PRESIDENT ASKS FOR INFORMATION.

President Roosevelt yesterday cabled Governor Dole for full information in regard to the Loan Act. He wants to know precisely the financial condition of the Territory and the need of the loan—the latter something the Territorial authorities will be able to explain to their own satisfaction but probably not to the satisfaction of the President. Secretary Carter and Treasurer Kepoikai are getting the information together and will hurry it forward. Following is the letter written by Governor Dole to the President shortly after the passage of the Loan Act:

June 30th, 1903.

The Honorable Secretary of the Interior, Washington, D. C.,
Sir: The Organic Act provides, in Section 55, that the Legislature may authorize loans by the Territory for certain purposes, and under certain conditions, one of which is that no "such bond or indebtedness shall be incurred until approved by the President of the United States," as set forth in the latter part of the section.

Under this authority the Legislature has passed an act to provide for public loans, a copy of which I enclose herewith. The Legislature has now under consideration a bill appropriating moneys under the authority of the loan act, section 2, for the coming biennial period, which begins July 1st, 1903. The amount which can be borrowed under the loan act for the first year of the coming biennial period, as limited by section 55 of the Organic Act to one per centum upon the assessed value of taxable property of the Territory, is \$1,290,000.

The President's approval is desired for bonds for such amount. We are arranging for the preparation of these bonds and, in relation thereto, I desire your instructions as to the form of the President's approval. Will he approve in one act of the above amount which we desire to borrow for the coming year, or will he approve of each bond by endorsing his approval on the same? In case the latter course is decided on, it will be convenient in the preparation of the bonds to provide a space therefor with the word "approved" and the words "President of the United States," engraved above and below such space.

As time is important to the Territory in this matter, may I ask you to telegraph your decision? The wording of this letter may make me appear to have taken the President's approval for such loan for granted but I assure you that I do not entertain any such sentiment.

When the loan appropriations are passed I will forward a copy.

Replying letter thirtieth ultimo advise you that requirements of Organic Act will be complied with when President approves incurring bonded indebtedness [by] endorsement. His approval of each bond unnecessary.

ADJOURNED SINE DIE.

The Fire Claims Commission has at last gone out of existence. At its last meeting held this morning, it adopted a resolution, elsewhere reproduced, adjourning sine die. In accordance with the tenor of that resolution, it will turn every matter of business it had in hand over to the Government. All its records will, in the meantime, be turned over to the proper official, the Secretary of the Territory, and matters are up to him and the Governor to satisfactorily arrange, rectify and certify, as the case may be, or as occasion may require.

"DRIVE THEM OUT."

"Love your enemies and do good to them that hate you" is a very noble principle, but no one ever heard of its successful application in politics. Probably it was never tried except in Hawaii, and we may be on the verge of a new discovery for the benefit of central committees the world over.

In the last campaign we had an energetic and well organized party committee and for its excellent services in that contest it deserves the thanks of the party. That it made a mistake in accepting as Republicans a lot of Home Rulers who entered the party to get votes, is well recognized. There is therefore no reason for repeating the error. If we are to have a Republican party it should be a real one and traitors in the ranks should be promptly driven out. The party organization should stop giving pap to its enemies. Our esteemed executive does enough of that with his own enemies, for the whole territory.

In retrospect it appears that the Home Rulers had little chance to lose last time. There was one set of Home Rulers on the Home Rule ticket and another set on the Republican ticket. It was heads the Republicans lost and tails the Home Rulers won. Such a situation can and should be avoided in the coming campaign.—Hawaiian Star.

The earnest attention of Home Rulers is called to the above. It should be remembered, at the same

time, that the Hawaiian Star is an official organ of the Republican Central Committee, and that its utterances are presumed to reflect the ideas of that committee and of the Republican party. Last year the Star and the party it represents went on bended knees and prayed for Home Rule votes. Flattery, glowing promises, money, political reward, intimidation and persecution were all resorted to for ballots. And now the men who elected a Republican delegate to Congress and gave to the Legislature a Republican majority are told that they are not wanted and are threatened with being kicked out of the party.

This is just the way we thought it would come out. There is no sincerity in the Republican party, particularly in the "missionary" faction of it. The natives were urged into the party last year for the sole purpose of manipulating their votes in the election, and from the day of election there was no further use for them. It is just about time for the voter to leave such a party and join with one in which there is independence, freedom of will and a certainty of furthering the best interests of the country.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Does it not look like the hearing in the County Act case was postponed to the next term of court in order that the County elections might be over and the successful candidates known before a decision is reached? Think that over.

The ship's boat named "Honolulu," picked up near Shanghai, probably belonged to Volcano Marshall. At last accounts Volcano was assuming capitalistic traits, and the small boat may have been the nucleus of an immense pleasure yacht of the future.

Why does not the Superintendent of Public Works remove the unsightly building from the Palace grounds at the corner of Hotel and Likelike streets? The structure is of no value and is an eyesore. The location is directly on the car-line and should be beautified with palms and other trees.

The band will resume its concerts on the Palace grounds every other Sunday. That will be a satisfaction to many working people with families. Complaint has been made that Makee Island music was too expensive to men of small means and large families, and the return of the concerts to the city will be hailed with delight by them.

The smoke from those burnt House vouchers of the Advertiser and Star must have been too much for Representative Harris to stand, for he's now laid up with the break-bone fever, probably from the effects of its fumes. It's really too bad, but we hope that Mr Harris will be up and out in a few days and attend to his business, minding not for those burnt vouchers. "Get thee up from thy bed and walk."

