Over strong objections by the Republican minority in the House of Representatives, the Democratic majority stood firm and rejected the nomination of Eric Smith to the post of Chief of the Division of Intergovernmental Relations Thursday during the regular House session.

A report from the House Committee on Judiciary and Governmental Operation was strongly critical of Smith, and in return the Republicans were strongly critical of the committee report.

"Mr. Smith did not convince the Committee that he can effectively represent the people of the Northern Marianas Islands on issues involving their sovereignty and their right to the land. He did not support the decision

rendered by Judge Ramon Villagomez on Ferreira vs. Borja," states the committee report.

Along with the Ferreria vs. Borja case, the report also pointed to the position taken by the Attorney General's office on Villaluz vs. Agulto as an instance when the AG's office acted in a way in which the committee members felt was in violation of the Covenant and the CNMI Constitution.

Although later debate centered on the exact role Smith played in any of the above cases, the committee found, "...Mr. Eric Smith, in reference to the findings above, will not protect the sanctities of both documents" (the Covenant, and CNMI Constitution)."

Rep. Mariano Bermudes, who when the final confirmation vote was taken voted for Smith along

with other Republicans, called the committee report on Smith, "very unprofessional and unfair."

"I find this report very one sided, very political and very unprofessional," said Bermudes.

Also voicing strong objections to the committee report was Rep. Juan Torres, Minority Leader of the House.

"I am asking the committee, especially the chairman (Rep. Antonio Camacho) to reconsider this report. I beg this body to please reconsider and take a favorable step and confirm this candidate for office," said Torres.

Several attempts to have the House allow Smith, who was present during the session, to be allowed to speak on his own behalf failed. Minority members said they wanted Smith to speak so that he could explain what, if any, role he had in the cases cited in the committee report.

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The opposing arguments are centered around the case of Wilfred S. Reyes vs. William H. Millard, Patricia Millard, Jerry Crowe, Mary A. Crowe, Marian Aldan Pierce, Antonio Guerrero and defendants in related cases. The origin of the case is the land transaction of 1983 over 10,010 sq. meters in Papago Village. The plaintiff, Reyes, has claimed the deals for the land were made in conflict with Article XII and should be void with the land title returning to the original owner.

Mitchell, representing Reyes, has filed a motion to remand the case back to the Commonwealth Trial Court for a decision, while

the opposition want the case to be heard in the District Court.

For the defendants attorney Robert Parish Jr., has argued that federal laws are involved in the controversy to be decided in the case, therefore the federal courts have jurisdiction.

"It is clear that several laws, treaties, or provisions of the U.S. Constitution provide an ample legal basis for removal of this action to the District Court," says Parish in his legal presentation.

Parish also says the court, in deciding jurisdiction, should not accept the interpretation of Article XII advanced by the plaintiff and that such an interpretation would be "...a clear infringement of individual rights and federal interest protection under the U.S. Constitution if this court were to accept the plaintiff's strained interpretation of Article XII."

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After being recaptured, the men were put in separate cells, away from the corner.

Camacho was held under \$10,000 bail.

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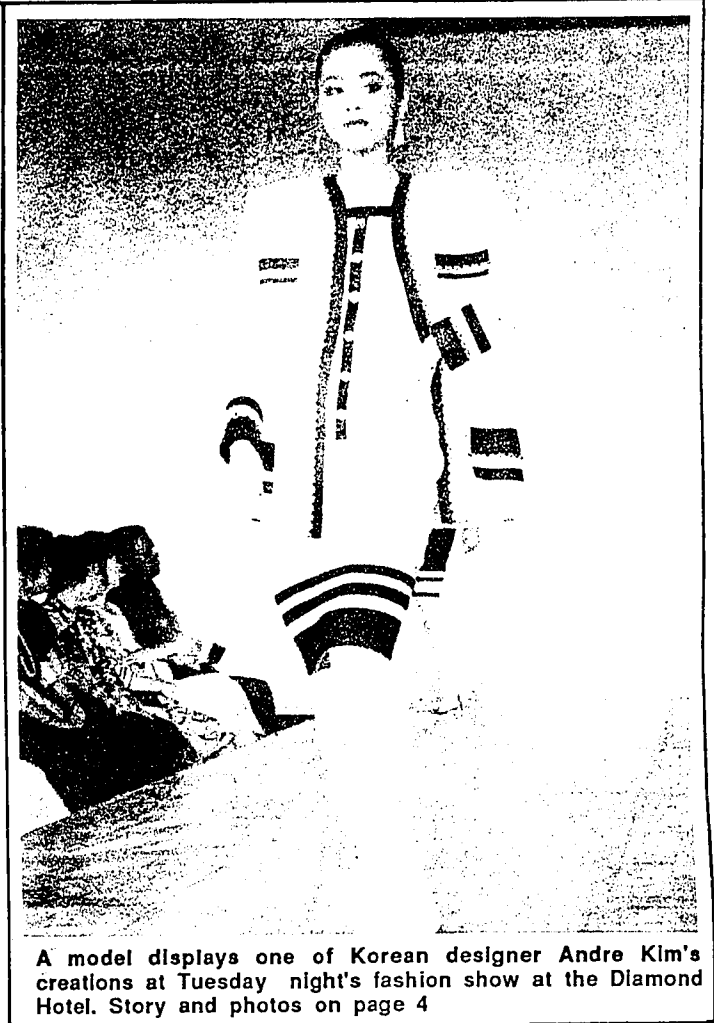

It places a vivid question in the minds of Micronesian political observers, visitors and investors as well about the safety of that republic today and in the immediate future.

It brings to mind a very pertinent query: Why assassinate an individual when his fate in the Palauan political arena could be determined via the presidential election? What really bothers me most is the fact that islanders are not known for violence involving assassination plots, etc. Couldn't greed amongst presidential aspirants be the strongest common denominator which apparently has been translated into violence--the assassination of Remelilik and Sali? Who's behind all these violence anyway? The CIA, FBI, Yakuza, Asian Underworld, or Palauan Underworld?

The Republic of Palau has all the human resources that it needs for nation building. It has the most educated people throughout the Micronesian Region, the richest ocean, strategic importance, etc., etc. It would seem to me that the only thing missing is the local resolve to work together

under the umbrella of unity so that our Palauan brothers and sisters could, for the first time say unto themselves: "Let us take the first step together" in that long and arduous road to nation building.

Now did I enjoy writing stories on the way some non-resident workers seem to be treated by their employers. It certainly reminded me of some of the horrors of slavery before the U.S. Civil War, and of the equal horrors of working conditions found even after the Civil War in company towns across the United States.

