ABOUT QUEEN VICTORIA

ONE OF THE GREATEST SOVEREIGNS
THE WORLD HAS EVER KNOWN.

Her Early Life and Education—Her
Marriage to the Prince Consort
and Her Children.

The history of the reign of
Queen Victoria would be a histo-
ry of modern England, too long
to be written here, and not to be
written at this time in any event,
but the following short sketch of
her life will be of interest in view
of the coming local celebration:

Victoria Alexandrina (Queen of
Great Britain and Ireland, and
Empress of India), only child of
the late Duke of Kent and of the
Princess Louisa-Victoria of Saxe-
Coburg (relict of the Hereditary
Prince of Leiningen, and sister of
Leopold Prince of Saxe-Coburg,
afterwards King of the Belgians),
was born at Kensington Place,
May 24, 1819; her parents, who
had been for some time residing
abroad, having hastened to Eng-
land in order that their child
might "be born a Briton." The
Duke of Kent died January 23,
1820, and the general education
of the young Princess was
directed, under her mother's care,
by the Duchess of Northumber-
land, wife of the third duke.
Until within a few weeks of her
elevation to the throne her life
was spent in comparative retire-
ment, varied by tours through
different parts of the United King-
dom. Queen Victoria succeeded
her uncle, William IV, June 20,
1837, as Victoria I, and her
coronation was celebrated in West-
minster Abbey, June 28, 1838.
Her Majesty was married Febru-
ary 10, 1840, to his late Royal High-
ness Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg
Gotha, by whom her Majesty had
issue: 1, H. R. H. Victoria
Adelaid Mary Louisa, Princess
Royal, born November 21, 1840,
married January 25, 1858, to H.
R. H. the Crown Prince Frederick
William of Prussia (he died June
15, 1888); 2, H. R. H. Albert Ed-
ward, Prince of Wales, born
November 9, 1841, married March
10, 1863, the Princess Alexandra
of Denmark; 3, H. R. H. Prince
Alice Maude Mary, born April 15,
1843, married July 1, 1862, to
Prince Louis of Hesse-Darmstadt
[H. R. H. died December 14, 1878];
4, H. R. H. Prince Alfred Ernest
Albert, born August 6, 1844,
created Duke of Edinburgh May
24, 1866, married January 23,
1874, the Grand Duchess Marie
Alexandrovna, sister of the pres-
ent Emperor of Russia; 5, H. R. H.
Princess Helena Augusta Vic-
toria, born May 26, 1846, married
July 5, 1866, to Prince Christian
of Schleswig Holstein; 6, H. R. H.
Princess Louise Caroline Al-
berta, born March 14, 1848, mar-
ried to the Marquis of Lorne,
March 21, 1871; 7, H. R. H. Prince
Arthur William Patrick Albert,
Duke of Connaught, born May 1,
1850, married March 17, 1879, the
Princess Louise Margaret Alexan-
dra Victoria Agnes, third daughter
of Prince Frederick Charles of
Prussia; 8, H. R. H. Prince Leo-
pold George Duncan Albert, Duke
of Albany, born April 7, 1853,
married April 2, 1882, the Prin-
cess Helen Frederica Augusta,
daughter of the Prince of Wal-
deck and Pyrmont (H. R. H. died
March 28, 1884), and 9, H. R. H.
Princess Beatrice Mary Victoria
Feodore, born April 14, 1857, mar-
ried July 23, 1885, to Prince
Henry Maurice of Battenberg.

Large Reductions in the Working
Force of the Company.

As a result of the recent visit of

tation, there has been a large re-
duction in the force of employes
about the mill and office of the
Spreckelsville plantation.

Among those who have resigned
from the company's service in
consequence are W. H. Meyers
and T. J. Leary, first and second
bookkeepers, the former of whom
has already gone to the Coast;
Dave Meyers, steward; George
Randolph of the plantation police;
M. K. Keelau, machinist; Joe
Miller, E. Benson and J. H.
Nicholson, assistant engineers;
W. A. Bailey, sugar boiler, and A.
Baek, blacksmith. J. C. Neill, the
assistant engineer, also resigned
to take charge of the Phoenix Iron
Works in this city.

In addition to the above list a
number of the minor employes
about the plantation have been
dropped. Their combined salaries
will make a large reduction in the
company's monthly pay roll.

We also hope (it is good to hope) that fresh Makapala oranges from "St. Paul's" precincts will find a ready sale (soil) for Honolulu, and put a few pennies into the box of this very poor and sincere Chinese Mission. 1896.

