A FINE PUNAHOU MANSION

WILL BE BUILT AT A CORNER OF THE TRACT LATELY OPENED.

Description of Plans Accepted by Mr. A. H. Isenberg—F. Wilhelm the Contractor—A Double Frontage.

Plans for the fine mansion of Mr. A. H. Isenberg have been prepared. Fritz Wilhelm has the building contract. The house will stand at the corner of Wilder avenue and Punahou street and will front on both. It will be two stories, and will contain eight principal apartments besides a kitchen to be attached only by a lattice passage. The outer view will be plain with rustic furnishings.

The front on Wilder avenue will be conspicuous for a wide verandah extending its entire length of sixty-seven feet. From the center it opens directly into a large hall 18 by 18 feet. This in turn opens on the left into a parlor and a dining hall, and on the right into a secondary reception parlor and a bed room. The stairs will be so put in as not to obstruct either of these apartments. From the dining room the kitchen is set off about twenty feet.

The second floor will be taken up by three living rooms, a hall and bath arrangements. Five windows will open from the upper hall, affording ample light and air. A section of the light effects will be new here. It will consist of a circular ceiling light ten feet in diameter, which, by a well arrangement, will strike down through the lower rooms. McKINLEY AND HOBART MAKE UP THE TICKET.

The Best Speeches—Planks from the Platform—Hawaii—Silver Bolt—The Other Views.

NAMING THE MAN.

[Convention Report.] After the New York delegation had been polled the balloting proceeded while the roll of States was called. The chairman said: "The chair is prepared to announce the vote upon the roll call. The following votes have been cast: For William McKinley, for Republican nominee for President, 661 1/2.

Pandemonium half an hour. Then the remainder of the ballot.

ST. LOUIS, June 19.—The Republican National committee was called to order today by Joseph Manley of Maine. Powell S. Clayton of Arkansas was made temporary chairman. On motion of H. C. Payne of Wisconsin, M. A. Hanna was unanimously elected permanent chairman.

REED.

NEW YORK, June 19.—Speaker Reed passed through the city today. Mr. Reed declined to discuss politics with a reporter.

PORTLAND, Me., June 19.—Thomas B. Reed will be tendered a renomination to Congress by the First district, and it is announced that he has consented to stand.

THE SILVER BOLTERS.

ST. LOUIS, June 18.—The Silver delegates who walked out of the conven-

tion are as follows: From Colorado—Henry M. Teller and seven others.

From Idaho—F. T. Dubois and five others.

From Nevada—A. C. Cleveland and three others.

From Utah—F. J. Cannon and two others.

From Montana—Charles A. Hartman only, and from South Dakota R. F. Pettigrew. The other constituting the sixty-three, were from scattering states and territories.

Counting Senators Carter and Mantle, and the four Senators, Teller, Dubois, Cannon and Pettigrew, who went out, there are six United States senators who participated in the protest against the gold plank.

TELLER HEADQUARTERS.

CHICAGO, June 19.—Next week Senator Dubois will open Teller headquarters in this city.

FROM BEST SPEECHES.

(John M. Thurston.)

This is the year of the people. They have risen in their might. From ocean to ocean, from lake to gulf, they are united as never before. We know their wishes and are here to register their will. They must not be cheated of their choice. They know the man best qualified to fight their battles and to win their victories. His name is in every heart, on every tongue. His nomination is certain, his election sure. His candidacy will sweep the country as a prairie is swept by fire. This is the year of the people. In their name, by their authority, I second the nomination of the great champion, William McKinley, not as a favorite son of any State, but as the favorite son of the United States; not as a concession to Ohio, but as an added honor to the Nation.

Under his administration we shall command the respect of the nations of the earth; the American flag will never be hauled down; the rights of American citizenship will be enforced; abundant revenues will be provided; foreign merchandise will remain abroad; our gold will be kept at home; American institutions will be cherished and upheld; all Government obligations scrupulously kept, and on the escutcheon of the Republic will be indelibly engraved the American policy: "Protection, reciprocity and sound money."

(Chauncey M. Depew.)

We meet to take up the broken cord of national development and happiness and link it once more to the ear of progress. Our industries stagnant, our manufactures paralyzed, our agriculture disheartened, our artisans unemployed, our finances disordered, our treasury bankrupt, our credit impaired, our position among the nations of the world questioned, all look to this convention and call upon its wisdom for hope and rescue.