For the information of our "policy" Board of Health we will state that the old Arlington lot on King street is being made the dumping ground for unsightly and insanitary refuse. Most of it is surface dirt and deeper excavations from the site of an old building, full of unpleasant odors and perhaps the microbes of disease. Another charming element in the

rabbits is the contents of an ancient cess-pool. Fine sight, that, for a border to a principal thoroughfare and a foreground for a great hotel.

Judge Davis is to be commended for his strenuous opposition to gambling and gamblers. Why, certainly, the heavy fining of a few ignorant and impecunious Pakes for playing dominoes and the like with a five-cent ante will strike terror to the hearts of the many "respectable gentlemen" about town who make their living by gambling and they will forthwith seek other vocations. Seriously speaking, however, the police and court policy in regard to gambling in this city is a marvel. Chinese who play insignificant games among themselves for insignificant sums are hounded by the police, rounded up into court, severely scolded by the magistrate and either heavily fined or sent to prison. "Respectable" white men who maintain a dozen gambling resorts about the city and make their livings by gambling, in the most reprehensible way, are never molested. And then, again, a party of friends fear to go into a saloon or other resort to play a game of pedro or cribbage for pastime and social enjoyment. Judging from the tactics of the police the real gambler is immune from apprehension and punishment, while the man who enjoys a game of cards for the amusement there is in it is the fellow to be jumped on.

Held for Salvage.

The British steamer Clavering has been seized by the United States Marshal under a libel of J D Spreckels & Bros Co. for \$50,000, alleged to be due as salvage, the steamer having been pulled off the reef by their tugs, the Fearless and the Counselman. A demand was made on the vessel's commander, Captain Barton, yesterday for the money but he refused to pay it, whereupon the attachment was gotten out. In the complaint the value of the steamer is given as \$350,000, cargo \$150,000 and coal \$15,000. An effort will be made to have the case heard at an early date in order that the Clavering may resume her voyage.

OUT OF COMMISSION.

The Fire Claims Commission Held Its Last Meeting and Adjourned *Sine Die*.

A meeting of the Fire Claims Commission was called by Chairman Macfarlane at 9 o'clock this morning, in his office in the Judd Building, all members of the Commission being present, as follows: Chairman Macfarlane, Messrs Ke-poiki, Lovekin, Pratt and Tosta. After some preliminary talk and the disposal of certain matters, the following resolution was presented and unanimously adopted:

"RESOLVED: Whereas, the Commissioners having completed their duties and being about to finally adjourn the Commission, the Clerk of the Commission is requested to reply in writing to all persons now having communications on file with the Commission, filed since the adjournment of the Commission taken after the signing of awards, notifying them that no further business will be passed upon by the Commission and referring them to the Government for consideration of the questions referred to in their communications.

"The Clerk is further requested to deposit forthwith with the Secretary of the Territory all the records of the Commission, consisting of all copies of claims filed, exhibits filed in evidence in the hearing of said claims, records of judgments of awards, minutes of the proceedings of the sessions of the Commission, letters and correspondence, accounts and all other records and property of whatsoever nature belonging to the Commission. A full and sufficient receipt shall be taken by the Clerk from the Secretary of the Territory for the records and property deposited and turned over to him, which shall be deposited with the Chairman of the Commission upon the completion of the transfer.

"And be it further resolved, that this Commission do now adjourn *sine die*."

New Demurrer Filed.

E Faxon Bishop has filed a new demurrer in the Korean immigration cases, in which the principal allegation is that the offense is alleged to have taken place prior to the time the law in question went into effect. Defendant says:

"That the time of the defendant's solicitation of the migration to the Territory of Hawaii from Korea of said alien to perform unskilled manual labor upon sugar plantations of said Territory is averred in said amended complaint, and in each count thereof, to have included the time between November 1, 1902, and March 3, 1903, whereas, the act under which said action is brought had not then been enacted.

It is further alleged that the act averred to have been committed by defendant do not in fact constitute solicitation of the immigration of aliens from Korea and further that the establishment of a Labor Bureau with the Deshler Bank of Chemulpo in Korea is not averred to have been made by the defendant and that no time is specified.

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Warm Times in The Supreme Case.

Things are getting decidedly torrid between the lawyers in the notorious Sumner case. It was thought that boiling point had been reached in the Humphreys-Thompson affair, which was a section of the same matter, but the thermometer seems still to have a bullish tendency. Following the filing of disbarment proceedings against J A Magoon and Judge George A Davis yesterday morning there was a lull in the storm just long enough to catch breath, when George Davis broke loose. He could not get back at the Attorney-General in the courts, but filed "bouncing proceedings" against him with the Governor.

Davis charges first that Attorney General Andrews is using his office for the purpose of "maliciously, slandering, defaming and otherwise injuring my character as a lawyer and a citizen," etc; and that the information filed against him (Davis) in the Supreme court is false and untrue. He also charges Andrews with neglecting and refusing to file an information against E C Peters, Deputy Attorney General, and a receipt alleged to be that of Peters for \$2,500 fees in the Sumner case, and a part of the same matter, is incorporated in the complaint.

Concluding, Judge Davis has this to say:

Your petitioner therefore prays that at the termination of the proceedings in the Supreme Court, and after the information which has been lodged against me has been disposed of, that I may be heard before your Honor as to the conduct, actions and doings of the said Lorrin Andrews, and that proofs as I may be able to furnish in support of the charges herein set forth, and that upon due proof being made of the conduct of the said Lorrin Andrews in the premises that he may be removed from the office of Attorney General by you, the said Governor of the Territory of Hawaii, and as in duty bound your petitioner will ever pray. Dated, this 24th day of July, A D 1903.