Although I will not be around to see the time when every home in the Commonwealth can get good drinkable water, or reliable electricity, I did see some progress being made in that direction.

CNMI Supreme Court Bill Gets Support

A public hearing by the House Committee on Judiciary and Government and Law on a bill to establish a Supreme Court for the Northern Marianas was held on Thursday and while few spoke against the intention of the bill, most criticized the way the current House bill was drafted.

Enough comments were made on ways to make the bill stronger,

that after the hearing, Committee Chairman Antonio Camacho said, "I can see I will be doing a lot of refinements on the bill based on what I have heard in this hearing."

Testimony for Judge Ramon Villagomez, and from attorney Ted Mitchell centered around the need for the creation of a Supreme Court to allow for more local self-government for the

Commonwealth.

"The purpose of our entering into the Covenant was for us to require self-government," said Villagomez. "Self government means we make our own laws, interpret our own laws and enforce our own laws."

"It does not make sense for us to make our own laws here, then have a court of another government, in San Francisco, interpret

for us what we mean when we make our own laws. We are in the best position to decide for ourselves what our own laws mean, how they are to be applied, and how they should be executed."

Attorney Mitchell echoed some of the statements of Villagomez and added his own experiences with the current system of appellate court in the CNMI.

Mitchell said because of the appellate system now prevailing some cases are not given serious consideration by the court. He told of arguing a case in front of the District Court judge only to notice the judge had fallen asleep. He also told of how a "super lawyer" from the mainland had made presentations in the District Court far below the professional standard called for.

The current system, said Mitchell, with support from Judge Villagomez was a costly system that resulted in losses of time, money and effort since the

9th Circuit Court had decided it would hear cases appealed to it from the District Court here as though no arguments had been made at the lower levels!

However Mitchell and others who testified in the hearing said the a more comprehensive overhaul of the judiciary would be needed than what was contained in the bill should a Supreme Court be established.

Also submitting testimony were: Attorney General Alex Castro, Public Defender Marty Taylor, attorney Miguel Demapan, and attorney Jesus C. Borja. A representative of the Bar Association was present but told the committee the Bar had not met to come up with a report on the bill as the Bar had only received the bill last week.

While the House was holding its public hearing, the Senate went ahead and passed its bill to establish a Supreme Court on second reading also on Thursday.

Manglona Seeks Subsidy For Power Users

The plan Senate President Benjamin Manglona has devised to help residential electrical consumers meet the rate hike of Commonwealth Utility Corporation also will help CUC collections and give funding to a Public Law which has never seen appropriations.

For several weeks, the Senate President has been working on the amendment to fiscal year 1989 budget to allow the govern-

ment to absorb some of the impact caused by the raising of residential rates by CUC to 11 cents. This week he sent a letter to Governor Pedro P. Tenorio asking for the governor to help identify and certify additional resources in the amount of \$1.5 million. The funds would be used to pay 3 cents on residential electrical bills.

This would mean the average residential bill, before the Jan. 1, 1989 rate hike, of 5.5 cents would only carry an additional cost to

the consumer of 2.5 cents. The remaining cost, of 3 cents would be subsidized by the government until the 11 cent rate is met.

Sen. Pres. Manglona's plan calls for the consumer's bill to reflect the 11 cent charge, but a sub-total would be included which would show the cost minus the 3 cent subsidy. The consumer would pay the sub-total rate.

However, prompt payment of the bill would be required, or the consumer would lose the 3 cent

subsidy. This, it is believed, should aid CUC in its collections efforts.

Should the Sen. Pres. budget amendment be passed, and there are indications it will be, the 3 cent subsidy would be retroactive back to Jan. 1 when the rate hike went into effect.

Also attacked in the plan of Sen. Pres. Manglona is funding for low income family's energy needs.

Public Law 1-22 is supposed to give a \$18 per month subsidy to persons who are elderly, widowed, and those receiving supplemental social security. But, said Manglona, there has never been any appropriations made to meet the needs of the law. He estimated at least 500 persons are eligible for benefits under Public Law 1-22.

A combination of appropriated funds under Public Law 1-22 and funds available from the federal government for energy assistance would result in a program which would pay \$35 per month to those who qualify, said Man-

glona.

To meet the funding needs for the program Manglona is asking, in his budget bill amendment, that \$300,000 be appropriated for low income energy assistance.

Subsidy assistance, however, will not be available to residence which are used in any way for a commercial activity nor would housing barracks fall under the provisions of the program.

Sen. Pres. Manglona added he expected the fiscal year 1989 budget to be brought out of the Fiscal Affairs Committee by no later than next week and that is when his amendments will be considered. He also said he anticipated no objections from other Senate members.

In addition, the Sen. Pres. said he also was prepared to defend his amendment as not being a rider on the budget because the content and purpose of his amendment is "germane to the budget's measures."

"It is in the interest of the public for us to do this," said Sen. Manglona. "We have to be concerned with meeting the needs of our people."

School Board Considering Dress Code

The Board of Education is considered approving the implementation of a dress code, which includes school uniforms, for all public schools.

Board member Anicia Tomokane, the Board's leading proponent of having a dress code, said the program, if approved, will probably not be made system-wide right away.

More likely, the schools who are most in favor of the plan will have the program implemented on a trial basis, she said.

A school survey designed to see if students and parents are favorable to having a dress code has been completed in all but five of the schools in the

Public School System.

The only school to have a significant amount of opposition to the dress code was Marianas High School, according to Ms. Tomokane.

The schools who have not returned survey results are Gregorio T. Camacho Elementary, Olcai Elementary, San Vicente Elementary, Hopwood Junior High, and Rota High School.

The Board of Education is now looking into whether or not the passage of a dress code requirement would be Constitutional.

If it is, implementation could start to take place during the next school year, said Ms. Tomokane.

She said that one of the

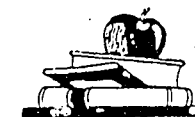
biggest questions about implementing the dress code is, not the legality of it, but what to do with students who may refuse to wear the uniforms.

Ms. Tomokane has several reasons she is in favor of the dress code. "When I first thought about it, the number one reason was that students would be immediately be put on an equal basis," she said.

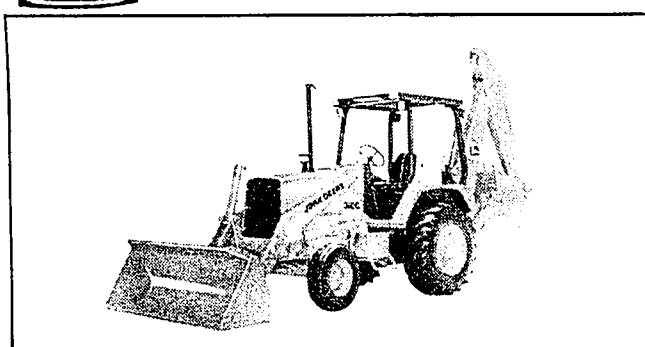
Other reasons she favors the idea include student unity, easy recognition and identification of school uniforms, the cost savings, and increased respect that school uniforms bring.