(Senator-Elect Foraker.)

The proud columns which swept the country in 1892 are broken and hopeless in 1896. Their boasted principles when they came to a test of practical application, have proved nothing but delusions, and their great leaders have degenerated to warring chieftains of petty and irreconcilable factions. Their approaching national convention is but an approaching national nightmare. No man pretends to be able to predict any good result to come from it, and no man is seeking the nomination in that convention. (Applause.)

(Senator Lodge.)

Four years ago we met as we meet now, representatives of the Republican party. Prosperity was in the land. Capital was confident and labor employed. There was the good day's wage feeling in the day's work, and the spirit of the American enterprise was stirring and bold. The treasury was full, the public revenues ample for the public need. We were at peace with all the world and had placed a prudent hand on the key of the Pacific. Four short years have come and gone. Look about now. The treasury is empty; our credit is impaired; our revenues are deficient. We meet the public need, not with income, but by borrowing at high rates and pledging the future for the wants of the present. Business is paralyzed; confidence has gone; enterprise has folded its eagle wings and mopes and blinks in the market place. Our mills are idle and our railroads are crippled. Capital hides itself and labor idly walks the street. There is neither a good day's wage nor a good day's work. We have met with slights abroad and have serious differences with our nations. The key of the Pacific has slipped from our nerveless hands. Foreign troops have been land-

ed in this hemisphere. Our own borders have been threatened in Alaska. The Monroe doctrine has been defended, but it is not yet vindicated. The people of a neighboring island, fighting for freedom, look toward us with imploring eyes, and look in vain. The American policy which would protect our industries at home and our flag abroad has faded and withered away.

FROM THE PLATFORM.

(Tariff.)

We renew and emphasize our allegiance to the policy of protection as the bulwark of an American industrial independence and the foundation of American development and prosperity. This true American policy taxes foreign products and encourages home industry and it puts the burden of the revenue on foreign goods; it secures the American market for the American producer; it upholds the American standard of wages for the American workingman; it puts the factory by the side of the farm and makes the American farmer less dependent upon foreign demand and price; it diffuses general thrift, and founds the strength of all on the strength of each. In its reasonable application it is just, fair and impartial, equally opposed to foreign control and domestic monopoly; to sectional discrimination and individual favoritism.

(Reciprocity.)

We believe the repeal of the reciprocity arrangements negotiated by the last Republican administration was a National calamity and we demand their renewal and extension on such terms as will equalize our trade with other nations, remove the restrictions which now obstruct the sale of American products in the ports of other countries and secure enlarged markets for the products of our farms, forests and factories.

(Foreign Relations.)

Our foreign policy shall be at all times firm, vigorous and dignified, and all our interests in the western hemisphere carefully watched and guarded. The Hawaiian islands should be controlled by the United States and no foreign power should be permitted to interfere with them. The Nicaragua canal should be built, owned and operated by the United States, and by the purchase of the Danish islands we should secure a proper and needed naval station in the West Indies.

(Sugar.)

We condemn the present administration for not keeping faith with the sugar producers of this country. The Republican party favors such protection as will lead to the production on American soil of all the sugar which the American people use and for which they pay other countries more than \$100,000,000 annually.

(Merchant Marine.)

We favor restoring the early American policy of discriminating duties for the upbuilding of our merchant marine and the protection of our shipping interests in the foreign carrying trade so that American ships, the product of American labor employed in American shipyards, sailing under the Stars and Strips and manned, officered and owned by Americans, may regain the carrying of our foreign commerce.

(Money.)

The Republican party is unreservedly for sound money. It caused the enactment of the law providing for the resumption of specie payments in 1876. Since then every dollar has been as good as gold. We are unalterably opposed to every measure calculated to debase our currency or impair the credit of our country. We are therefore opposed to the free coinage of silver except by international agreement with the leading nations of the world, which we pledge ourselves to promote, and until such agreement can be obtained the existing gold standard must be preserved. All our silver and paper currency must be maintained at a parity with gold, and we favor all measures designed to maintain inviolably the obligations of the United States, and all our money, whether paper or coin, at the present standard—the standard of the most enlightened nations of the earth.

(Immigration.)

For the protection of the equality of our American citizenship and the wages of our workmen against the fatal competition of low-priced labor, we demand that the immigration laws be thoroughly enforced and so extended as to exclude from entrance to the United States those who can neither read nor write.

