SITUATION OF THE FOUNDRY

What Manager Hedemann Has To Say About the Matter.

Old-Wholesale Method of Advancing Money Must be Stopped—Reply Given to Committee of Three—Men at Work.

The three men chosen by the Hawaiian laborers at the Honolulu Iron Works called on Manager Hedemann at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon as agreed, and presented the grievances of the men. The matter of a raise in wages was not broached although, as stated by the BULLETIN yesterday, that view of things had taken very definite shape in the minds of native employes on the outside, who did not hesitate to communicate what they thought to two men who have a knowledge of both the English and Hawaiian languages. Those two men published reports in two afternoon papers of what they gleaned while in the midst of the men at the time when they were collected about the door of the office.

Mr. Hedemann was seen by a reporter of the BULLETIN this morning and, in brief, this is the statement he kindly vouchsafed:

"There has been in force here at the Iron Works for many years past, the custom of giving the men advances. The regular pay day was once in every two weeks. The men would come into the office between times to get money with which to pay the Chinese collectors for their daily sustenance. With a few men in the shops, this course, was easy to do.

"However, at the present time, there are something like four hundred men in the works and the matter of granting advances has made all kinds of trouble. The men would line up, sometimes three hundred strong and rush into the office to the clerk who, standing at his desk would deal out the amount desired by each man from a pile of silver dollars at his side. Sometimes the amount would equal that paid out on a regular pay day.

"Mistakes were made when it was sought to straighten out all these advances and the management decided to stop the practice. Placards to that effect were published about the shops.

"As we did not wish to work any hardship on the Hawaiians, who have always been given the preference here, we decided to grant one more advance. The second advance is today the time we intended to stop the practice.

"A few days ago I received a petition in which the men asked that the practice be allowed to continue, as a change would work a great hardship on them.

"On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of last week, I was out in the country and on Thursday I was too busy to attend to the matter. Yesterday was the time I was going to attend to it. Imagine my surprise when I found all the men outside the office door.

"The three men chosen by the Hawaiians in the shops, called on me at 3 o'clock. Asked what it was the men wanted they replied, without any reference to a raise in wages, that they wished the advances continued.

"I told them we would continue the practice until the end of the year so as to allow the men to get used to it. After that, the new order of things must go into effect. The committee left, saying they would tell the men of the decision.

"This morning I went through the shops and found perfect order. There was no disposition on the part of any of the men to create a disturbance."

The representatives from the machine and boiler shops were seen today. Both men said they asked for higher wages as instructed by the men in their departments and that the answer came that this could not be done

as there were four hundred men in the works. The other representative was the only one who asked that the advances be continued.

A KAMAIAINA RETURNED.

Mr. Fred Mitchell Arrives in the Archer.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Mitchell and the Misses Mitchell of New London, were passengers from San Francisco in the barkentine Archer this morning. They will winter in Honolulu, taking the Diamond place at Waikiki as their residence.

Mr. Mitchell is an old kamaiana here, having been associated with Mr. Williams in the whaling business in the old days. He went back to the States in the early sixties and did not come again to the Islands until about seven years ago.

Mr. Mitchell, though situated far away from the Islands, has not lost one iota of his interest in affairs here. By each mail he has been wont to receive his papers so that now, he can converse as on affairs here as anyone whose residence is in Honolulu.

GETTING HISTORY RIGHT

The Historian of This Morning Misses Some of the Facts.

Boat's Crew Not Unheard From and Boat Not Swamped—The Record Boat Voyage of Dunnottar Castle Crew.

An editorial on "Remarkable Voyages" in the Advertiser has served to raise a reminiscent revolt against some of the statements made therein. The writer of the article refers to an official position he held here, when the captain and a portion of the crew of the lost ship Norval arrived here in 1882. A comparison is drawn between the voyage of the W. H. Starbuck's boat that arrived on the coast of Hawaii the other day and that of the Norval's boat, thus:

"Owing to the steadiness of the trade winds, the boats of the Starbuck made 1500 miles in twenty days. The boats of the Norval made 2000 miles in twenty-one days.

"There is a singular coincidence in the incidents of the two voyages. Out of the four boats that left the Norval, one, commanded by the mate, disappeared, and never was heard from. Another of the boats was swamped, and the crew transferred. In the case of the Starbuck, three boats left the ship. One, commanded by the second mate disappeared, and will probably never be heard from. Another boat was swamped, and the crew transferred to the only remaining boat."