Opponents of the dress code say that they have the right to freedom of expression and that instituting a dress code violates their rights.

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Brown Snake Reported, Not Found

A snake sighting was reported to the Division of Fish and Wildlife on Wednesday late in the afternoon of January 25. The person reported seeing a snake about 16 inches long, as thin as a pencil, colored brown with black flecks, in the top of a coconut tree. "The description fit that of a young Brown Tree Snake and is the first in over 2 years not obviously another species" said Jim Reichel, a biologist with the Division.

"We frequently get reports, but they usually turn out to be an eel which occasionally comes out on the beach" he said.

Division personnel were immediately sent to the scene and put a trap in place to prevent any small reptiles from escaping from the tree. Thursday morning Reichel closely examined the top using a cherry-picker provided by CUC. "We couldn't see anything, but a small snake could still be hidden in there"

he said.

The owners of the property, Townhouse, Inc., were contacted and agreed to allow the tree to be cut down. "We at Townhouse certainly don't want the Tree Snake in the CNMI" a spokesman said. On Friday afternoon, after personnel from the Division of Parks and Recreation cut the tall grass below the tree, it was sawed down. The top was completely taken apart while about a dozen DFW and Park

and Recreation personnel watched the ground around it to be sure a snake could not escape.

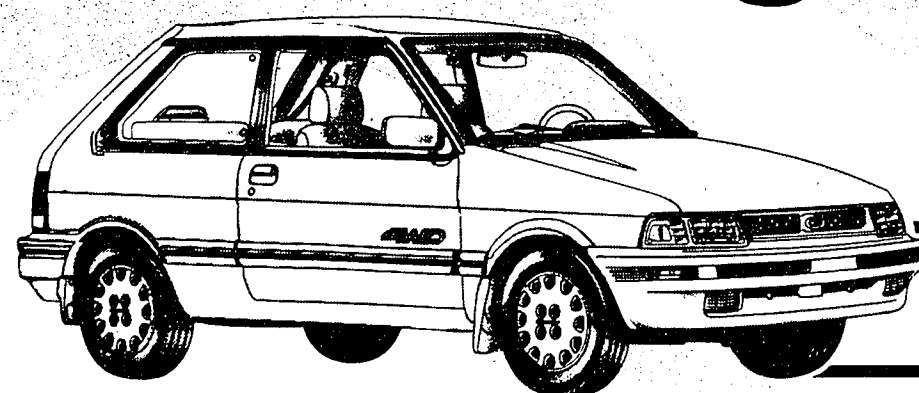
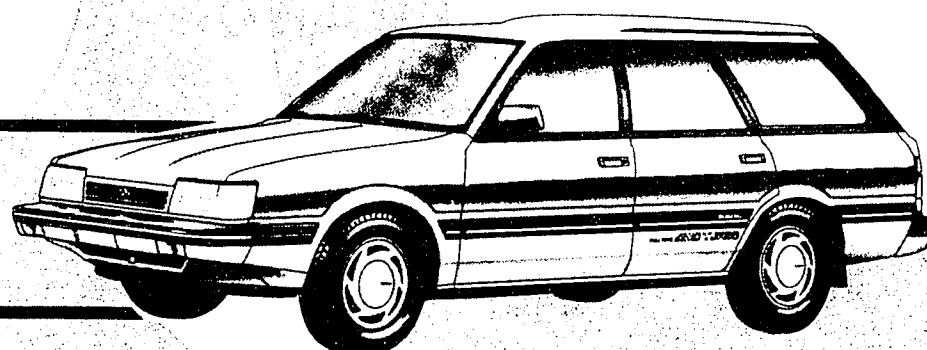
Six lizards were caught by hand and in the trap the previous nights, but no snake was present. "I'm really happy there was no snake, and people are still watching for them" Reichel said. The Brown Tree Snake, accidentally introduced on Guam about 1945, causes millions of dollars in damage and has caused the extinction of

almost all species of native birds on that island. "We would rather have 100 false alarms, than let one possible snake sighting go un-investigated. I would like to thank all the people involved in the sighting and capture efforts" Arnold Palacios, Chief of Division of Fish and Wildlife commented. "We hope people will continue to call us whenever they see a snake" he added.

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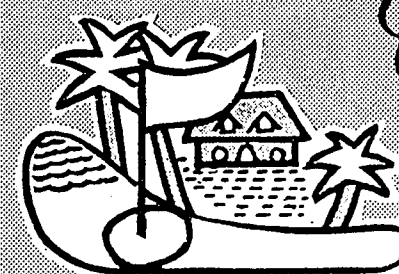
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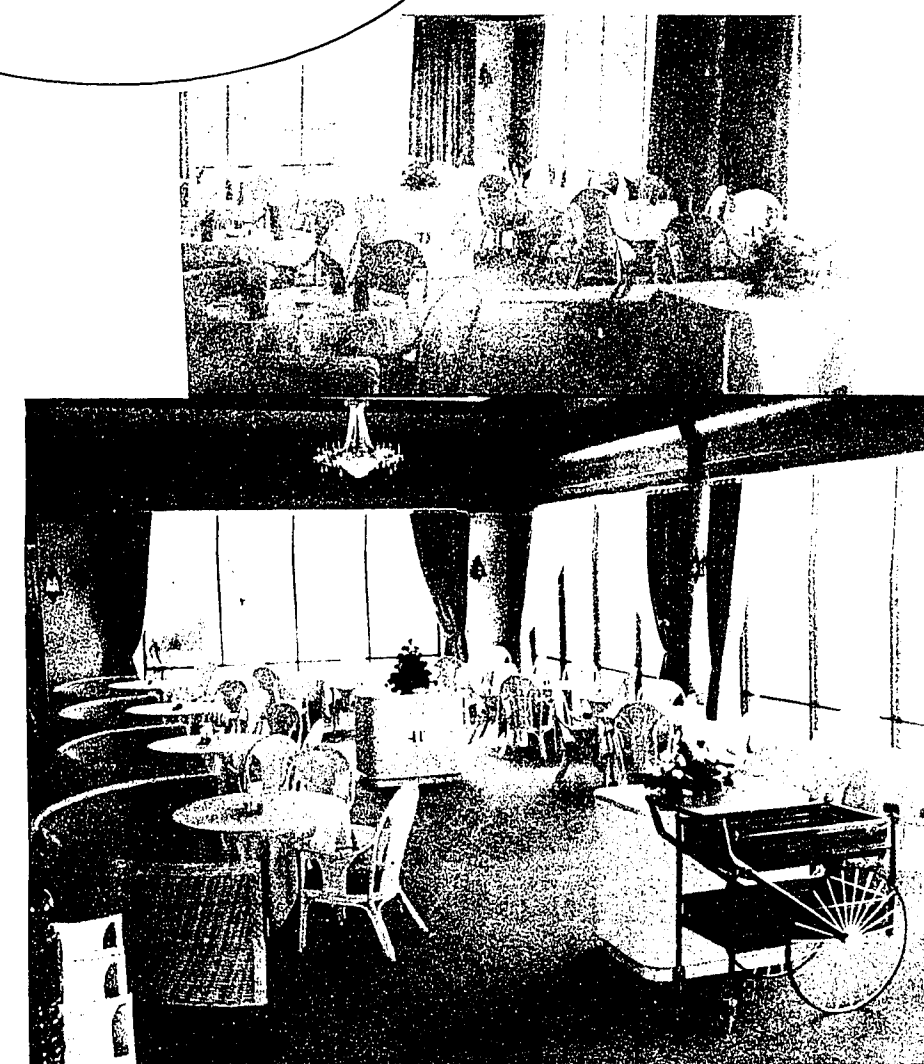