We have had the gift of a good joke and pass it on to you my friends: One of the wardens of "St. Paul's" is an old man (Chinese of course) quite decrepit, and works on his own little ranch. He is not too old, however, to take an interest in my country, and question me very intelligently about its products, and display not a little information in the matter. He grows quite excited and wholly earnest when taking up, each Sunday, the nickels, viz: for it amounts to just that - the offertory. One Sunday, after he had gleaned the last half-bit, he marched triumphantly to the head pew, poured them out of the little wooden hand box and counted them, shouting, when the abstruse calculation was completed: "Seventy five cents!" It was a close call and like the officer's "attention!" nearly brought us on our feet. How much like a little boy an old man fingers and fumbles and counts his money! "Once a man and twice a child" - Indeed and indeed it is true.

What do you folk get to eat up there, anyway? Makapala's so far off from Honolulu, the capital, you know." Well, yes, we do pretty nearly furnish a few times a week; but then the good Samaritan heaves in sight with a cargo and we manage to draw our breath a few days longer.

We just step out of a morning at 5 o'clock and take a sweep, brush, across country - turn our face seaward and skyward and that's a full meal for any man.

But to come down to your own level of solid beef, bread and beer, and leave the Hawaiian heights and dewy meads to the outside, we took inside this morning a diversified basket of pine-apple, oranges from our gulch half an hour picked, fresh eggs - of course we could have had instead a broiled chicken but we didn't, - not cheap, white eggs like they sell in your village, but brown, fat ones laid yesterday by three hens, Kona coffee, turnip radish, crisp, just pulled, cream brought by the Portuguese at 6 o'clock a. m., [we patronise the clock up here - it saves time, in a year], butter made yesterday at 6 o'clock p. m. and home-made bread. What do we not get to eat, you meant to say. "Was that all you had for breakfast?" Was that all!

We follow our own fashions and never take cabbage, or clam chowder early; not, even, a slice of salted tongue; a swallow of wine - no. However, at the fetes we take

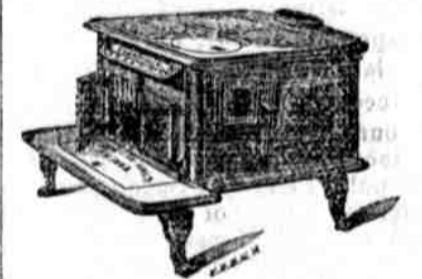

CORPORATION TAXES.

If corporations in some cases are having their taxation doubled, it is under legislation that was enacted only after full discussion. Therefore it is to be presumed that the basis of taxation is as fair as could have been devised, especially when it is considered that the corporations practically dominated the Legislature. Under such circumstances the doubling of the taxes of any corporation, providing that the law is equitably administered, would mean that such corporation had hitherto only paid half of what it should have paid, had there been a fair system of taxation in vogue. It is many years since attempts began to be made to have corporations taxed in something like due proportion to their property, but corporate influence was always too powerful to allow the necessary legislation to be effected until now. Some of the largest owners of corporate capital admitted, when the latest legislation was pending, that taxation had borne with inequitable lightness upon corporations. Before the recent amendment to the tax laws, however, there was an outcry from a large number of taxpayers against the arbitrary raising of assessment valuations. Before the Appeal Board it was proved in many cases that the assessors were guided by no standard so much as by their own whims. If the amended law will promote equity and system in the levying of taxes, it will be sustained by the country at large regardless of the resentment of corporations.

UNDUE MYSTERY.

Minister Damon has avowed nothing more strongly before legislative bodies than his belief that the public has a right to be informed regarding administrative acts. Yet lately it would appear that there has been more mystery hedging the doings in subdivisions of the Finance Department

than anywhere else in the Government. Men who have been active supporters of the republican regime from the first have been discharged from the customs service for instance, and, although they have challenged a statement of the cause of dismissal, neither they nor the public can get the slightest satisfaction. Bonds beyond the ability of other officers to furnish are arbitrarily exacted, until some of them are got rid of by that means, and then the embargo is raised after a few days. If the Legislature was in session, Minister Damon would be required either to give reasons for these proceedings or state why such reasons could not be produced. This air of mystery surrounding the operation of the public service cannot but have a tendency to cause a weakening of confidence in the administration of any Department where it prevails. Worse than that, it will be liable to promote dishonesty in officials holding positions of trust. When they do not know the day nor the hour when they may be incontinently thrust out, without any cause assigned for their dismissal, their fortitude against temptation to make hay while the sun shines will need strong moral bracing.