(Monroe Doctrine.)

We reassert the Monroe doctrine in

its fullest extent, and we reaffirm the right of the United States to give the doctrine effect by responding to the appeals of any American state for our friendly intervention in case of European encroachment. We have not interfered with and shall not interfere with the existing possessions of any European power in this hemisphere, but those possessions must not on any pretext be extended.

(Navy.)

The peace and security of the Republic and the maintenance of its rightful influence among the nations of the earth demand a naval power commensurate with its position and responsibility. We therefore favor the continued enlargement of the Navy and a complete system of harbor and sea-coast defenses.

(Cuba.)

We watch with deep and abiding interest the heroic battle of the Cuban patriots against cruelty and oppression, and our best hopes go out for the full success of their determined contest for liberty.

(Rights of Women.)

The Republican party is mindful of the rights of women. Protection of American industries includes equal opportunities, equal pay for equal work and protection to the home. We favor the admission of women to wider spheres of usefulness, and welcome their co-operation in rescuing the country from Democratic and Populist mismanagement and misrule.

(Strikes.)

We favor the creation of a National board of arbitration to settle and adjust differences which may arise between employers and employed in interstate commerce.

(Lynchings.)

We proclaim our unqualified condemnation of the uncivilized and barbarous practice well known as lynching or killing of human beings suspected or charged with crime without process of law.

(Temperance.)

We sympathize with all wise and legitimate efforts to lessen and prevent the evils of intemperance and promote morality.

(ARMY.)

(Republican Platform.)

We believe the United States should exert all the influence it can properly exert to bring these atrocities to an end. In Turkey American residents have been exposed to the gravest dangers and American property destroyed. There and everywhere American citizens and American property must be absolutely protected and at any cost.

(PREAMBLE TO PLATFORM.)

The Republicans of the United States, assembled by their representatives in National convention, appealing for the popular and historic justification of their claims to the matchless achievements of thirty years of Republican rule, earnestly and confidently address themselves to the awakened intelligence, experience and conscience of their countrymen in the following declaration of facts and principles:

For the first time since the Civil War the American people have witnessed the calamitous consequences of full and unrestricted Democratic control of the Government. It has been a record of unparalleled incapacity, dishonor and disaster. In administrative management it has ruthlessly sacrificed indispensable revenue, entailed an unceasing deficit, eeked out ordinary current expenses with borrowed money, piled up the public debt by \$222,000,000 in time of peace, forced an adverse balance of trade, kept a perpetual menace hanging over the redemption fund, pawned American credit to alien syndicates, and reversed all the measures and results of successful Republican rule. In the broad effect of its policy it has precipitated panic, blighted industry and trade with prolonged depression, closed factories, reduced work and wages, halted enterprise and crippled American production, while stimulating foreign production for the American market. Every consideration of public safety and individual interest demands that the Government shall be rescued from the hands of those who have shown themselves incapable to conduct it without disaster at home and dishonor abroad, and shall be restored to the party which for thirty years administered it with unequalled success and prosperity.

(SPAIN BUYS SHIPS.)

MADRID, June 19.—At yesterday's cabinet council the Government decided to propose to the Cortes to purchase two ironclads, one from the Argentine Republic and the other from the Italian Government.

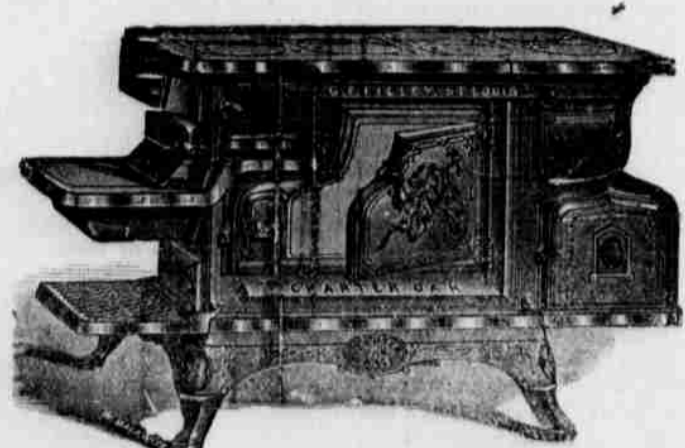

For the first time all of the leading British papers have good words for a Republican nominee.