erty restrictions and excessive governmental scrutiny based solely on national origin," states Parish.

"No great legal scholarship is required to read the face of the amended complaint and to identify the Constitutional issue being framed. First, the distinction being drawn is solely along lines of national origin. The amended complaint in this case present a blatant attempt to re-analyze and restructure all dealings in land in the CNMI solely because of where one was born,

no matter how far removed from current owners or tenants," says Parish. And he adds an unwarranted fear of government scrutiny of all land transactions would also come about.

Parish points to several sections of the Covenant such as sections 402 (a), and 805 along with articles of the U.S. Constitution as references for his argument.

In answer to the assertions of the counsel for the defendants, attorney Mitchell in his presentation said, "The defendants litiga-

tion strategy is these cases is simple, and in its way elegant. First they transmogrify the plaintiffs complaint into a federal case based on Section 805 of the Covenant, then they destroy the claim with supremacy clause defense based upon the 4th and 14th United States Constitution Amendments."

"The defendants ascribe to the plaintiff's a desire to disguise a federal case in Commonwealth clothing so as to avoid this court."

Mitchell answered the argument that the plaintiff was motivated by fear by saying, "...plaintiffs are indeed motivated by an element of fear. It is fear that

these cases will be removed from the Commonwealth Trial Court to this court, then appealed to the 9th Circuit and from there to the U.S. Supreme Court, where the jurisdictional issue will be examined with the utmost scrutiny, then remanded all the way back down to Commonwealth Trial Court for lack of federal matter jurisdiction, resulting in a terrible waste of time, effort, and money," said Mitchell.

Aside from the specific case involved, Mitchell said he foresaw another aspect of the question involving what laws in the Commonwealth are to be decided by the Commonwealth

Court and which by the federal court.

"If these guys are right then there will not be any cases over at the Commonwealth Court, they will all be federal cases," said Mitchell.

A ruling which would allow the case to be heard in the District Court could also mean the argument advanced by the defendants that the Covenant is a federal law and not a unique compact between sovereigns could gain precedent, said Mitchell.

Although Judge Ducenas is taking the matter under consideration it is not known when a decision it will be made.

he planned to "purge the budget of all riders."

In his substitute bill, Inos said he would restore line item appropriations for all Executive Branch offices and also it would zero in on the reduction and eventual liquidation of the deficit.

At least \$2 million would be set aside in the 1989 FY budget for deficit reduction, said Inos, a million more than what was identified in the House version of the budget.

In addition the substitute bill would set aside \$2.7 million to fund a governmental pay raise.

Funding for the Civil Service Commission, Group Life Insurance Programs and Workman's compensation will

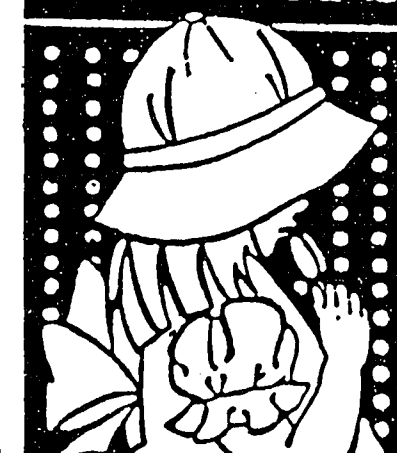
also be included in the substitute bill, said Inos.

The Committee Substitute budget bill is expected to be brought before the Senate next week.



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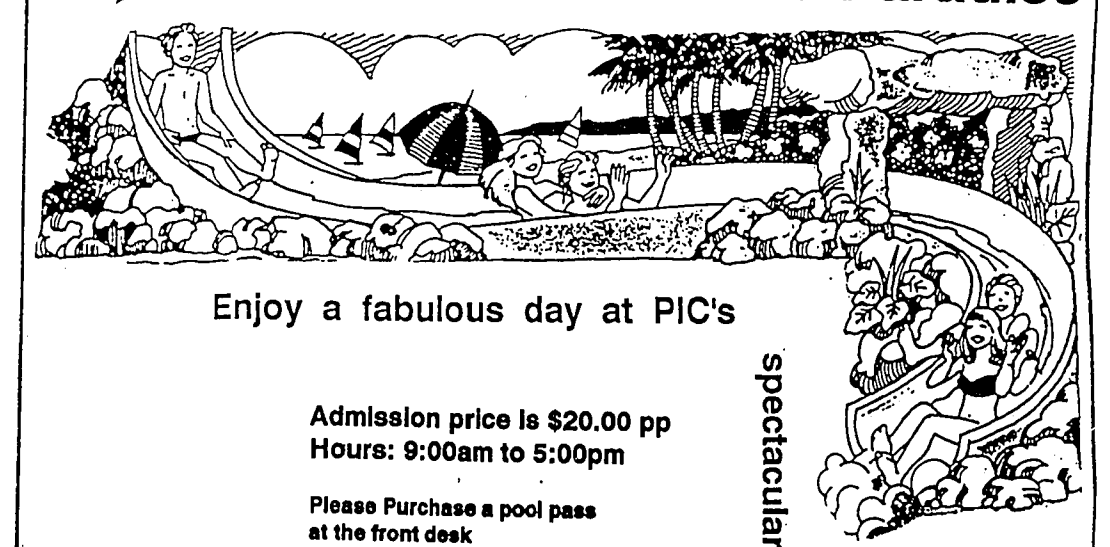
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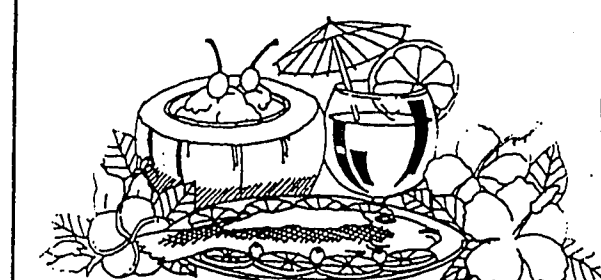
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Etpison Inaugurated as Palau's President

Editor Notes: The following is some excerpts of Palau's President inaugural speech.

