Foster, Young and Townsend.

Minister Thurston made the following statement on the petition relative to the letter carrier at Kaanapali.

The petition prays:

1. That the letter carrier from Lahaina to Kaanapali be paid every Friday.

2. The information is conveyed that the pay is \$1 50 a week which is equivalent to \$6 a month.

3. That the present incumbent of this lucrative office is a policeman, and that petitioners want him removed and another man by the name of "Bill Nakooka" be appointed.

No reasons are assigned for any of the prayers.

Your committee are of opinion that the management of the department of the several bureaus should be left to the respective heads thereof. In case such officers shall refuse or fail to remedy any alleged injustice or evil, it will then be in order for this Assembly to enquire into the matter.

Noble Castle moved the report of the committee of one be received and the committee discharged. Carried.

The same Minister read his answer to Noble Widemann's question about water rates, as follows: The Minister of Interior has not surcharged the inhabitants of Honolulu with 10 per cent, in addition to the ordinary water rates. What the hon. member probably has in view is, that the Legislature of 1886, of which he was a member, passed a law, viz.: Chapter XXVI, laws of 1886, imposing 10 per cent, additional upon all water rates unpaid for over fifteen days

after the same are due. The Superintendent of Water Works as in duty bound has carried out this law.

NOTICES OF NEW BILLS.

Rep. Kinney gave notice of certain amendments to the Constitution relating to Chinese.

Noble Wight gave notice of a bill amending the Act to prevent the use of explosive substances in taking fish, passed June 3, 1872.

NEW BILL.

Minister Ashford read, a first time, by title, the bill to provide for the right of challenge to jurors in certain cases.

RESOLUTIONS.

Rep. Kamaoaha read a resolution in the form of a bill or a bill in the form of a resolution—which it was not explained, but the hon. member's attention being directed to the form of the document, he withdrew it.

Rep. Paehaole moved to take from the table, to be considered, the bill to amend Article 63 of the Constitution. Lost.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

Prints and Labels.—Third reading of the bill to provide for the registration of prints and labels. Passed.

Election Law.—Second reading, by title, of the bill to amend and consolidate the election laws of the Kingdom. Referred to a special committee, consisting of Nobles Castle and Smith, the Attorney-General, Rep. C. Brown and the Minister of the Interior.

Meetings of several committees were announced for the afternoon, and at 11:57 the House adjourned to 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

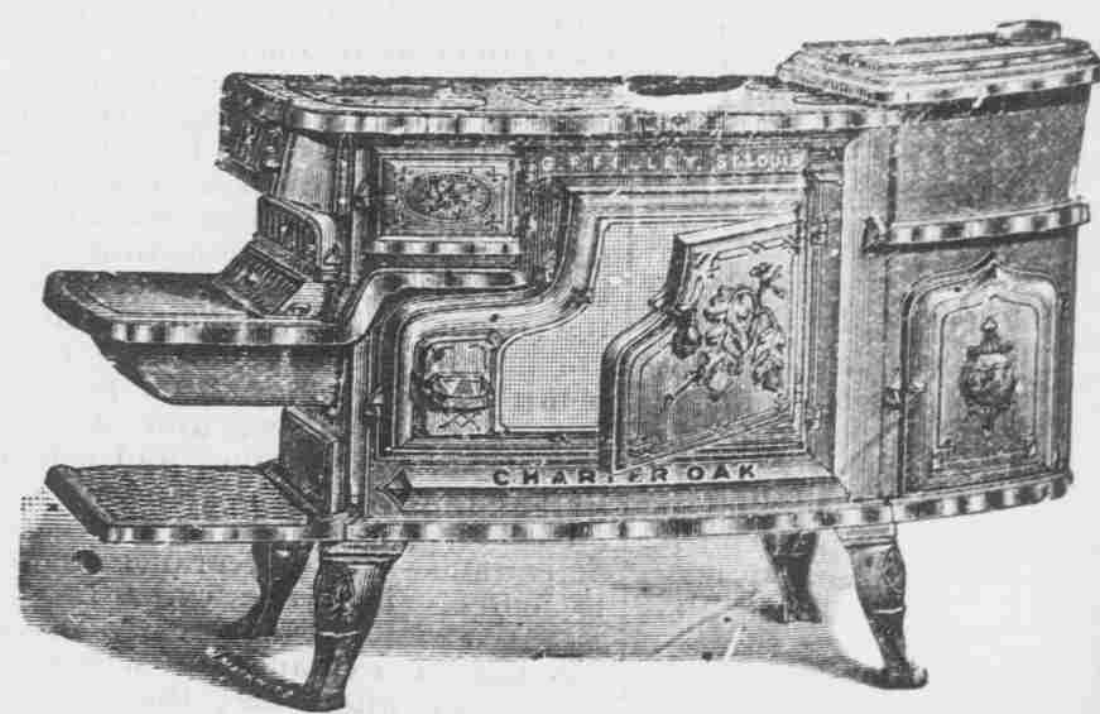
