

Kumalae Charge Is Withdrawn By Pence

NOLLE PROSEQUI ENTERED IN KUMALAE CASE BY PENCE DUE TO ERROR MADE IN EVIDENCE

Reported Victim's Name Was Incorrectly Presented To Grand Jury Necessitating Prosecution To Withdraw Case

At the request of County Attorney Martin Pence, Judge J. Franklin McLaughlin of the fourth circuit court granted a motion of nolle prosequi to be entered in the case of County Clerk, Alfred Kumalae, who had been indicted last week by the grand jury for alleged embezzlement.

MIX-UP IN NAMES

According to reports, the name of Ted Kuramoto, a Big Island representative now in Honolulu, appeared in the evidence presented before the grand jury through an error. The name which should have been mentioned in the evidence is that of Tamotsu Kuramoto, brother to the legislator, it was said. It was also disclosed in the request filed by the county attorney that there is some question as to whether an amended indictment, as previously reported could be filed at this time, and for this reason, County Attorney Pence is planning to charge the defendant, Alfred Kumalae, again before the district court of South Hilo District.

RUMORS FLY IN TOWN

Meantime, it was being rumored around town yesterday and today that Tamotsu Kuramoto had come to Hilo within the last few days and had contacted the County Attorney, reporting to Mr. Pence that he had no case against the County Clerk. His brother, Rep. Ted Kuramoto had previously made a statement in Honolulu that he knew nothing about the alleged charge against Mr. Kumalae.

Speculation is high around town yesterday afternoon and this morning because of the publicity given this case in the last week or so, and the fact that there has been a mix-up in the name of the reported victim in the case. According to reports, both Rep. Ted Kuramoto and his brother, Tamotsu, denied that they had anything to do in bringing the indictment against the County Clerk, in that neither had made any complaint to the authorities.

SOUTH PACIFIC NAVY TO STAY INDEFINITELY

WASHINGTON, Mar. 28—The possibility that the United States navy might retain warships in the south Pacific was definitely suggested by an official "no comment" on future movements and detachments recently sent to Australia.

Admiral Harold Stark, chief of naval operations, said that in accordance to the policy of the Navy department, he has no information concerning the movements of the ships either present or contemplated, no comment could be made when the vessels would return from the cruise" although the Navy department originally announced that the vessels will return to the Honolulu base after the visit.

SUEZ CANAL TERMED BRITISH LIFE-LINE WITH GREECE AND TURKEY HOLDING OLD STATUS

LOSS OF BRITISH OIL SUPPLY AND MENACE FROM RED SEA SEEN IN CASE BRITAIN LOSE SUEZ CANAL ROUTE

TOKYO, Mar. 29— Dwelling upon diplomatic glacier-like pushes through the Balkans, the Japan Times and Advertiser, only English paper in Tokyo, editorially observes that the blitz method of war seems to have been replaced by a glacier-like movement.

Suez Canal, British Life-Line

"Slowly, inevitably and overwhelmingly the replacement of the old order of completely independent states by the Reich union of European nations goes on. The key principle of British operations in the Mediterranean is defense of the Suez Canal, the British life-line. Between Germany and that canal today are only Greece and Turkey, strengthened by large British forces either withdrawn from North Africa or brought a-fresh from various parts of the empire," the publication declared.

Oil Supply Threatened

The paper asserts: "Now it will be seen how the glacier-like system of steady, creeping pressure will affect Greece and Turkey with the aim of securing a benevolent neutrality toward the Axis or being forced to make way. Some strategists assert the outcome of the war will be determined by proceedings in southeast Europe, because if it all capitulates and the Suez is taken, oil of the British empire will be threatened, and via the Red Sea a new menace will be opened up against British shipping."

ABSOLUTE NEUTRALITY STAND TO BE TAKEN BY YUGOSLAVIA UNDER KING PETER II REIGN

NEW PREMIER INFORMS GERMANY YUGOSLAVIA WOULD NEITHER RATIFY NOR DENOUNCE AXIS PACT, TAKING NON-COMMITTAL STAND

NEW YORK, Mar. 28—High diplomatic sources close to the Yugoslavian government revealed that Yugoslavia's new Premier-General Dusan Simovitch, following an all night cabinet session, informed the German minister to Yugoslavia, Victor von Heeren, that the Yugoslavian parliament most likely would not ratify Yugoslavia's adherence to the tri-partite alliance, reports arriving from Belgrade stated. Premier Simovitch told von Heeren that these reports said that the parliamentary approval is unlikely as the fulfillment of the pact's terms "impossible since they are contrary to the will of the Yugoslav people."