Those who are trying to make political capital out of a reference to the Supreme Court in the Chicago platform, denouncing it as anarchism, might be referred to the language held by Charles Sumner at the Massachusetts convention where the Republican party was first christened. He made no bones about saying that the Judiciary was only worthy of respect when it reflected the principles of righteousness and justice, and he arraigned the Judiciary of even modern ages, and not only in England but America, for its blood stained, oppressive and servile record. The occasion of the reference was the upholding of slavery as constitutional by the Supreme Court against the advanced opinions of some of the ablest lawyers and reasoners of that critical period.

Go slow on praise for Honolulu property owners, neighbor, as to their enterprise in making sidewalks. There was more rotten wood than stone, more mud than wood, in the capital's sidewalks until the legislation of 1892 compelled a change of scene. Grades there were none to speak of, excepting in the records of the Government Survey.

Let the reopening of the Opera House be as popular as it is intended to have the establishment permanently conducted. It is not aristocratic dollars for a ticket, but the democratic price—half, three-quarter or one dollar—according to section that has always prevailed, which is going to make the doors swing open frequently.

It is news indeed to hear that the expenditure of the appropriation for a wharf at Hilo is dependent upon the action of the people of that town. The money was appropriated in the Loan Act without any local option conditions, and when the bonds are sold the wharf should be built.

Regatta Day is an ornament if not the crown of Representative Robertson's universally admitted high usefulness as a legislator.

A Hundred Thousand a Year.

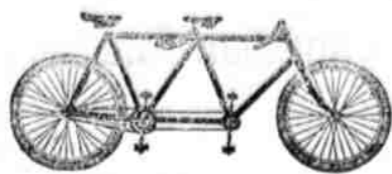

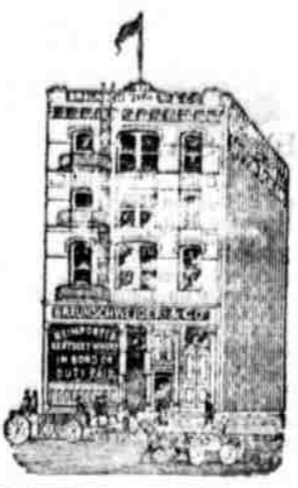

SHIPPING MOVEMENTS

ANOTHER SHIP ARRIVED TO LOAD FOR NEW YORK.

The Troop from Portland - Doing Along the Waterfront - Some Other Marine Notes.

The steamers Kauai and Waialeale both sail with coal for the Garden Isle today.

The W G Irwin loaded a quantity of sugar at Kilauea wharf today. She has discharged her inward cargo.

Tomorrow, high tide large 4:30 a.m.; high tide small 4:15 p.m.; low tide large 10:22 p.m.; low tide small 10:51 a.m.

The bark Matilda is lying in the stream. She will discharge lumber after the bark Ceylon at Allen & Robinson's wharf.

At present, Pacific Mail wharf is the most unpleasant spot in town. The steamship Arctic is discharging coal from four hatches, and the coal dust flies about in all directions.

The British iron ship Troop, Fritz, master, arrived in port late yesterday afternoon, 18 days from Portland, Oregon. The Troop is of 1826 tons burden, and after discharging 600 tons of ballast, she will load sugar for New York. She has a good crew aboard, the men having been with her since she left Hongkong, some time ago.

San Francisco, Sept. 21 - Charles Jensen and Charles Klein, two of the hardest sailors that the Scandinavian peninsula ever produced, are preparing to attempt the daring feat of sailing around Cape Horn, from San Francisco to New York, in the smallest craft that ever attempted to make the passage.

The vessel in which the trip is to be made is a sloop. She has a length of 23 feet over all, a water-line of 28 feet, beam, 9 feet 6 inches, draught 3 feet and a depth of five feet from the cabin roof. She has fore and aft compartments, besides the cabin, and her rail is six inches high. She carries a mainsail and two jibs. The trip for which Jensen and Klein are preparing is about 8000 miles. They will keep the regular sailing course to make time, and will stop at Valparaiso on this side and the Falkland Islands on the other. They will not take the Straits of Magellan, but will actually round the Horn and take chances with the dangers of the trip. They expect to start not later than October 15, and as much earlier as possible.
