CONCERNING RECIPROCIITY

In another column will be found the draft of what is said to have been proposed by Mr. Carter as a substitute for the present reciprocity treaty whenever it shall expire, some two or three years hence.

In the absence of any other explanation, it is probable that Mr. Carter conversed with the King on this free trade question, and this draft of a convention may have been drawn up by him at the King's request, and the copy of it left with him.

So long as there are native Hawaiian alii, qualified to occupy the throne, no act should be permitted to transpire, which shall abridge in any manner the perfect independence of this Kingdom.

Regarding the present reciprocity treaty, if it can be renewed and extended for ten or twenty years, or for an indefinite period, it will be all that we can ask for.

OUR SAN FRANCISCO LETTER.

Per S. S. Zealandia, San Francisco, September 21, 1889.

The San Francisco sugar market continues steady and no alterations have been made in the scale of prices since the last report.

Advices from New York are that Cuban centrifugal has advanced 1/2 cent a pound. The market is very steady and operators are hopeful of better prices in the near future.

The European markets have presented a much healthier and more satisfactory aspect. There has been a reaction in the value of beet, which has ruled steadier at 14s.

James F. B. Marshall, one of the founders of the firm of Charles Brewer & Co. of Honolulu, and whose dealings on the coast even antedates the discovery of gold, is on a visit here with the National Conference of Charities for the first time since 1855.

David Nagle will never be tried for killing Judge David S. Terry. On the 16th inst. Judge Sawyer decided the habeas corpus proceedings which have been pending since Neagle was brought from the jail at St. Louis.

Much dissatisfaction still exists in Canada over the determination of Great Britain not to become embroiled in the dispute about the sealing in the Behring Sea.

The government has been asked to accept the cruiser Charleston. Her horse-power is 6812 or 184 under requirements. If the penalty is exacted the Union Iron Works Company will have to pay \$18,400.

The new cruiser Baltimore which was built by the Cramps at Philadelphia has had her trial trip. She attained a speed of 20 2/3 knots and is the fastest cruiser in any navy.

The government has decided to build two 3,000 ton cruisers in the navy yards at Brooklyn and Norfolk.

The State Fair is in progress at Sacramento, and the gamblers are holding high carnival. Killip & Co., a well known pool-selling firm, jumped the Government lot in Sacramento and defied the State authorities to oust them or break up their games.

Four jurors have thus far been obtained to try the four men accused of the murder of Dr. Cronin. It is said that J. T. Kirby of Niagara Falls, Ontario, knows the entire story of the killing and will be an important witness for the prosecution.

A riot has occurred at Navassa Island in the Caribbean sea, in which several Americans were killed. The island is under the protectorate of the United States and has valuable guano deposits.

The troubles between Nicaragua and Costa Rica arising out of the canal scheme are being arbitrated.

Each month records some additional progress with this great enterprise. Preparations are now making to dig from both the Atlantic and Pacific sides of the isthmus.

Engineer Menocal sailed for Nicaragua on the 20th inst. In speaking of the work on the canal, he says it will take at least a year to make the preparations, and after this, when the machinery is in place, it will take six years to complete the work.

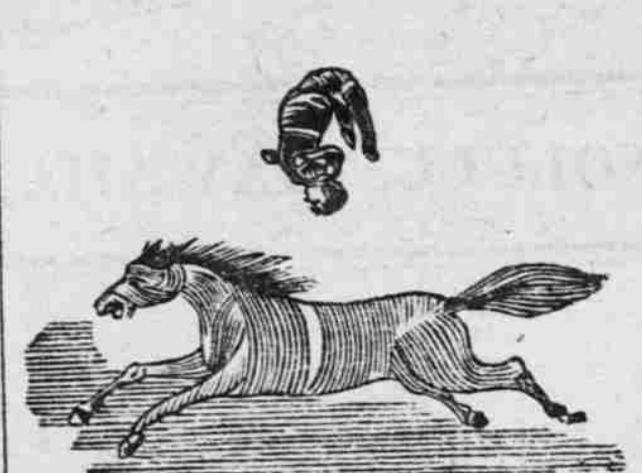

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

The steamer Zealandia sailed Sunday morning at 6:30 o'clock for the Australian colonies.

A new auctioneer has arrived. He is new in every sense of the word, but is much valued nevertheless.

The crews of the American and British war-vessels in port will be entertained at the Y. M. C. A. hall to-morrow evening.

Captain Davis of the Likie reports plenty of rain at Makawao and other parts of Maui; but there were only light winds.

