## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

"Are you stuck on the jury roll?" is now the question. Two hundred and fifty names have been listed and 144 of these, at least, will be drawn.

Hilo won't be satisfied with a break-water off its port. Inside of six months it will want a break-water overhead and a railroad to San Francisco. Aw, those grasping Hiloites!

Kauai may not be in it in showing up votes, but it certainly comes in for many of the plums when offices are going round. But then, you know, Dole, W O Smith and other navigators of the Territorial ship came from that island.

If the Chamber of Commerce succeeds in having the Army transports call regularly here it will accomplish far more than can be expected from the tourist and small farmer agitations. Transports mean (including purchase of coal) from \$15,000 to \$30,000 a month to Honolulu.

The policy of the Republicans in coercing Hawaiians into their ranks will result in no benefit to that party. It is the old game, and it will work out in the old way. The case is one of convincing a man against his will, and when election comes around the native who has been forced to sign the Republican rolls will vote as he pleases.

This afternoon the remains of the late Hon Walter Murray Gibson, one of the best foreign friends the native Hawaiians ever had, will be put aboard the Lehua and transferred from this city to Lahaina. Although there will be no ceremony

attending the transfer, the older sons of the soil will not fail to recall the friendliness of this good man and his work for them. The remains have been removed from the vault in the Catholic cemetery and will find their last resting place in the Hayselden vault at the old capital of Maui.

The Advertiser states that nearly all the Democrats of Honolulu belong to the Central Committee of twenty-one. Electricity is said to be quick and thought a little quicker; but we will gamble that neither could hold a light to the speed of missionaries to join the Democratic twenty-one should a Democratic President be elected next year.

Kahului's second race program did not prove so successful as the first, and a rather disappointed party of pleasure seekers will return to the city tonight. Two-bit soda water and three dollars for turning a corner in Wailuku do not act as attractions to outsiders. Wailuku hospitality needs to be made over, and it will then probably work better.

The failure of the Democrats to enter the County elections may have a considerable effect on the campaign. It will mean, in the first place, that the Home Rulers will not have a campaign fund behind them and will have to do some lively skirmishing for money. Whether they will be successful, without the aid of the Democrats, in getting together the necessary wherewithal remains to be seen.

But Governor Dole is to be complimented on one thing in his selection of a second district magistrate, i. e.: He acted independently of the impertinent, impudent boss, the Republican Central Committee. He appointed his own man independent of the meddling committee, and although a member of the Family Compact was selected, the Governor scored a point in declining to be dictated to.

Former Senator Kauha states that he has only one foot in the Republican party and will wait until he sees which party is the strongest before making a positive move. In other words, he wants office and is willing to go with any party that will give it to him. Principles cut no ice with him. Mr Kauha is a Republican. The woods are full of just such Republicans as he is. It will take a little jarring up by a Democratic administration to uncurl the stuff in his top-knot.

Well, Boston can't sink too sudden to please most people of the civilized area. The pesky village has always been a trouble maker, and the next best place to Hades for it is the locker of Davey Jones. Hawaii has had enough of Boston in the region below the belt; and George Davis was not the worst locust from there, either. If P C J can run back quick enough to save Bunker Hill, we will vote to let the thing go to the briny—without a gulp or a regret.

The new district magistrate, Alexander Lindsey, Jr. is an amiable young gentleman and is doubtless very capable of filling acceptably the important office to which he has been appointed; but would it not have been far better to have placed in the office an older and steadier head, and a man better acquainted and more closely identified with the people of the city, with whom he

will have principally to deal? Lindsey was born on Kauai, the native home of Governor Dole, and belongs to the Dole Family Compact; and that probably composes the chief reason for his preferment.

The Ferris case is a peculiar one. After being sentenced to hang and unsuccessfully appealing to the court of last resort, a new witness, Expressman Christiansen, appears and states that the murder of Watson was committed in self defense. The new man claims to have been an eye witness to the tragedy. Under the circumstances it seems most unfortunate that a new trial cannot be had in the regular way; and if it is in the power of Governor Dole to order a new hearing, in view of the fresh evidence, he should by all means do so.

When Pearl harbor is opened United States vessels will go there. In addition to the immense Hackfeld and railroad wharves, another long wharf is being built on Queen street near the foot of River. Then the I I S N Co. is putting in a great wharf on River street which will relieve the wharves at the foot of Fort street. All in all there is now more wharf room than Honolulu will require in fifty years. And yet Superintendent Cooper wishes to destroy a lot of valuable business property and spend a barrel of money on a number of new wharves to parallel Fort up to Allen street. The thing is unbusinesslike and absurd.

In the Home Rule meeting this morning Charles Notley again made the charge that the Democrats were unfaithful to the Home Rulers in the last election. The Democrats were "unfaithful" to the extent that they put up the money for the campaign and voted for a number of men not of their choosing. We are not aware that the defeat of Mr Notley was due to the Democrats, but if such is the case the Democrats are perhaps rather to be congratulated and thanked than censured. If we remember correctly neither he nor Mr Mon War came in for many cheers from the grandstand of their own party.

**LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.**

E R ("Douglas") Bath is overhauling the plumbing in the Palace.

George Allen, of Cotton Bros. and Mrs George F Allen, were married yesterday.

Mrs Jane L' Stanford was a through passenger by the Sierra for the Colonies. She is on a two years tour of the world.