Weyler is not much more of a diplomat than he has demonstrated himself so far to be a suppressor of Cuban rebellion.

OUT TO WIN.

The Republican party of the United States is out to win at the end of this troubled year. Their leaders have planned to fairly surge to victory. They have skirmished, advanced guard and firing line all combined in a solid, moving front. Their skillful generals have overlooked nothing. They command a united, brave and enthusiastic army. With the cleverest use of all the material they have constructed a flying "trocha" which they calculate will simply sweep the enemy into the sea of defeat and oblivion.

The new blood is what has so perfectly equipped the Republican party for the opportunity of its life. Very few of the men who have been in the saddle at the fore since the days of Lincoln were at the St. Louis convention. The remarkable and absolute triumph of the McKinley forces was due to the talent, tact and management of men who have never before been prominent in a National campaign. The best speeches were made by young men new to public life and just winning the spurs of National fame. They bring to the contest an earnestness, zeal and a degree of confidence that is more than half a battle. They have routed the old "bosses." They have disciplined and dropped the disaffected and with their marvelous platform and their shouting following are ready for operations.

The whole Republican party is out to win now, as were the McKinley men when that statesman was first projected as the proper person to bear the standard. No paper produced in the United States in half a century can compare with the St. Louis platform. It simply covers everything that could possibly be brought into the contest for the presidency. And every sentiment appeals to immense bodies of electors.

Elements that may find fault with one expression or idea in the platform will have the criticism fully offset by determined statement in another debatable matter. It may be called a blanket platform. But by whatever name it is a statement and declaration of principles that is strong as best thought could make it. And it has that rarest of all merit for a political document. No supplement or explanation is needed. Each plank is clear and concise. Any one could stand alone without any of the others.

In making this platform the authors probably perfectly accomplished their purpose of leaving not the smallest loophole or permitting weakness in any spot.

In a presidential campaign the personnel of the candidates means much. Since the period when the word of the Plumed Knight, the incomparable James G. Blaine, was the law and the command for a million valiant men and effective voters, no individual in public life in the United States has had such tremendous individuality as Wm. McKinley of Ohio. He is affable, democratic, graceful, of liberal thought and on the plane with the common people. He is a western man. He is from a cradle of presidents.

Hobart, the man named for the Vice presidency, is an eastern ideal and favorably impresses both the leaders and the masses in other parts of the United States. A weak platform and indifferent management would not greatly impair the "running" qualities of this team.

There will be some side issues and camp disturbances before the fateful day of November. All reports from St. Louis indicate positively that the Republican managers have anticipated almost anything that can by any chance occur in the way of defection. They have planned away ahead of all the past four years, still have a discerning and penetrating eye on the future and all in all are out to win.

They are prepared in full armor for any or all combinations.

Hawaii has deep and abiding and vital and permanent interest in several paragraphs of the platform. Perhaps some other national convention will take cognizance of the Islands in a friendly spirit. It would be a trifle inconsistent on the part of the Democrats to do so, but the courtesy would certainly be accepted as such. The Republican party representatives have already spoken kindly and encouragingly to and of Hawaii. The party was friendly officially in the early days of 1893. The Democratic party was unfriendly as a Government in the latter days of 1893. It is not necessary to record judgment as between the two and Hawaii.

The Republicans appear to be actuated by the conviction that Americanism is supreme in Hawaii, that these Islands are a natural ally or companion of the United States. Reasoning back from these premises, the Republican party says that what is good for the two Republics is made a common cause by the party of McKinley, Harrison, Blaine and the other great men who have been its guides and advisors. Neither Hawaii nor Hawaiian newspapers can afford to be too partisan, but they cannot be so base as to fail in acknowledging friendship when it is evident in the truest, noblest and most patriotic of proffers.

GOMEZ ACTIVE.

HAVANA, June 19.—Private advices indicate that Maximo Gomez has formed a plan to overcome the falling Spanish garrison of Puerto Principe.

IN BEHALF OF AMERICANS.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Instructions of a direct and positive character have been sent to the United States Minister at Madrid, Hannis Taylor, to make strong representations to the Spanish government with a view of securing reparation for indignities to Dr. Jose Delgado and other American citizens in Cuba.

WEYLER'S DIPLOMACY.