Honored Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen:

We are gathered here today to launch the third constitutionally elected government of the Republic of Palau. Five months ago, I did not have the slightest notion, nor the dream, nor the ambition to be standing here as President of this nation.

The extraordinary event of last August, involving the death of President Lazarus E. Salii and the political and economic uncertainty in our country that followed, thrust me and six other prominent public figures into a closely contested race for the presidency of our country. That election is now over and done with and, by the grace of God and a slim majority, I have taken the oath of office as your president.

This inauguration coincides with the tenth anniversary of

the Convention that wrote our Constitution. The events of the last decade need not be recounted here for they are still painfully fresh in our consciences. What you and I ought to do here, rather, is to make a solemn pledge to stop bickering about small and inconsequential things and to work together so that our country may move ahead and catch up with our friends and neighbors in the Pacific and the World.

I do not wish ever to quarrel with the Olbiil Era Kelulau. As President, I will be asking them to endorse programs which I believe would serve the interest of the Palauan people.

I wish to turn now to future political status. The Trusteeship status for Palau was not meant to last forever. It is up to us to terminate that ignoble condition and the sooner we end it the better for all concerned. But before we can divorce ourselves from the United Nations Trusteeship system,

we must first choose and approve in a plebiscite a new political arrangement that will replace our present designation as a Trust Territory.

This leads me to the subject of our future relationship with the United States. This topic has been with us for many years. In the last six years, we have gone to the polls in as many times to approve the Compact, but we have not been able to do so for a variety of reasons. One thing has become abundantly clear, however. In all the Compact referendum we have held to date, a consistent overwhelming majority of our voters have demonstrated to our satisfaction and to the satisfaction of the world that Palau wants a close and friendly relationship with the United States and that our people wish to see this arrangement become effective at the earliest opportunity. I intend to honor and implement this popular mandate early in this administration.

I assure our friends and neighbors in the Pacific Region that Palau will continue to maintain friendly and cooperative relations with them which my predecessors wisely initiated in the past.

As in the past, our doors will remain open for foreign investors. This administration will take positive steps to promote Palau's potentials and will insure that foreign capital and other legally authorized investment that are placed in Palau will not only be protected but will be given every opportunity to grow and expand as well.

I turn now to the subject that

Schools Announce \$4.2 M In Construction Contracts

(Schools Announce \$4.2 Million In Construction Contracts)

Contracts valued at a total of \$4.2 million will be awarded next week for the building of facilities in public schools on Saipan and Tinian, according to Commissioner of Education Henry I. Sablan.

The projects include administration buildings, cafeterias, classrooms, vocational buildings, libraries, fencing, toilets and physical education facilities, and bus stop shelters.

Already under construction are 12 classrooms at Garapan Elementary School and 15 bus stop shelters in Saipan.

Construction of these projects is scheduled to begin in late February and last about eight months, according to Chief CIP architect Herman R. Cabrera.

The contractors that received the contracts were the lowest bidders, Commissioner Sablan said.

Still under negotiation are Rota School projects. Commissioner Sablan said that bids that have been received for the Rota projects so far are still too high, easily surpassing the funding available.

According to Commissioner Sablan, the funding for the Saipan and Tinian projects comes from the \$6.59 million allotted for the Public School System from Fiscal Year 1988 CIP funds.

Here is a list of the projects approved and the amount of funding budgeted for each:

SAIPAN PROJECTS

Garapan Elementary -- 12 classrooms (\$483,000); Hopwood Junior High -- eight classrooms (\$460,000), cafeteria (\$200,000), Phys. Ed. Building with shower/restroom facilities (\$160,000); Marianas High School -- six classrooms (\$360,000), cafeteria (\$260,000), library (\$300,000), completion of campus fencing (\$100,000); Tanapag Elementary -- cafeteria (\$140,000), administration building/3 classrooms (\$200,000), six classrooms and library (\$400,000)

W.S. Reyes Elementary -- nine classrooms (\$540,000); G.T. Camacho Elementary -- admin. building and two classrooms (\$150,000), four classrooms (\$240,000), library

and admin. building (\$130,000); San Vicente Elementary -- three classrooms (\$150,000); Oleai Elementary -- completion of campus fencing (\$30,000), six classrooms (\$360,000); San Antonio Elementary -- completion of campus fencing (\$50,000); Koblerville Elementary -- cafeteria/library (\$250,000); 15 bus stop shelters (\$22,500).

TINIAN PROJECTS

Tinian Elementary -- cafeteria (\$330,000), admin./library building (\$250,000); Tinian Jr. High -- vocational ed. building (\$240,000); five bus stop shelters (\$7,500).

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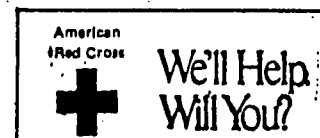
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Navy Do Clearing Work On Tinian