Now the BULLETIN is assured on good authority that the third boat of the Norval, commanded by the second mate, was very much heard from. It was picked up and its occupants rescued by the ship Duke of Connaught. The fourth boat was not swamped. Being a slow boat its occupants were taken into another boat and it was simply turned adrift. It may be stated that the Norval's crew arrived at Honolulu on March 26, 1882.

There have been few tales of privation in open boats to exceed that of the voyage of the Dunnottar Castle's crew from Ocean Island to Honolulu in 1884. The newspapers left absolutely nothing of the details to be sought for later by historians. Those shipwrecked mariners were forty one days tossed about on the waves, and were reduced to half a gill of water and half a biscuit a day. It is believed to have been the longest voyage of shipwrecked persons in an open boat with the exception of that made by the mutineers of the Bounty.

A subscriber calls attention to the fact that the crew of the Starbuck sailed 2000 miles instead of 1500 as stated by the Advertiser. The wreck occurred in almost exactly the same longitude and latitude as the Norval.

BARKENTINE ARCHER HERE.

Makes Trip of Fourteen Days from San Francisco.

The barkentine Archer, McAlman master, arrived from San Francisco and hauled alongside Brewer's wharf this forenoon, after a very pleasant trip of fourteen days from San Francisco with a cargo of about 1600 tons of general merchandise.

The Archer arrived off Koko Head at 6 p. m. yesterday, a little late to make Honolulu. When about five days out, she sighted the Wilna bound for this port.

Captain McAlman makes a report which is certainly damaging to the one in charge of the light house on Molokai. He says that when he approached that island last night, no light shone from the lighthouse and that the Archer passed within two miles of the point.

Messrs. Castlering and Winters, two stockmen from California, came down with twenty-five mules which they will attempt to sell here. The animals are as fine as any that have ever been landed in Honolulu, and the fine weather on the trip as left them without a scratch or a bruise.

Besides these are two fine carriage horses for E. D. Tenney.

The Archer came down in command of former First Mate McAlman, as Captain Calhoun has taken charge of the R. P. Rithet.

WORK TO GO RIGHT AHEAD

Site for Experiment Station to be Surveyed and Fenced.

Water can be Supplied Through Tank—The Forest Culling on Tantalus Found Well Done.

The expedition of the Board of Agriculture to the Punchbowl slopes yesterday was successful. A site was selected for the experiment station, and surveyors will be detailed at once to stake out the ground. It will then be fenced, after which experimental culture will begin.

Andrew Brown, Superintendent of Water Works, who accompanied Minister King on the expedition, gave assurance that, with the aid of tanks, water could be supplied for irrigation.

After going over the ground, the members of the Board went up to the Tantalus forest. They found that the culling lately ordered had been well performed under the direction of Forester Haugha. It was agreed as best to leave the trimmings on the ground to disintegrate into fertilizing properties.

At St. Louis Fair.

The St. Louis Fair and luau is in progress this afternoon. At 12 o'clock, the gates were thrown open for the luau and a large number of people are in attendance. At 2 o'clock the fair opened. The place will be open all afternoon and until 10 o'clock tonight.

A temporary canvas covered shed has been erected on the grounds. This is the place where everything is taking place. A hundred ready hands have decorated the place with ferns and flowers until it is a perfect bower of beauty.

Those in charge of the fair are very much disappointed over the fact that certain promised relics have been withheld.

Mortality Report.

There were 93 deaths in Honolulu last month, as compared with 51 for November, 1897. Not only the great mortality among U. S. soldiers—shown in the return by 15 U. S. males between 10 and 30 years of age—is changeable with the high rate. The deaths of 27 infants under one year, only one in three of them attended by a physician, and the native Hawaiian annual death rate per thousand of 42.61 against the whole districts rate of 31.88, ought to cause reflection. Among the causes of death typhoid fever with 13 equals any two of the next highest causes given.

Verdict of Coroner's Jury.

The Coroner's Jury in the case of Fred Wardell met in the Deputy Marshal's office yesterday afternoon and, at about 4 o'clock, their deliberations were finished, the result being a verdict to the effect that "The said Fred Wardell came to his death in Honolulu, Oahu, November 20, 1898, by taking a dose of carbolic acid during an attack of typhoid fever."

The jury was made up of the following men: H. E. Waity, E. S. Cunha, T. W. Hobron, W. W. Hall, Godfrey Brown and W. W. Wright.

Golf Notes.

Miss Arnold, Middle States lady golf champion for 1898, is in this city.

There will be quite a number of people on the Punahou links this afternoon. Mr. Anderson, the recently arrived golfer from Scotland, will be among the number.

Mistake Rectified.

Wilson & Whitehouse are given the contract for furnishing pipe and fittings to the Honolulu Water Works, which was at first awarded by mistake to the Crane Company, San Francisco. The bid of Wilson & Whitehouse was the lowest.