Invitations have been issued by the King's Chamberlain for a dance at the palace this evening. Gents to be in "full dress."

The members of the non-commissioned staff of the Honolulu Rifles will meet this evening at the Armory at 7:30 o'clock.

The People's Ice and Refrigerator Co.'s office is removed to Damon's block, Bethel street, next to corner of King street.

The other car for the Oahu railway has been landed from the barkentine W. H. Dimond, and will be taken to the terminus to-day.

The Blue Ribbon entertainment on Saturday evening at the Y. M. C. A. was very successful, and there was a large audience.

The Royal Hawaiian Band will not play at Emma Square this afternoon, on account of having to be present at the ball in the Palace.

Up to 12:30 o'clock this morning the arrests were: Saturday—one for disorderly conduct, and sixteen drunks. Sunday—three drunks.

The advices by the Zealandia regarding the sugar market were that there was little change to note. The price for 96 test remains at 6 1/2 cents.

The thanks of the ADVERTISER and GAZETTE are due to pursuer George McLane of the Zealandia for files of California papers and news files.

Mr. Goo Kim, merchant tailor, advertises that he has on hand a variety of cloths, which are named, and he guarantees a perfect fit. His store is on Nuuanu street.

Captain Campbell of the Mikahala reports plenty of rain at Lihue and Koloa, Kauai. One Japanese died and 8 more are laid up with typhoid fever at Waimae, Kauai.

The steamer Akamai was telephoned, by courtesy of the Bell, as having arrived at 8:15 o'clock last night. She will sail again this afternoon at 4 o'clock for ports in Kauai.

A very pleasant gathering and dance was held on Saturday evening last at the residence of Mr. Hamilton Johnson, Waikiki, on the occasion of that gentleman's fiftieth birthday.

The funeral of the late Thomas R. Foster will take place this afternoon at 3 o'clock from his late residence on Nuuanu Avenue. Friends of the family are respectfully invited to attend.

Mr. A. Kraft advertises his stock of clocks, watches, musical instruments, curios, etc. for sale at the very lowest prices. He also notifies persons having articles left with him for repairs to call for same.

Both the native churches of this city held their usual quarterly exhibition of Sunday Schools in Kawaiahao church on Saturday last. The attendance was large and orderly, and the exhibition was a success.

Mr. J. F. Morgan's sale of Hawaiian antiquities was fairly successful. Hon. C. R. Bishop bought articles to the value of about \$360 and the entire sale realized about \$400. One stone adze brought \$27.50 and another \$26.

Last night about 8 o'clock, while a native boy was hanging on to the side of a tramcar coming from Waikiki, his coat caught upon a fence and stayed there. The garment was mutilated by the proceeding, and its owner was mortified.

The U. S. S. Nipsic was successfully launched from the Marine Railway on Saturday afternoon. She is now alongside the P. M. S. S. Co.'s wharf taking on board her armament, etc. and fitting up preparatory to a trial trip which will be made in a few days.

The Hawaiian band gave a complimentary concert in honor of Sir Henry Loch's visit on Saturday evening last, at the Hawaiian Hotel. Sir Henry is the new Governor of the colony of Victoria, and the concert was given at the request of His Majesty the King who was present upon the occasion.

The new quarterly card of the Bell Telephone Co. is out, and there are eighteen additional names. Large as the telephone system of the city is, it is still extending; and when the Pearl River City assumes the large proportions expected, the telephone will become something marvellous in extent.

Elsewhere is a notice from the Hawaiian Tramways Co. stating that an inspector, to examine the tickets held by passengers traveling on the cars, will be appointed on and after to-morrow. Passengers are therefore requested to retain their tickets intact until leaving the cars, otherwise the fare from where the car started will be demanded.

The S. S. City of Peking left Hongkong on the 19th of Sept. and Yokohama on the 28th, and will be due at Honolulu on the 10th or 11th of October, with Chiarini's circus on board. The S. S. Gaelic leaves San Francisco on the 3d of October, and will arrive here on the 10th or 11th of October. So that both steamers will probably be here together. The Gaelic will bring a mail from San Francisco and the Peking will take one to San Francisco.

The Ecuador bark Ophir, Captain Brigiere, arrived Sunday Sept. 29th, after a quick passage of 48 days from Newcastle, N. S. W., with about 1200 tons of coal. She experienced fine weather and light variable winds the whole trip. On Sept. 10th, at 4:30 a. m. she passed between Tekeham and Rawgira islands in lat. 15 deg. south and 148 deg. west. On Sept. 18th, she crossed the equator in lon. 145 1/2 deg. west, and hence 11 days to port. She is at anchor in the stream.