Dr A N Sinclair has been appointed a member of the Board of Medical Examiners to succeed Dr C L Garvin, resigned.

The Chamber of Commerce has appropriated \$100 with which to provide Delegate Kuhio with photographs of Federal works and Honolulu for use in Congress.

Judge Dickey will handle the civil and Judge Lindsay the criminal business in the district court. The former will be first judge.

Members of the Bankers' Association are to be invited to visit Honolulu on the occasion of their coming convention in San Francisco.

Matteo Sandona, an artist, arrived in the Ventura to paint the portrait of Princess Kawnanakoa and others. He is stopping at the Young hotel.

William L Hall, expert forester in the employ of the Agricultural department at Washington, arrived by the Ventura to take charge of forestry work in the Islands.

Mrs George A Davis has removed the furniture from her husband's law office and closed the place. It is reported that Judge Davis will not return to the Islands.

The Chamber of Commerce yesterday elected the following officers for the ensuing year: C M Cooke, president; E D Tenney, vice president; J G Spencer, secretary and treasurer.

Saturday night's anti-mosquito meeting will be held in one of the ball rooms of the Young hotel, beginning at 8 o'clock. Dr C B Cooper, president of the Board of Health, will be chairman.

Eight Japanese couples were married on Quarantine Island yesterday. They were immigrants and it was necessary for the women to marry to meet the requirements of United States law.

Nine of the jurors that convicted George Ferris (Kentucky Bill) have petitioned the Governor to commute the sentence from death to life imprisonment, and it is now believed that that will be done.

Rev T D Garvin, father of Dr C L Garvin and founder of the Christian church here, died in Los Angeles last evening after an illness of several weeks. W C Waedon received a cablegram conveying the news.

High Sheriff Brown has received a cablegram from Chief-of-Police Whitman, of San Francisco, to the effect that the Japanese stowaway arrested there does not answer to the description of Yanagi, the Ewa murderer.

Mrs Jennie Murray, daughter of the late Captain T B Murray, and Guy Owens, the well known electrician, were married at the bride's residence in Panahan last evening. Both of the young people have many friends in the Islands.

Wm Haywood writes from Washington that the coal terms proposed by the Merchants' Association are satisfactory and that in future all army transports will call here. This will mean from one to three boats each way per month.

Alexander Lindsay, Jr, has been appointed second District Magistrate to succeed Judge Davis. The appointee is a Kauai man and a graduate of the University of Michigan. Mr Lindsay speaks Portuguese and Hawaiian, nearly as well as English.

**LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.**

Excursionists to Kahulu for the August 12 races will be expected early tomorrow morning.

Drs W E Allen and H A McConnell, local dentists, left for Shanghai, China, yesterday to open business.

A beer saloon will be opened at the corner of Beretania and Aala streets by a Portuguese and a Japanese.

Before returning to Honolulu Superintendent Andrew Brown will inspect the water works at Hilo and Wailuku.

Admiral Terry, the new commandant of the naval station, will likely arrive by the Siberia tomorrow from San Francisco.

Al Moore has apologized to his baseball opponents for accidentally running into Catcher Leslie during the game last Saturday.

"Pete" Sullivan has returned to the city after five years of service as carpenter at Oahu plantation and accepted a position at the Shamrock.

August Dreier wishes it stated that the funeral of his late daughter, Juanita, will be delayed until the arrival of Bishop Libart by the steamer Alameda.

Cable news has it that the Nebraskan will not sail from San Francisco until August 22. There was a considerable delay there in getting her sugar discharged.

Ah Loy, a Chinam who has just finished a twenty years term in Oahu prison, was yesterday sentenced to thirty days more for attempting to rob the house of a fellow countryman.

Judge Edging, of Hawaii, will shortly publish a digest of Hawaiian reports upon which he has been working for nearly a year. It is said that the work will be a valuable addition to law libraries.

Freight cars on the Queen street electric car line are today engaged in transferring rails from King street near the bridge to a point opposite the Honolulu Iron Works for use on the Waikiki extension of the line.

Sanitary Officer Tracy believes he has already succeeded in exterminating mosquitoes in certain small localities where petroleum has been used. Mr Van Dine estimates that the number of mosquitoes can be reduced fifty to sixty per cent by a vigorous campaign for a year.

The Home Rules held a long meeting this morning for the purpose of filling vacancies in the central committee and organizing the executive committee. "Hot air" prevented a completion of the work and a special meeting to fill other vacancies was decided on for Saturday morning.

A meeting is to be held this afternoon in St Andrew's Sunday School house by Hawaiian women for the purpose of organizing a Woman's Guild or sewing society in connection with the Hawaiian congregation. Queen Liliuokalani and Princess Kalianakoa are at the head of the movement.

James A Thompson has filed a master's report upon the final account of G Rodiek, administrator of the estate of Wo Hing, late of Hilo, who died in Canton, China. With the exception of two items, which almost exactly offset each other, he finds the account correct. The account balances at \$16,661.43 on either side.

Bodies Removed.  
By the Lehua at 5 o'clock this afternoon the remains of the late Premier, W M Gibson and two children of F H and the late Mrs Talula L Hayselden will be sent from Honolulu to Lahaina to be placed in the new Hasselau vault. There will be no ceremonies here and none at Lahaina. The oldest of the Hayselden children died in 1883, or twenty years ago. Mr Gibson died in January, 1888.