EDITORIAL BETWEEN TWO FIRES

The Balkan kingdom of Yugoslavia finds itself caught between two fires due to King Peter II's latest coup in response to the indignation of the masses expressed against the country's joining the Axis group but a day or two before the young king's sudden seizure of the throne, that was to become rightfully his in time, from his uncle, Prince Paul. According to wireless dispatches, General Dusan Simovic, the new premier named by Peter II, is understood to have advised Germany that Yugoslavia would not be able to ratify the pact entered into with the Axis powers by the regime just overthrown for fear of an internal uprising among the populace. On the other hand, neither will Yugoslavia's new regime denounce the Axis Treaty, according to Premier Simovic, but the country will adhere to a policy of absolute neutrality toward both the Axis powers and those opposed to Germany and Italy.

Meanwhile, both England and Germany are massing troops on the Yugoslavian border, with Hitler, through his pressure tactics, still endeavoring to force ratification of the Vienna pact signed by Yugoslavia's old regime less than a week ago. Simultaneously, both United States and Great Britain are persuading the new government to repudiate the pact with Germany and the other Axis powers, promising Yugoslavia full aid in case of a German military retaliation against the Balkan kingdom for its taking a stand against Hitler and refusing to be bound by the Vienna pact. The new regime, however, has declared that it would take a safe, middle course, neither ratifying or renouncing the pact entered into by the overthrown government, thus asking to be recognized as an absolutely neutral power, only looking for peace both internally and externally.

The present stand taken by Simovic, the new premier, apparently does not fully satisfy Great Britain primarily and the United States in the second place, but the fact that the new Yugoslav regime refuses to ratify the Vienna Pact must be considered more than a half way diplomatic victory for both England and the United States, and both of these powers probably will not force the issue from their end. JAPANESE ARE STILL UNEASY IN INDO-CHINA

TOKYO ECONOMIC MEET BEING CLOSELY WATCHED

HANOI, Mar. 29—The French Indo-China government continued to bring pressure on the Japanese business firms here despite the reports that smooth progress in the Japanese and Indo-Chinese economic talks are now being carried on in Tokyo.

Although keenly interested in the results of the Tokyo talks, the Japanese business circles here fear that they may be forced to foreclose their business soon, regardless of the outcome of the Tokyo negotiations in view of the strict French Indo-China laws on import and export trade.

Japanese Forces Are Welcomed by Chinese

CANTON, Mar. 29— Making rapid progress inland, the Japanese forces landed yesterday morning on the shores of Kitchi-o Bay, 150 kilometers northeast of Hongkong and entered Lukfung, major hinterland transport center, noon press bureau of the Japanese expeditionary forces in South China announced last night.

The communiqué said that the Japanese forces were welcomed by the inhabitants, waving Japanese flags. Peace and order prevailing in Lukfung after the occupation, business was carried on as usual in the various shops, the announcement added.

KCC UNFAVORS \$15,000 HILO WATER SURVEY

OHRT, STEARNS OF HONOLULU TO INVESTIGATE HILO WATER PROBLEMS

At the meeting held at the Naniloa Thursday night by the Hilo Chamber of Commerce, some of the important bills now pending before the territorial legislature were discussed.

President Lindsay welcomed those present including visitors from the Junior Chamber, Hilo Japanese Chamber, Hamakua Civic Club, members of the Hilo Bus Association and also Mr. Clark, tax assessor.

The police commission bill was first taken up. President Lindsay called on Mr. Irwin, chairman of the legislative committee to outline this measure and Senate bill No. 92, which will establish a police commission on this island was approved. The motion was carried unanimously.

The Senate Bill No. 205 was then taken up. It concerns working hours and wages. This bill was disapproved by the directors unless those elements which create unfair competition were eliminated. It was suggested that the association go on record to approve this bill.

The board of directors disapproved the Water supply bill No. 204 which appropriated \$15,000 for survey. It was made known that Fred Oert of the Board of Water Supply of Honolulu and Harold Sterns of the United States Geological Survey will make a trip to Hilo to look into this matter in view of the above. This association disapproved the bill.

Senate Bill 34 and 178 concerning gas taxing were discussed and the members present approved Senate Bill 178.

Personal property tax involved in Senate Bills 125, 206, 272 were discussed and it was recommended that Senate Bill 206 be approved.

The classifications bills which are Senate bills 21 and 317, and House Bill 34, were discussed. These bills, SB 21 and HB 34 set up territorial and county salaries and wages, while Senate Bill 317 deals with the county only, giving the Board of Supervisors authority to fix the salaries and wages. The Chamber of Commerce approved SB 317, feeling that the power to fix salaries and wages should be left in the hands of the county officials.