DRAFT OF PROPOSED FREE TRADE TREATY.

The United States of America and the Kingdom of Hawaii recognizing the importance to both nations of perpetuating the peculiarly friendly relations now happily subsisting between them and of protecting and giving permanence to the important commercial and vested interests which have grown out of the treaty relations heretofore established between the two nations, have solemnly resolved and agreed upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1.—It is agreed that the treaties and convention now in force between the high contracting parties shall continue in force (notwithstanding any articles therein contained limiting their duration) until modified by mutual consent of the two governments.

ARTICLE 2.—It is agreed that all articles the growth produce or manufacture of the United States of America are entitled to be admitted free of duty into the ports of the Hawaiian Kingdom under the convention of commercial reciprocity of July, 1875, shall be treated by the Hawaiian Government, in respect of any bounties paid, or of any exemptions or immunities, and in all other respects precisely as if such articles were the growth, produce or manufacture of the Hawaiian Islands, and likewise all articles the growth and manufacture or produce of the Hawaiian Islands which are admitted free of duty into the ports of the United States, under the convention of commercial reciprocity of July, 1875, shall be treated by the Government of the United States of America in respect of bounties, or of any exemption or immunities of any kind and in all other respects, precisely as if such articles were the growth or produce of the United States of America.

ARTICLE 3.—It is agreed that whenever the Congress of the United States of America and the Legislature of the Hawaiian Islands, shall have passed the necessary laws providing therefore, all articles the growth produce or manufacture of the Hawaiian Islands shall be admitted into the ports of the United States free of duty and in consideration thereof and as an equivalent thereof, all articles the growth produce or manufacture of the United States of America shall be admitted into the ports of the Hawaiian Islands free of duty, and all articles, thus admitted into the ports of either country free of duty shall be treated in respect of bounties, exemptions or immunities, and all other respects precisely the same as if of the growth produce or manufacture of the country into whose ports they are introduced.

The evidence that such articles are the growth produce or manufacture of the exporting country, shall be the same as required by the convention of commercial reciprocity between the Hawaiian Kingdom and the United States of America of July, 1875.

There shall be exempted from the operation of the article opium, and spirituous liquors, meaning thereby any liquids of more than 18 per cent. (Law of 1836, folio 155 21 per cent. alcoholic strength) and any articles which may be prohibited from entry into the ports of either country by the laws of that country.

ARTICLE 4.—In order to insure to the Hawaiian Islands the tranquil and constant enjoyment of the advantages which come to them under existing treaty relations between the two countries, and to protect the peculiar interests of the United States of America in the Hawaiian Islands, the United States hereby guarantee positively and efficaciously to Hawaii the perfect independence and autonomy of the Hawaiian Government in all its dominions and its rights of sovereignty over such dominions, and the Hawaiian Government as an equivalent for such guarantee and in order to enable the United States thus to guarantee the sovereignty and independence of Hawaii efficaciously and without danger of complications with other powers that no treaties, conventions or agreements shall be negotiated or made between any other power and the Hawaiian Government without the full knowledge of the Government of the United States.

ARTICLE 5.—It is agreed that the convention shall be ratified by the President of the United States and by and with the advice and consent of the Senate thereof and by His Majesty the King of Hawaii, and the ratifications exchanged as soon as possible, and upon such exchange of ratifications and proclamation thereof by the President of the United States and the King of Hawaii, the stipulation thereof shall go into effect with the exception of the third article which shall go into effect upon some date to be agreed upon after the ratification of the United States and the Legislature of the Hawaiian Islands shall have passed the necessary laws to give effect to its provisions.

ARTICLE 6.—The present convention shall remain in force until modified or terminated by mutual consent, a conference for the purpose of considering the modification or termination of this convention or any of the conventions or treaties between the two high contracting parties shall be held at the capital of one or of the two countries for such purpose any time in six months after either of the high contracting parties shall have given formal written notice to the other of its desire to hold such conference.

PROPOSED ADDITIONS TO ARTICLE 4. And the Hawaiian Government further agrees in consideration of such guarantee, and to enable the United States to efficaciously protect the independence and tranquility of the Hawaiian Islands, that the forces of the United States may have access to such parts of the Hawaiian dominions as may be necessary for that purpose.

If (which God forbid) the independence and sovereignty of the Hawaiian Government should be threatened, it is agreed that the force of the United States may have such freedom of action in the territories of Hawaii as may be necessary of securing the independence and peaceful administration of the Hawaiian Government.