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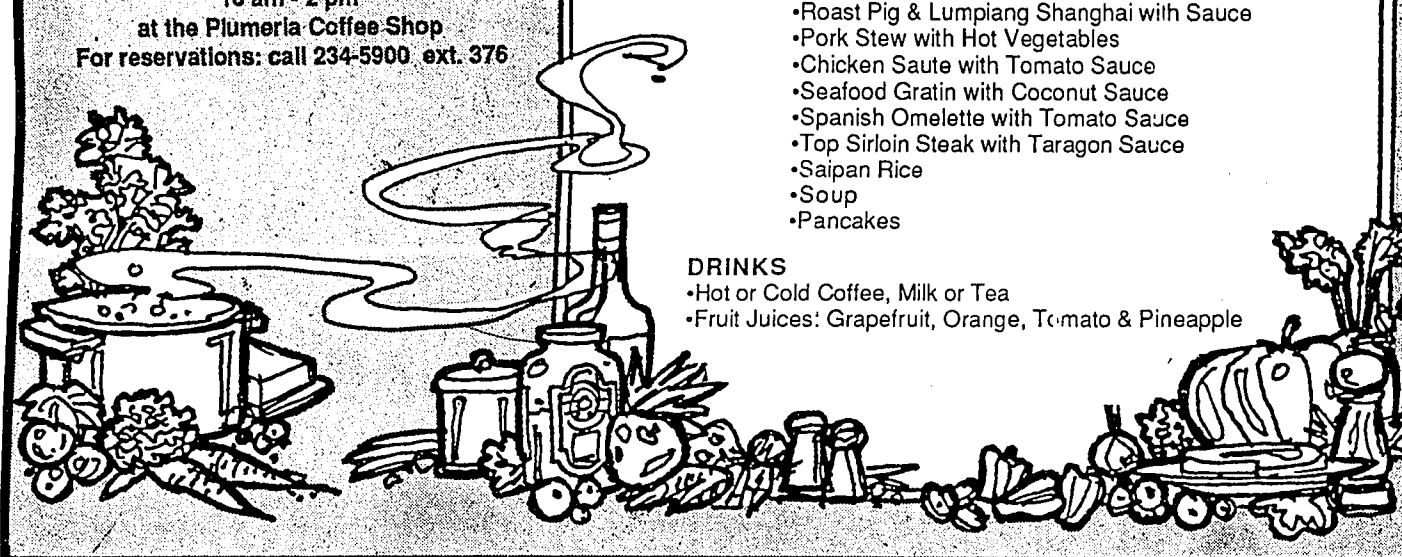

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TENORIO / HOCOG TO RUN FOR GOVERNOR'S OFFICE

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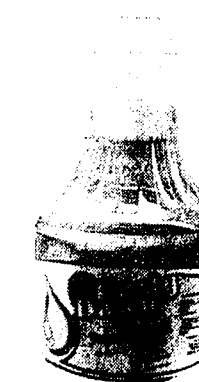
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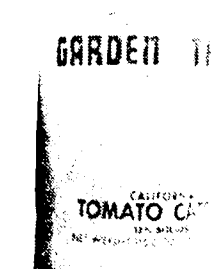
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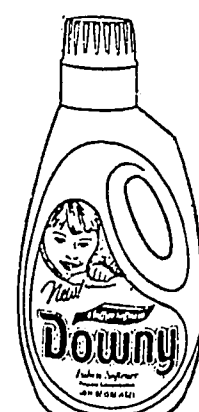
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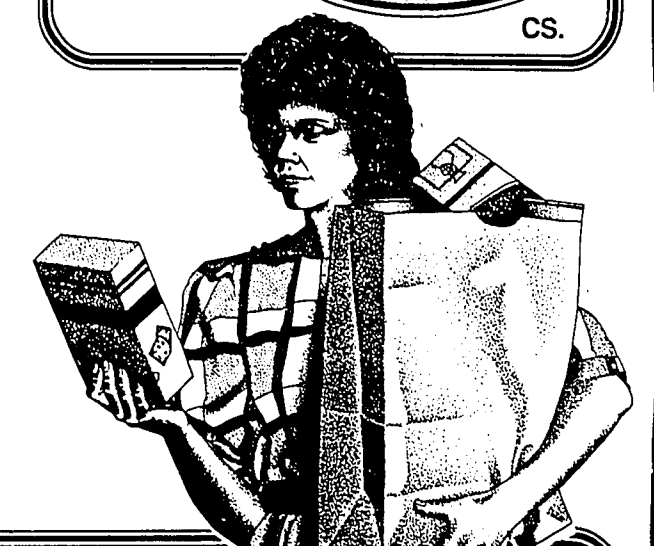
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College Opens New Information Center

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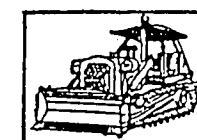
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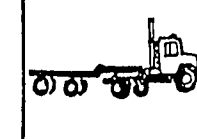
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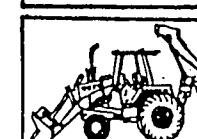


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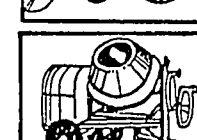
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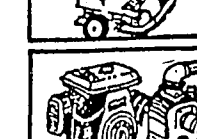
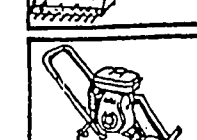
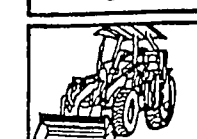
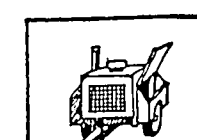
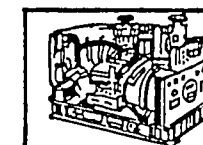
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President plans trips to Canada, Japan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush indicated today he is considering a visit to China next month in connection with his trip to the Far East for the funeral of Japanese Emperor Hirohito.

"Stay tuned," Bush replied when asked about a report that he was planning a visit to China, where he served in the 1970s as this country's first envoy to Beijing.

The president was responding to a report in the official Yugoslav news agency Tanjug, which was reported from Beijing. The agency, quoting unnamed sources, said Bush would visit China on Feb. 25-26 following his trip to Tokyo.

Bush said "I just don't know yet" whether he'll go to China.

White House spokesman Roman Popadiuk, responding earlier to the Yugoslav report, said "there are no plans at this time" for such a trip.

White House chief of staff John Sununu declined to confirm or deny whether Bush would be making such a trip.

"I would suggest that you wait for the tall thin guy (Bush) to sing, or the short bald guy (press secretary Marlin Fitzwater) to tell you that the tall, thin guy has sung," he told reporters. "There is no official announcement of that yet."

"Nothing on the itinerary (of the Far East trip) is ready for

announcement yet," he said.

There has been widespread speculation that Bush would use the occasion of the Japanese trip to visit both China and South Korea before returning to Washington from the trip to the Orient.

His first trip out of the United States as president will be to Ottawa on Feb. 10, for talks with Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney.

The Canada trip will be the first outside the United States for the new president. The White House press office said Tuesday that Bush and Mulroney "will discuss bilateral and international issues of common concern" during the one-day Ottawa visit.

China's Foreign Ministry has not yet confirmed the report on Bush's impending visit, but its spokesman has recently said that the president "would be welcome in China," Tanjug reported.

It said Bush will hold talks with Chinese officials on bilateral and other issues, especially political developments in the Far East.

Tanjug said Bush, the first U.S. representative in China after the two countries re-established diplomatic ties, "is very popular in Chinese political circles."