IN THE CIRCUIT COURT

New Trial Granted in One of Lincoln and Cooper Cases.

Various Suits in Equity—New Appearance of Counsel—Three Divorce Cases Decided by Judge Stanley.

By stipulation of counsel, Judge Perry has entered judgment in favor of J. A. Hopper, personally against G. W. Lincoln for the amount claimed, and against H. E. Cooper for the enforcement of the lien as prayed for—without prejudice to the right of Cooper to contend that the lien is unenforceable at law or equity. Jury had been waived. The claim was for \$312.98 and interest from July 22, 1898.

The Pacific Hardware Co. has filed a waiver of that much of the verdict given in its favor on Friday as authorizes the enforcement of any lien against the cottage belonging to the defendant H. E. Cooper.

Judge Perry has granted a new trial in the case of Allen & Robinson against G. W. Lincoln and H. E. Cooper, in which the jury did not allow the lien claimed against Cooper. Mr. Cooper noted exceptions to the granting of a new trial.

W. R. Castle and P. L. Weaver have filed their appearance as associate counsel with A. S. Hartwell for defendant in Hawaiian Government vs. Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Co.

Lepeka Puamana, on her own behalf and as next friend of Joseph Puamana, a minor, has brought a bill in equity to redeem mortgage against William K. Castle and D. S. Kau.

Antonio Fernandez by his attorneys, Magoon and Silliman, has filed a demurrer and a motion to over rule injunction both, to the bill in equity for specific performance brought by John D. Paris on a written contract to sell out a stock ranch in Kona. The bill prayed for the appointment of a receiver.

Judge Stanley, on the fifth day of hearing, granted Justina Franca a separation from her husband, A. F. Franca, and will hear the matter of alimony on Monday. Robertson & Wilder for libellant; Correa and Creighton for libellee, who appeals from the judgment.

Julia Aka vs. Fook Say Ake, pending for years, was decided this morning by Judge Stanley, a divorce being granted for non-support. C. F. Peterson for libellant; defendant in person.

Kathleen K. Paiko was also granted a divorce from her husband, Joseph Paiko, on three grounds found proved. Hatch for libellant; Kaulokou for libellee.

Judge Perry overruled the motion for a new trial made on behalf of defendant in the libel case of Harry Saylor vs. Star Newspaper Association. Kinney, Ballou & McClanahan for the motion; Creighton and Henshall contra.

This evening Nance O'Neil and the McKee Rankin Company appear in the Magistrate.

NEW CEYLON SEED RECEIVED

Commissioner Clark Propagating Valuable Plants.

Detail of How These New Plants May be of Advantage—Of Interest to All Agriculturalists.

The Bureau of Agriculture has received the following seeds which the Secretary ordered from Ceylon, and they have been placed in the hands of the gardener for propagation. It is deemed best not to distribute these scarce and high priced seeds, but to grow young plants for distribution, which will insure better results than for the propagation to be left to those not skilled in the work, which would be the case in many instances: Piper Nigrum (commercial black pepper). Croton Tiglium (produces Croton oil). Garcinia Mangostana (Mango-steen). Sterculia Acuminata (Kola nut). Erythrina Lithospema (valuable for shade for coffee and cocoa, also for enriching the soil). Bassia Latifolia (valuable for its timber and for the flowers which are rich in saccharine matter). Hevea Brazilinsis, Para Rubber, which produces the finest rubber that is collected. From a circular accompanying the seed we quote: "The Para rubber tree is the most profitable of all the known kinds of India rubber yielding trees to cultivate; it thrives from sea level up to one thousand feet and over on any soil; moist lands, borders of rivers and inundated places are preferred. The only enemy is cattle; they are very fond of young plants; seeds are as large as nutmegs and are eaten very greedily by pigs. Para rubber was worth 4 shillings 4 pence per pound last August in London.

Mr. J. C. Willis, Director Royal Botanic Gardens, Ceylon, reports: "It succeeds best on a flat wet alluvial soil at very low elevations, but in sheltered positions will thrive at elevation of over three thousand feet, although the growth is of course much slower. When plants are ready for distribution I will supply such information as is available to aid in obtaining the best results possible in the experimental planting. If the tree can be introduced into our mountain forest districts with success, there is apparently no reason why they cannot be made a source of large revenue to the Government, and at the same time be valuable as conservers of the water supply for which our forests are now mostly valued. The Department will also secure Camphor seed and propagate it largely for forest planting. BYRON O. CLARK.

"Children's playground to the front" is the cry, but the response is echoed in continuous delay.