HAVANA, June 19.—General Weyler's attitude toward Consul-General Lee is problematical. As is known, a dinner was given by the Governor-General in honor of General Lee. It was remarked that for the first time General Weyler had invited to his table a foreign representative. The Consuls of other nations resented this, and some openly spoke of the incident as an act of cowardice, which, far from doing any good to Spain, would show her once more as imploring mercy from the United States.

ARMENIANS KILLING.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 18.—Armenian aggression in Van continues. The Armenians have massacred a large number of Mussulmans. Turkish troops are now preventing neighboring tribes from entering the town.

HAWAIIAN HANGED.

FOLSOM, June 19.—Paul Kamaunu, a Hawaiian, was hanged in the prison corridor this morning for the murder of Mrs. Elen Robinson at Latrobe, El Dorado county, on May 6, 1894. The execution was devoid of sensational incident, and was witnessed by only the few persons required by law. The murderer died without a word or a tremor.

GEN. W. H. DIMOND.

NEW YORK, June 18.—General W. H. Dimond passed quietly away at 7:28 o'clock this morning. So peaceful was the end that only the practiced eye of the physician and attendant, who had been faithful watchers day and night at the bedside of the dying Californian, detected the signs of transition. Gen. Dimond mercifully was spared the final agony that usually attends the termination of Bright's disease, which carried him off. The remains will be shipped to San Francisco tomorrow afternoon at 4:30 o'clock over the New York Central.

MATABELEES.

CAPE TOWN, June 18.—A new outbreak of natives of Matabeleland has occurred between Umfali and Salisbury. At a meeting in that vicinity on June 9th of a number of chiefs under Makoni all except four agreed to revolt, and several whites were killed.

TERRILL WINS.

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., June 18.—It was a great day for Californians here at the national circuit bicycle races. Zeigler, McFarland and Terrill captured respectively the half mile, two mile handicap and mile for professionals.

MARQUIS DE MORES.

NEW YORK, June 18.—A Herald cable from Tunis says: The news of the massacre of Marquis de Mores and his expedition is confirmed.

BIG DISASTER.

LONDON, June 17.—The steamship Drummond Castle struck on a rock off the French coast, near Brest, at

midnight last night, and sank in three minutes. There were on board 24 persons, 144 passengers and 103 officers and men of the crew. There were only two survivors.

AFTER THE BIG ONES.

CAPE TOWN, June 19.—The Secretary of State for the Transvaal has telegraphed the British High Commissioner here that, having in view the welfare and peace of South Africa, the Transvaal Government is convinced that proofs in its possession, which are at the disposal of Great Britain now, completely justify and compel the bringing to trial of Cecil Rhodes, Alfred Beit and Dr. Harris, all of the British South Africa Company, and connected with the raid in the Transvaal.

GERMANY WANTS SAMOA.

LONDON, June 19.—The Berlin correspondent of the Times says there appears to be a disposition on the part of the German press to take up the Samoa question in view of the retirement of Governor Schmidt.

GUATEMALA REVOLUTION.

SAN JOSE, Guatemala, June 19.—A revolution has broken out in Guatemala.

VENEZUELA FIRM.

GEORGETOWN, (British Guiana) June 19.—One hundred British laborers were opening a road from the Barima to the Cuyuni river, within the Schonburg line, when they were stopped by armed Venezuelans. Orders have been sent from Georgetown to the British officers not to offer resistance to the Venezuelans, but to withdraw under protest.

GOLD STANDARD.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Minister Andrade of Venezuela has received advices from Caracas as to the final ratification of the constitutional amendments by which Venezuela adopts the gold standard.

Persian Peasants.

There is probably no peasantry in the world so ground down as the Persian. The agricultural laborer there, as in China, never tries to ameliorate his condition, for the simple reason that if he earns more, more is taken away from him by the rulers of the land. The general condition of the laboring classes, however, does not seem to be so bad as might be supposed. In a country so vast (550,000 square miles) and so thickly populated (3,500,000 in all), a small and sufficient supply of food is easily raised, especially with such prolific soil at the command of the poorest. At Shiraz there are two harvests in the year. The self, sown in summer and reaped in autumn, consists of rice, cotton, Indian corn and garden produce, and the tehatol is sown in October and November, and reaped from May till July. This is exclusively wheat and barley. Here also grow grapes, oranges and pomegranates, for which latter Shiraz is famed.—Outing.