Bush was chief of the U.S. liaison office in Beijing in 1974-75.

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Toves Provides Student Voice To PSS Board

Barry C. Toves, a senior at Rota High School, carries a big responsibility as a representative of all CNMI students on the Board of Education.

The 18-year-old Rotanese, who is the President of the Student Council at Rota High, said he was appointed to the Board in November, 1988, by Governor Pedro P. Tenorio.

A student representative, in addition to two private schools and public school teachers representatives, are required by Constitutional Amendment #38. This amendment was adopted by the Second CNMI Constitutional Convention held in the summer of 1985. Margaret Levy, a Mt. Carmel School reading teacher, represents the private schools on the Board. The public school teachers' representative has not yet been named.

Their appointments do not need the CNMI Legislature's confirmation, and their terms on the Board will last only one year, according to Toves.

He said he was appointed to the Board because he won a May, 1988 CNMI-wide high school essay contest on how students would prosper with knowledge.

The appointed members are ex-officio Board members and therefore can vote only in committee meetings, and can only join discussion in the regular meetings.

To date, Toves said he has attended at least two Board meetings. He said he's learning from the meetings and familiarizing himself with the Board's procedures.

Asked what his priorities are as a Board member, Toves said in an interview with the PSS

information officer, "My priorities are to represent the students in the best of their needs and to try to promote a good working relationship between each school."

He said he will see to it that the students are encouraged to go to college. "Fewer and fewer students are going to college," he said.

"The majority of our students are stuck here after high school," he said, noting that in order for "the students to be fruitful and resourceful in our society, they must go to college." He said in order to "provide the CNMI better leadership in the future," he encourages students to further their education beyond high school.

Toves said he is the oldest of five children (three boys and two girls) in his family. They reside in Songsong Village, the main village in Rota, with their parents.

The whole family lived in Yacaville, California, from 1979 to 1980, Toves said. There he attended Elmer Elementary School, which he said is a small, countryside school, about the same size as Rota Elementary School.

Toves said he spent the first quarter of last school year at Marianas High School in Saipan and returned to Rota High for the rest of the school year.

He was one of three high school students who in June of last year represented the CNMI in the Presidential Classroom Program in Washington, D.C.

"We were there June 16-27, and we learned a lot in the program," Toves said. His colleagues in the program were Oliver Gonzales of Marianas

High School and Patrick San Nicolas of Tinian School.

What are his future plans? Toves said he wants to become a medical doctor. After his high school graduation in June, he said he plans to attend the University of Washington in Seattle. He said his second choice is to become a lawyer.

According to Toves, there is only one Rotanese medical doctor, Dr. Larry Hocog. "We need more local doctors in Rota," said Toves.

Toves is a member of both the Board's standing committees, on Personnel / Fiscal and Legislative / Program.

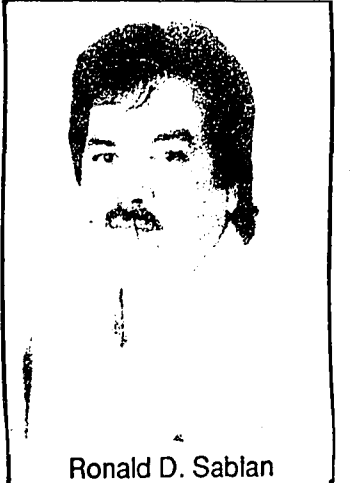
general membership meeting held at the Saipan Diamond Hotel.

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1989 ANNUAL ALIEN REGISTRATION SCHEDULE IMMIGRATION SERVICE

The Chief of Immigration and Naturalization wishes to remind all aliens that the CNMI Immigration Law requires that an Annual Registration be made at the beginning of each year. All aliens must register and receive a 1989 Registration Card. Aliens or any persons who are not United States Citizens or U.S. Nationals, CNMI

Certificate of Identity holders, CNMI citizens, CNMI permanent residents, U.S. Green Card holders, or Trust Territory citizens. Failure to register and failure to have the card in your possession is punishable by 90 days imprisonment, a \$500 fine, and deportation.

Registration on Saipan will begin on January 3, 1989. The

Registration will be conducted on the second (2nd) floor of the Nauru Building, Susupe. Registration will be daily. Aliens will be scheduled according to their present Entry Permit Number. The schedule will be posted at post offices, the main Immigration Office, and other public places.

Registration on Tinian will begin January 3, 1989 and will

be conducted at the Tinian Immigration Office.

Registration on Rota will begin January 3, 1989 and will be conducted at the Rota Immigration Office.

All aliens must bring with them (1) a completed alien registration application; (2) employer affidavit form; (3) original copy of current entry permit; (4) non-resident

workers labor certificate (if in the CNMI for employment); (5) previous alien registration card; (6) two identical photographs; and, (7) \$10.00 for payment of the registration application fee.

Registration application forms must be obtained in advance at the respective Immigration Offices.

When we want to have more energy, when we want to soothe ourselves, when we want to party, we turn to music. Music has been referred to the highest vibration that we can physically create. It really is a vibration, a wave form that moves with the EQ of your sound system, the speakers and our heart, body and soul. We dance to music, sing with music, exercise around music, and heal with music. So what is all this music talk about....the announcement of the first music concert series in CNMI. The concert series is designed to create an opportunity for artists to amplify their stage performance skills by performing publicly as professionals. An audition system will be developed to foster the identification of younger musicians or musicians who have never performed in a club or concert situation. There will be auditions in Saipan, Rota and Tinian. The concert auditions are open to all ethnic groups that are permanently residing in the Northern Mariana Islands. The aim of the Island Music 89 series is to affirm and encourage the musical artistic value of indigenous culture on the islands, and to enrich cross-cultural experiences.

The Arts Council music series team will be looking for music played by children, teens, both new and professional bands, as well as

the elderly, whether that be with a pair of spoons, the accordion, ukelele, harmonica, baby grand or electrically wired five piece band. Both soloists and groups will be sought.

The first phase of the Island Music 89 Concert Series is the logo development of posters, brochures, and T-Shirts. This logo development will occur through a contest that begins this week in the Junior High, High School and College school systems. Students are being asked to artistically interpret Island music in the center space encircled by the music series title. There will be four prize winners. The prizes are now being solicited from both supportive individuals and business'. The winning students will be awarded with a music instrument and lessons. Ana Teregyo, Executive Director of the Commonwealth Council of Arts and Culture emphasized, "The Island Music 89 Concert series has a long range focus of preparing CNMI for a community cultural center that can continually show case the performance arts of the Mariana Islands."