Evidently, the Popular Science Monthly does not take as kindly to historical takes as some of our contemporaries.

Wray Taylor is as usual to be congratulated on the Monday night's concert. When Mr. Taylor takes hold of a concert proposition success is assured.

If Governor Roosevelt came to Honolulu, the wise conservative boys could suddenly come hurrah boys. It is strange indeed how some of our friends adapt themselves to circumstances and when caught in a political box try to agree with everybody.

The morning organ is about to start up a new historical society, and has set one of its attaches at work on the wreck of the ship Norval. Judging from the incorrectness of the historical data which is published about the Norval, we presume the Advertiser's attaché must be its old friend Mons Gaspard de Coligny.

After years of argument and appeal, Hawaii is to have the experiment station, it has so long needed, conducted particularly in the the interest of those having small land areas to cultivate. The Board of Agriculture and the people are to be congratulated. Once the movement is started, under the new conditions, it is bound to continue and give forth new benefits to the people.

An interesting incident of the Pennsylvania campaign was the return of Gideon Marsh, who is held responsible for wrecking the Keystone bank. The Quay republicans were making insinuations as to what Marsh might say about Wanamaker if he were to return. Wanamaker in a public speech called on Gideon Marsh to come out from his hiding and say what he pleased. The following day Gideon Marsh appeared on the scene and was taken in custody by the Philadelphia police. What effect his return had on the election is an unknown quantity, but the question now arises whether Quay has been keeping Marsh for political purposes.

Hawaii has been annexed but Henry T. Oxnard and his beet sugar followers do not love the new territory any more than they ever did. Oxnard has given notice that the beet sugar men will combine with the tobacco producers and ask Congress to place a duty on imports coming from the new colonies. That the people of the States will allow such action is not probable, but Oxnard and his crowd may be able to block legislation for Hawaii in the coming short session of Congress. There are a good number of Representatives and Senators whose terms expire on March 4th who may not be averse to whooping it up for home producers as against the colonies.

WHO SPEAKS THE TRUTH?

Now the Advertiser questions the veracity of the BULLETIN's statement that the patriotic letter it published was a personal letter. It says, "it is incomprehensible that at this late date the claim should be advanced that the communication was 'personal.'" Now here's a statement that we defy the Advertiser to deny: The letter which it published was contained in an envelope on which these words were type written, "W. N. Armstrong, Editor of the Pacific Commercial Advertiser." On the left hand corner of that letter was written in ink the word "personal." The letter itself was addressed "Friend Armstrong." Look up the letter; look up the envelope and if the BULLETIN is not right the BULLETIN will "acknowledge the corn."

We regret very much entering upon the personal side of this affair, but when the question of the BULLETIN's veracity is brought in question, it is not our disposition allow a lie to be thrown at us.

So far as Mr. McStocker is concerned, he has neither authorized or suggested any statement that has appeared in connection with his letter. Any American who would not defend the sentiments which he expressed is not worthy the name of an American. Mr. McStocker's sentiments are too well known in this community for any common sense individual to consider that he regrets any expression of patriotism he has ever made. The circumstances attending this incident are such however as to indicate a studied desire on the part of the morning organ not alone to cry down patriotic Americans but to attempt to hold to scorn one of the chief exponents of such sentiment in this territory. The Advertiser has not yet been able to prove wherein any of its statements have contained a scintilla of true American spirit. In each and every instance its final resort has been the funny story. The examples it has attempted to draw from history are acts and sentiments that have been repudiated by the American people. The character of weak kneed patriotism which it expounds appeals to the loyal citizens of no nation on earth.

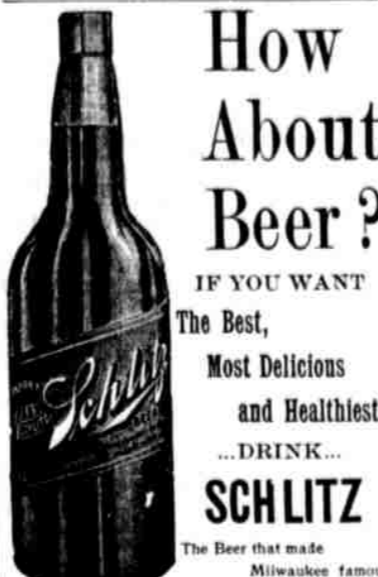

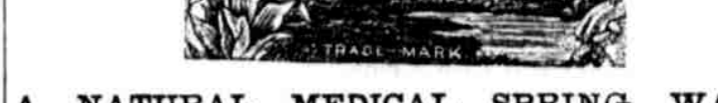