The secretary then read the letter received from the Hilo Bus Association asking the Chamber for support in regard to House Bill 29, relating to compulsory insurance of common vehicle carriers. No action was taken on this bill because of the fact that not enough time was available to study this bill. It was referred back to the legislative committee for study.

Robert Trent, president of the Junior Chamber expressed his desire to have a committee of the Junior Chamber work in cooperation with the senior Chamber relative to matters pertaining to (Continued on Page Four)

WAR SUPPLIES ARE CAPTURED BY JAPANESE

CHUNGKING FORCES LOSE LARGE QUANTITY OF EQUIPMENT

NANKING, Mar. 29— Chungking's spring offensive has been shattered by Japanese forces in their counter-offensive which resulted in the occupation of Shang-kao, 120 kilometers west of Nanchang, capital of Kwangsi Province, it was claimed by the weekly review of the China situation issued yesterday by the press section of the Japanese Expeditionary Forces in China.

From March 15th to March 25th, the review says that Chinese troops left 2,565 dead, besides 207 taken as prisoners, while the Japanese claimed booty which included 1 trench mortar, 10 heavy machine guns, 11 light machine guns, and 400 rifles.

The review further claims that the Japanese capture of Swabue port in the southeastern Kwangtung Province has doomed Hongkong as a base of supply for the Chungking regime.

Chungking Campaign In Spring Shattered

CANTON, Mar. 29— Japanese troops engaged in mopping up operations along the eastern coast of the Kwangtung Province captured a large amount of enemy war materials and other supplies since they landed on the shores of Haimen and Honghai Bays on March 24th, army officials here disclosed.

The military equipment which the Japanese captured up to date included 8 cannons, 850 rifles, 55,000 rounds of ammunition, 2 light machine guns, 150 pistols, 870 enemy military uniforms, while war materials included 6,000 drums of gasoline, 40 drums of Mobile oil, 50 barrels of vegetable oil, 80 automobile tires, 1 ton of iron, 1300 bags of cement, 909 bales of cotton and 1770 bales of wool.

"His bride!"

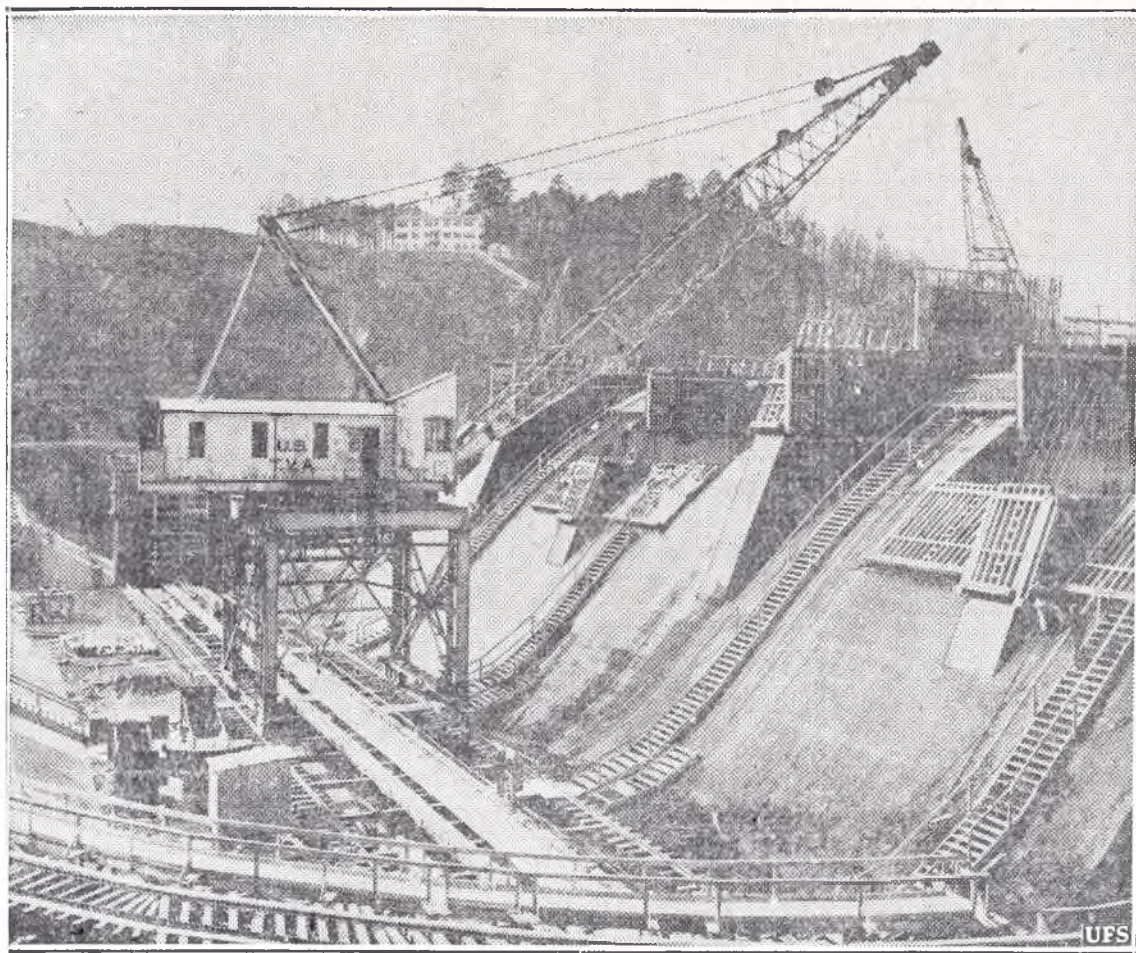
"Yes," said Casper, then explained.