Music documents the victory, sadness, joy, beginnings and ends of life main events. Recently while

attending the final day of a family rosary a 79 year old Japanese woman artist from the International Modern Artist Cross-Cultural exhibit held hands with a 65 year old Carolinian woman singing the songs of their past in fluent Japanese....The musical history of CNMI is probably the most authentic story of the islands historical events. Kantan Isla, Kkeelul Faluw 89 is designed to share this experience. 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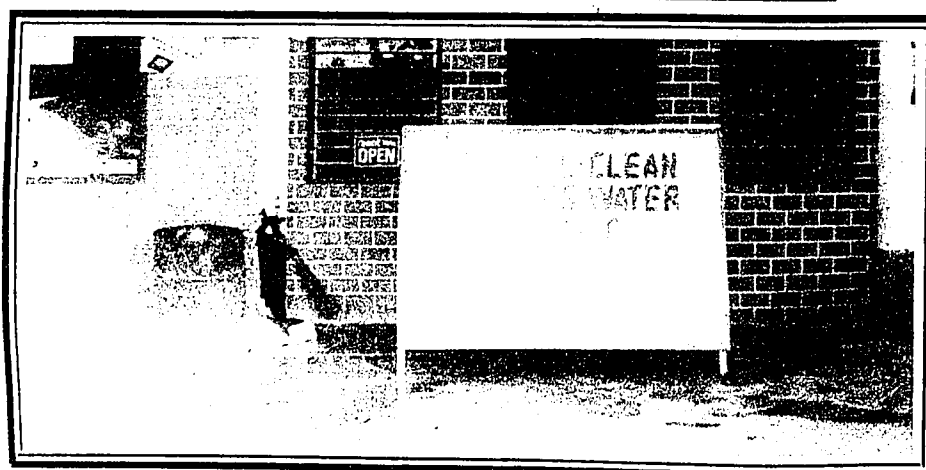
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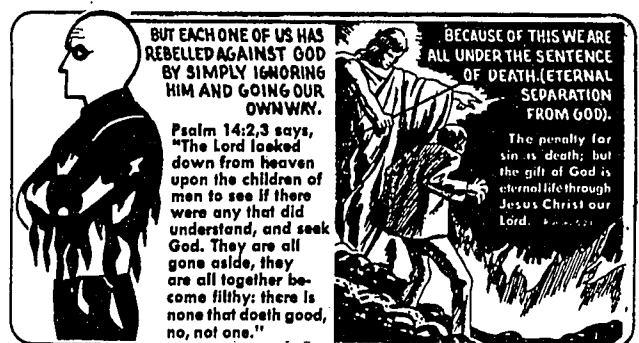

There are no exhibition games planned here. Training

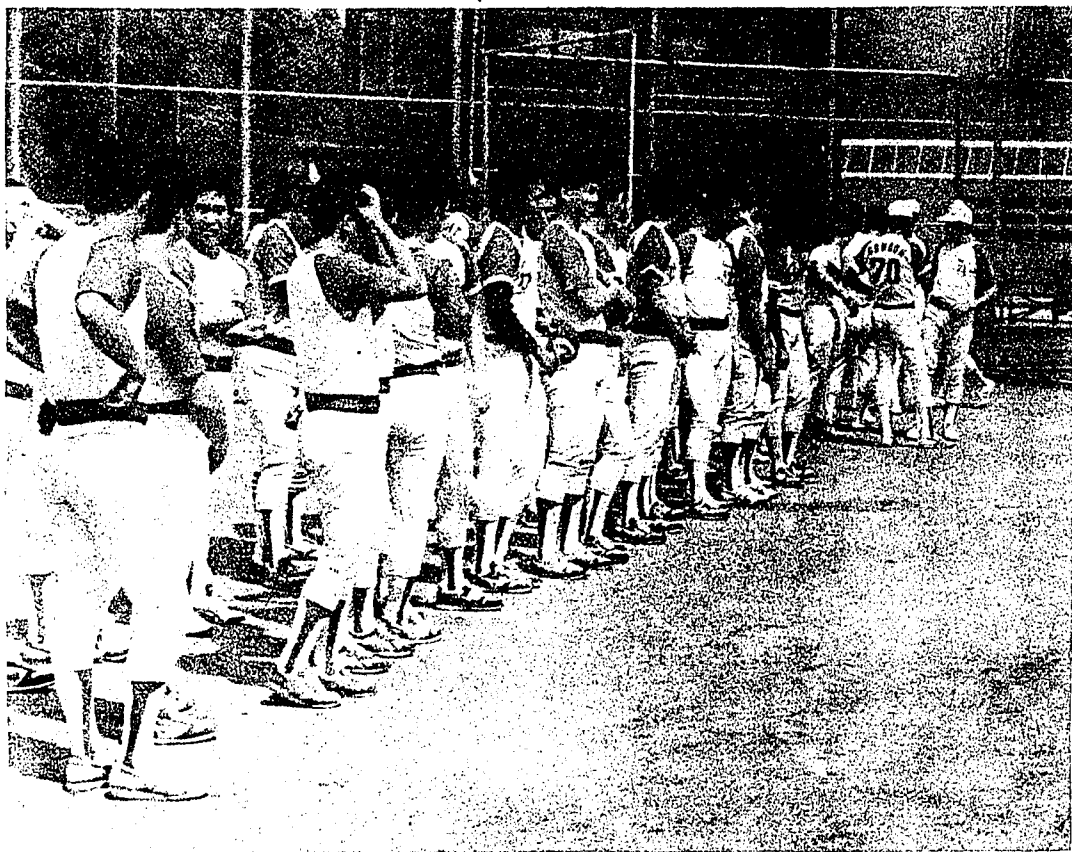
will consist primarily of conditioning exercises, throwing, fielding, and batting practice.

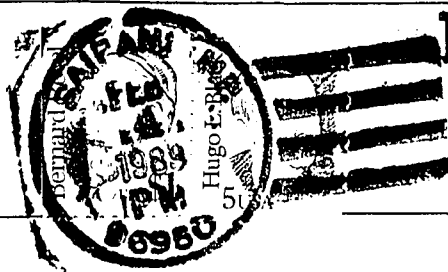

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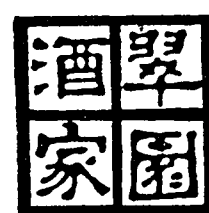
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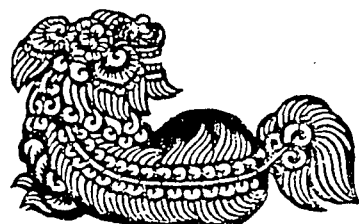
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CNMI Chinese Celebrate New Year