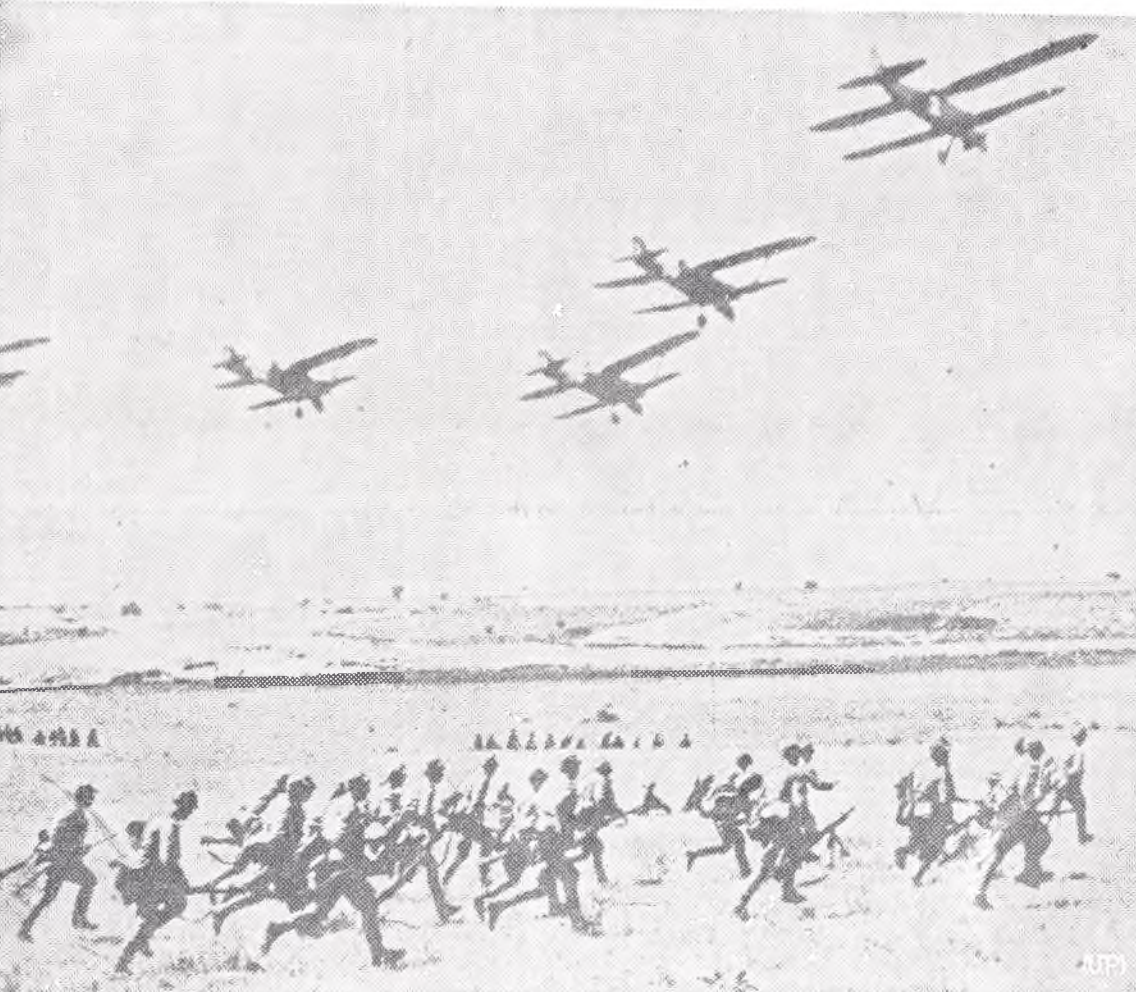

Braves Wilds in Alaska Hike



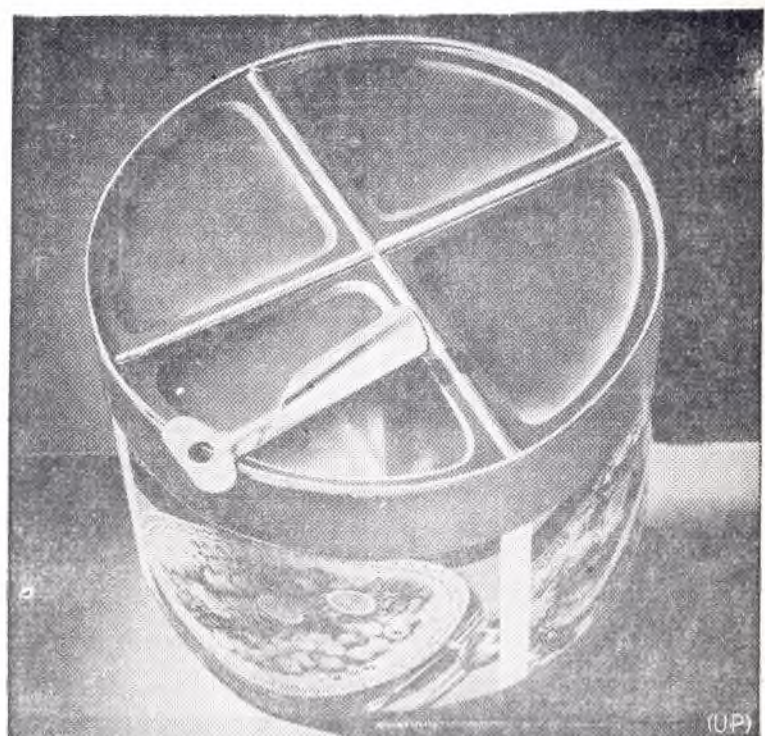

Churchill Needs These Turk Troops and Planes



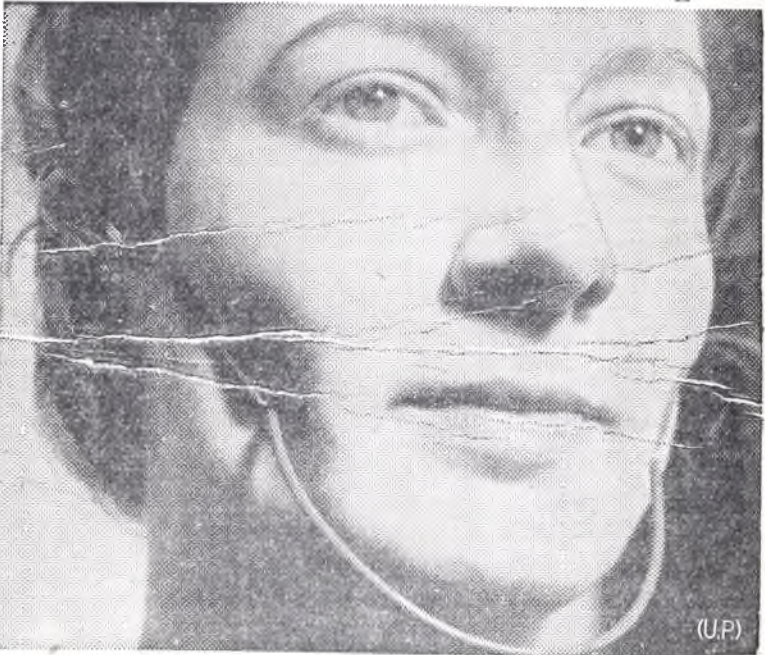

Is Yugoslavia purposely playing a game of carrying water on both shoulders, so to speak, or is it that it does not know which side to turn to like a little mouse which is caught between two cats with no passage to escape on either side?

Acute thought the situation must be for Yugoslavia, even the cruelties disclosed by powerless nations engulfed in international pressure politics have their momentary amusing aspects.
